M'Callum Makes Announcement For Representative

TO THE DEMOCRATIC VOTERS:

I hereby announce my candidacy for State Representative from Marshall and Lyon Counties.

If selected to represent the Sixth District in the next session of the General Assembly I shall continue to work for the best interests of our two counties without being tied or obligated to any special group or faction.

I feel that it is only proper to offer at least a brief resume of my work during the past sessions of the General Assembly as well as my views on future sessions.

1. EDUCATION—I was glad to have the opportunity of co-sponsoring the act setting up the Minimum Foundation Program and I shall work and vote for the full implementation of this program which is designed to improve the general structure of our school system. I co-sponsored the act known as the "TVA in lieu of taxes bill" which provides our county school systems with additional revenue.

2. ROADS—While the road situation is always something to be desired—I have worked constantly to secure better roads in our district and progress has been made in many areas. If re-elected I shall continue to strive constantly for better farm-to-market roads as well as improved arterial highways.

3. FARM—I shall continue to work closely with the legislative representatives of the Farm Bureau in efforts to enact legislation beneficial to our agriculture. For my work in 1952 and 1954 I was awarded the citation for service to agriculture by the

commissioner in Frankfort, and have served on the agriculture committee.

4. WELFARE-OLD AGE ASSISTANCE—I favor the repeal of the so-called "lien law" and voted to take a bill from committee that would have repealed this act.

5. TAXES—I have always opposed blanket tax raises and was among those who appeared before the Tax Commission in Frankfort in order to protest the blanket increases made last year.

6. INDUSTRY—Recognizing our favorable position I shall continue to work unceasingly toward extending aid and cooperation to any group or organization seeking to bring about a greater development of our industrial potential. Incidentally the first bill passed by this session was a bill that I was privileged to introduce making Calvert City a fifth class city.

7. GENERAL—I introduced and co-sponsored the legislation creating a new Judicial District for Marshall-Calloway and Livingston Counties. It was my good fortune to be selected as one of the 10 outstanding representatives in the 1952 session and invited to a dinner at the University of Louisville to accept this award.

I have resided continually in Benton since 1939 with the exception of the time spent in the Army, 1942-1946, having served in the European Theatre with the 3rd Division and remaining in Germany for nine months following V-E Day. In 1949 I was married to Betty Harper, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Harper of Benton and we are now operating Radio Station WCBL in Benton. In closing I want to thank you for the confidence shown in me in the past and to promise you that if re-elected I shall do my best to give you effective representation in the 1956 session of the General Assembly.

The Calvert Drive-In Theatre, located on Highway 95, was robbed last Sunday night of \$3,200 in cash.

Miss Harrington heard the sound of money being scooped up, and went back to the cage. There she saw the robber taking the money.

Miss Harrington ran to notify her father, who was in the theatre protection booth, and the robber fled into a nearby field, from which he apparently has come to the theatre.

Officers were notified and searched the nearby fields.

They found a spot in a field where a half-dozen cigarette butts lay on the ground, but there were the only clues. Several persons reported seeing a car leave the Doss Cemetery about 11:30 p. m., but officers could not say for sure if it was a car driven by the robber.

The robber wore dirty, khaki trousers.

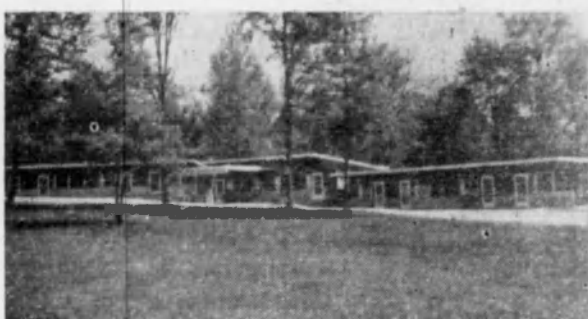
Rev. Otis Willie officiated at the funeral, and burial took place in the Calvert City Cemetery, with Filbeck-Cann in charge.

