Fire Razes Holland Residence

The house and all the contents were a total loss. The Hollands only saved the clothes on their backs. Mrs. Holland did grab a cloak as she fled from the burning house.

Mr. Holland said the fire started near the electric stove or the refrigerator, but he did not know what caused it.

The only help the Hollands had in fighting the fire were some neighbors of ladies. One auto came along after the fire was over, but the occupants could be of no help then.

Hard Freeze Damages Crops, Fruit, Gardens

The extreme cold weather over the weekend caused extensive damage to all crops in the county. Many tobacco beds were destroyed. Lespedeza has been killed, if the seed had germinated or were up. Spring seedlings of clover and grasses have been killed or severely chilled.

Peaches have been destroyed. Other tree fruits have been killed or severely damaged. The damage done cannot be completely estimated for several days. Some tree damage will show up in a few days.

Strawberries have been severely damaged, and much of the crop has been lost. However, there may be a partial crop. Time will tell. Some of the crowns were showing some discoloration Monday. Damage will show on new berries set this year. It is not too late to set berries now. Plants from cold storage are still available.

Row garden vegetables such as greens (new seedlings) lettuce, radishes, etc. were destroyed. Others such as peas, onions and cabbage were damaged. Replant as soon as possible.

Lawns, shrubs, roses, and other flowers were killed or damaged. All damaged or killed branches or tops should be pruned as soon as the extent of damage can be determined.

Reseed tobacco beds, lespezea, and other clovers if they are killed.

Plan now to include sudan grass in your pasture program. It will fill in during July, August and September. Plant about two weeks later than corn and fertilize heavily.

Phillip Coulter Tells of Page Boy's Life in Washington

The first in a series of articles on the life of a page boy in "Capitol Hill" written by Phillip Coulter, page boy in the U. S. Senate.

Jan. 27, 1955, I received a telegram from Senator Aiken W. Barkley which stated: "I am glad to inform you that I have appointed you as a page in the United States Senate. Please notify me when you can be here."

Naturally, after many months of correspondence and anxious waiting, I was excited and glad. It is extremely rare that a Junior Senator gets page patronage, which is the privilege of appointing a page in the body to which he belongs. There are three pages from Kentucky serving as pages at present.

Believe it or not, they are all from the First Congressional District. Under the patronage of Senator Earle Clements, is Jimmy Daniel of Kuttawa. Under Noble Gregory is Willis Peal of LeCenter, while I am under Senator Barkley's patronage.

A page's life is composed of various, intricate and interesting phases. Our day begins in the very early hours of the morning. Long before daybreak, we rise to dress in blue suits, black socks, black ties, black shoes and white shirts. A very strict rule of the Senate concerning pages is that they must dress immaculately and exactly alike.

We must rise at 5:15 a.m., because the school which we attend begins at 6:30 a.m. From experience in the last month, I know—dawn breaks between the first and second periods. The school, at present, is located on the third floor of the library of Congress. Although only 81 selected young men from all over America attend this school, it is well equipped with all the modern things that constitute an outstanding school. In order to attend the Capitol Page School, you must have completed the eighth grade.

C. P. S. offers four years of academic training which includes English, social subjects, science, mathematics, and three different foreign languages. Several other courses are elective. A typical sophomore schedule is typing, history, English and biology.

The Capitol Page operates in conjunction with the Board of Education of the District of Columbia and college entrance requirements may be met through the academic courses offered. One certificate of merit is signed by the president of the United States.

After school is dismissed at 10:30, we go immediately across the street at the Capitol. Our base of operations, or our headquarters, is the cloak room, depending upon the one to which we are assigned.

Our boss is the Secretary of the Senate; next is the Sergeant-at-Arms, then the Secretary of the Majority, and next their assistants.

This is where the busy days of our lives begin. Our morning duties consist of filing the Congressional records of the day before, the executive calendar, and the calendar of business. These must be placed on the Senators' desks along with the pending bills, resolutions, documents, committee reports and treaties, exactly straight and the same on every desk.

