Calvert's United Fund Drive is On

Solicitations are underway in Calvert City's United Fund drive and the campaign is expected to reach its \$6,000 goal on schedule.

Official end of the drive has been set for Nov. 6.

The campaign was kicked off last Thursday night at a dinner meeting held at the Gypsy Tea-room in Calvert City. The event was attended by most of Calvert's civic leaders.

Charles Hall, president of the Lions Club, which fathered the United Fund drive in Calvert City, opened the meeting and then turned the gavel over to Myron Pfeiffer, president of the United Fund.

Pfeiffer introduced the fund drive leaders at the Calvert industrial plants and the leaders in turn introduced the solicitor. Pfeiffer also introduced officers of the United Fund and members of the City Council of Calvert City.

United Fund officers are: Pfeiffer, president; Tim Hellala, vice president; Hunter Gaylor, secretary; and J. R. Hoover, treasurer. Directors include Mrs. Sue Draffen, Bob Arnold, Kenneth Capps, Phillip Dettmer, Earl Gray, William Roy Draffen, Rev. H. V. Fletcher, Richard Hampton, Mrs. J. B. Conn, Jack Davis, Sol Williams, Lowell McDaniel, Nelson Cherry, Ed O'Dell, Pfeiffer, Hellala and Gaylor.

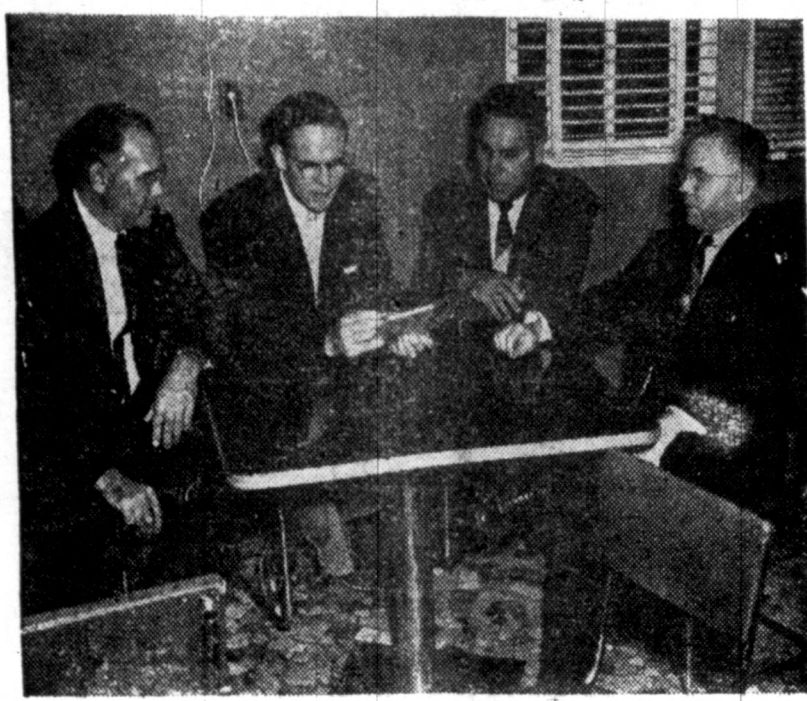
Mrs. Draffen, Arnold, Gaylor, Capps and Dettmer were named to the board of directors to replace retiring directors Luther Draffen, Russell Lund and Draffen Schmidt, who were chosen ex-officio officers.

Representatives of each of the

participating agencies in the United Fund also made brief talks. They are Robert Dukes, Recreation Association; Dr. J. R. Colburn, Welfare Association; H. V. Duckett, American Red Cross; C. M. Rhodes of Mayfield, Kentucky Heart Fund; Al Hughes and Hugh Miller, Boy Scouts; and R. G. Matheson of Paducah, Girl Scouts.

