## City Gas Franchise Is Awarded to Owensboro Man

J. H. Moseley Jr. of Owensboro was awarded a franchise to install a natural gas system in Benton by members of the City Council Monday night.

The franchise was awarded to Moseley on his high bid of 2 percent of the system's gross income, plus payment of \$500 cash and the advertising costs.

The only other bidder on the franchise was the West Kentucky Gas Co., which bid \$250 plus advertising costs for the franchise.

Mr. Moseley is vice president of the Modern Welding Company of Owensboro, but he bid on the gas franchise as an individual and his company will have no part in the installation of the gas system here.

The modern Welding Company, however, installed Benton's water system extensions a couple of years ago.

Installation of the privately-owned gas system in Benton probably will start some time during this year. The project must have the approval of the Federal Power Commission.

Merchants Here Fined For Assault

A Marshall Circuit Court jury Tuesday found Richard Cooksey guilty of assault and battery and fixed his fine at \$100.

Cooksey, operator of the Cooksey & Smith dry goods store here, had been indicted on a charge of assault and battery against Mrs. Marshall Wyatt.

Mrs. Wyatt, on the witness stand, told this story:

Mrs. Cooksey came to the Wyatt home on Oct. 5 to telephone police after the Cookseys allegedly had an altercation. Cooksey followed her to the Wyatt home and struck his wife, according to the testimony.

When Mrs. Wyatt intervened, Cooksey struck her, it was revealed in the trial.

A local physician testified he treated Mrs. Wyatt for head and facial bruises.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Cooksey denied that Mrs. Wyatt was struck.

### Kentucky is One of Few States to Show Tuberculosis Gain

Kentucky was one of 21 states with an increase in the number of new, active cases of tuberculosis in 1953, according to an article in the January issue of the bulletin of the National Tuberculosis Association.

While the country as a whole showed a decline of about three per cent over the 1952 case-rate, 2,831 new cases were found in Kentucky in 1953 as compared with 2,231 the previous year. The figures show that Kentucky had the dubious honor of having both the third highest TB case rate and the third highest death rate in the nation.

The article, based on provisional information from the U. S. Public Health Service, stated that 113,531 new cases of TB were reported in continental United States and its territories during 1953. In contrast to the high case rate, deaths from tuberculosis over the nation continued to decline. During that year the number of TB deaths in Kentucky were reduced 25 per cent after the previous years.

Plan your cropping system now, if haven't already done so, for crops to be grown next summer. Try for maximum yields of all crops. Soil test and use fertilizer according to soil needs. Plant adopted varieties and cultivate properly. This is one way to reduce cost of production.

Woodrow Hill, manager of the Marshall County Soil Improvement Association, announces a corn yield contest for the county. The purpose of the contest is to stimulate better corn production management, such as land selection, fertilization, proper spacing and cultivation. Full details of the contest will be announced later.

## Business Outlook is Good For Marshall County in '55

Marshall County started the year 1955 in good financial condition, according to the year-end financial statements of the three banks in the county.

Deposits in the three county banks totaled \$7,619,173.84, an all-time record. The Bank of Marshall County reported deposits of \$3,576,160.78, the Bank of Benton \$2,898,107.73 and the Calvert Bank \$934,905.30.

Resources of the three banks also hit an all-time high. The Bank of Marshall County, for the first time, became a four million dollar institution, its total resources amounting to \$4,106,253.19.

The Bank of Benton, for the first time, became a three million dollar institution, with total resources amounting to \$3,035,767.28.

The Calvert Bank at Calvert City hit for the first time the million dollar mark, with total resources amounting to \$1,061,344.85.

Other developments indicate that 1955 will be a good year in the county.

Construction of the new 6 million dollar General Aniline and Film Corp. plant at Calvert City is expected to be at its peak this year, and operation of the plant is expected to begin in 1956.

Construction of the new 3 million dollar addition to the Air Reduction plant at Calvert City is expected to be in full swing this year.

Benton High School will erect a new gymnasium this year.

Installation of a natural gas system is expected to get underway this year in Benton.

There also is talk that a new shopping center will be constructed in Calvert City, and also a new shopping center will be erected in Benton.

With commercial construction outlook bright and residential construction holding up well, there is little likelihood of any unemployment in the building trades. Other unemployment is expected to be held to a minimum.

So the business picture in Marshall County for 1955 looks good. Forecasts are expecting business in general to be as good as it was in 1954, and possibly better.

## Oil Heaters Cause Many Fatal Fires; Precautions Urged

A recent survey made by the  
National Fire Protection As-  
sociation shows that oil heaters—  
that is stove, range and space  
heaters—cause about a fourth of  
fatal fires in dwellings.

Of these, one-third are caused  
by portable heaters, which in  
many places are still in frequent  
use—often in tenement dwellings  
that are especially vulnerable to  
the spread of fire and loss of life.

Because of these things, the  
National Board of Fire Under-  
writers has issued the following  
precautions:

1. Don't place the heater near  
a doorway where the exit could  
be blocked.
2. Don't put it where it can  
easily be tipped over.
3. Keep it away from curtains,  
bedding or other combustibles.
4. Don't fill it when hot or  
when in use.
5. Be sure there's ventilation  
in the room at night—open a  
window.
6. Don't let children play near  
the heater.

## How Important Is Your TV Antenna?

Buying a television set is truly a family affair. The lady of the house  
examines the cabinet. The head of the clan probes the chassis. Junior  
is interested only in the picture. But no one thinks much about the  
antenna. And yet reception can only be as good as the antenna that sits  
on the roof. The antenna is the "eyes and ears" of your TV set.



There's a lot of gold at the end of every  
rainbow, even this one—a powerful new  
TV antenna called the "Rainbow." Hold-  
ing the pot is model Pat Parker, recently  
elected "Miss Channel Master of 1953" by  
a group of TV viewers meeting in El-  
lenville, N. Y. The "Rainbow," say antenna  
engineers, was designed for top efficiency  
in all kinds of weather. Blandliest Miss  
Parker, unfortunately, does not make the  
same claim.

New antennas are constantly  
being developed to solve difficult  
reception problems, and to provide  
TV pictures of ever-improving  
quality. For example, Channel  
Master Corp. recently introduced  
a new type of all-channel antenna  
that is claimed to be the most pow-  
erful long-distance TV antenna  
ever developed. Called the "Cham-  
pion Rainbow," it not only provides  
better black-and-white reception  
than ever before possible, but also  
meets the rigid technical require-  
ments for color television.

Another problem recently solved  
is that of homes being stained by  
rust streaks from the steel masts  
to which antennas are attached.  
To prevent this, Channel Master  
has developed an all-aluminum  
mast which can never rust. It is  
also stronger, lighter and easier to  
handle than steel masts.

Engineers are presently work-  
ing on many other products to pro-  
vide better television reception at  
greater and greater distances from  
the TV station. If your picture  
shows "ghosts," "snow," or other  
disturbances, if you are not clearly  
receiving all channels potentially  
available in your area, ask your  
service man whether he can recom-  
mend an antenna that can improve  
your reception. Chances are that  
he can.