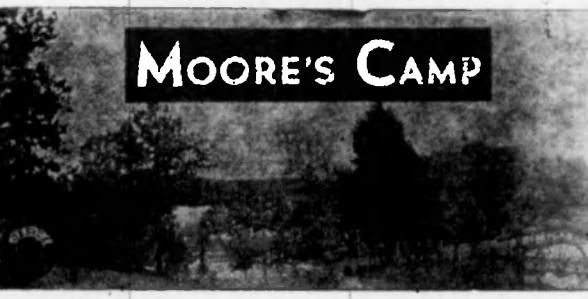

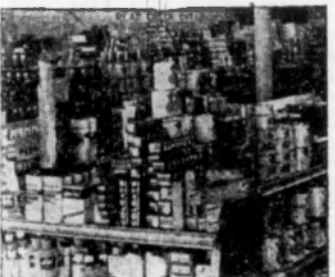

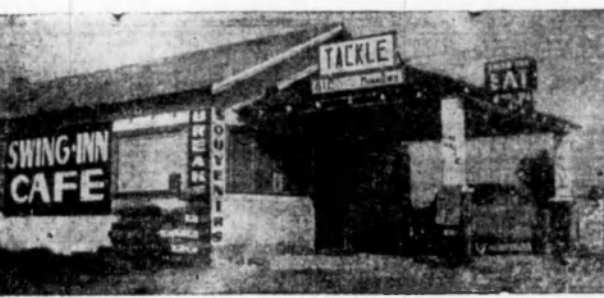

"... verily I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel." Matt. 8:10.

Jesus was dealing with Roman Centurion, a soldier, a man of strange and heathen religion.

He has just made a very pleasant discovery. He has found this man other than what anyone would expect: tender, sympathetic, greatly concerned over the fate of a sick servant. He also found that, despite heathen parentage and rearing, this man is really a Christian of the finest and best kind.

By following the example of Jesus, let us see if we cannot find for ourselves the Master's joy by opening our eyes and looking for the good in others.

There is real need for finding good in others. There is such a strong tendency in all of us to look for and to find that which is bad in others. There is a strange perversity in human hearts that prompts them to look at one another, not with the eye of kindness, praise and good-will, but so often with the eye of envy, criticism and malice. It is there to the extent that very often it hurls forth the bad and exalts it in such

measure that the good is never seen or given a chance at all. We need today far more people who will point out what is right with others and fewer who keep harping on what is wrong with them.

You may have heard the story of the dear old lady who always looked for the best in people. Whenever anyone said anything unkind about another person she would retaliate by noting something good. Her grandchildren planned to start a little conversation at dinner time, about the devil.

She pondered as they talked and finally came up with this: "Well, children, if we were all as industrious as the devil, we would get a lot more done."

It is evidence of Christlike-ness when a person persistently looks for good in other people. Good is always there. The fault is that we do not always discover it. Our bitterest enemies are endowed with some qualities that are good. Among the finest people you may meet each day are the mailman, the bus driver, the store clerk, the person who works at the next desk.

Does not our text teach us, that we usually find what we look for; trouble, if we want it, sorrow, if that be our interest; sin, if we have an open eye for it? 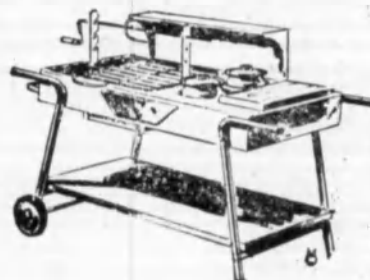

Background Sermons: II Chronicles 11, Nehemiah, David's Psalm 118:2-18

Teen-Age Faith

Lesson for June 12, 1955

WE do not expect teen-agers to have the same outlook on life, or the same kind of clothes, or looks, or digestion, or habits, or occupations, as their grandmothers. Why should we expect them to have the same kind of religion? This is not saying that young people should have one religion and old people another. It is saying that a teenager thinks and acts in a way that is different from the way his elders think and act, so that we might reasonably expect that he will take the same religion with a different slant. Not all grown-up Christians are made in the same mold; and certainly it is a mistake to try to force the religious expression and ideas and beliefs of growing boys and girls into the precise pattern of Grandma, let alone St. Paul.

