## New Pontiac Will be Shown Here Friday

The new 1956 Pontiac models which go on display at the Roberts Motors showrooms Friday Oct. 21, introduce a General Motors "first," a completely new Hydra-Matic transmission. Called Strato-Flight Hydra-Matic by Pontiac engineers, the new transmission is designed to provide smoother, quieter shifting of gears.

The Pontiac Strati-Streak V-8 engine, introduced last year, is larger in 1956 with horsepower upped to 227 in the Star Chief and 205 in the 870 and 860 series. Fifteen new body styles, longer by 2.4 inches, include six "hardtop" Catalinas, three of them four-door and three two-door. 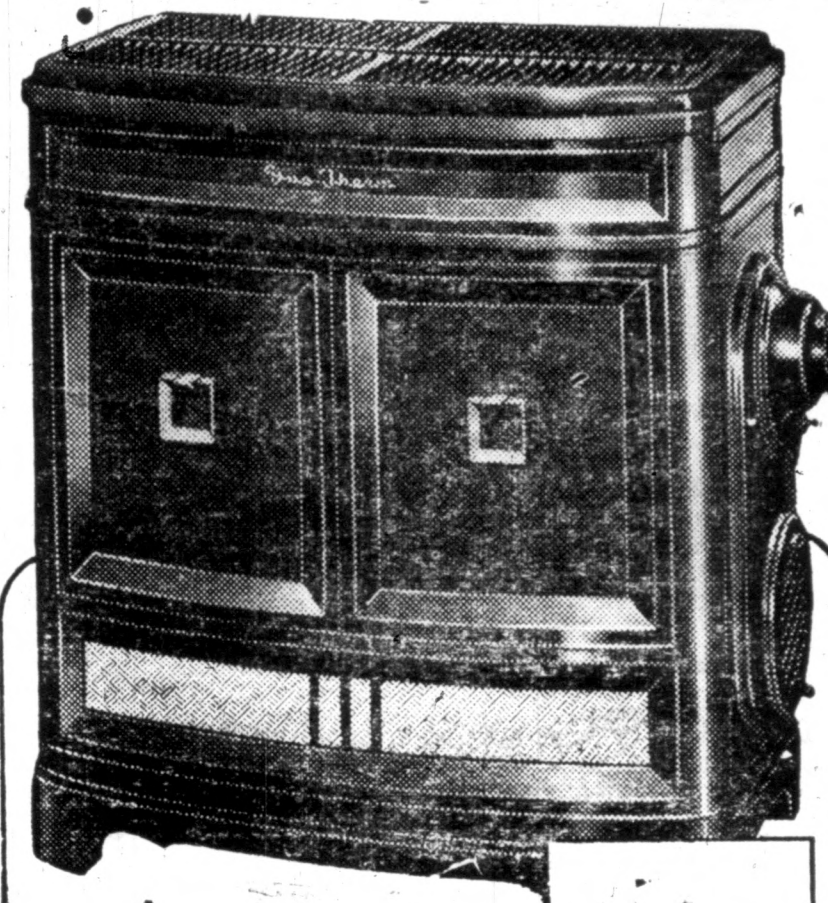
## Ruth Class Holds October Session at Mrs. Henson's Home

Background Scripture: Luke 4:1-15  
Devotional Reading: Hebrews 4:12

**How to Win**  
Lesson for October 23, 1955

NOBODY can be tempted to do what he can't do. Nobody can be tempted to do what he doesn't want to do. Of course somebody can say to you, "Do this," but if you can't or don't want to do it, the words are no words in your ear, they are no temptation, and you can't be said to have "resisted" what did not appeal to you at all. Furthermore, nearly always temptation means the pull of desire, not for something evil in itself, but only a good place, or a lesser good in place of a possible greater. If a child takes the money he was going to put into Sunday school and spends it for candy on Saturday night, that does not mean that candy is bad in itself, or that eating it is a sin. But the child is tempted to a lesser good when a greater good was possible.



**Questions About Temptation**  
The higher in the scale of life you go, the more this is true. Persons who live on a low level may easily be tempted to gross sins, because they don't have any strong desire for good, or to do good. Persons who live on a high level are much more likely to be tempted with good than with evil, for they habitually desire good. The temptation consists in seeing the lesser good so clearly that one forgets to look around and see the greater good. Now the temptations of Jesus were of this sort. There is no evidence that he ever felt an urge or even a slight inclination to do what was wrong in itself. There is evidence that he was tempted to do some good things that were not the best things. Take Luke's story of the temptations in the wilderness. One was to turn stones into bread—surely no sin in a hungry world, to produce more bread would be a good thing. Another temptation was to get control of the kingdoms of the world. Was that not what he came to do? Or the third temptation again—to trust in the protecting care of God; who would call that a sin? Yet each of these, under the circumstances and conditions, was not the right thing for Jesus, because not the best thing; and so he knew all these for what they were—temptations of Satan. We can ask many questions about temptation: where it comes from, what kind of persons are tempted, how to recognize it, and so on. But the question most of us want to know is, How can I win?

