## Jim Owens Is Injured In Accident

Jim Owens, an employee of the City of Benton, was seriously injured about 9 o'clock Monday morning in a fall at the N. C. & St. L. station here.

Owens was preparing to help unload some electric light poles from a flat car when the accident happened. He was standing on top of the carload of poles when the brace holding the poles gave way and the poles started rolling off the flat car.

Owens rolled off the car with the poles, and suffered a back injury.

He was taken to a Paducah hospital in a Linn ambulance.

Physicians said he suffered fractured vertebrae in the spinal column. He was to be placed in a cast as soon as he recovered from shock of the injury.

Owens is a former star basketball player for Benton High School and is an electric meter reader for the city.

## Calvert City Courtyard Sprayed to Halt Illness Is Being Beautified

A spraying program to control mosquito breeding was started in the Calvert City area this week in the fight against the outbreak in this county of encephalitis (sleeping sickness).

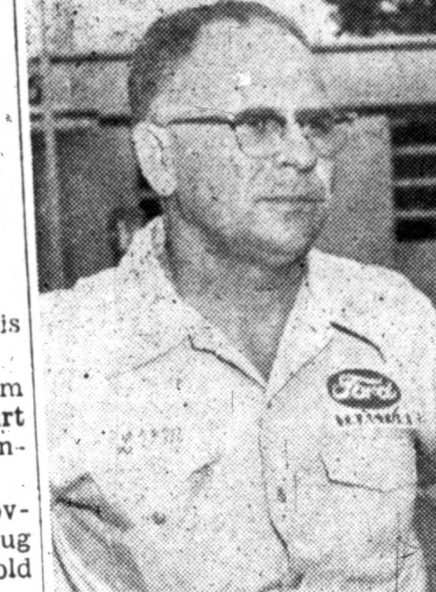
The spraying program is being carried out under the direction of the Marshall County Health Department and the Kentucky State Health Department.

Cost of the program has been set at \$2,400, and is being paid for by the industrial plants at Calvert City. It will continue for about 20 days. Rain this week hampered the program and much of the spraying will have to be done over again, said Dr. Sam Henson, county health officer.

It is believed the disease is transmitted from animals to people by mosquitoes. It causes severe inflammation of the brain.

In charge of the spraying are Ruby Walker, county sanitarian; Dr. Henson, health officer; Dr. E. Ranzenhoffer, State Health Department; and officials from the U. S. Public Health Center at Montgomery, Ala.

Meanwhile, another death in the Calvert City area last week was listed as due to encephalitis.

## Polio Shots Given by Physicians

The Salk polio vaccine is now available at the offices of all physicians in Marshall County.

The physicians will administer shots to all children, ages 1 to 9, for a charge of \$2 per shot.

The vaccine is supplied free of charge to the physicians by the State Department of Public Health.

The Marshall County Health Department no longer will administer shots to children. Parents desiring that their children have the polio shots should contact their family physician.

Each civic group in the county has been asked to send a representative to the meeting. Any one else interested in tuberculosis control is invited to the meeting.

## Pennsalt Will Build Caustic Potash Unit

The Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Company has started construction of a sizeable facility for the production of potassium hydroxide at its Calvert City works, President William P. Drake has announced.

The new electrolytic unit, which is expected to go into full production soon after the first of the year, will be equipped with De Nora mercury cells. The process will be continuous. Initially production will be confined to the liquid chemical but will provide all commercial grades and strengths.

The Calvert City works is one of eight widely dispersed Pennsalt installations which produce heavy chemicals for industrial use. Selection of this particular plant for the company's first "caustic potash" unit was dictated by its proximity to important Pennsalt industrial markets, in the Midwest, and favorable freight and shipping rates. Much of the plant's output will go to the soap, textile, chemical, pharmaceutical and petroleum industries.