Teen-agers Make Top-notch Christians
Most people who are converted are converted in their teens. Most young people who have been brought up in Christian homes and have since childhood never thought of themselves as anything else but Christians, join the church (or are confirmed) during their teens. Most ministers first felt the call to the ministry before they were 20 years old. Most missionaries first thought of being missionaries during their teens. The fact is, the teens are just the time when religious reception is good. Just as there are days when radio reception is good and other days when it is bad, so it is with what we can call religious reception; there are times in life when it is better than at other times. As the teen-age is the waking-up time all along the line, so it should not be surprising that the heart of boys and girls, just at the time when they begin not to be boys and girls any more, but men and women, should be specially open to the vision and the voice of God. Teen-agers can make top-notch Christians.

But They Need Help
We have a case in point, in the story of the young king Josiah. He was eight years old when he came to the throne. His father, King Amon, had been a bad man and a bad king, so bad that his own servants had a palace revolution and killed him. There must have been something promising about little Josiah, because we read that the people of the land "made him king."—as we would say, elected him. This was remarkable, because in the ancient Near East it was just as it is in some of our neighboring countries today: if a king or a president is assassinated, one of the plotters is generally the next king. But the people picked out little Josiah and made him king. Boylike, he did nothing particularly worth mentioning for eight years. Then, when he was 16 years old, he began to seek after the God of David. Now whenever a boy with worthless parents turns out to be a fine character with a sincere faith, it is safe to guess that someone has been there influencing the boy for good. Boys and girls seldom develop into mature Christians without help. Later we read that Josiah was acquainted with the best and most God-fearing men of his time, and we can be reasonably sure that this young king's wise and steady leadership, his growth in faith, his constructive reforms, were "sparked" by some of these priests and prophets who were his close friends.

Teen-agers Are the Church of tomorrow
Whenever a boy or girl who has been confirmed or "joined the church," stops going to church and perhaps slips down from good to bad and from bad to worse, thoughtful persons will ask, "who's to blame?" The fault may very well be in the church, not in the young people. Boys and girls need wise help from older Christians. Young people coming into the church are always "commended to the fellowship" of the church or words to that effect. But how much fellowship do they get? An officer in a church once complained that his church paid too much attention to young people. Young folks don't contribute," he said. Not in money, of course! But don't teen-agers contribute anything?

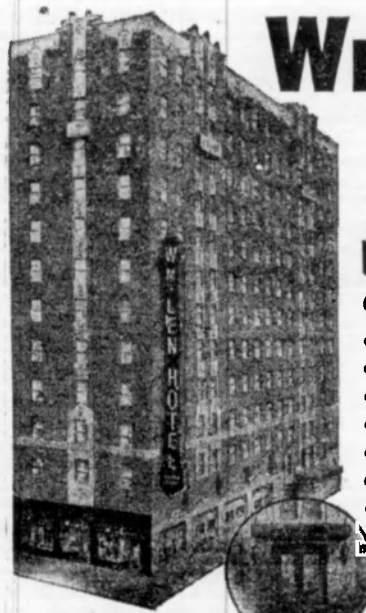

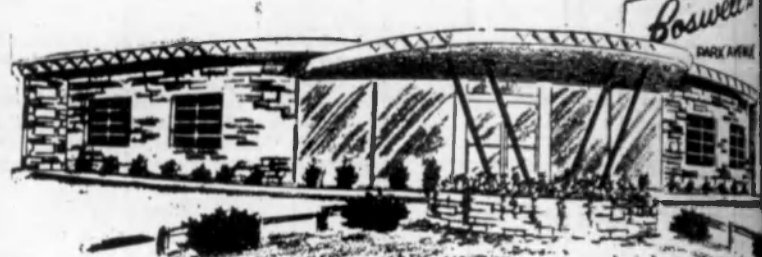

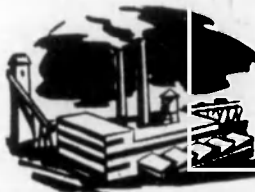
