## Bill Nelson is Sued By Fay Melton for an Accounting of Books

Fay Melton, part owner of the Tribune-Democrat, filed a civil suit in Marshall Circuit Court this week against Bill Nelson, publisher of the newspaper.

Mr. Melton's suit, filed by the Benton law firm of Prince and Asher, asks for an accounting of all the newspaper's accounts receivable since Sept. 19, 1953, when Mr. Melton purchased a half interest in the publication.

Mr. Melton, in his suit, says that on Sept. 19, 1953, he entered into a contract with Nelson and purchased one half undivided interest in the Tribune for the sum of \$5,000. Mr. Melton said the terms of the contract called for a down payment of \$1,000 and the balance to be paid at the rate of \$100 per month until the note was paid in full.

The contract, the suit states, was to be a joint venture and not a partnership. Mr. Melton says in the suit that he has paid \$2,050 toward the full \$5,000 investment.

On June 5, Mr. Melton says in the suit, he received a typewritten notice from Nelson of default on payments and that Nelson's notice declared the contract terminated.

The suit further states: "Under terms of said contract, plaintiff was to receive one half of accounts receivable as of the date of same, which amounted to approximately \$2,200, according to a list prepared by defendant shortly after the execution

of said contract but this plaintiff has at no time received any part of said \$2,200 although plaintiff believes that most of the \$2,200 which was due upon accounts receivable on Sept. 19, 1953, has long since been paid and received by the defendant; that by applying one half of said accounts receivable to his credit on the total purchase price for said undivided one half interest of the business, this plaintiff would have and is entitled to a total credit of more than \$3,150 on said \$5,000 purchase price."

The suit further states: "Plaintiff states that since he entered into the contract for sale of said Tribune-Democrat business, the defendant has had complete control of the collecting and paying out of funds in the operation of said business and that he has at no time ever furnished plaintiff with an accounting of the same; that since Sept. 19, 1953, a substantial amount of accounts receivable have been accumulated and are now on the books of said business; that the plaintiff is entitled, under said contract, to one half of the accounts receivable since Sept. 19, 1953, and he is entitled to a credit of said one half upon any unpaid balance to the defendant on the agreed purchase price from said one half undivided interest in the business; that he is entitled by the defendant of all accounts receivable from said date up to the date of this complaint."

## Indictments Returned by Grand Jury

Two youths, Robert Dale Adams and Elzie Byers, each 17 years old and a juvenile, were indicted this week by the Marshall Circuit Court Grand Jury on a charge of breaking into the Co-op Store in Benton.

Both of the youths reside in McCracken County.

They were arrested recently at Ripley, Tenn., for possession of burglary tools. The youths were brought to Benton last Friday by Sheriff Billy Watkins and Deputy Sheriff Buck Brien. They were released to the Marshall County officers by Tennessee officials.

The youths are accused of hauling away a 600-pound safe from the Co-op Store, and taking \$225.55 in cash and checks from the safe. The safe was found abandoned near Hard-money in this county.

Byers also was indicted on a charge of damaging the county courthouse. He is alleged to have attempted to escape jail Monday night by chiseling his way out.

The alleged escape attempt was thwarted by City Policeman Charles (Chewing Gum) Carroll.

Two soldiers, Charles Wallace and Ronald Jones, were indicted on a charge of grand larceny in connection with the theft of an outdoor motor from Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Trasher. They also were indicted on a charge of breaking into the dwelling house of Ed Hill of Altoona.

The soldiers also were indicted on a charge of damaging the courthouse. This charge resulted from an attempt made by the soldiers to escape jail. They were discovered trying to chisel their way out after breaking some water pipes in the jail and using the pipe as chisels.

Joe Metcalf was indicted on a charge of child desertion.

Two cases were dismissed by the grand jury. They were a hit and run case against William Solomon and an assault and battery case against Leslie Myers.

### Methodists In County Make Only 2 Changes

Only two changes in the Methodist Church setup in Marshall County were made at the annual conference held in Memphis last week.

Rev. B. J. Barron, who has been pastor of the Brewers circuit for five years, was promoted to the McKendree station. Rev. H. L. Lax, who has been the pastor at McKendree, was shifted to the Brewers circuit.

The Benton circuit was divided by the conference. Rev. Orville Easley of Kirksby was named pastor of the Briensburg and Mt. Carmel churches. Rev. F. B. Alexander, who formerly had the entire circuit, will be pastor of the Church Grove and Maple Springs churches.

Rev. V. H. Burnette was returned to the First Methodist Church in Benton. Mr. Burnette will be serving his second year in Benton.

