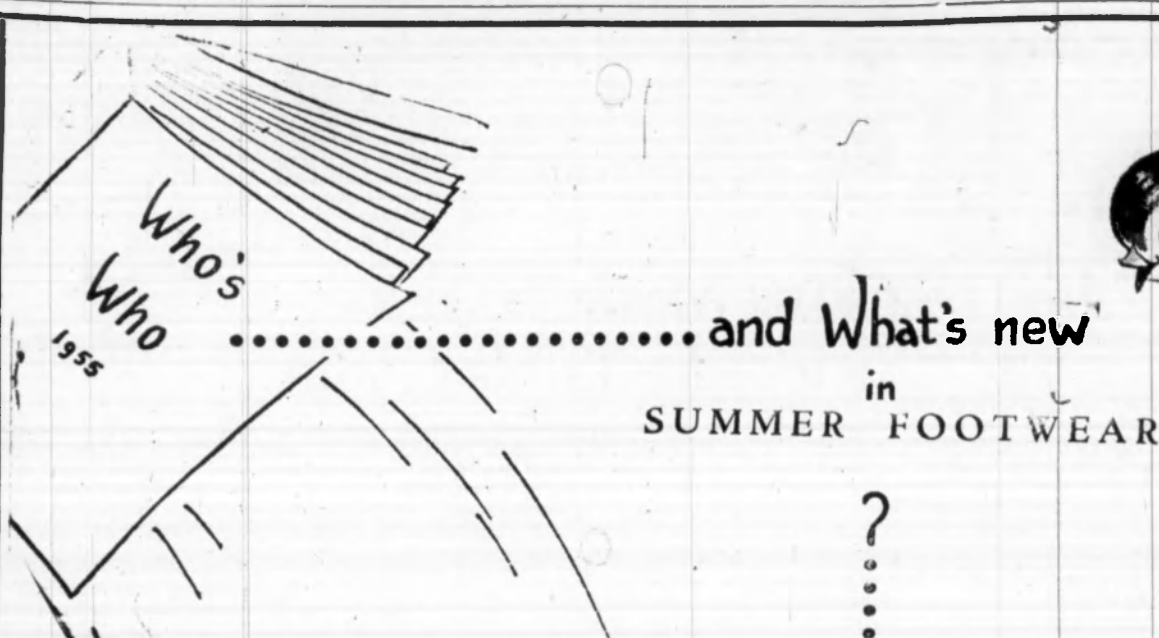

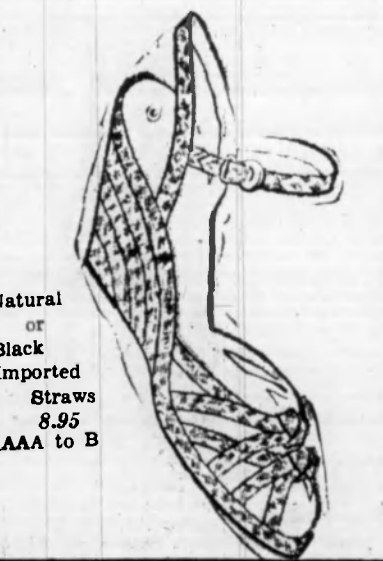

Conservation Day To Be Held July 7 For Kentucky Folks

FRANKFORT — "Kentucky Conservation Day" has been set for July 7 at the Soil and Water Research Station of the United States Department of Agriculture at Coshocton, Ohio, and persons throughout the state interested in soil conservation are already making plans to attend.

Marshall W. Qualls, state director of Soil and Water Resources, said that farmers, businessmen, teachers and persons connected with agricultural agencies are particularly invited to make the Ohio trip, which is to be sponsored by the Kentucky Association of Soil Conservation Districts and the Kentucky Bankers Association.

Each county group will make its own arrangements for travel and expenses and local supervisors of soil conservation districts, county agents, bankers association agricultural chairmen and

vocational agricultural teachers have been requested to serve on county committees for the event.

Qualls said that visitors to the research station will see watershed work that is not carried on at any station in the eastern United States. Interest in this type of project has been shown by more than 140 applications for watershed planning assistance submitted from Kentucky soil conservation districts, he said.

The weather seems to be setting all kinds of records. The last of March was the coldest on record for the time of year, and last weekend was near a record for high temperature—from cold to hot. No spring so far this year.

Total rainfall for the first three and one-half months of the year has been 14.5 inches. January .75 inch, February 5.9 inches, March 5.0 inches and

first half of April 2.85. Total rainfall for the same period last year was 11.95 inches.