**How to Lose**  
There are two sure ways of losing the fight against temptation, whether in its lower or its higher forms. One is by sheer resistance, just saying No. If your temptation is liquor, for instance, it won't do you a particle of good to stand in front of a tavern door and say "No, I won't." Because, before long, you will meet stubbornness will go a long way, but not even Jesus tried to meet temptation with a simple empty No. Another way to lose your fight is to debate the question. In the vivid story of the first temptation (see Genesis 3) the serpent just gets Eve's mind to thinking about how fine that fruit was.

**The Sword of Spirit**  
Every Bible reader knows how Jesus won his victory over temptations: by using the "sword of the Spirit," the Word of God. But there is a right and a wrong way to use a sword. There are two ways of using the Bible as a defense against Satan. One of these ways works, the other does not. It will not do simply to quote the Bible. The Bible is not a sort of magic wand which you just wave in Satan's face and he will go away. Just repeating Bible verses is not enough. The Bible is Scripture which is any good temptation's struggles in Scripture which you have first "hid in your heart," that is to say committed to memory, and what is more important, Scripture which has become part of you. It is not quite enough to say, "God says," Take the next step, "God says—and I believe it." You've got to make God's word your own, not just with the top of your mind but down to the bottom of your heart. So believed, the Word becomes life invincible.

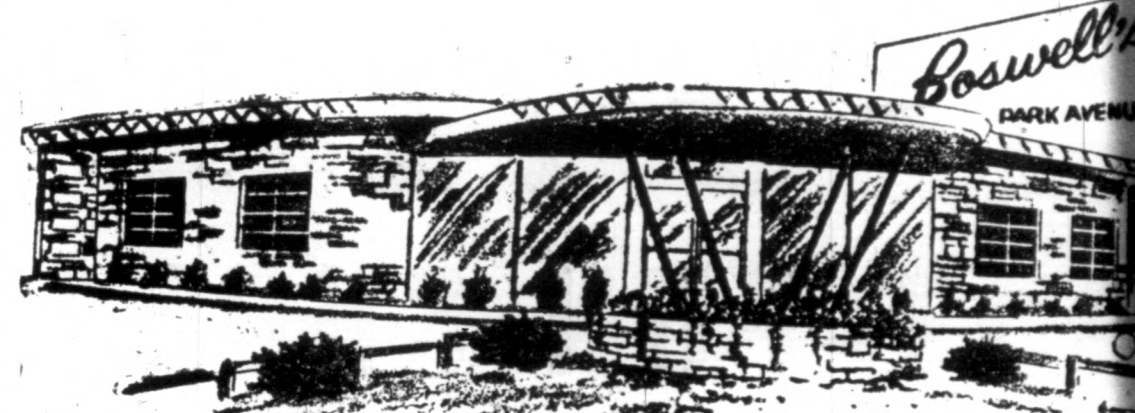

## 4-H Club News

Last year there were over 700 members in Marshall County. I think I would be safe in saying that there will be around 1,000 members this year. To join the 4-H you have to be between the ages of 10 and 21. After you have joined, to be an active member you will be required to take at least one 4-H project.

Some of the projects are sewing, cooking, freezing, foods, housekeeping, home improvement, farm and home, electric, woodworking, tobacco, dairy, beef, strawberries, poultry, sheep, swine, cotton and many others.

For each project there is a record that is to be kept by each 4-H member. Make your plans to join the 4-H and I am sure you will have an enjoyable year.

To have good 4-H Clubs it is necessary that we have 4-H leaders.

The way the 4-H clubs are now set up is that we have one community leader in each club. She or he will meet once a month each time that the club meets. The boys and girls are then broken down into project groups of four or five members. The leader then has a group meeting once a week or once every two weeks. At this time the leader helps members with their project and record books.

