One of Benton's and Marshall County's most urgent needs is a Chamber of Commerce. A proposal for a Chamber of Commerce has been discussed and action for some years but thus far the discussions have brought little action. An energetic and enthusiastic Chamber of Commerce organization could accomplish a great deal for Marshall County. For one thing, the county and Benton especially, could use some new businesses. Benton's factory building is idle again, thus depriving the town of a much-needed payroll. Benton also needs a modern drive-in shopping center, such as Calvert City's new shopping center. And it needs new business firms to occupy such a business center. Benton further needs a new postoffice building. The town and its postal business already have outgrown the present quarters occupied by the postoffice. These are some of the major needs of Benton. And a live-wire Chamber of Commerce organization could do a great deal toward obtaining these much-needed projects for Benton. Leaders of the county should revive the Chamber of Commerce movement. Meetings of citizens should be called to create new interest in such a movement. Grand Jury Indicts 5 and Criticizes Care of Jail

Under the plan, telephone subscribers of Bell could make free calls to West Kentucky County subscribers at Fairdealing and Calvert Telephone System subscribers at Calvert City and Gilbertsville. Under this arrangement Benton could call Gilbertsville, Calvert City and Fairdealing by dialing the called party directly. Gilbertsville could dial customers in Benton and Calvert City would be able to dial Benton and Gilbertsville. Fairdealing could dial the customers in Benton. All of these calls would be on an unlimited basis and could be made without any charge. The Bell System is sending out cards and form letters asking the views of subscribers on the proposed countywide free service. Southern Bell, however, proposes some rate increases before instituting its free countywide hookup. The following graphs are Southern Bell's proposals rate increases as outlined in the form letters mailed to subscribers. Before introducing this free plan, the rates for your local service would have to be changed to equal those paid elsewhere in the state for local service available to the same number of telephones. For customers having a business service, the increase would amount to \$1.00 a month except those who have rural business service; their increase would amount to 50 a month. For customers having residence individual line, the increase would be 50 a month and all other residence customers would pay an increase of 55 a month. Before we undertake to provide the complex equipment and facilities necessary to furnish this Extended Service, we would like to be assured that this new service will have the approval of a large majority of subscribers. For that reason we are enclosing a postal card and we will appreciate your indicating your wishes on it and returning it to us at your earliest convenience. The introduction of this proposed Extended Scope Service must necessarily be conditioned on its acceptance by the majority of our subscribers.

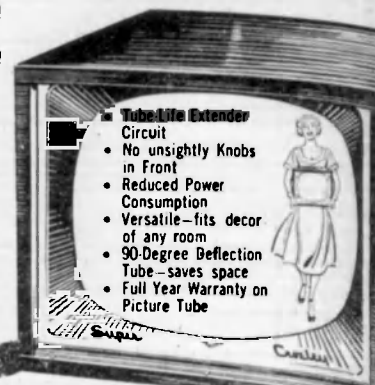

Methodist Hospital Fund Drive Nears \$2,500,000 Goal

The Memphis Conference of the Methodist Church has soared to victory in the Methodist Hospital building campaign.

The seven districts of the conference have topped their individual quotas to send the conference, composed of churches in West Tennessee and West Kentucky, high above the victory mark of \$2,500,000. So far the conference has reported \$914,312, which is \$164,312 more than the original quota.

The three conferences which own the hospital—Memphis, North Mississippi and North Arkansas—and the general public in the Memphis trade area are renewing their efforts to raise \$378,205, the amount between present pledges and victory, by Wednesday, March 23, final report meeting in Memphis.

The North Arkansas Conference has raised \$212,656 of its \$400,000 goal. North Mississippi Methodist have reported \$304,444 of their \$350,000 quota. The public phase of solicitation in the Memphis trade area has collected \$891,596 of its one million dollar quota.

Total amount sought is \$2,500,000.

Foster is political sponsor of many state employees from 1st Dist. who owe allegiance to Foster not administration. New batch of A&ID Board letterheads bearing Foster's name as board member rolled off press day before Foster endorsed Chandler.

Private polls showing administration candidate running far behind Chandler. Also showing Harry Lee Waterfield (Clinton) out front for lieutenant governor. Waterfield is definitely Chandler man. Observers see Aug. race as 3-pronged prize for winning team, governorship, pick U. S. Senator in 1956, and control of party machinery at National Democratic Convention in Chicago next year.

