Building Struck by Lightning, Burns

Lightning struck the new storehouse of the City Light Plant last Friday noon and started a fire that almost consumed the building.

The building was located at 7th and Elm Streets near the Long Concrete Co. and near the N. C. & St. L. Railroad tracks.

The structure was filled with meters and other electrical equipment, and the damage was estimated at several thousand dollars.

An official estimate of the damage had not been made when the Courier went to press.

The lightning struck the building during a downpour of rain.

Despite the rain and the efforts of firemen, the flames quickly consumed the structure and it was considered a total loss.

The fire whistle was sounded several times, but volunteer firemen failed to hear the alarm and few firemen showed up to fight the flames.

A big crowd of spectators, however, witnessed the fire from their automobiles.

The residence of Willie Gilsen adjoins the storehouse and it was reported that the lightning bolt knocked Mr. Gilsen off his feet. His house was reported undamaged.

Mr. Henson, had returned to his native county to reside for the past year from Detroit, where he had lived for 30 years.

Kickoff Dinner Held

Speaker for the meeting was Dick Patterson, who is in charge of the financial campaign for the entire Four Rivers Council, composed of 10 West Kentucky counties, which will build the reservation.

Mr. Patterson was introduced by B. L. Trevathan, who is Marshall County chairman for the drive.

Mr. Patterson explained that the reservation will consist of 450 acres of land, various lodges and facilities for the Boy Scouts and will cost \$250,000.

He said there now are 3,100 Boy Scouts in the Four Rivers Council and that a growth to 5,000 or 6,000 was anticipated in the next few years.

He said that the national Boy Scout jamboree probably would be held at the Kentucky Lake reservation in 1960, and that it would be attended by 60,000 Scouts from all over the nation.

Mr. Patterson explained the method of soliciting funds and distributed pledge cards to the civic leaders.

The fund drive already is underway in Calvert City and Gilbertsville. The drive will end on Aug. 15.

In explaining the FBI's position in regard to cooperation in such training programs, Boyle said, "Under the directorship of J. Edgar Hoover, the FBI has constantly striven to further the professionalization of law enforcement through media such as

training. In addition to training in Police Department schools such as the present one, the FBI operates the FBI National Academy, which since 1935 has had 2,665 graduates, all of whom were members of local Police Departments from throughout the United States."

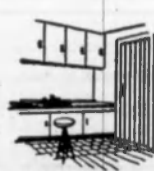

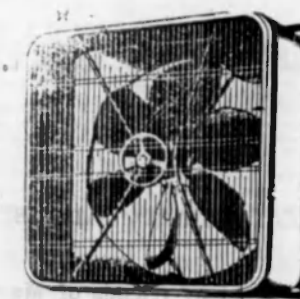

County Soil Notes

Soil Conservation Service

July 24 to July 30 is soil conservation district week in Kentucky and Marshall County as proclaimed by the Governor of the State and the County Judge.

The purpose of the week is to stimulate among the county's population a full realization of the desperate need for conserving our soil and water resources.

In view of this purpose, I think it would be well worthwhile to answer the question: What is the value of the soil conservation district program to the county?

The first and probably the greatest value is that the people have one local self-governing organization, the soil conservation district, which is given by State Law the specific responsibility of developing a program and plan of work for soil and water conservation in Marshall County. The governing body of the District, the Board

of Supervisors, also have the responsibility of supervising the application of the District Program. The recent supervisors are Renloe Rudolph, Homer Chester, Eura Mathis, Sam Gold, and J. M. Solomon.

A second value of the District Program is the control of soil erosion. This is brought about in two main ways. First, is by wise land use based on the scientific classification of the capability of the land. Second is the establishment of conservation practices such as contour farming, terraces, diversions, farm drainage, crop rotations, cover crops, pastures, woodland, and wildlife improvements. When soil erosion is controlled, more effective drainage can be done because of less sedimentation of new ditches.

A third value of the District Program is found in the increased profits which come to farmers through increased crop,

pasture, and woodland yields. More and better livestock also contribute to this profit.

As the farmers buying power goes up as a result of increased profit, we have the fourth value of the District Program. This is a more prosperous county with more business, better schools, roads, and a higher standard of living for all.

The fifth value of the District Program is found in the opportunities for recreation for all of the people. These are the hunting, fishing, swimming, and so forth which are the result of wildlife and water conservation.

There is a sixth value also which comes to all of us as we see the reality of the first five and that is the satisfaction of a job well done. We would have the pleasure of living in a county in which soil erosion, floods, and the resulting damages are held to a minimum. Visitors also would enjoy seeing the green fields, woodlands, waterways, and other conservation work applied to the land.