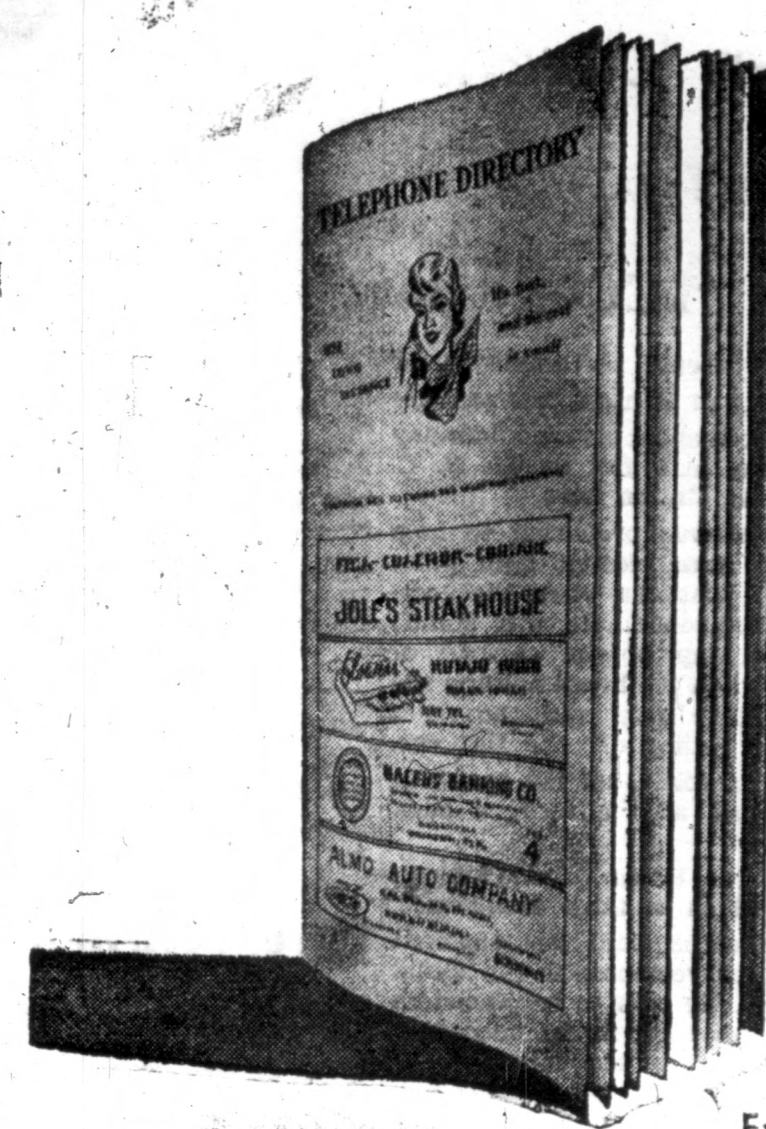

## The Farm Front - -

Now is the proper time to plant wheat. The Hessian fly free date is past. This insect can do severe damage to early planted wheat. Fertilize according to soil needs. Plant adapted varieties such as Vigo, Thorne, and Knox.

This is fire prevention week. The slogan this year is "Don't give fires a place to start." Clean up in and around the house, check flues and wiring. All can be sources of fire.

Harvest corn as soon as it is ready. Check the moisture content. When it is around 15 or 16 per cent it should keep with out special precautions.

Fall is the proper time to plant most bulbs such as tulips, jonquils, crocus, and narcissus. Keep color together rather than mixing. Put them in beds instead of rows.

Plan now for your crop next year. Plant cover crops on all plowed land. Know where your