Army worms are on the prowl again this year, according to reports coming to this office. Check your pasture, meadow, and small grain fields for infestations. They can do considerable damage. For their control use 1-2 to 2 pounds of actual chlordane or Toxephene per acre.

Houston Gregory is building the first permanent trench silo. He has cut a trench 6 feet deep

for the sides and trench with concrete forms. The earth was poured out with a derrick about 50 tons. He is now feeding.

Godly Nations

Lesson for April 24, 1955

WE MAY as well admit that no such thing as a "godly nation" has ever been seen—not if you take the word "godly" at its full meaning. A godly nation, 100 per cent, would be one where every citizen kept God's commands, where every act of Congress (or of Parliament, of de-cree of king) would be such as God would fully approve. For the matter of that, a hundred-per cent godly individual is also unheard of. Dr. Foreman And yet we can speak of godly men and godly nations. So we can speak of more or less godly nations, nations whose trend and direction is toward God or away from him.

Is God on Our Side?

We always like to think, especially when we are at war, cold or hot, with other nations, that God is on our side. We like to think that we are God's people and the other side, the enemy, is not. The truth of the business is that no nation is either completely right or completely wrong, no nation fully carries out God's will and no nations wholly defy it. No nation in the world today is composed entirely of Christians, no nation without Christians in it. But having said all this, we can still say truly that God is on the side of some people and nations more than he is on others. In the Old Testament we have a good example of a nation that made this mistake of supposing God would be for them whatever they did, and they were dreadfully dismayed when they discovered that they could lose wars and generally "eat bitter-ness." Many Jews thought God would let them down when such things happened; but the prophet knew better. Azariah, a prophet in King Asa's time, put the truth in a nutshell. "The Lord is with you while you are with him," he said.

Leadership in the Church

King Asa's times, and the times of President Eisenhower and Queen Elizabeth, are not so very far apart after all. Who was needed for a godly nation in the days of Asa? The need that the prophet mentions first is "teaching priests." There were plenty of priests who went through the liturgies and made sacrifices but what the nation needed was teaching priests, religious leaders who could teach the law of God that is to say, priests who could show the people what religion meant in daily living, in dealings between man and man. So long as religion stays inside the church, so long as religion concerns itself only with the Other World, so long as religion tries to confine itself to what is exclusively spiritual, it will not be Biblical, and it will be powerless to build a godly nation. An officer in a young people's church group once told the writer: "Our bunch really means business. This year we raised the money to extend the 'chancel two feet.'—and that was all they did! One suspects that there was something missing in his sermon, for if those young people got the idea that the business of religion mainly has to do with how long or short the chancel is, God's law is not a law for Sunday mornings only, but until and unless there are teaching priests who take the lead in showing us how we can apply God's law—and above all the law of Love—to our life as a nation, we shall be godly only on Sunday mornings, if ever. The most church-going city in the south was for years also the city with the highest murder rate; the place lacked teaching priests.

Leadership in the Nation

Preachers and churches will have an uphill time of it, at the best, even when they do see and work for the doing of God's will in everyday social and political and business life. There is too much organized and unorganized selfishness abroad to give the God of Love much chance. So in our time, as in King Asa's time, there is need for leaders outside the pulpit. In those days it was the king himself who took the lead. We have no kings in America but we do have leaders, all the way from village mayors up to Congressmen, senators, supreme court justices and the President.

Soil Conservation Notes

BY HERBERT ANDERSON
Soil Conservation Service
Otho Franklin, Tatumville, and Lloyd Collier, Fairdeal, plan to install pipelines for livestock water this spring. Franklin will install about seven hundred feet and Collier eight hundred and fifty feet. This will provide water in three fields for each farmer. The A. S. C. Committee will share the cost with these farmers at the rate of fifteen cents per foot of pipe used not to exceed fifty per cent of the average cost.

Everett Treas, Chairman of the ASC committee, called a meeting of all bulldozer operators in March. Treas explained how they would issue purchase orders for bulldozer work this year, if the operators would sign as vendors of bulldozer services.

For example: A farmer makes application for payment in digging a pond. The committee approves payment of \$80. The farmer comes in office and gets a purchase order for \$80. He gives this to the operator who will cash it for the ASC cost-share in the pond. The farmer will pay the remaining cost of the pond in the past the farmer had to pay the total cost of the pond and then wait a year for the ASC cost-share refund check.

Most all of the local bulldozer owners have signed that they would accept these purchase orders from farmers.

I helped five farmers write Conservation Farm Plans during March. They were Dewey Lawrence, west of Calvert City; Leo Palmer, north of Brewers; J. C. Blakney, M. B. Fiser, and Waite Clark, Palma.

