Chandler Says He's Running for 'Vacancy'

A. B. Chandler, flashing his famous smile, rode into Benton Tuesday afternoon, delivered a brief speech in the Circuit Court room and left his audience in a decidedly "Happy" frame of mind.

Chandler and his running mate, Harry Lee Waterfield, were escorted to Benton from Eddyville by Herman Kanitzer and Billy Watkins, county campaign leaders.

Watkins introduced Waterfield, who made a brief talk in which he promised sound and economical government by "two Western Kentucky boys."

Waterfield said he had heard rumors that if Chandler were elected he was going to start "selling hotdogs and popcorn" at the state parks. Nothing could be farther from the truth, Waterfield said. He promised that the parks would continue to be operated as state institutions and that every effort would be made to expand Kentucky's tourist trade.

Waterfield introduced Chandler. Happy was in his usual fine form, and sprinkled his address with the frequent use of the first names of men in his audience, such as "Now, Tom, you know how I have always stood on that question."

Chandler facetiously said that he was not running for governor. "We have no governor," Happy shouted. "And we haven't had one for at least four years. I'm running for a vacancy."

The audience roared. Chandler said he was not going to mention his opponent. "Very few people have ever heard of him," Happy said, "and you probably never will even see him. So he really doesn't matter."

His opponent entered the race because "Earl held his hand over his (Combs) head and said 'This is the man.' (The Earl referred to is U. S. Senator Earl Clements.)

In a more serious vein, Happy laughed out at the "wastefulness and extravagance" of the Waterfield administration. He cited as a part of the "wastefulness," the plans to build a \$25,000,000 stadium at Louisville and the proposed toll highway "that starts nowhere and goes nowhere."

"When I get to Frankfort I'm going to have to UNDO a lot of things," he said. "I'm going to have to favor more funds for schools, better pensions for the old folks 'without a mortgage on their homes,' better rural roads instead of 'super highways that go nowhere' and operation of the government within its income."

"With the help of God and Harry Lee," he closed "I promise you a sound, sane and economical government."

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Children Vaccinated For Polio

First and second grade school pupils of Marshall County received their first shots of the new Salk polio vaccine this week.

All of the youngsters in these grades in all the schools received the shots this week.

The second shots will be given in approximately two weeks, said Dr. Sam Henson, county health officer. The third shots will be given seven months later.

Wednesday morning, pupils of the Benton school were vaccinated. Walnut Grove pupils also were vaccinated at Benton. Pupils at Breeze and New Harmony were vaccinated on Wednesday morning also.

On Wednesday afternoon, pupils at Sharps were vaccinated. Griggs pupils also were vaccinated at Sharps.

The shots were administered by local physicians and County Health Department nurses.

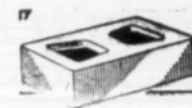

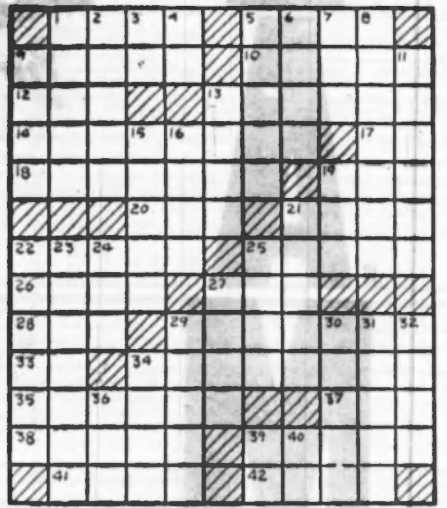
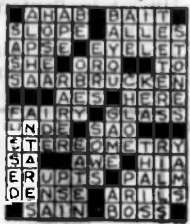

"I am the door, by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and shall find pasture." John 10:9.

Edwin A. Robinson, poet-philosopher, once wrote, "The world does not seem to me to be a prison house, but a kind of spiritual kindergarten where millions of bewildered children are trying to spell God with the wrong blocks."

It is not until we spell "God" with the letters of Christ's life and love that it will come right. This is our faith.