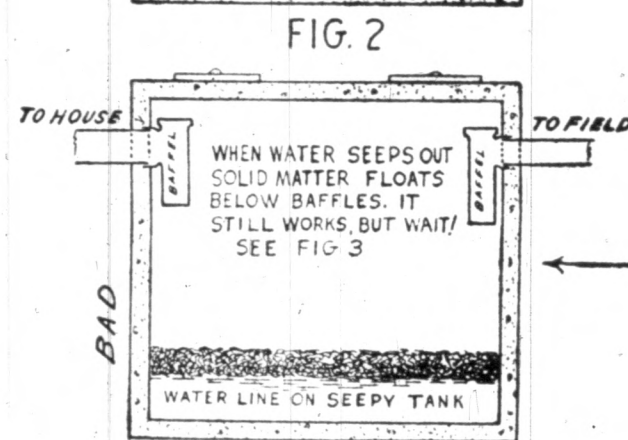

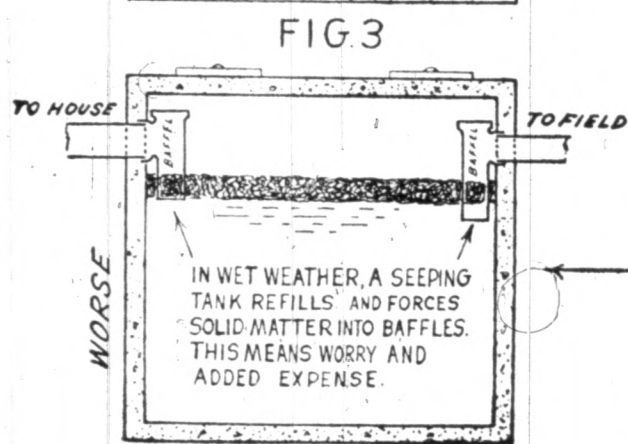
This is the way the inside of a septic tank should look AT ALL TIMES to give perfect service. This tank should give many, many years of service without any attention whatsoever.

REMEMBER THIS — when a tank is giving service NEVER allow it to be opened or pumped out. To do so will only cause harm to the bacteria action so necessary to the proper working of a tank.



A "Seepy" tank like this is what we call a "Dry weather tank". During a drouth it appears to be working and is, but at the same time most of the bacteria is gone and it is building up trouble and expense for the owner when the rains begin and the ground gets full of water.

You may see what happens then by noting figure 3.



Many a septic tank has been pumped out because of this condition. The tank is not full — only the baffles have become clogged by the water pushing a part of the "cake" into the inlet and outlet. Pumping is only a very temporary relief for this condition.

To avoid these worries and unnecessary expense Install A Precast-Reinforced Concrete Septic Tank.

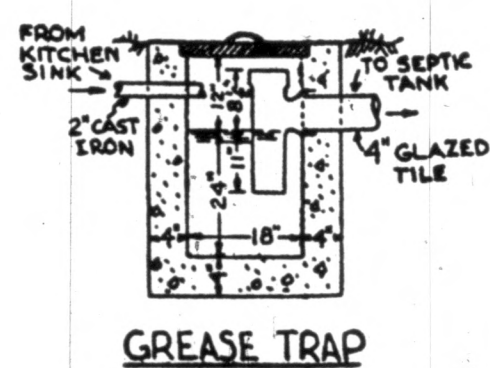

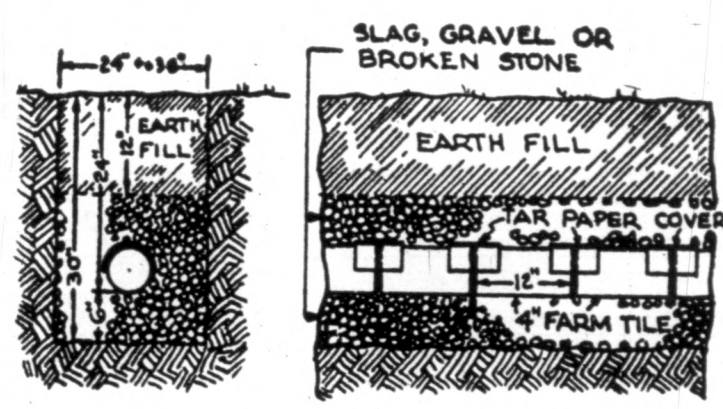

Some states, and many counties in which first, second and third class cities are located PROHIBIT THE USE of septic tanks made of STEEL. "We do not recommend the use of steel septic tanks, nor would we recommend that they be approved by local departments". Another one says in part "The division of health recommends AGAINST THE USE OF STEEL septic tanks, because in most cases they are inadequate in capacity and have a relatively SHORT LIFE". WHY?

Common reasoning will teach us that a steel tank will become effected by the strong bacteria, which is present in a GOOD septic tank at all times, to disintegrate the waste and insure perfect service.

If you have never lived on a farm, ask any farmer who has cleaned out stalls in a stock barn... If any metal object, a knife, pliers or a wrench, which had been lost and buried in manure for a year, was ever fit for further use. Chances are, it was rusted and corroded so bad it was even hard to recognize.

In view of all these facts isn't it reasonable to believe that a septic tank made of precast-reinforced concrete will last and stay "Seep proof" many, many years longer than tanks made of materials that are likely to rust full of holes or CRACK OPEN? In either case just remember — a "seepy tank" is likely to give trouble and cost money to maintain for as long as you attempt to continue to use it.
