# Sending Information of Employment and Assignment of the Teachers in the Affiliated Hospitals XVI.

Assigning the nurses and a certain number of the doctors at the Owensboro-Daviess County Hospital and the Jennie Stuart Memorial Hospital as teachers at Murray State College, in the Division of Nursing, indicating, of course, that the people are located in the respective affiliated hospitals.

The hospitals will pay the salaries; but the National League of Nursing Education insists that if our Department of Nursing is to be accredited, the people at the hospitals must be listed and recognized as teachers on the faculty of Murray State College.

#### XVII. High School Day

High School Day was held Friday, April 11, and we had a fine, representative group from throughout western Kentucky. Because of the cold and threatening weather, the group was not as large as it would have been if the weather had been more pleasant; but, even so, the attendance of visitors was between 1,500 and 2,000.

The various Departments did an outstanding job in pointing out to high school seniors opportunities in various vocations and professions.

### XVIII. Intersession Courses

Three Intersession Courses are planned to be offered from May 19 to June 6, 1952:

Home Economics 235, Nutrition in the Elementary School, three semester hours, to be taught by Miss Marjorie Murphey. Miss Murphey's salary will be paid by the State Board of Health.

Education 127, Child Growth and Development, three semester hours, to be taught by Mrs. O. C. Whitfield, Supervisor of Instruction in Hopkins County Schools. We have agreed to pay Mrs. Whitfield \$225.00 for the intersession period; and I ask approval of this action.

Biology 112A, Field Biology, three semester hours, is to be taught; and the plans are to have Mr. C. W. Kemper to handle this course.

# XIX. Summer School Program

A complete summer school program, designed to meet the needs of the people of the area, has been planned. In addition to the regular offerings, there will be two workshops: one in Educational Leadership, operated in cooperation with the State Department of Education; and one in Moral and Spiritual Development in Education, likewise operated in cooperation with the State Department of Education.

# President Authorized To Proceed with Matter of Issuing Bonds for the Enlargement of the Cymnasium

Pursuant to previous action by the Board of Regents, Mr. H. L. Sullivan, of Paducah, Kentucky, came before the Board and presented the proposal for the issuance of second-lien bonds in an amount not to exceed \$75,000.00 to furnish funds for the enlargement of the Gymmasium in the Health and Physical Education Building, as submitted by Stein Bros. & Boyce, Almstead Brothers and Bankers Bond Company.

Motion was made by Mr. Winslow that the Board of Regents authorize the President to proceed on the proposition made by Stein Bros. & Boyce, Almstead Brothers and Bankers Bond Company, as submitted to the Board under date of April 14, 1952, with reference to selling the bonds for the enlargement of the college gymnasium. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Price, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye; Mr. Butler, aye. The motion was unanimously carried, and the proposal referred to therein follows:

Gentlemen:

You have advised us that you desire to enlarge your present Gymnasium, making improvements to the Physical Education Building, through the issuance of Revenue Bonds and aid from the State of Kentucky.

In 1935 we and our associates handled an issue of \$145,000 of 1% Building Revenue Bonds on the Physical Education and Home Economics Buildings of which there is outstanding at this time \$68,000 maturing serially from November 1, 1952 through 1963. These bonds are non-callable and it will be necessary to issue Second Lien Bonds.

We are of the opinion that the Second Lien Bond issue should be limited to \$75,000 and, therefore, are submitting to you the following proposal:

We will guarantee a bid to you of 100-1/2, the bonds to bear a coupon rate not to exceed 3-1/4%.

We will employ Messrs. Chapman & Cutler, Attorneys, and cause them to prepare for your adoption and execution all the necessary resolutions and other instruments to issue and sell the bonds.

It is understood that you are to show earnings on the project sufficient, in our opinion, to cover interest and principal charges and set up sufficient reserves.

It will be provided in the advertised notice of sale, or sales, that all bidders shall have the right to name their own coupon rate or rates in multiples of 1/4 of 1%. The bonds will be widely advertised and through this manner of permitting bidders to fix coupon rates the Board of Regents will be assured of securing the lowest possible interest rate.

The bonds are to mature serially from one to twenty years as mutually agreeable, taking into consideration the outstanding bonds, and be callable at 103 the first five years, 102 the second five years, and 101 the third five years, and at 100 thereafter in inverse numerical order.

We agree that we will pay the expenses incident to the carrying out of this sale or sales, including the fees of our counsel, cost of printing the bonds, recording fees, cost of advertising and holding the sales, except that you are to furnish us free of cost, title examinations or abstracts executed by your attorney as may be required by our counsel.

You are to cooperate with us in furnishing any information which is needed and which is requested in connection with the issuance of said bonds. We agree to proceed in said matter with all reasonable promptness toward the end of holding said public sales of bonds.

In accordance with sound banking practices, should the bonds not be sold by May 29, 1952, then after said date, should the index basis of Twenty Bond Averages as shown by The Bond Buyer, be more than as the date hereon, then the interest coupon rate or rates on said bonds be adjusted so that the bonds shall be sold on an adjusted basis, bearing the same ratio to the index basis on the date of sale as the basis stated in our proposal bears to the index basis as of the date of this proposal and in no event, less than the basis in this proposal.

As compensation to us for our services and expenses and for the fees of our counsel and the risk which we assume in making the above guaranteed bids, you are to pay us a sum equal to 2-1/2% of the face amount of the bonds issued. This compensation is to be payable to us whether we are the highest bidder at the sale or not, and if we become the purchaser of the bonds, we are to be permitted to take credit for the compensation when we pay for the bonds.

If said bonds have not been sold by May 29, 1952, we reserve the privilege of withdrawing from our undertakings hereunder at any time thereafter by giving written notice to the Board of Regents of such withdrawal.

Said bonds are to be issued subject to the approving legal opinion of our attorneys and that the bonds under existing laws and rulings are not subject to Federal or Kentucky Income taxation and Ad Valorem tax.

This proposal contemplates assisting your Board of Regents in developing the best plan for financing your building program through the issuance of Revenue Bonds, and securing for you at the time the bonds are sold the lowest possible rate or rates of interest available in the market for your bonds at the time same are publicly advertised for sale.
