Where Were the Police?

AN EDITORIAL

Benton suffered a serious outbreak of lawlessness last week. Five business firms were broken into and burglarized in one night. The news story made the front pages of nearly every newspaper in West Kentucky, and was printed widely over the entire state. And such unfavorable publicity is not good for a town.

The burglars apparently tried to make our police department look as sorry as possible. The thieves leisurely cooked themselves free food and ate it while they were burglarizing the Chevrolet Cafe. The lights in the cafe burned brightly while the burglars "worked" and feasted.

The lights also were on at the Benton Cleaners, where the burglars took time to examine a toy trumpet, to scatter clothing all over the floor, to rifle the cash drawer and to thumb through the firm's paper records.

The lawbreakers took time at Lane Lumber Co. to place the cash register on the floor and hammer and pry it open.

Where were the police during all this time? We have been asked this question dozens of times since the five break-ins. And it certainly is a reasonable question to ask.

There is another statement going around town that also deserves to be mentioned. The statement is this: We can't find a policeman when we want one.

With so much criticism going around, it seems obvious that the police department is not as efficient as it should be. Benton has three fulltime policemen and one part-time officer. The police department also has a radio equipped patrol car.

For a town of 3,000 population, this would appear to be ample police protection. But, apparently, it is not. Else we would not have had five burglaries in one night without the police at least encountering the burglars at one of the five places.

Perhaps the police department is not using its manpower wisely. It shouldn't be too big a task for two night officers to cruise in the police car over the entire residential area and to make a foot check of every building in the business section at least every hour and a half.

With a foot check of the business buildings and a cruise of the residential sections every hour and a half it would be difficult for burglars to operate without getting caught. And with such a thorough check every 90 minutes it would be almost impossible for five break-ins to take place in one night without the culprits being captured.

We believe the citizens of Benton are paying for ample police protection, and we think it is the duty of the city officials to see to it that the citizens get ample protection.

Otherwise, the citizens would be well within their rights to get themselves a new group of city officials and a new police force come election time.

Henson to Lead Easter Seal Sale

Dr. Sam Henson has been named chairman of the Easter Seal campaign in Marshall County for the 15 consecutive year. Dr. Henson first was appointed as chairman in 1940.

In 1951 Dr. Henson received a special citation from the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, for which the Easter Seal sale is conducted annually.

The Easter Seal campaign, from March 10 to April 10, will stress accident prevention as well as fund-raising to benefit children already handicapped by all types of crippling.

Talton K. Stone, state campaign chairman, said the accident prevention campaign developed because accidents each year kill and cripple more children than do infectious diseases.

Kentucky vital statistics for 1953 showed that home, highway, farm and other accidents took the lives of 255 children under 15 years of age. Polio, influenza, rheumatic fever, tuberculosis, diphtheria and measles claimed 151 lives that year.

Funds raised by the Easter Seal campaign are used to pay for medical care and treatment for all types of crippled children including accident victims through the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission.

Other Kentucky Society for Crippled Children projects include a statewide speech and hearing program through the State Department of Education, operation of Cardinal Hill Nursery School at Lexington and Opportunity School at Covington, and Cardinal Hill Hospital, Lexington.

The Kentucky Society also aids financially the University of Kentucky hearing center and the Rehabilitation Center, Louisville, buys artificial limbs, braces, wheel chairs and hearing aids, pays teacher salaries in three hospitals and loans special equipment to school districts.

Calvert Plans Fire Dept. Fund Drive

A drive to collect funds for the operation of the Calvert City Fire Department during the coming year will be held Feb. 5 - 20 in Calvert City and the surrounding area. It is estimated that it will require a least \$1500 to keep both Calvert fire trucks operating during 1955.

It is planned to sell fire prevention certificates in order to raise this \$1500. Any holder of a Certificate will be entitled to free fire protection for one year. Anyone who does not purchase a certificate will be charged \$25 per fire truck call. It should be emphasized that regardless of whether or not a person has purchased a certificate the fire truck will make the call. However, the \$25 service charge will be levied only on those people who have not purchased a certificate.

The cost of these certificates are as follows: residences - \$5; business places - \$10; industry - \$25. In the case of rental houses, it is planned to sell the certificates to the tenants rather than to the property owner. The sale of these certificates will be made on a house to house basis.

It is necessary to raise \$1500 during this drive in order to take care of such major items as: the purchase of a new water pump for the tank truck; the purchase of some much needed firehoses; the payment of insurance premiums on the firetruck and the firemen. These items alone will account for more than half of the \$1500 operating expenses for the coming year.

The area to be covered in this drive consists of all the incorporated Calvert City plus a limited amount of additional territory. The canvassing will be made in an area a mile and a half on each side of highway 95 and stretching from the new 62 highway north to the Tennessee River.