In a goal report, Ed O'Dell said that the following amounts had been earmarked for the various participating agencies:

Red Cross, \$1,550; Boy Scouts, \$1,150; Recreation Association, \$950; Welfare Association, \$900; Girl Scouts, \$850; Heart Fund, \$400. Campaign expenses were placed at \$200.

Fall is Time to Start Conservation Projects

With fall and winter coming, many farmers are looking over their farmland with a view toward installing some conservation measures. Many conservation practices can best be done in fall and winter when the land is not covered with crops. Land and drainage are two of these.

The first steps toward establishing a permanent grass and legume cover or pasture are usually best done in fall or winter months.

Farmers who are contemplating measures would do well to

check to see what are considered the most pressing conservation problems locally. ACP cost-sharing, materials and services are keyed to the county situation and usually the most needed conservation measures those for which ACP assistance is offered.

The agricultural conservation program is one of the programs handled by the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

Jewett Gets 2 Years in Arson Case

Marshall Circuit Court plowed through a heavier-than-usual criminal docket this week and assessed prison terms in almost every case.

Harry F. Jewett, 60-year-old former groceryman, was found guilty Wednesday of arson and the jury placed his punishment at two years in the state penitentiary. Mr. Jewett was charged with setting fire to a Briansburg grocery which he had sold a short time before to Merlin Lamb and Thomas Fleisdon.

As the Courier went to press Thursday morning, Robert Dale Adams, a McCracken County youth, was on trial on a charge of breaking into the Co-op Store in Benton, hauling away the safe and taking approximately \$200.

Elzie Byers, also charged in the safe robbery, will be tried separately from Adams. Among the other criminal cases disposed of were: Henry Hughes Edwards of Dexter pleaded guilty to a charge of voluntary manslaughter and was assessed a two-year prison term. The manslaughter charge resulted from a fatal automobile accident near the Kentucky Lake Drive-In Theatre.

Garland Jenkins pleaded guilty to a charge of grand larceny and was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. He was accused of stealing a hound dog from Ophus Jones.

J. W. Turner pleaded guilty to a charge of check forgery and was assessed two years in prison. Turner is not a Marshall County resident.

Three juveniles, Bob Brockman, Carl Buchanan and Johnny Jackson, were tried on a charge of dwelling house breaking and were sentenced to custody of the Kentucky Youth Authority pending further disposition of their case.

In a civil case, Robert L. Hamm, as administrator of the estate of Freeman Hamm, was awarded \$3,000 judgment in a \$20,000 suit against Clint Bryson. The suit grew out of an automobile accident at the Smithland bridge.

John H. Phelps Dies At Home In Oak Level

John H. Phelps, 78, died at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday at his home in the Oak Level community. He was a well known farmer and was a member of the Oak Level Christian Church.

Funeral services were held this (Thursday) afternoon at the Oak Level church with Revs. Bill Williams and E. A. Byrd and J. R. Doom officiating. Burial, by Filbeck-Cann, was in the Lyles Cemetery.

Mr. Phelps is survived by his wife, Mrs. Cora Phelps; two daughters, Mrs. Buron Smith of Benton Route 2 and Mrs. Howard Wood of Bardwell; four sons, Cletus, Roosevelt, Roy and Willie Phelps of Route 2; one sister, Mrs. Lulu Delaney of Crab Orchard, Ky.; nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

L. J. Lovett Dies At Home Of Son on Rt. 5

Lee Johnson Lovett, 88, died at 10 a. m. Monday. He had been in poor health for some time and seriously ill for two weeks. He died at the home of his son, Elvis Lovett, Benton Route 5.

Funeral services were conducted by the Revs. J. N. Henson and Fred Alexander Wednesday afternoon at the Maple Springs Methodist Church. Burial, by the Linn Funeral Home, was in the church cemetery.

Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Grace Sirls and Mrs. Mollie McNeely of this county, and a sister, Mrs. Sonoma Bean of Paragould, Ark. Herman Lovett of Benton is a grandson.