A supply of paper, pencils, stationery and ink is provided by the Senate, stationery room. I have an extra duty—keeping Senator Barkley's desk clean inside and making sure that everything he needs is there at all times.

In the House of Representatives, the standard procedure differs. The pages sit in the rear of the chamber and listen for a buzzer and watch for a blinking light on a large switch-board. When a Representative wants a page, he just pushes a button.

In the Supreme Court, since there are only nine justices and four pages, the pages stand behind the chairs of the marshal of the Court. A very strict rule of the Supreme Court is that no page shall exceed the height of 5' 8 1/2". The Senate and House pages are not supposed to be taller than the shortest member of that body, but this rule is not so strictly obeyed as in the Supreme Court.

While the Senate is in session, starting at 12 noon on week days, we sit around the rostrum steps, in front of the vice president, facing the Senators, the Democratic pages on one side and the Republicans on the other. A Senator summons a page by motion of the hand or by snapping the fingers. This rule is not always obeyed by the Senators, as in the case of Senator Neuberger of Oregon. He appears to be catching flies or something. We just have to guess when he wants one of us.

A page never knows just what to expect when called by a Senator. They may want just anything, and usually do. For example, Senator Robertson of Virginia once sent Jimmy Daniel to his office to pick up a pheasant to have it frozen. Another time, right in the middle of a four and one half hour speech, Senator Morse of Oregon asked for a red rose for his lapel. Senator Eastman of Mississippi always asks for a 15 cent Webster. That's a cigar. On Capitol Hill they are known as Eastland Cigars.

We carry bills or resolutions from the Senators' desks to the clerk's desk for introduction, or memoranda to the officers of the Senate on the rostrum; we may call Senators to the telephone in the cloak rooms or notify a Senator when constituted.

