## 5 Business Firms Here Burglarized In a Single Night

Five Benton business firms were burglarized and ransacked Tuesday night in a series of break-ins that was the talk of the town Wednesday.

City police Wednesday afternoon arrested one youth as a suspect, but he was released after being questioned.

Officers theorized that the break-ins were committed by two or more young hoodlums who were more interested in money than anything else.

Cash drawers at all five firms were emptied but only a small amount of money was obtained.

At Benton Cleaners, the burglars took about \$3 in change from the cash register, an old watch, at least one suit of men's clothes, two pairs of slacks and a leather jacket. They scattered clothing over the floor of the plant.

They also took time to remove a \$3.98 top trumpet from its case—either to see if it were a genuine horn or perhaps to blow a few notes on it.

At the Chevrolet Cafe, the vandals cooked themselves some "short-order" food and left the kitchen in a mess. They also took all the change from the cash register and several cartons of cigarettes.

At Lane Lumber Co., they had to prize open the cash register and got only small change for their efforts of ruining the re-

## Big Housing Project Planned at Calvert City

The Kentucky Report, a business guide published by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, has a recent issue advising business men to "keep a big eye in 1955 on Calvert City, Kentucky's booming center of chemicals and other manufacture."

The publication says that "major developments are looming" at Calvert City.

A new Calvert City company has been organized by Hubert T. Willis, Louisville attorney, with corporate powers broad enough "to run that section of Kentucky," says the Kentucky Report.

It goes on to say that this new company soon will launch a big housing development project to ease Calvert City's growing pains.

Associated with Mr. Willis in the new company are W. L. Lyons, Louisville, and H. V. Duckett, Calvert City realtor.

This new firm, reports say, has option on property lying between Adams Road and Highway 95 and approximately 40 acres lying west of Highway 95. Value of the property is about \$150,000.

The new company proposes to build four brick apartment projects containing 32 rental units, and two large business buildings which will house six and eight stores. Leasing of the business units already has been started.

It is understood on good authority that at least three large chain stores have made commitments toward leasing space in the proposed two new business buildings.

The property improvement of the new company includes sidewalks, hard surface streets, water and sewer lines, electricity and natural gas.



Wm. M. Gray, district director of Internal Revenue, has announced that several hundred taxpayers have filed their returns on the facsimile copy of 1040-A rather than on the card Form 1040-A. He added that all of these returns are incorrectly filled, and that the processing will be delayed.

All taxpayers who have adjusted gross income of \$5,000 or less from wages subject to withholding, and not more than \$100 of other wages, dividends, and interest should file federal in-