Jailer is Slugged; 2 Men Flee But Are Soon Caught

Two prisoners escaped from the Marshall County jail, in the basement of the courthouse, early Sunday morning after one of the men had slugged Jailer H. Edwards with a stick of wood.

The attack on the jailer took place as he was delivering breakfast to the prisoners.

Fleeing the jail were James Franklin, an itinerant magazine salesman, and Billy Mark Borer, alias Tommy Graham. Franklin slugged Edwards on the head with the stick which supposedly was a piece of old jail furniture, and then Franklin and Borer dashed from the cell. Jailer Edwards, who was NOT knocked out by the blow, ran after the men. They quickly darted out of sight and then the jailer sounded the emergency alarm on the town fire whistle.

Sheriff Billy Watkins, Deputy Buck Brien, city police, members of the Rescue Squad and the Rescue Squad Auxiliary answered the alarm and began a thorough search of the town for the escapees.

The two men were found at 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning hiding in an abandoned smokehouse at the old Sam Creason home in East Benton. They were found by Sheriff Watkins, Deputy Brien and Joe Faughn.

Mrs. Wilma Creason provided the tip that led to capture of the men. She urged the officers to search the smokehouse, believing that the men might have hidden there because the old Creason place is not occupied. The men had fled the jail toward the east, so the search was concentrated in East Benton.

Franklin pleaded guilty Monday in Marshall Circuit Court to altering a check and was assessed a four-year term in the state penitentiary at Eddyville. He was taken to Eddyville Tuesday. He was in jail on the check charge when he escaped.

The other prisoner, Borer, had been jailed on a charge of driving a car without license. He gave his name as Tommy Graham when arrested. Authorities learned later, however, the car had been stolen in Texas from a Tommy Graham, a man with a police record.

Authorities also learned that Billy Mark Borer had escaped from Indiana State Penitentiary. Officers here said no probably will be released to Indiana authorities and returned to prison there.

Jailer Edwards suffered a head wound that required four stitches.

Love Feast Is Held by Democrats

Democrats of Marshall County held a love feast last Friday night at the courthouse in Benton.

Approximately 100 Democrats from all sections of the county were at the meeting.

Billy Watkins, county campaign chairman, presided at the meeting and made a brief speech in which he said he believed Western Kentucky and Marshall County had their greatest opportunity to advance under a Chandler-Waterfield administration.

Watkins also predicted that if Chandler is elected Waterfield will win the governorship four years from now, which would give Western Kentucky eight years of favorable administration.

Mayor H. V. Duckett of Calvert City, in a brief talk, said that a victory on Nov. 8 cannot be obtained without plenty of hard work and suggested that all Democrats urge their friends and neighbors to "get out the vote."

E. T. Inman said he had been a farmer all his life but that, under Republican rule in Washington, it was becoming more difficult each year to make a living. And if Kentucky elects a Republican governor, he said, there is "no telling what will happen."

Leonard Jones, former county judge, said he owed a great deal to the Democratic Party and that he intended to back the Chandler ticket completely. He said Democrats should forget their differences of the recent primary and unite for the general welfare and progress of Kentucky.

Others who made impromptu talks were Representative Shelby McCallum, Attorney Elwood Gordon, Attorney Earl Osborne, Dewey Jackson and Toad Brien.

The meeting was entirely informal, with no planned program or speeches. The chairman merely asked for party members to express any opinions they might have regarding the coming election.

3 Ordinances Passed By Calvert City Council

The City Council of Calvert City had a busy session at its regular meeting on Monday night. Quite a few visitors were present as Mayor Duckett and the entire council worked their way through the agenda. Three ordinances were passed and an important committee on street improvement was appointed.

One ordinance adopted sets the fee for the Police Judge in criminal cases tried in the City Police Court. The fee will be five dollars when the ordinance becomes effective. Leonard Hill is the present police judge.