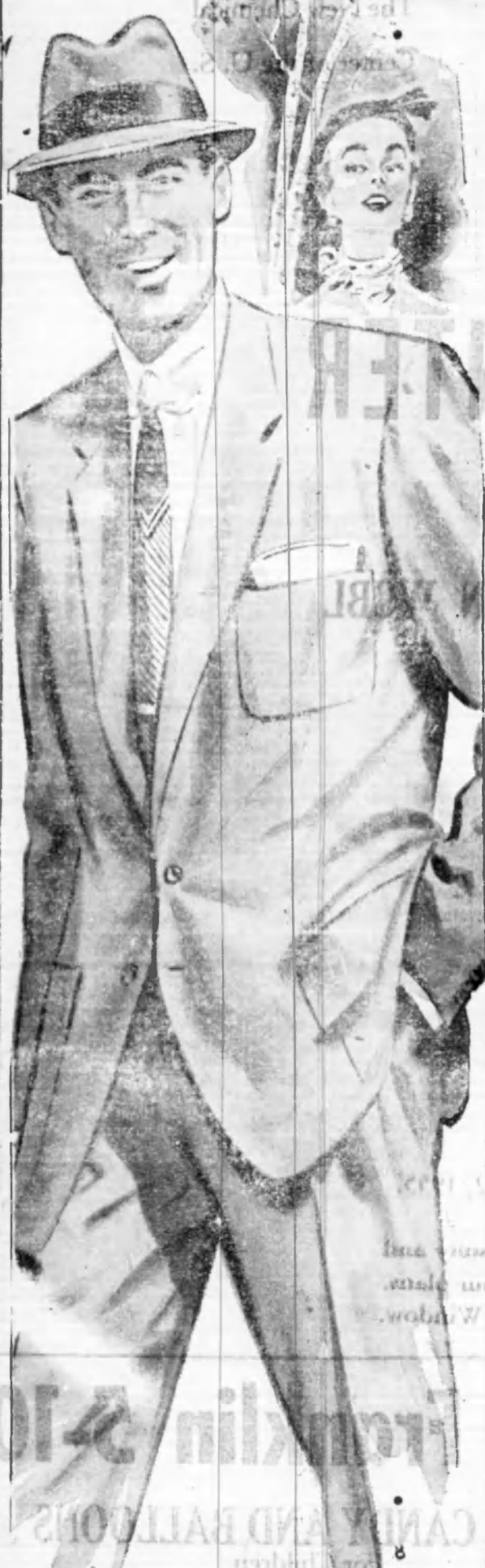

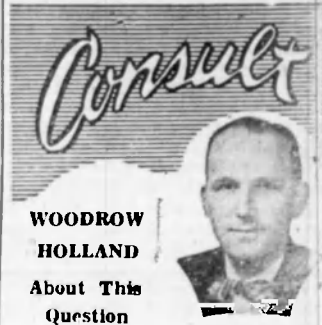

The Cross: A Cross

Lesson for April 3, 1955

PEOPLE who don't know the least thing about Christian religion do know this much, that it has something to do with a cross. You can't go into a church without seeing one. Many churches are even constructed in the shape of a cross. You can see one above the door or on the steeple. At this time of year it is especially a rare newspaper which does not carry somewhere the picture of a cross to go with the Good Friday meditations or a Good Friday editorial. But if the cross is known even to persons altogether outside the Christian faith, it is infinitely better known to those on the inside. The deeper one penetrates into the meaning of the Christian faith, the more luminous the cross becomes. One might say that the cross is both in the preschool and the post-graduate courses in Christian growth and knowledge.

Sacrifice Unlimited

The familiar cross of Christian art and architecture is a prettified version of an ugly thing, a cruel instrument of torture and death used by Romans only in case of executing slaves and the vilest criminals. Jesus was neither the first nor the last to be crucified. There are people who would call the cross itself an "historical accident." That is to say, if Jesus had lived in other eras or in other climates, he might have been killed by being frozen to death or buried alive or hanged or gassed. But that is neither here nor there. The meaning of the cross is not in the shape of a certain wooden thing that was used to kill people in a painful and horrible way. The meaning of the cross is simply this, in two words: Sacrifice unlimited. Paul puts it as simply as possible: "Christ died for all." He taught all. He set an example for all. He challenged and inspired all—that is, all who as He said "had an ear." But the cross reminds us that He died for all. "For their sakes," Jesus himself said, "I dedicate myself." How far would that dedication go? Many a person will say sincerely, "I will do anything in reason, to help you." Christ went farther. It was not "reasonable" that He of all persons should give up His life for lesser men; but the kind of dedication that was His, did not stop at the limits of the respectable and reasonable.

What Christians Remember

One might suppose that the Christian church would have liked to hush up the story of the cross, especially after the resurrection. It was a very ugly fact and as such was a handicap to the early Christians. Both among Jews and non-Jews, the cross was a kind of real curse. When the Christians preached Christ crucified, many a listener's reaction was: "Ask me to take for Master and Lord an 'executed criminal'! Never!" But the Christians went right on with the story of the cross. The gospels give that story more space than any other event in Jesus' life. And the Christian church has never forgotten nor tried to forget it. For what it means to us is that God in Christ was far more than the fabled Greek gods who sometimes took human shape, sometimes shared with men their Olympian wisdom, but never suffered for them. It is known to Christians that the cross measures the immeasurable love of God for us and for all men.

What Christians Forget

What Christians too easily forget is something Jesus set in the center of his teaching. He spoke of His own cross, but He in the same breath would speak of the cross of His followers. The cross does not stand alone for one great event. It is intended to stand as a prophecy and pattern for every Christian's life. One modern translator of the Bible, coming to the verse, "Let him take up his own cross and follow me," boggled at that word "cross" and translated it: "Let him take up his own yoke." No, there is no bypassing the intention of Jesus, one who meant what he said. And what he said amounted to this: For the Christian, one who wants to be a follower of Jesus, there must be no limit set on love's devotion. The Christian cannot say, if he really follows his Master, "I will do anything—in reason." I will make any sacrifice—that does not cost me too much.