In John, Chapter 10, Jesus gives us the picture of Himself as the Good Shepherd. We are told that there are two kinds of sheepfolds in Syria—one for the winter, a large square building covered with beams, branches and a layer of straw and earth. The other, used for warmer months, is a large enclosure without a roof. Walls around it protect from wild animals and thieves. This enclosure has a single entrance but without a door. After the sheep are brought in for the night the shepherd sleeps at the entrance so that he can be awakened at the threat of danger.

We hear Jesus saying, "I am the door—by me if any man enter he shall be saved and go in and out and find pasture."

"I am the Door—whenever enters by me shall be saved." This is our faith—Christ is the Door. A door means that certain things may be shut out, and certain things may be kept within the circle of security. Is not this the meaning of "being saved?" THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: 2 Chronicles 17-20
Devotional Reading: Nehemiah 8:1-4

Faith and Action

Lesson for May 1, 1955

THE church is not the state and the state is not the church. When either one tries to be the other, or to run the other, there is trouble. Church and state are separate; that is a deep-rooted American principle. But that does not mean that a wall should be run up between the state and religion. That does not mean that the state can afford to be indifferent to religion. You are not I and I am not you; but that does not mean there Dr. Foreman ought to be a stone wall standing high between us. It does not mean that either of us should be indifferent to the other. The church can help the state, and vice versa.

Executive's Religion

Most American churches, including those denominations (both large and small) sponsor this column, believe that the state ought not to help the church by direct "establishment" of any church by public law. No Presbyterian, Methodist or Baptist, for instance, and still less a Quaker or a Pentecostal Christian, wants his own church given government support, by money grants or any other way. Nevertheless, Christians of every label rejoice when a President or other leader professes his faith openly. We all feel, quite rightly, that we shall be better off when our leaders in state and society are genuinely religious men and women. There is an interesting and instructive illustration of this in the Bible. In the course of the history of Judah we come on the administration of a king named Jehoshaphat. He was a good king and he left his country far better than he found it. Now we hear very little about this king's beliefs. He was no more nor less orthodox than kings before or after. He was not a better king because he could pass a better examination in theology. He was better because he put his beliefs into action. A creed that can't get right and air and exercise turns sour, and it sours those who hold it.

Beginning on the Ground Floor

Now many acts of a high executive may not seem to be religious, or to have anything to do with religion, and yet they may affect religion strongly. For example, there was Jehoshaphat, a king whose first recorded act was one for the public defense. He fortified his border garrisons and he developed a well-organized and well-equipped army. Religion cannot be upheld on the points of bayonets, that is all true; but the fact remains that in the time of Jehoshaphat there was real danger from invasion, and a successful invasion meant that the true religion would have to go underground. Korean Christians know this today perhaps better than anybody. What South Korean Christians want the U. N. forces to go home? So, even so seemingly non-religious a business as reorganizing an army for greater effectiveness, may have notable religious effects too.

Getting the Message to the People

Before Billy Graham visited Denmark, it was said, the preachers in that country, who were men of high education, preached so far over the heads of the people that churches had dimly small congregations. It is the people's business to rise to our level, said the preachers, not for us to sink to theirs. Then Billy Graham came along and showed what would happen if preachers really got down where the people are. Since that time, it is reported, the ministers have taken the hint and the churches are getting more people interested. You can put religion in a beautiful ivory tower, or gothic cathedral for that matter, and people may admire it but that's all. Religion has got to be put within reach of the people. King Jehoshaphat did this by putting his "teaching priests" on the road, taking the Law of God to the people, the Law which had so much to say about everyday living. In our country, on the contrary, though the one place where you can reach all the people is in the public schools and state colleges, the law generally permits any subject at all to be taught—except the Bible, which cannot even be legally read aloud!

