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Indigo and Fescue Good Grazing Crops

Indigo and fescue are the dairy soil builders. This is especially true of all the perennials that allowed to grow for several years. They protect the soil against erosion and usually improve its fertility and structure. This is in sharp contrast to the way most annual crops, especially the clean-tilled crops, affect land. They use up all the plant nutrients they can take from the soil and furnish little protection against erosion.

Grass crops, when properly rotated, are one of the most effective tools available for conserving and improving the soil. In fact there is no practical way to do conservation farming on most land without growing grass at least part of the time. Moreover, the profitable uses of these crops in conservation are many and varied.

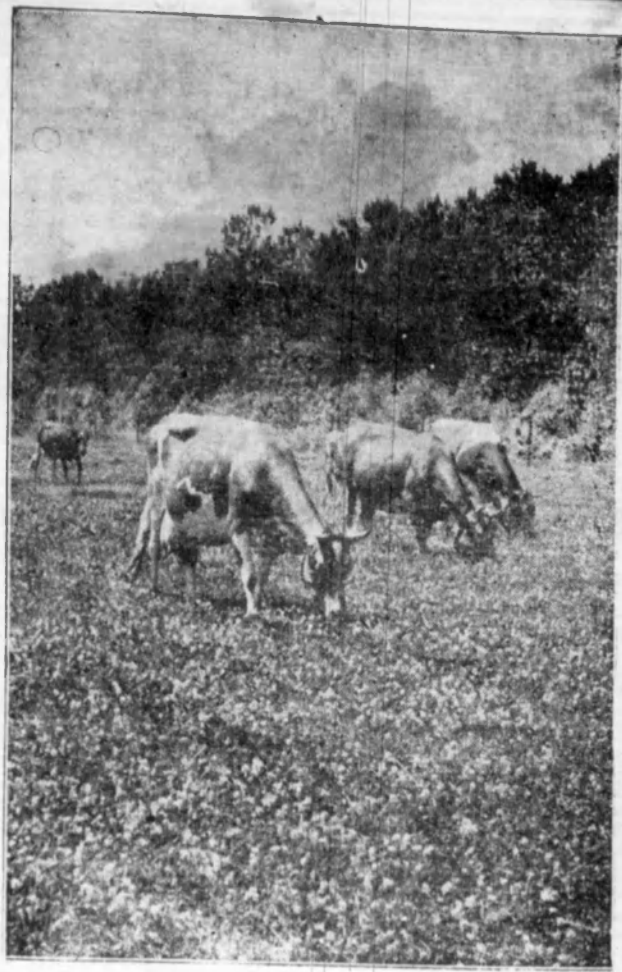

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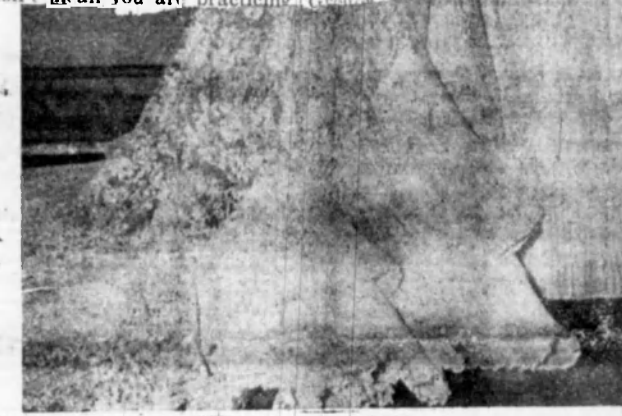

Jailer Edwards Kills Self With Pistol at Home

County Jailer C. C. (Bogue) Edwards, 69, was found shot to death shortly after 4 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon at his home in Benton.

A 32 calibre pistol was found near his body, which was on the floor of the living room.

There were three bullet wounds in the body, one in the left chest, one in the right chest and one in the left arm. Three shots had been fired from the revolver and death was instantaneous.

Mrs. Edwards reported that her husband came home from the court house about 4 o'clock and went immediately to the bathroom. Soon after he left the bathroom, she heard pistol shot and, on investigation, found her husband lying on the living room floor. She notified authorities.

Ironically, Mr. Edwards had tried for several weeks to sell the pistol with which he took his life. He had been keeping the pistol in a desk drawer in the outer office of County Judge Artelle Haltom. Shortly after noon Tuesday, he took the weapon from the desk and went to his home. He then returned to the courthouse, performed his duties as janitor and went home again. It was on this trip that he shot himself.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Linn Funeral Home. Rev. W. H. Burnette, pastor of the First Methodist Church, of which Mr. Edwards was a member, will officiate. Burial will be in the Washam Cemetery.

Mr. Edwards is survived by his wife, Mrs. Eula Edwards; two daughters, Mrs. Maggie Jones of Morgantown, and Mrs. Valera Flowers of Paducah; a step-daughter, Mrs. Florence Helton of Indiana; three sons, Ernest of Hardwell, H. B. of Benton Route 6, and Charles Thomas Edwards of Hartford, Conn.; 27 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Mr. Edwards was elected jailer in 1933. He was a long-time resident of Marshall County and once before had served a term as county jailer.

County Judge Artelle Haltom said he will make a temporary

appointment in the next few days to fill the office vacated by the death of Mr. Edwards. Judge Haltom said he will make a permanent appointment later to serve the more than two years of Mr. Edwards' unexpired term of office.

No inquest was scheduled as Mr. Edwards' death.

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The men are J. W. Turner, of Metropolis and Paducah, who was in jail on a charge of forgery, and Lawrence Neese, of Eastern Kentucky, who was charged with taking a gun and other articles from an Olive residence.

There were two different versions of the escape.

One version was that Turner walked away from his cell Monday night.