Recently, the Calvert Fire Department was reorganized so that there are now three separate groups functioning. These are: the operating group headed by Fire Chief Ed Rendlemen; the maintenance group under the leadership of Tim Hellala. The primary function of this latter group is the raising of funds to enable the Calvert Fire Department to stay in operation.

Past money making drives for the Calvert Fire Truck have been traditionally successful. The truck was purchased in 1951 and was completely paid for by 1954. Also during 1954, a tank truck was purchased to furnish an additional water supply to fight fires in outlying districts. Both trucks are completely debt free but upkeep and operating expenses are now a sizable figure.

Even though each Calvert City resident does not expect his home to catch fire during the coming year, it is still his civic duty to purchase a fire protection certificate. There can only be fire protection if there is a fire truck and there can only be a fire truck if there is money to operate it.

It's Time to List Property

Frankfort — Kentucky property owners are reminded by the Department of Revenue that they are required to list their property with county tax commissioners before March 1. The listings are the basis for 1955 property taxes. Kentucky is urged to list their property at the percentage of market value to which the same class of property in their county is assessed. Every property owner should ascertain this from his tax commissioner, and value his own property accordingly. The market value is the amount the property would bring if sold in a free market. The assessed value is the value of the property for tax purposes. If the tax commissioner informs the property owner that the assessment level in his county is 40 per cent, and his property would sell for \$10,000, then he should list it at \$4,000. All real estate, tangible, and intangible property owned by a person should be listed with the county tax commissioner. Tangible property includes automobiles, household furnishings, inventories, farm machinery, and livestock, to name only a few classes. Intangible property includes such items as stocks and bonds, mortgages, notes, and accounts receivable. Many persons find out too late that their property has been omitted from the tax roll.

TOBACCO WORRIES Many people over Kentucky are alarmed about the tobacco situation. With surplus stocks creeping higher, farmers are faced with smaller allotments and lower prices. It is estimated that the income from the 1955 crop will be at least 50 million dollars less than from the 1954 crop. That will mean a decrease in purchasing power for the majority of people in Kentucky, whether they are farmers or not. What hurts tobacco in this state hurts us all.

There are two general solutions to the problem. One, do something about tobacco itself—endeavor to produce more of the light cigarette type — and 2,asten a "diversification" program on Kentucky farms.

Russell Hunt, our Mr. Tobacco, has some pertinent suggestions on the first. He recommends that tobacco be grown in a rotation so that it follows sod at least every other year; that the application of nitrogen be kept to a minimum, and phosphorus and potash be maintained or a very high level. Certain cultural practices also aid in reducing the nicotine content.

We all have high hopes, too, that research workers will soon have desirable types of low nicotine tobacco.

ONE-CROP FARMING is a curse on anybody's farm whether he is a producer of tobacco, corn, cotton, cattle or what not. Russell's recommendation will boost diversification in Kentucky because most crops grow well

after tobacco. This is particularly true of strawberries and alfalfa.

STRAWBERRIES are an excellent supplement for tobacco on the small farm. Berries, properly cared for, will usually equal tobacco in income per acre. Alfalfa follows tobacco well on farms with large allotments and a larger production of alfalfa will encourage more sheep and more economical production of other livestock.

Twenty years ago I was county agent at Paducah, in which area nearly 1000 carloads of strawberries were produced annually. At that time I was considered a near-expert in berry production, but last month while attending the State Horticultural Society I found how much progress had been made in their culture, and how little I knew about modern berry growing.

The berry grower now has "virus-free" plants to insure freedom from certain diseases; chlordane to control grubs, cutworms and aphids; "Crag" herbicide and grass to control weeds and grass; and irrigation to prevent drought damage.

With a combination of these new developments, the berry

Farmers are Told Proper Method to File Income Return

Frankfort - Kentucky farmers have until Feb. 15 to make a declaration of estimated 1954 state income taxes, if they wish to follow this method.

Department of Revenue officials pointed out that there are three possible methods for the farmer to pay his 1954 income tax. The first and easiest is simply to file his final return and pay his state tax by Feb. 28. By using this method, the farmer is not required to file any declaration.

A second method open to the farmer is to declare his estimated 1954 income by Feb. 15 and pay the estimated tax. He must then file a final return by April 15.

The third method is available if he filed a declaration last November 15. In this case, he has until April 25 to file his final return and pay the remainder of his tax.

Any person who earns at least two-thirds of his income from farming may use these methods of paying state income tax.

Forms for filing declarations and final returns are available at banks, county courthouses, and Department of Revenue offices in Frankfort, Ashland, Covington, Lexington, Louisville and Paducah.
