Mayfield Delegates Attend Sessions of Jehovah Witnesses

Fourteen delegates from the Mayfield congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses attended some of the 155 worldwide assemblies. Six delegates attended the assembly at Comiskey Park, Chicago, June 22 to 26. Nuremberg will have the largest number in attendance, 58,000 have requested rooming and accommodations. 45,000 delegates from United States and Canada are now attending the European assemblies. Delegates from Latin America, Africa, Australia and the Far East will also attend in Europe.

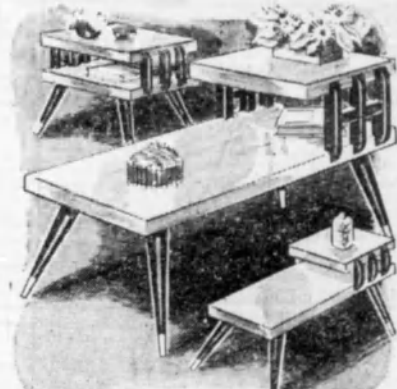

Big Fish Go Deeper, Catches Remain Good

Cooler weather has made fishing more pleasant for Kentucky Lake visitors and the catches have been good, but fewer big fish are being brought in.

The big ones are in the deep water and become increasingly difficult to catch. Night fishing remains popular for the best results.

Striped bass and black bass are being caught with medium deep running plugs out in the lake and around the rocky points. Still-fish the inlets and bays with minnows for crappie. Fish about 20 feet in depth.

Some good strings of bluegills are being caught on worms, and some good-size catfish also are being hooked.

Bill Nall of Kenlake Boat Dock reports that fishing at his place is still good for this time of the year. His report follows:

Martin Brachtensend and wife of St. Louis caught 25 crappie, 5 bass, 3 cats and one walleye with minnow bait. W. R. McBrayer and party of Louisville took 9 largemouth, 20 nice crappie, 14 white bass and two cats. Dutch Owen of Fulton took limits of crappie, largemouth, stripes and also some good-size cats. Albert Oldfield of Sunrise, Ind., took two limits of stripes on spinners.

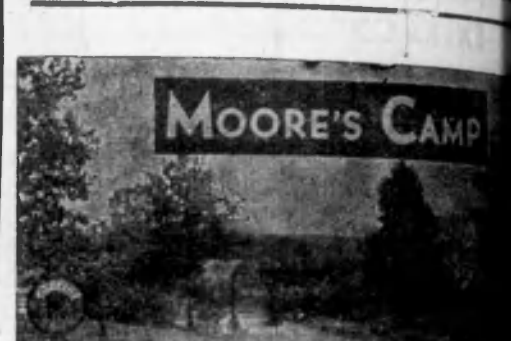