To promote traffic safety within the city, an ordinance was adopted to set speed limits on all streets within the city limits. Maximum allowable speed on Route 95 or Main Street will be 35 miles per hour. The maximum speed in all other roads and streets will be 25 miles per hour. The ordinance provides that signs be set up informing motorists of the new regulations.

A third ordinance provides for the issuance of city auto license tax stickers for a minimum period of six months. The original ordinance had no provision for partial payment of the tax.

Improvement of the city streets was the subject of considerable discussion. The Council set up a committee to further study the problems as to type of improvement and means of financing the work. The five member committee will consist of one councilman, one member of the Planning and Zoning Commission, and three resident property owners. It is expected that Mayor Duckett will announce the appointments in the very near future.

The next regular City Council meeting will be held on the third Monday in November.

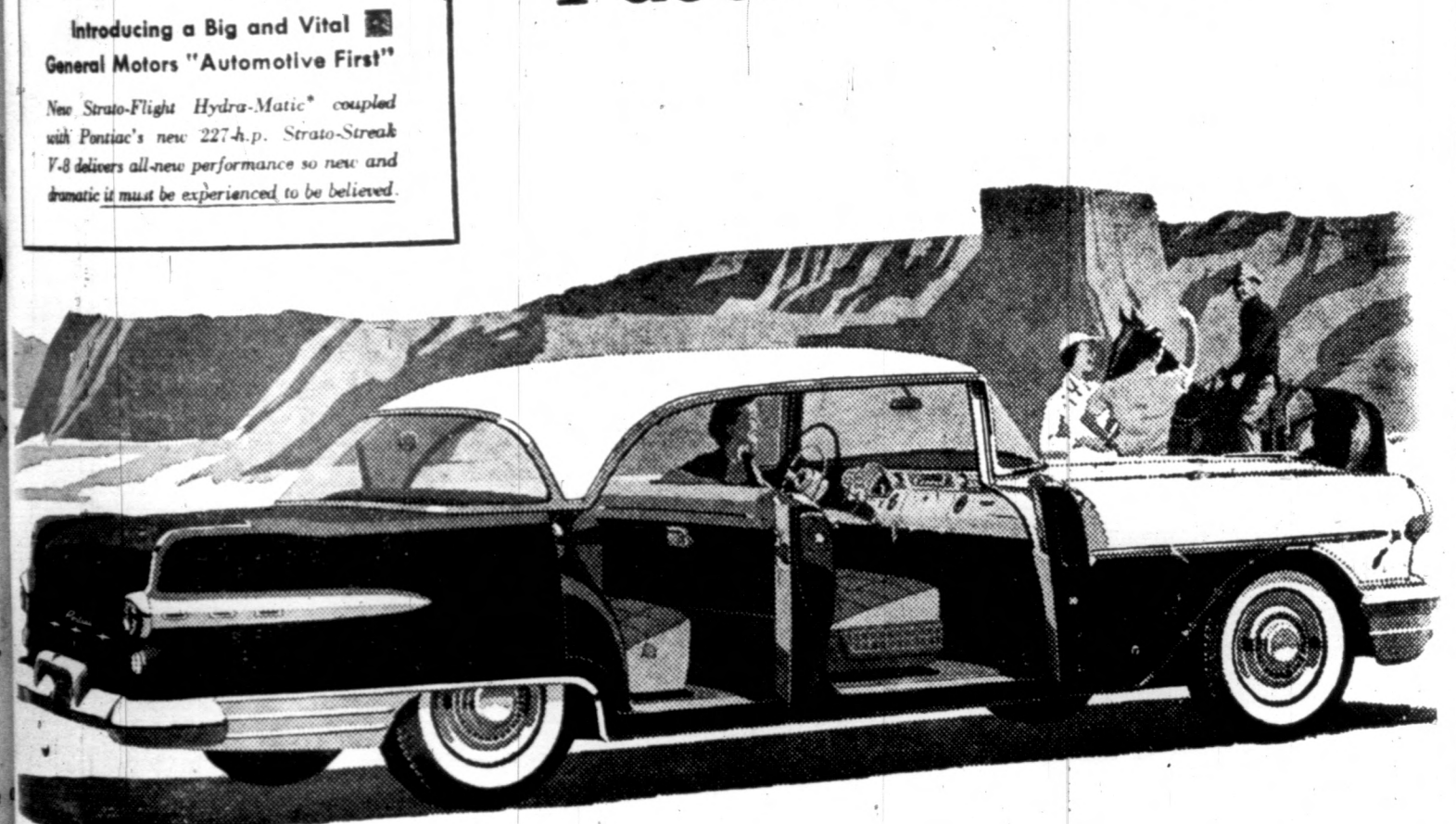

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Self-Portrait

Lesson for October 30, 1955

THERE are people who don't care how they look to other people; they have no particular long-range plans or pattern of life, they live (as they might say) by ear. We call such persons extroverts; they never stop, so to speak, long enough to look into a mirror. There is an opposite kind of person who is painfully interested in himself. He is forever looking into a mirror, as it were. He makes the most careful and detailed plans and is quite upset when a detail goes wrong. We call such persons introverts. In between these types is a more balanced sort of person. If one could "type" Jesus of Nazareth he would be the balanced sort, by all means. He was self-conscious enough to know and care what he was doing, but not in the least self-centered.

Action Portrait
Jesus once had the opportunity, which to some young people is a rather frightening thrill, of speaking to a crowded audience in his own home town. He knew what was in nearly everybody's mind: "Give an account of yourself. Who do you think you are and what do you think you are doing?" To them he was just a home-town boy, but they had heard of strange things he had said and done, and they wanted to hear him talk. So he had the opportunity on a Sabbath Day of speaking in the synagogue. As he read the Scripture for the day, from Isaiah 61, Jesus stopped in the middle of a sentence, and