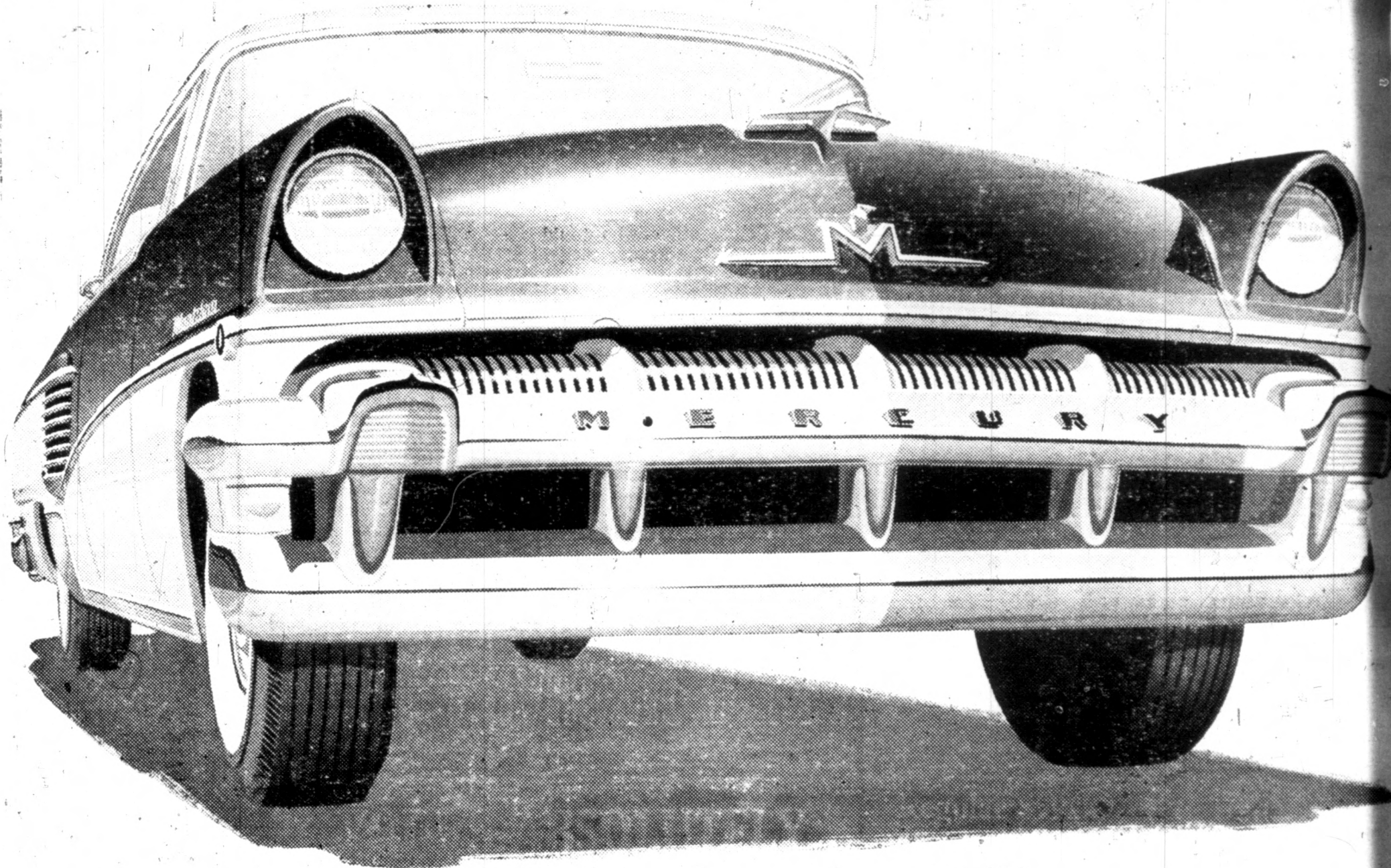

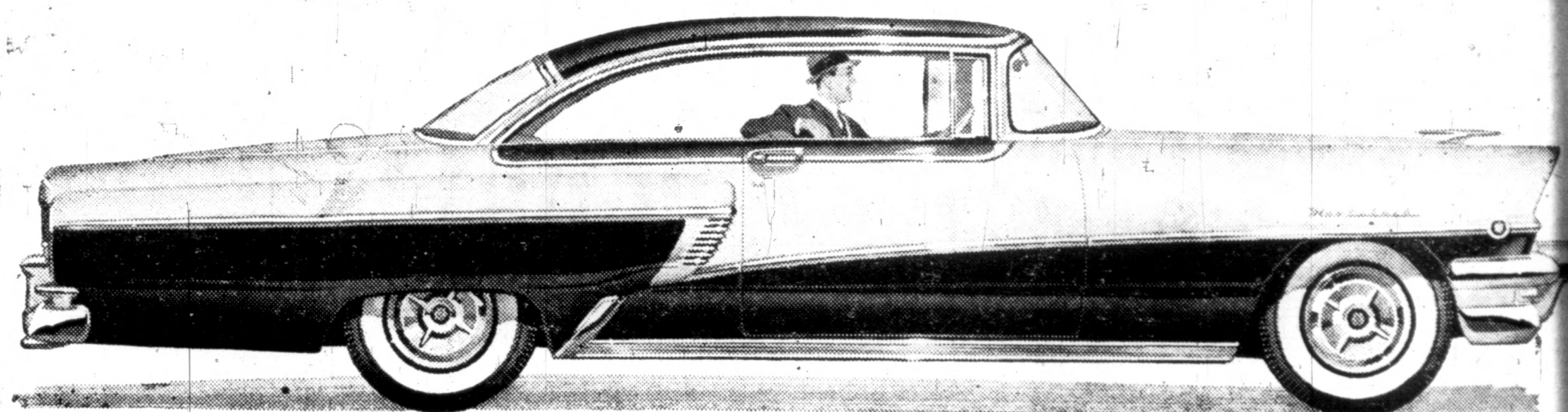

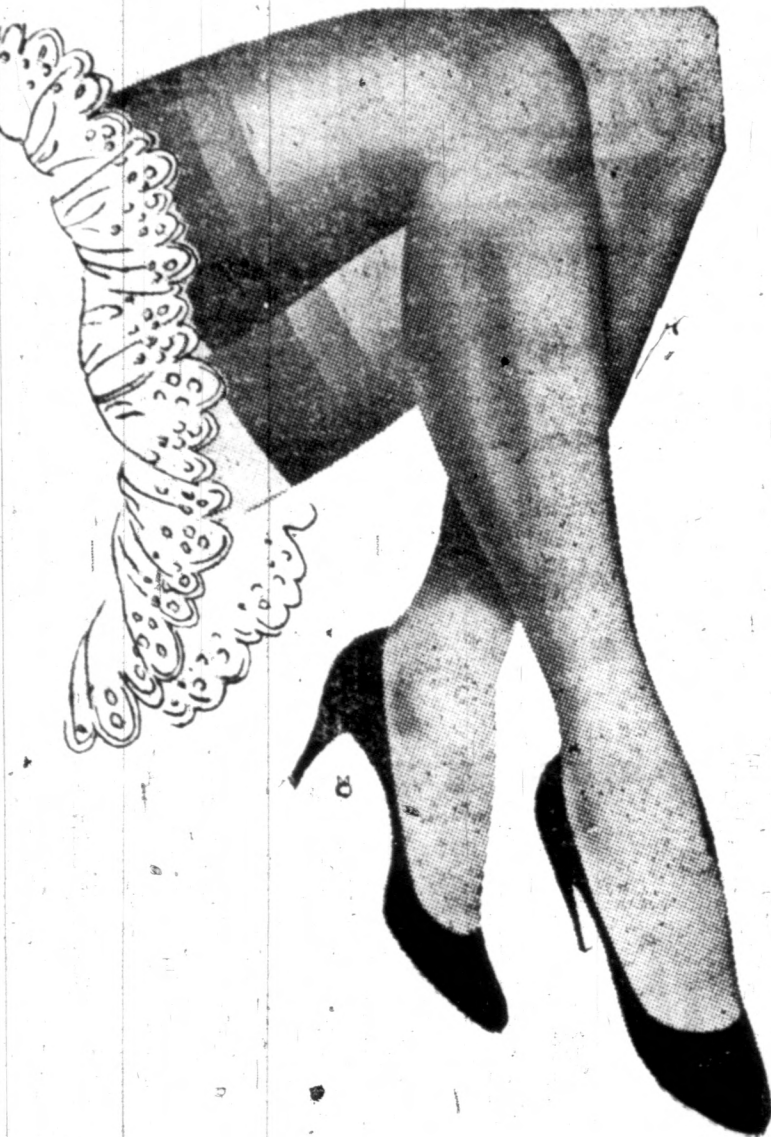

## Sports Column--

This fall the National Wildlife Federation and the League of Kentucky Sportsmen have announced a conservation essay contest in which Kentucky Junior and senior high school students may enter. The subject for junior high students is: "How can farmers help Wildlife?" and for the senior group: "How renewable are our Wildlife Resources?"

The contests are open to any junior or senior high student in the state whose teacher or school is conducting the contest in cooperation with a local conservation or sportsmen's club. This local group must be associated with the National Wildlife Federation and any sportsmen's club that belongs to the League of Kentucky Sportsmen qualifies in this respect.

Awards will be made in two divisions. For the Junior group the winner will receive \$100 second, \$50; third, \$25, and 10 honorable mentions will receive \$10 each.