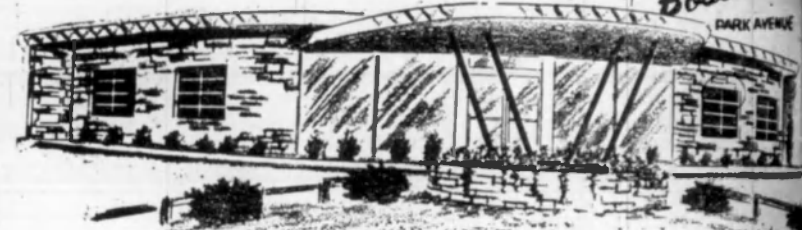

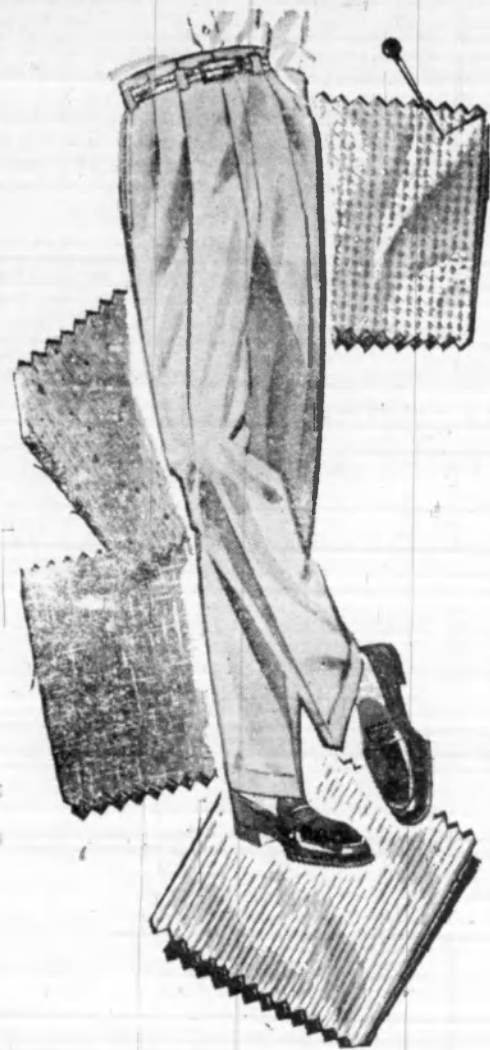

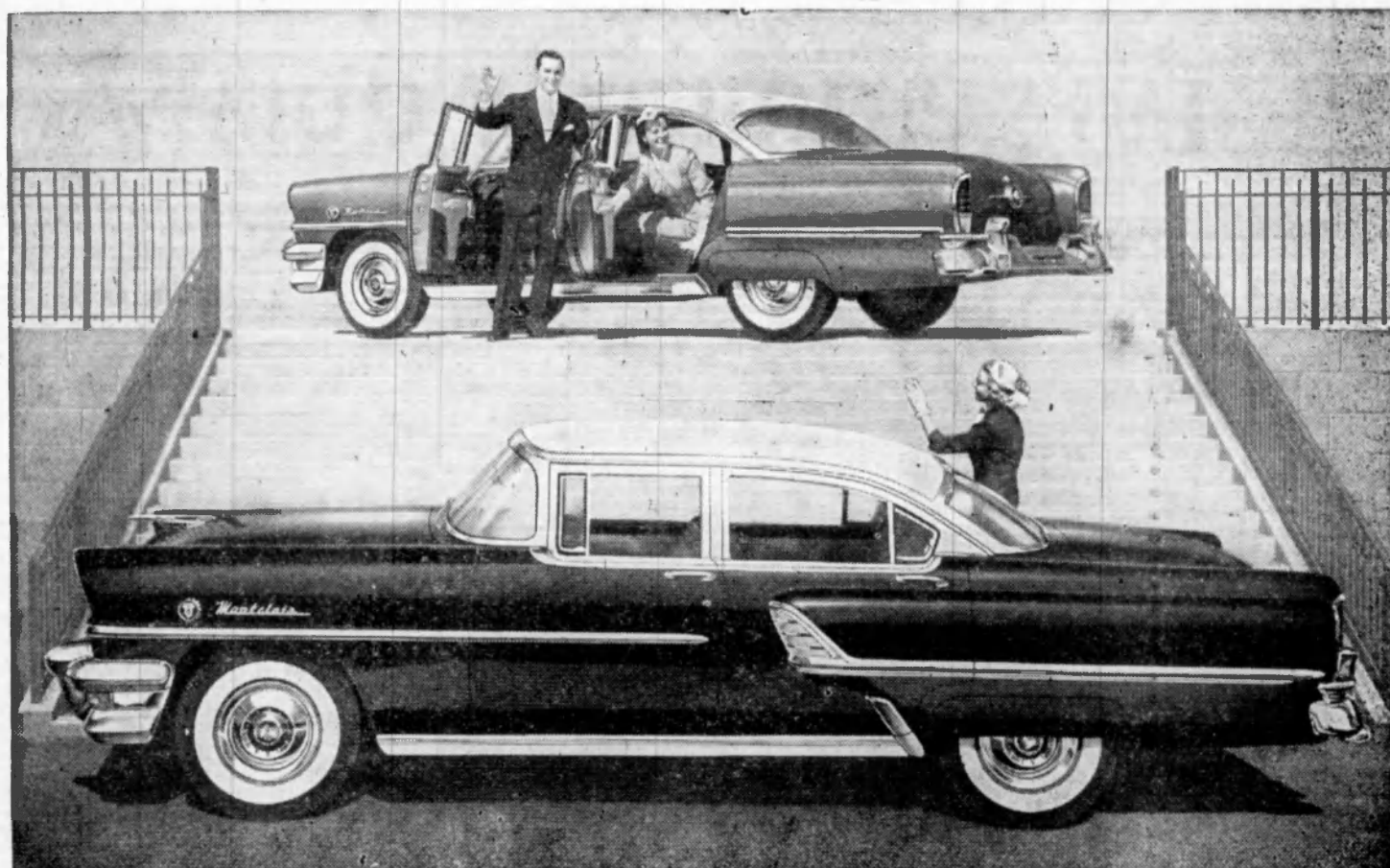

Teaching of Science Limited to Interests

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth in a series of articles by the Department of Classroom Teachers of Kentucky Education Association.)

What is taught in science at any grade level is limited by the interests, inquisitiveness, and abilities of the children concerned. A child's personal experiences with his surroundings leads to literally thousands of questions about weather and climate, the earth, living things, machines, light and sound, electricity.

In elementary classes children plant and care for bulbs, make and keep aquaria, feed and care for white rats in the study of nutrition, keep weather charts. Beginning with the collecting of leaves in grade one, science study involves class study of the life cycle of insects, trips to the weather bureau, a local dairy, or viewing movies of time-lapse photography of plant growth.

Classroom talks supplemented by real-life objects for children to examine are made by beekeepers, astronomers, ornithologists and meteorologists.

Such experiments as ringing a door bell in a vacuum teach the child that sound cannot travel in an empty space.

In the high school biology is the study of plant and animal life. By cutting apart in the laboratory every type of animal the student can obtain he is able to look at its parts and figure out their work. Because of this the intestine in his own abdomen is no longer a mysterious stomach ache after he searches for the frog's intestines among many of its other slimy looking structures.

The brain, eye and heart are more important after the student cuts open an earthworm, crayfish, fish and cow and handles their various organs. They become more real when he visits a medical school and sees the student doctors remove the heart from a cadaver.

Plants are studied by working with them. By planting seeds and watching them grow the student learns that manure makes plants grow better, that when a green plant is placed in darkness it

does not grow nor does it manufacture starch as most green plants do. By placing water plants in the aquarium with fish the students learn that plants give off oxygen which every living thing must have to live.

In the chemistry laboratory the student combines hydroxide (lye) and hydrochloric acid, both poisonous to man and irritating to his skin, boils the water away, and finds the solid crystals remaining are common table salt. Physics is the study of matter and energy. The student learns practical ways to make work easier and produce more. In the laboratory he proves a man can lift an automobile by using the right pulleys or levers, that one normal size boy can balance two heavy boys on a see-saw by sitting on the right spot, how television works by building a set in class.

In good science classes the child learns by doing actual scientific work to take his place in today's scientific world.