sitting down (as teachers did in those days) he said, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled." In other words, as Americans would put it, "This is my plan of life. This prophecy, hundreds of years old, describes what I am and what I am doing. In short Jesus took this prophecy to himself, as a self-portrait. It is more like a motion picture than a still picture; it expresses what he was, in terms of what he did.

For Others
That, by the way, is typical of the Bible way of describing people. Adjectives like "good," "merciful," "truthful," always have verbs behind them. Adjectives describe actions. A man does not have one kind of character and another kind of action. His actions are his character—not his external actions alone, but together with the motives and intentions which are a true part of every act. Now Jesus describes himself and his plan for life not only in terms of action, but of action in relation to other persons. John Wesley says somewhere that when Christianity ceases to be Social it is not any longer Christian. The idea that any one can become a higher type of Christian by retiring permanently from the world, devoted exclusively to prayer and contemplation, is a notion not derived from Jesus. For him, the meaning of life is in contact with other persons. But note the sort of person Jesus mentions: the poor, the captives, the blind, the bruised... the very people so many of us avoid. Most people jump at the chance to get their pictures taken with famous people. Jesus' self-portrait was a picture of him with obscure people, people in trouble. What would happen in a community if every church member became more interested in doing something for people than in "doing" people?

For All Others
What really enraged those Pharisees of Nazareth was not that Jesus was dedicated to helping others. That was fine, they were all in favor of it. The thing that raised them to murder-heat was that he drew up lines. He was far helping one and all, yes even Gentiles. What Jews of that day thought of Gentiles is expressed in a passage from a popular book written about the same time as the New Testament: "For he makes you (God) made this new-born world. But as for the rest of the nations which are sprung from Adam, you have said they are nothing and are like spittle." (II Esdras 6:56) So when Jesus made it clear that he (like Elijah and Elisha before him) would draw no race or national lines, that he intended to carry God's love to the least and least of men, these rare-journd Nazarenes threatened to lynch him.
