ZENO YOUNG.

Our candidate for Senator Rubs It In On Convict Lunsford.

A large crowd assembled in the Court house Monday afternoon to hear Zeno Young, Democratic candidate for State Senator, discuss the issues now before the people. He was received with a round of enthusiasm and made a ringing speech for his party. After explicitly stating his views on various questions, he proceeded to discuss the issues of the canvass. He said he was a poor man, running honestly and decently for the office. Then he took up Lunsford's convict record showing that he either voted against or dodged the following bills while in the Legislature: The bill requiring employers to pay miners in money; the substitute to take convicts out of mines; to employ check-weighmen; to secure ventilation of mines; to prevent the employment of children in mines; and he also favored a bill to permit landlords to enforce leases on all the produce of tenements and to repeal all exemptions—showing that Lunsford is a bootler and against free and honest labor. The speaker then proceeded to correct certain misrepresentations that were freely circulated about him, and closed his remarks amidst a storm of applause.

Mr. Young's speech was a clean, searching argument, and if ever a man was skinned alive Lunsford was that man. The Republican candidate persistently refuses, to meet Mr. Young. He will not take a position on a single question of importance and is worthy of no man's vote.

At the conclusion of Mr. Young's speech the Republicans yelled out "Eug. Tinsley," and if there ever was a man who mistook his calling it was the good "Squire" when he attempted that speech. It was a "bad break" and had no effect whatever.

Mr. Young is making a sweeping canvass. Every day his cause brightens. He has driven his opponent into his hole, and next Monday he will record a victory for Democracy of some 300 or 400 majority.

At the conclusion of Mr. Tinsley's speech, loud calls for "Henry" brought forward Mr. R. W. Henry, who proceeded to take the scalp of Mr. Tinsley in the most approved Democratic style. Mr. Henry was followed by Col. A. H. Clark who made a good speech for a very bad cause.