Some Democrats fear "Pyrrhic victory" from bitter battle between administration forces and Chandler. They feel either way will be worst blow to party in decades. Administration has launched grand strategy of "divide-and-conquer" . . . trying to pledge every elected Democrat in state to Combs. Chandler forces meeting this challenge head-on. But one top Democrat told Ky. Report: "Somebody's

got to stay neutral in this fight to help pick up the pieces after August 6."

Inside observers in Jefferson County expressing concern several frictions here threatening political picture: bitterness among taxpayers outside City over annexation threats for one. . . . City's proposal to County that special taxing measures be taken in areas where City now provides part services . . . and also taxing formula on real property. Observers say these frictions could cause Democrats to lose Board of Aldermen . . . two County Commissioners and County Judge . . . when coupled to bitter within-party fight for governor.

Living in Health

Lesson for March 20, 1955

ASCARIASIS is the name of a disease. It is caused by colonies of small round worms, parasites, named Ascaris. A Christian medical missionary who operates a hospital in Korea writes: "Reducing the number of people who have this debilitating parasite from 98% to 38% in one year, in our leper colony, is something to shout about from the housetops of Korea. Ascariasis takes that sharp edge off a person so that he is dull; his ambition is dampened; his reflexes are sluggish, and his integrity is weakened. I sometimes feel that many of the attributes so often blamed on the Devil may possibly be more accurately credited to the lowly round worm that lives in comfort inside of most Koreans." This is just one single illustration of something many Christians do not realize: that spiritual health, mental health and physical health all go together.

Doing, Not Drifting

Christian living has many aspects. One of them is the importance of keeping a healthy body. Ascariasis seldom puts the patient to bed. Indeed the patient is seldom aware that anything is wrong with him, and yet his lack of ambition, his dullness of mind, his lack of dependability, may have their basis in his physical condition. So it is with all diseases, so it is with all physical inefficiency even when you can't quite call it a disease. It is a sin to be less healthy than you can be. It is assuming you can help it because your physical flabbiness leads to mental and moral and spiritual flabbiness too. This is not saying that every patient in a hospital is there because of his personal sins. But it is true that many of them are there precisely by their own fault. The point is, health of body is a Christian's responsibility, a duty he owes God, other men, and himself. And health of body will not come by chance. It will not come by drifting. It comes by doing. This is true of the whole Christian life. Bottom to top, Paul says to his converts: "Every one of you should learn to control his body, keeping it pure and treating it with respect, and never regarding it as an instrument for self-gratification." (I Thess. 4:4, Phillips translation.) Health begins in self-control comes only by working at it.

Purity Is Positive

It is true that the New Testament warns against spiritual sins as much as against physical sins, if not more so. But it is also true that there are plain teachings about virtues and vices of the body itself. Drunkenness, sexual sins of various kinds, are always marked out as spiritual dangers. Blessed are the pure in heart, that is true. But those who are not pure in body are not pure in heart. Further, purity is not a negative thing. A virgin who has never touched a drop of liquor might yet not be pure. Repression of desire as the Bible knows and as psychology on its own has also discovered, — sheer repression, with nothing to balance it, may be a bad thing. A driver was boasting about how he eliminated some distance on a certain route he took every week, and so saved three minutes on every trip. But he could not answer the question: What do you do with those three minutes? So purity of life means more than not squandering our energies and wasting our health, or drink or otherwise, it means using the energy we save, as God would have it used.

Who's In Charge Here?

The key question for health—physical, mental, and spiritual—is, Who is in charge here? Is your body in charge of your mind, or is it the other way around? But which mind is in charge here? Our lazy, sleepy, shiftless mind, content with ignorance, asking only to be amused (for you have such a mind), or the mind that strives to higher things (for you have such a mind too). You carry with you all your life the mind of the brute, the mind of the child, but you have the right to a mature mind, to be mature. Who is in charge here, the brute, the child, or you? Above all, who is in charge of you? If the true answer to that last question is God, then the true answer to the others will be easier.

INCOME TAX FACTS No. 4 Get All Exemptions for Yourself and Dependents

(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Kentucky Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Many taxpayers cheat themselves on their personal exemptions. Of course, there are others who get into trouble by claiming too many exemptions — like the cowboy who claimed an exemption for his horse because he loved him like a brother. The rules for a taxpayer's own exemptions are the same this year as last year, but the new tax law has made it easier to get exemptions for dependents.

Your Own Exemptions

Here's how to count your exemptions (each one takes \$600 off your taxable income):

One exemption for yourself, two if you are 65 or over, two if you are blind, three if you are both 65 and blind. The same applies to your husband or wife.