Another version was that both men fled Tuesday morning when breakfast was being served by County Jailer C. C. (Bogue) Edwards.

Turner was recaptured at 11 a. m. Tuesday at a residence six miles east of Benton near Highway 88. The house was surrounded by Sheriff Billy Watkins and State Troopers before the arrest of Turner.

Sheriff Watkins said that Turner told him he escaped from the jail Monday night and spent the night in the residence near Highway 88.

Neese was still at large today (Thursday), as the Courier went to press.

A Circuit Court grand jury recently investigated escapes from the Marshall County Jail, but no indictments were made.

Two Men Drowned Near Dam

Two McCracken County men drowned Saturday afternoon when their fishing boat, powered by an outboard motor, capsized in the swirling waters near the lake-side wall of Kentucky Dam.

The victims were George E. Allen Jr., 27, of Paducah, and David Stines, 32, of Heath.

The body of Allen was recovered at 6 p. m. Saturday, approximately four hours after the tragedy. The body of Stines was recovered at 3:25 p. m. Sunday. Separate funerals for the men were held in Paducah on Tuesday. Both men were employed at the atomic plant in Paducah.

The accident was witnessed by two Marshall County men, Herman Warren and Alan D. Koebel of Route 6. They were fishing from the walkway under the roadway on the lake side of the dam.

They witnessed the two men approach the dam in a small fishing boat and later heard screams. They ran nearer the scene and saw the two men clinging to the capsized boat. Warren and Koebel threw their fishing lines to the men in the water several times but the lines broke each time. One of the victims then disappeared beneath the surface of the water and a short time later the second man disappeared.

What Is Right?

Lesson for September 18, 1955

THE most dangerous notion in the world is that "right" and "wrong" do not mean anything at all but "I like it" and "I don't like it." When people begin to think along that line, all the walls are down, they have made the surrender of their character. Right and wrong do mean something, and all the slippery philosophies to the contrary notwithstanding, a person who is blind to these green and red lights is headed straight into trouble. Even when people are professing not to see any sense in those great words, for themselves, however, they do see how important they are for others.

Doing As Everybody Does

One of the wrong ways to find out what's right and what's not, is the simple, easy, and foolish method of counting noses. That is, some people will think anything at all is right if enough people do it. At the lowest level, take some primitive tribe in Borneo where men are admired in proportion to the number of heads—human heads—they have cut off and brought home. The "best citizens" of such communities are the most murderers! Now it has not occurred yet to some of those people that this killing is wrong; everybody does it, so it must be right. At the upper level, take some American school or college where more than two-thirds of the students cheat on examinations. Everybody does it, the freshman is told, so it must be all right. In the same community, perhaps, people who should know better will indulge in liquor just because "everybody" does it. But you cannot make a wrong thing right by addition.

Doing As You Like

Another mistake about right and wrong is to suppose that if a thing appeals to you strongly enough it must be right—for you. One man's meat is another man's poison, you will be told. If it is pleasant, that is a sign it is good; if it is unpleasant, that is a sign it is bad, or wrong. Now everybody knows how silly this is, when they see some one else putting up this kind of excuse. But when it comes home to one's own self, one sings a different tune. We hear talk like this: "I have a right to be happy, haven't I? ... You can't expect me to sacrifice my own interests. ... Something I want so much can't be very wrong. ... I'm in the grip of something too big for me. ... After all, I've got myself to consider. ... If you know how much this means to me you wouldn't blame me. ... and so forth and so forth. Now there is a grain of truth—no more than a grain, mind you—in this kind of philosophy of life. Certainly the opposite is wrong, too: if the pleasant is not always the same as the good, the unpleasant is not always good either. Stuff you hate to eat may be good for you (like spinach) or it may be bad for you (like underdone sausage). In an ideal life, a person would love to do what is right to be done, he would not hate it. Still it does not follow that duty is always delightful, or that the "kick" we get out of something is a measure of how right it is for us.

Doing What God Likes

Malachi the prophet many centuries ago said pretty plainly, in the name of God, what is the real difference between right and wrong. (And of course this is not the only place in the Bible where this comes out.) The righteous (the good man) is one who serves God; the wicked man is the one who does not serve him. Now that is not so simple as it is true. The will of God cannot be read off like a blueprint. God does not stand at a man's elbow all day long dictating to him moment by moment what he must do. Nevertheless in the Word of God we have the main lines of God's will plainly shown. We are never to be saved the trouble of thinking our problems through. But yet we do have some course-lights, some beacon on our way. We have the Ten Commandments. We have the Golden Rule. We have the inspired word, that loveth his neighbor hath fulfilled the law. The will of God is as simple, and as profound, as we.

The Farm Front - -

By J. HOMER MILLER

T. V. Mobley of Brewers has the best burley crop I have seen in the county. The tobacco was topped and the top suckers were left until time of cutting. Mr. Mobley used KY 35 for the first time. The tobacco is cured and ready for stripping as soon as the weather permits.

A tobacco press is a must for burley tobacco if you are to get the maximum returns from the crop. Blue prints can be secured at this office.

Crimson clover, barley and oats must be seeded as soon as possible if they are to go into the winter in good shape. Plant as soon as possible.

Treating tobacco plant beds in the fall is usually more successful than in the spring. Two chemicals now being used are cyanamide and methyl bromide. Some new chemicals are showing great promise and will be tried

next year.

Seventy-one farmers have tested 174 soil samples this year. Sixty percent of the Farm and Home Development families have tested their soil compared with 1.6 percent of other farmers of the county.

Applications are now being received by the Extension office for Farm and Home Development. A group will start their meeting in November. More families are wanted for these meetings. Make your plans now to plan next year's Farm and Home operations.