Bill Gimmitt has set six acres

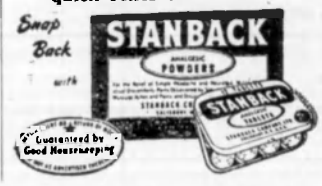

ment in the annals of radio.

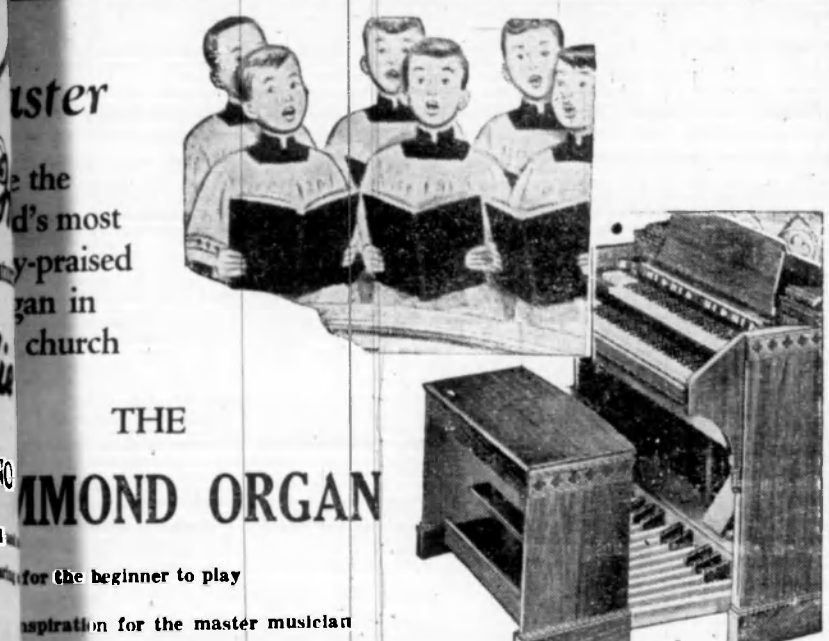
Since settling down in Holly-

'Right Now' Values are Important to Children

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles by the Department of Classroom Teachers of Kentucky Education Association.)

A child increases his interest in learning because of the "right now" values instead of what it will mean to him when he is grown.

Many a child learned to hate music from a parent who wanted him to learn to play the piano. Many a student has learned in order to pass a test only to forget it next week.

This illustrates the importance of creating the "right now" interest in the pupils.

How does a good teacher avoid the pitfall of stressing learning instead of creating interest?

The good teacher stimulates interest and arouses curiosity by introducing outside resources in the form of pictures, stories, film strips and other related objects, waiting for the pupil to show interest and then very carefully encouraging him to broaden it.

The good teacher knows children enjoy new experiences. The good teacher knows that sooner or later children will want to try to play the piano if they are given the opportunity to watch and to hear others play, not because "someday" they'll be pianists, but because it is fun to play.

Capable teachers encourage children much more frequently than they punish them. But above all, they seek to cultivate the natural desire to learn because nothing is more important.

And how the most difficult problem is in learning the "how?" Most children do not learn "how" if they sit and listen to the teacher tell them how or if they recite what is in the book.

Children and adults learn to do by doing. They learn to do arithmetic by working real

problems. They learn to sew by sewing; to cook by cooking.

So much learning is useless unless the teacher is having the children do instead of listen and recite. Learning to do is a very complicated process.

If you don't believe this, let me remove your appendix. I've read a book about it.

There is much that we do not know about learning, but we do know:

1. A child learns for right now and not for when he is grown.

2. Children want to learn; they find it exciting and pleasant.

3. A child learns what he wants to; not what the adult expects him to learn.

4. A child learns better if he is encouraged and not punished or frightened by adults because his work is poor.

5. Children learn by doing and not listening.

6. When teachers follow these principles, regardless of the grade level or subject field, children learn more efficiently and forget less than children who are taught by the "listen and recite" method.

7. The maturity of the child is an important factor in learning and should be given consideration in all learning experiences.