In the senior group the winner will receive \$250; second \$50, third \$25, and 10 honorable mentions will receive \$10 each.

The contest rules are: The essay you enter in your school contest should be submitted to local judges by Dec. 15. The winning essays from the local contest should be in the hands of state contest judges by Jan. 15.

First, second and third prize winners in both junior and senior high divisions of the state contest must be submitted to the national contest by Feb. 15.

In this area of West Kentucky we should have several boys and girls who are interested in conservation so if you want to enter the essay contest tell your teacher and arrangements will be made.

You might talk with members of the clubs here in this county or you might see the Wildlife

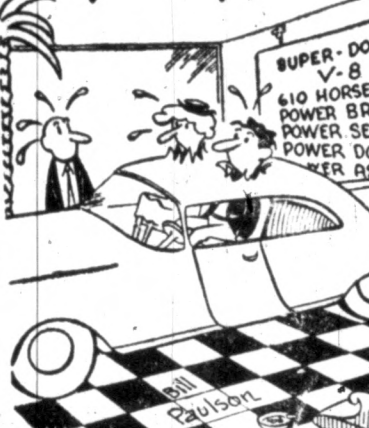

## Chairman Named for Girl Scout Fund Drive

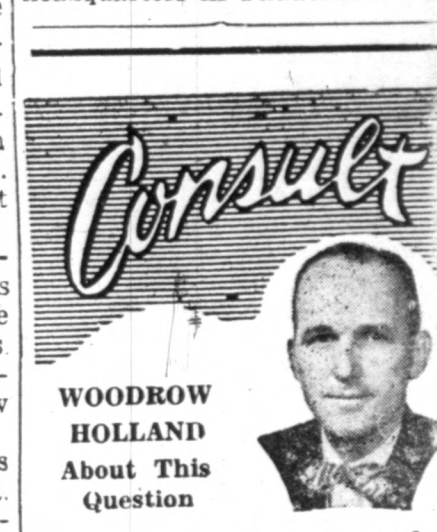