If your husband or wife died during 1954 you can file a joint return claiming the exemptions including those for age or blindness, to which the deceased would have been entitled at the time of death.

Exemptions for Dependents

One exemption of \$600 can be taken for each person who fits the definition of a dependent. This \$600 is not doubled for age or blindness, as in the case of your personal exemption.

To count for an exemption, the dependent must:

1. Have less than \$600 gross income for 1954 (except that under the new law this does not apply to your child if he is under 19 or is a full-time student).

2. Have received more than half his support from you. (New Law: Do not include scholarships in figuring total cost of support. The dependent may also qualify even though no one person furnished more than half of his support. If a group of persons who would otherwise be able to claim the dependent contributed more than half, any member of the group who contributed at least 10% may claim the dependent if all others who contributed 10% or more have signed a declaration that they will not claim the deduction.)

3. Not file a joint return with her husband (or his wife).

4. Be either a citizen of the U. S. or a resident of the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone, Panama, or (in some cases) the Philippines.

5. Live with you (absentee while attending school does not interfere) or be a close relative as defined in the tax instructions or be a cousin receiving institutional care for a mental or physical disability who lived with you before going to the institution.

Children and Disabled Dependents

Don't forget that a baby born any time up to midnight December 31 counts as a full exemption.

A new feature this year is a deduction of as much as \$600 for care of a dependent while the breadwinner is working. This deduction is available to mothers, widowers, divorced and legally separated persons, who are allowed to deduct expenses up to \$600 for the care of a son, daughter, stepson, or stepdaughter under 12 (or any dependent who is mentally or physically incapacitated).

A working wife is entitled to this deduction if her husband is physically or mentally incapable of providing support. Where the husband is not disabled, the working wife may also take a deduction if a joint return is filed, except that the \$600 limit is reduced by the amount the couple's gross income exceeds \$4,500.

Kentucky Banks in Good Financial Shape

Frankfort — Kentucky's 284 banks and trust companies under state supervision increased their holdings by \$78,000,000 during last year, reports Commissioner of Banking Henry H. Carter. Total assets rose from \$1,240,853,460 to \$1,318,868,519 for the year, largest single year's growth in a decade.

Resources showed, loans and discounts of \$469,249,547.22 up \$21,000,000 over a year ago; Government obligations of \$441,247,244.67, an increase of \$29,000,000 during the year, and cash and due from banks, \$349,944,117.47 an increase of \$26,400,000 was reported.

Liabilities likewise showed an increase with demand deposits of \$753,848,944.46 being reported at the end of the year, up \$26,500,000 over a year ago. Time deposits of \$170,669,757.23 were recorded, an increase of \$16,600,000.

Capital accounts of banks showed \$26,524,400, compared with \$25,881,400 a year ago; while combined surplus totals were \$49,140,213.42, up \$3,115,000 and undivided profits and reserves were \$23,302,959.35 an increase of \$4,289,000 for the year.

Sales of Plymouth Cars in January Reached New High

J. D. Gammel of Benton Auto Exchange said Plymouth cars are in greater demand here than ever before at this time of the year.
Nationally, Plymouth retail deliveries for January totaled 52,122, and were 63 percent above the same month last year. This compares with 31,900 Plymouths delivered at retail in January, 1954.
Plymouth's biggest previous January had been 1953 when 49,221 units were delivered. During January new orders received were ahead of shipments by 35 percent, despite production schedules exceeding 3,000 units daily.
Mr. Gammel said, "This sales record is only the beginning of

a record Plymouth year." He pointed out that Plymouth began a schedule of overtime work the first of February, increasing production to meet public demand for the all new Plymouth cars.

Despite the overtime, which has increased Plymouth's production by nearly 10 percent, the backlog of orders continues to mount, and is now 24 percent greater than when the new models were first placed on sale in mid-November. At the same time, stocks of new Plymouth cars in dealers' hands are 28 percent below a year ago.

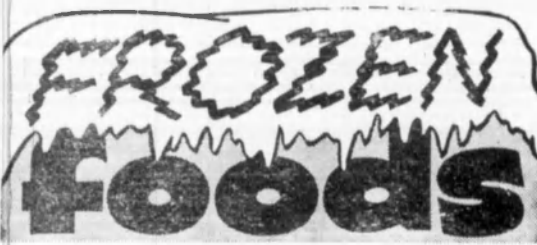