Rev. H. C. Fletcher was returned to the Calvert City First Methodist Church. He will start serving his third year there.

Rev. Daniel Tucker was returned to the Hardin Methodist Church to start serving his second year.

Assignments of former Marshall County men included the Rev. R. L. Dotson to the South Fulton Circuit; the Rev. Paul T. Lyles to the First Church in Murray; and the Rev. E. E. Gress to North Side in Paducah.

One of the conference's important decisions was to place a two-year minimum on pastoral assignments. The previous minimum has been one year of service.

### Combs Says He Offers Positive Program for State

Bert Combs, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, spoke to a crowd that overflowed the circuit courtroom in Benton last Saturday afternoon.

Combs said he was the only candidate in the gubernatorial race who offered a positive program for the people of Kentucky.

He said the first plank in his platform was the park system of the state. He said that he would carry out this program, provided he is elected governor, if it were the only thing he accomplished. He said it would cost \$18,000,000.

He said the second plank in his platform was the park system of Kentucky. He said he favored the park system as it is now operated and would continue that policy "as is." He said he thought Henry Ward had done an outstanding job with the park system.

"My opponent says if he is elected governor he will take the park system out of the hotel and hotel business. Last year more than three million persons visited Kentucky parks. And that means a lot to the financial welfare of Kentucky. You folks in Marshall County know how important the parks are to you. So I promise you I will continue the park system, including the hotel and hotel business."

He said he also endorsed the work of the State Highway Department, and would continue with the highway program. He said the people in Marshall County had reason to be proud of the road mileage constructed in the county in recent years.

### Probe Begun After Escape Of Prisoner

The Marshall County Grand Jury, in session this week, reprimanded County Jailer C. E. (Bogue) Edwards for his conduct in office.

The grand jury's investigation and its reprimand of Jailer Edwards resulted, in part, from the recent escapes from the county jail of G. W. Washburn, Washburn, jailed on a charge of drunkenness, escaped the first time when he left his cell to go to the lobby of the courthouse after drinking water. He escaped a second time, and was given a six-months term in the court of Judge Artelle Haltom.

The grand jury's report, signed by J. W. Beard, foreman, had this to say about Jailer Edwards:

"In response and compliance with the specific charge and instruction to us by the judge of the Marshall Circuit Court at the time this grand jury was impaneled, we hereby report that, we have made a thorough examination as is possible concerning the handling and safekeeping of prisoners committed to the Marshall County Jail and, more specifically, the circumstances surrounding the escape of prisoners from said jail. Our investigation leads us to believe that the escape of these prisoners has been caused or effected by reason of some practices on the part of the jailer of this county and which are a result either of his negligent or willful mismanagement of this portion of his duties as such jailer. In either event, it is the certain belief of this grand jury that the conditions which have brought about and which have directly contributed to the escape of these prisoners can, and should and must be corrected in the interest of the preservation of law and order in this county."

"We have not felt that the evidence before us is sufficient to demand or justify the returning of an indictment at this time, but we feel that the nature of the evidence is such that this investigation should be continued and that it should be referred to the next grand jury impaneled in this county, and we do hereby so refer it."

"We have discussed this matter at length with the jailer of this county, and it is our hope and we do so believe, that the jailer can and will proceed to take immediate steps to correct the conditions which have been under investigation."

Former residents of Birmingham, the old Tennessee River port that now lies at the bottom of Kentucky Lake, are making plans to hold their annual reunion.

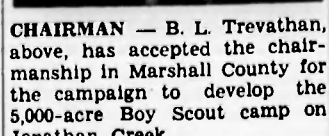
This year's get-together, the 12th since the town was inundated when Kentucky Lake was formed, will be held on Sunday, July 3.

## The Farm Front

Farm work is considerably behind schedule because of continued rain for the past month. The total rainfall for last week was 2.8 inches, bringing the year's total rainfall to 24.7 inches. Rainfall has exceeded normal every month this year except January.

Only a small percentage of the corn crop has been planted and many fields planted did not get a good stand. A number of growers have planted fields two or three times and still must replant again when weather permits.

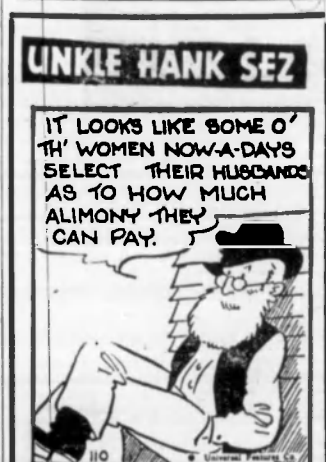
Tobacco is badly in need of work. Grass and weeds are damaging many fields. Diseases are doing damage in many fields. Wildfire and Angular leaf spot is showing up on part of the crop. French is doing some damage.

The 4-H boys and girls reported a wonderful time on their trip to Lexington. It rained every day they were there. DeLores Goheen and Carolyn Lee received red ribbons in the state contest.

Special care must be given to tomatoes, beans, and other garden plants for the control of blight. The weather is very favorable for its spread. It can severely damage or kill many plants. 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## Stripes and Big Mouth Bass Lure Fishermen

Striped bass still are the objects of the affections of most Kentucky fishermen, but several good crapple catches have been reported in the past few days.

The Kentucky Dam area still is one of the most popular spots for anglers seeking the "stripes." The shores are lined with fishermen every weekend.

The "stripes" are expected to start jumping soon and this always provides a big thrill for fishermen.

Bob Ross and a buddy took 20-odd stripes on a recent jaunt to the dam.

Mrs. Otto Can and Mrs. Roy Boyd brought in a nice string of crapple Monday morning from below the dam.

Fisherman's One-Stop reports its baited docks are in full feed and that several hundred pounds of fish are being caught there daily.

Ed Cook and party of Hopkinsville caught 45 stripes weighing up to two pounds at Egger's Ferry Bridge. They fished with minnows in 15-foot water.

Glendon Stevens and party of Beaver Dam caught 240 bass in three days. They fished with spoons and spinners.

Wallace Hooks of Golden Pond caught 22 stripes, using the rubber shad minnow.

J. W. Buchanan of Hopkinsville caught three large-mouth bass and a 7-pound catfish.

A. T. Berkeley of Mayfield recently landed a 4-pound striped

bass below Kentucky Lake Dam. He caught the big 'un on a dog jig lure.

Arthur Curtis of Paducah recently caught a string of 10 large-mouth bass while fishing near Coakley's Village Docks. Most of the bass were big ones and were caught with a Bomber. Mr. Curtis' picture was printed in the Louisville Courier-Journal.

Bass, both stripe and large-mouth, have been caught on surface plugs, spoons, bombers, spinners and rubber shad. Many good catches have been reported.

Several catches of bluegills have been reported. The bait was worms. And heavy poundage of catfish has been hooked on cut bait and worms.

Dr. Leo A. Will of St. Louis and Bill Jackson of Murray took 27 nice large-mouth bass in a day and a half of fishing.

Mose Florence, Burble Knight and Rad Conner all of Hardin Route 1, recently took limit strings of large-mouth on surface plugs.

And Edward Williams of Clinton brought in 23 crapple, all nice ones, with minnow bait in water 12 to 16 feet deep.

Continued rain has hindered fishermen some but still Kentucky Lake is proving itself one of the best fishing spots in the whole country.

## 27 Million Pounds Of Fish Caught, But 'Twas in Great Lakes

Lansing, Mich.—The Michigan Department of Conservation reveals that commercial fishermen took 27,000,000 pounds of fish from Michigan's Great Lakes waters in 1954.

Officials said that figure was 1,000,000 pounds above the average annual catch. Herring provided 8,500,000 pounds, and smelt ran second with an all-time record of 4,900,000 pounds.

Only 85 pounds of lake trout were taken in Lake Michigan and none was caught in either Lake Huron or Lake Erie during the 1954 fishing seasons.

Trout from these lakes sustained a \$2,000,000 industry until depredations by sea lampreys in recent years.

Lake Michigan produced 14,200,000 pounds of the total 1954 catch. Lake Superior 5,800,000 pounds, Lake Huron 5,400,000 pounds, and Lake Erie about 1,800,000 pounds.

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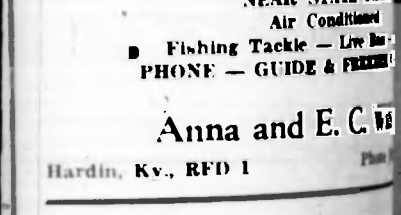

Background Scriptures: II Chronicles 35: 11 Kings 23  
Devotional Reading: Psalm 133

**Before Worship**

Lesson for June 18, 1955

I DON'T seem to get much out of church. You can hear that complaint too often. Maybe you have made it yourself. Let's leave the question of the sermon out of the picture. The sermon isn't all you go to church for. The object of that meeting, on Sunday morning or whenever it is, is to bring you closer to God, to make God real to you, to send you back into your every-day life with a radiant heart and a mind at peace.

The object of your going to church is, in one word, **Worship**. Hymns, prayers, offering, meditation, sermon—all of it ought to blend into one blessed experience of worship, that is to say, an experience in which you and others with you meet with God. Why doesn't this always happen? Maybe the fault is with the people, not with the minister alone. One good preacher can't make a good service all by himself.



**Encouraging the Minister**

In the Bible story of Josiah and his great Passover, there are some valuable suggestions that even after all these years and all these changes can help us too. The Passover was the great festival of worship among the ancient Jews. It was observed every year. But the chronicler reports about this one of King Josiah's, that there had not been one like it since the days of Samuel; or in other words, it was the best Passover in about 400 years. What made this one so special? Three points stand out. One is that Josiah "encouraged the priests in their service." Put into modern terms, that means the people encouraging the minister. You always see the minister at the door after service, shaking hands with the people. They may tell him they enjoyed the sermon; but how many who tell him that, helped him, beforehand? How many of them prayed for him, not while he was preaching but long before, when he was working on his sermon? When a religious chicken-farmer is taking his poultry to market, he doesn't pray that they will be good chickens. The time to pray for that is back when the eggs are hatching, when they are in the baby chick stage, while he is selecting the feed, and so on. By the time the chickens are ready for market it's a little late to be praying about it. So the time to begin praying for your minister and encouraging him is while his sermons are hatching, so to speak; before, not only after, the service.

**"Prepare Yourself"**

We read also that King Josiah said to the Levites, "Prepare yourselves." The Protestant Christian belief is that all believers are priests. A service of worship, as we understand it, is not a kind of performance in which the minister does it all while we just sit and watch him. One reason why we get so little out of church is that we put so little into it. If you had an interview with the President of the United States, wouldn't you make some preparation for it? You don't just "drop in" to see a man as important as that. And yet people will go to the house of God without the least preparation. They may be well dressed, but their minds are only half-dressed and their souls are more than half asleep. You have a right to come before God with a burdened heart; he welcomes the heavy-laden. But you have no right to expect much from a so-called worship service which you enter with a mind cluttered with workday bores that you won't let go, with a heart hardened by pride, with a spirit almost of defiance, as if you said to the minister, I dare you to interest me!

**"Prepare for Your Brethren"**

Josiah also told the Levites to prepare for their brothers who were coming to worship. True worship in a church is not an individual affair, as if each person present were sitting in a separate cell listening in by earphone. There is no point in "public" worship unless there is some sharing, some fellowship, some opening of the heart. A service of "worship" from which the people stream away without speaking to one another, or praying for and with one another, is a poor affair. ## Soil Conservation Notes

BY HERBERT ANDERSON

Waite Clark, north of Palma on highway 68, seeded five acres of sericea lespedeza this spring. Corn was grown in this field last year. The seedbed was prepared by disking. A good stand was secured over most of the field. Mr. Clark plans to harvest the sericea for hay next year.

The Soil Conservation Service helped C. P. Blakney, south of Palma, John Collie and G. L. Morgan, Fairdealing; W. E. Downing, near Breezeel School; and Roy Cox, near Bethel Church, stake farm ponds in the past three weeks. The ground remains too wet to dig these ponds.

Olen Houser, south of Benton, completed the digging of his farm pond the first of the month. The surface area of this pond will be about one and one-fourth acres. The dam which impounds this water is two hundred and thirty feet long with a maximum height of twelve feet. The depth of the water will be about seven feet. Fifteen hundred cubic yards of earth were moved in building the dam.

Ralph Moore, east of Bethel Church, dug a small pond on his farm week before last. This pond will hold a lot of stock

water because it averages six feet in depth over three-fourths of the area.

H. L. Story, south of Possum Trot, plans to dig a drainage ditch as soon as the ground dries. He helped him stake the ditch and then make a survey to determine the size of ditch needed. There is a four hundred and forty acre watershed which will drain through the ditch.

Boone Lyles, northwest of Brewers; Roscoe Breezeel, near Breezeel School; E. E. Chambers, west of Benton; and Charlie Edwards, Fairdealing, became cooperators of The Marshall County Soil Conservation District during May.

Rev. Suthard said that if permission is granted WNGO-FM will bring to listeners of this area sporting events and other public affairs that have not heretofore been broadcast.

Construction of the station will begin as soon as permission is granted and it is expected to be in operation in the late summer or early fall.

## Perk Up Your Petticoats



The Petticoat Parade marches on! When your petticoats droop and need to be starched after washing, you'll get the perkier finish from Argo Gloss Starch—a good old-fashioned, starchy starch that makes skirts really billow.

### Special Pointers For Special Petticoat Problems

1. Nylon taffeta petticoats that have gone limp, can be starched in above solution, but do not wring out excess starch, and damp petticoat drip dry. Dry completely and use steam iron set at "synthetic" or iron with dry iron while still slightly damp.
2. Crinolines are easier to iron after starching if thin pressing cloth is placed between the crinoline and the iron.
3. Excessive stiffness around waistline can be avoided by not starching the top few inches of your petticoat.
4. Can-can petticoats are easier to iron if you iron the body of the petticoat on the right side first, then turn skirt wrongside out and iron the ruffles, starting with the top one.

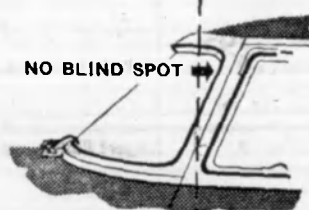

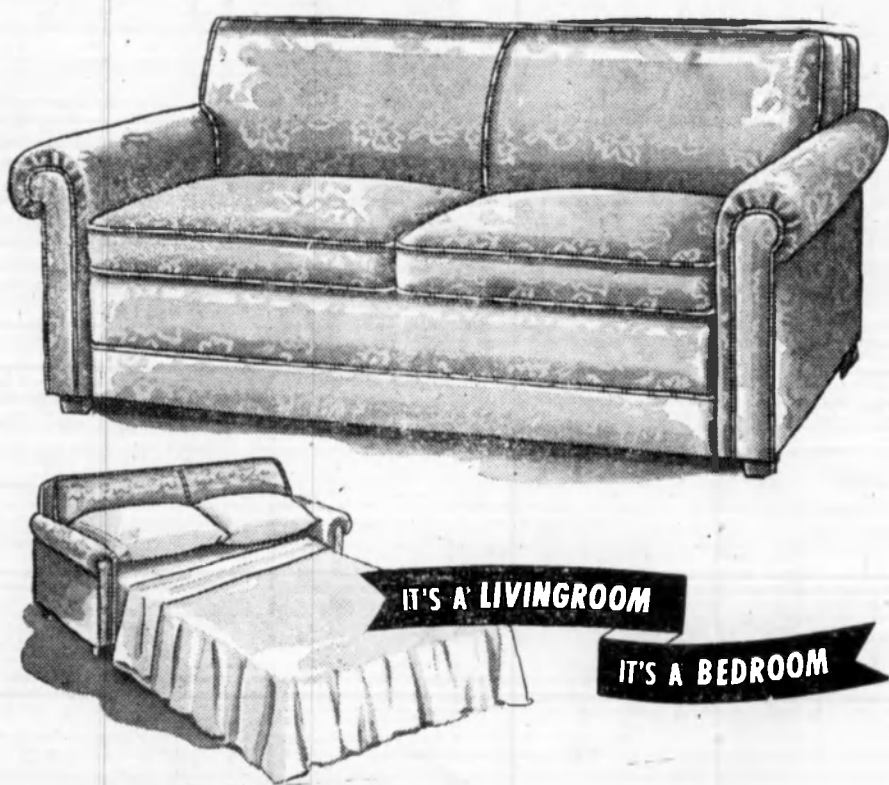

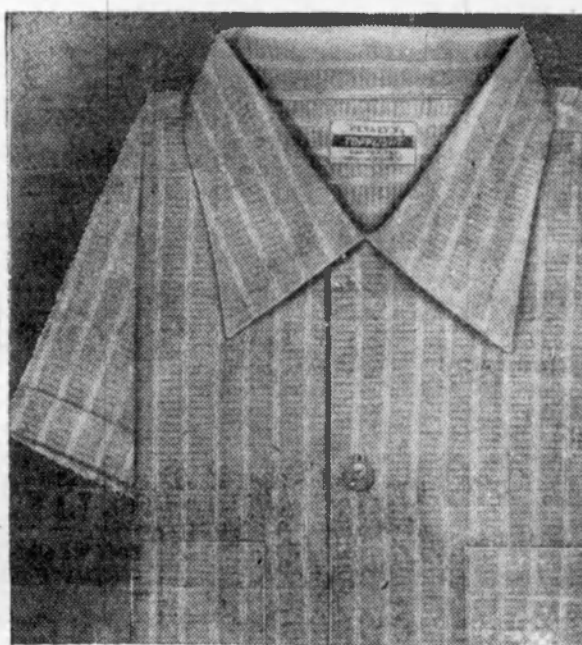