Fred Camper, Palma, asked Sonny Rose and I, Soil Conservation Service Technicians, to help him stake three diversion ditches, March 23. On March 30,

the ground got dry enough to build one of them.

Two farm tractors were used to build the diversion. One tractor pulled two flat bottom plows; the other a terracing blade. The plows loosened the dirt and the blade moved it to form the diversion ridge. It was necessary to use the blade because the plow would not move the loose dirt the second and third time successfully. A disc plow can be used to build a terrace or diversion without the

use of a blade.

Walter Copeland, Benton; Garvin Darnall, west of Hardin; Atlas Armstrong, south of Palma; Louis Collins and G. A. Cope, Dogtown; and Olen Houser, south of Benton, became cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District during March.

William D. Collier, Fairdeal, W. L. Frazier, south of Gilbertsville, G. A. Cope, and Atlas Armstrong, received wildlife plants, multiflora rose and Japonica

lespedeza, from the Kentucky Division of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The boys in the Junior Conservation Club at Fairdeal helped Collier set his plants. He then mulched the rose plants with pine needles. The rose will grow into a permanent living fence.

Joe Brooks Mathis, C. Boran, and Robert Smith, members of the Junior Conservation Club at Brewers also received 2500 multiflora rose.

Burley Vote Slated April 28

On Thursday, April 28, 1955, the growers voting in this referendum will be in effect and there will be no price support on the 1955 crop of Burley tobacco.

If two-third or more of the growers voting in this referendum approve marketing quotas they will be in effect for the 1955 crop and price supports will be available at 90 percent of parity.

The new legislation provides also that: (1) Any acreage of tobacco harvested in excess of the farm acreage allotment for 1955, or for any subsequent crop, cannot be considered in establishing State and farm acreage allotments; (2) The allotment next established for a farm is to be reduced if any producer on the farm files, or aids or acquiesces in

the filing of, any false report about the acreage of tobacco grown on the farm;

(3) The penalty on the marketing of excess tobacco is increased from 50 to 75 percent of the average market price for the preceding year.

A new minimum Burley tobacco farm acreage allotment has been established for 1956 and following years when the minimum becomes the smallest of (1) the allotment established for the farm for the immediately preceding year, (2) five-tenths of an acre, or (3) 10 percent of the cropland.

A "revised" allotment notice will be sent to the operator of each farm prior to the referendum. The revised allotment is based on the redetermined national marketing quota reflecting the latest available supply-demand statistics. For most farms, the "revised" allotment will be 25 percent less than the 1954 farm allotment. On farms with a Burley allotment previously determined for 1955 at 7 acres or at 6 acres, the reduction in the revised allotment will be 1 acre. Farms with a previously determined farm allotment of 0.5 acre or less will not be further reduced.

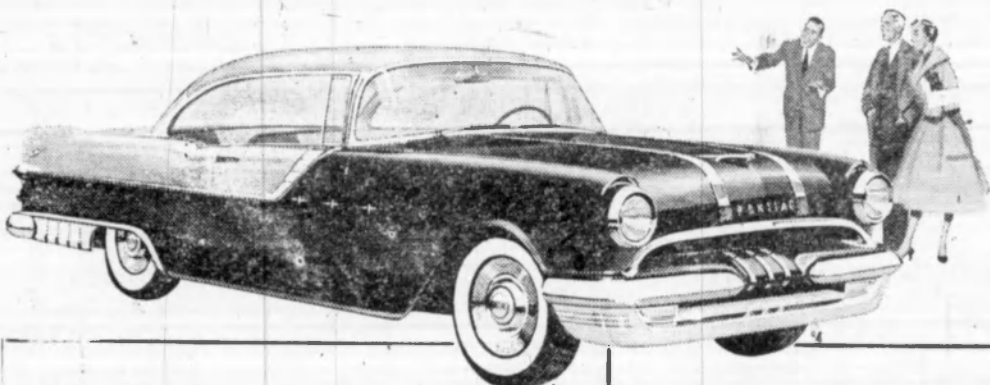

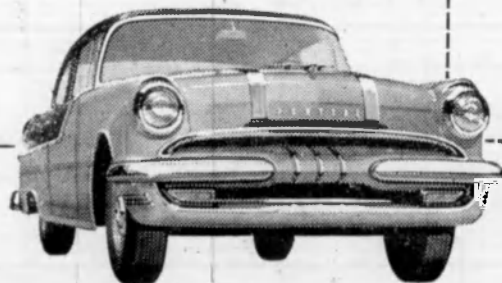
