## Lovett is Certified as Democratic Nominee

Several weeks ago I stated through the newspapers, that I would be a candidate for the office of Circuit Judge of the First-Second Judicial District of Kentucky, composed of the counties of Calloway, Livingston and Marshall, and that my official announcement would appear at a later date.

My declaration of candidacy has been duly filed, and since the time for filing declaration papers has passed and no other candidate has filed for this office, I have now received my certificate of nomination as the Democratic nominee and this office will not be voted for at the August primary. However, my name will appear on the ballot at the general election in November.

I am very grateful to the people of this area for the many favors I have received in the past, both official and professional. April 6 of next year will be the 50th anniversary of my entering the legal profession.

During this half century I have had many and varied experiences that have been of much value to me in the office I now hold, and I believe I am still young enough in my ideals to meet the rapidly changing conditions of our times. If I am elected to this office next November, I can only promise to use such abilities as I have obtained through education, training and personal experiences in administering justice without fear or favor with the predominant desire to make this a better place in which to live.

An interest in public offices by all good citizens is the safeguard of our democracy. No Judge should degrade his office by low scruples for the political preferment of himself or others.

One ascending to the judges bench should strip himself of all bias, prejudice and party loyalty. He should be considerate of the convenience of litigants and members of the bar, until kindness becomes antagonistic to his duty. He should be careful of every particular case before him, but he must not forget that the general public is concerned with every cause.

"He should know no fear but the fear of God; he should feel no love but the love of truth; he should have no ambition but to walk uprightly before men with unsold honor and blameless life."

These are my ideals of a judge. Like all humans, I often fall short of my ideals. I can only promise to keep trying to do the best I can.

## Wheat Quota Referendum Is Due June 25

The referendum to determine whether or not the marketing quota program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop will be held June 25. Polling place will be Marshall County ASC office, Benton.

Each grower has been advised of his farm's 1956 wheat acreage allotment and has received a leaflet explaining program operations. Farm allotments will be based on a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres, the same as this year.

Everett Treas, chairman of Marshall County ASC Committee, explains that if the vote is favorable, the program will be in operation for the 1956 wheat crop, and price support for the crop in the commercial wheat area -- depending on the supply situation -- will be probably between 75 and 82 percent of parity. The support level will be announced by the Secretary of Agriculture before the referendum. A farmer who exceeds his farm wheat allotment or 15 acres whichever is larger, will be subject to a marketing penalty equal to 45 percent of parity on the excess production.

If the vote is unfavorable, the support will be 50 percent of parity. In either case, only the wheat from farms where the wheat acreage allotment is not exceeded will be eligible for price support.

Remember the date June 25, at the Marshall County ASC Office. Polls open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.





## REQUESTS DUE JULY 30 FOR ACP COST SHARING

The date established for requesting cost-sharing for conservation measures to be completed in the fall of 1955 is July 30.

The tobacco crop is getting off to a very poor start because of the cool, wet weather for the past five or six weeks. Disease is showing up in many fields. Insects are now taking their toll. Follow a rigid spray program for their control.

Paul Darnall will represent this county at a meeting in Paducah Friday at noon to make further plans concerning the establishment of an experimental farm here in the Purchase. Nine counties are co-operating together for the establishment of an experimental farm in our area.

Tomato blight is now causing severe damage to the tomato crop. The bottom leaves turn yellow and then dry up. The fungus disease then progresses up the plant until it is completely killed. A spray program is the only thing that can be done. Materials for spraying are C-O-C-S, Copper A, Basic Copper Sulfate, and Zineb.

It is time to plant that mid-season garden. Most all garden vegetables can be planted this late in the season. Plantings of beans and corn should be made each 15 days until about the first part of August.

It is not too late to plant sudan grass for pasture or hay. It should be ready to graze 30 days after seeding. This would give about two months grazing before frost.



### Patriotism

Lesson for July 3, 1955

IS a man subversive if he—has an international outlook? fails to conform to popular styles of patriotism? will not promise to support every war in which his country engages? speaks out against his nation's sins?

In this year of grace 1955, men who fill the above qualifications are cried down as subversive. Perhaps it has always been so. But in the sight of God, some such men have been honored above their stone-throwing fellow-citizens, one such person of record had what most people would call a "bad" record. He had been accused of subversive activities. He had predicted defeat for his nation while at war, and had publicly advised surrender. He had a record of jail sentences. He had missed being executed, several times; and finally died, so tradition says, at the hands of a lynching party. Nevertheless he was one of God's great prophets. His name was Jeremiah.

**Professional Patriots**  
Jeremiah's chief enemies were also called prophets by their contemporaries. History calls them false prophets, though to the "man in the street" of that time they seemed to be the true ones. The false prophets did not really have a word from the Lord. Their words were suggested by what the people wanted to hear. Their sermons were suggested by their own desire for prestige. They were suggested by their wish for a good income. Not long ago an American organization, professing patriotism, was selling mottoes to put on automobiles, reading "The only good I am is Americanism," or some such phrase. The decals does not dictate all their actions, for God is never the author of sin. But when we read what is going on in the world, we must not read with despair, for God never lets nations out of his control.

**God Judges**  
If God literally dictated and brought to pass every happening in history, then God could be the judge only of himself. But he does judge the nations, as he judges individuals, for what nations do of their own free will and consent. Nations, as nations, can make right choices or they can make wrong ones. It has been often remarked that the mortality rate among nations is 100%. As the Bible sees it, the death of a nation is the judgment of God upon it. Now the point so often overlooked, indeed the point the average citizen of ancient Israel and Judah conveniently overlooked, is that God judges all nations alike. He is not like a referee who calls fouls on one team and never sees a foul if his favorite team makes them. He is not like a parent who brings some of the children up carefully and spoils his favorites. No person can be just, and God cannot be just, if his justice is only for some and not for all. We all know what to think of a judge who "fixes tickets" for his friends who violate traffic regulations. God, the Judge of nations, never fixes anybody's ticket. Let us put this into plain English in terms of our own American situation: If an act of another nation is "bad," really bad in the sight of God, then the same kind of act on America's part is just exactly as bad, maybe worse if (as we claim) we know God's will better than anybody. Or if what our nation does at any time is "good," really good in God's eyes, then the same act done by another nation is good too, and we ought not to resent it.

**God Rewards**  
The prophet Zephaniah says what all the other prophets write in their own way, namely that God rewards nations that follow his laws. God does not of course reward nations in heaven, as he does people one by one. The reward of a nation is continuing peace and happiness—and sometimes power—on this planet. The reward of nations is to become the safe home of men and women who know and love and serve God. The reward of nations is to be the living evidence of the justice of a God who loves justice. 

## Weekly Meditation

Text: "Martha, thou art anxious and distracted about many things, but one thing is needful." Luke 10:41.

Jesus did not criticize Mary, that for serving. Serving was necessary. It was her home. She was responsible for the service of the home. He did not criticize her because in her serving and faithfulness and in the energy of her purpose, and efficiency, she was losing the one thing that was necessary to bless and satisfy the soul. She could have had both. It is possible for a Martha to have the gift of serving and also the blessing of a Mary.

Jesus did not say, "You are serving too much," but "You lack one thing."

The word anxious and troubled and wrought up about all kinds of things is dividing its mind and strength among many matters. We readily understand distraction, confusion of mind, for alas, we are living in the midst of it. We are serving a Martha, but we are forgetting to sit at the Saviour's feet. If there is one thing in the world which we need just now it is to be well poised, to be calm and quiet.

The Master's admonition to Martha is worthy of our attention. Jesus says: "Mary is gaining the part that never shall be taken away from her." She is poised and quiet and sitting at the Saviour's feet. Martha could have had it, too, but did not realize her need. Service need not cause irritability or fretful criticism.

We learn in this lesson that food for the soul is as necessary as food for the body. How often we feel this and need it. Man cannot live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God. The greatest gift God can give us is given from His personality, and not simply in our serving Him.

This is why we need to sit at the feet of our Saviour. We need to take into our lives what we can give, and the greatest gift is that of God giving Himself to us. We know not how, nor when our lives may come in contact with this Divine Personality, but we know that we need God. The whole world feels it.



