## Two are Indicted For Burglary of Hardin Postoffice

The Marshall Circuit Court grand jury adjourned late Tuesday after returning indictments against eight persons.

Two young men of Graves County, Herbert Lee Sanderson and Jimmy Frizzell, were indicted on a charge of breaking into the U. S. Postoffice at Hardin

and taking \$347.68 from the safe. The suspects are being held in jails outside of Marshall County.

Billy Mart Barger was indicted on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. He is charged with beating H. Edwards, county jailer, and fleeing from the jail.

Barger was captured, soon after his escape, on the old Sam Creason place here in Benton.

Earl Hollowell and James L. Bostick were indicted on a charge of grand larceny. They are accused of taking a TV set from D. A. Harper.

Hurley Fleet was indicted on a charge of grand larceny. He is accused of taking 300 to 400 bales of hay from the farm of John O'Daniel.

Jay Smith was indicted on a charge of failing to comply with a court order to support his children.

Dan Bloodworth was indicted on a charge of failing to support his children.

The grand jury also investigated the recent death by gunshot of Mrs. Lalah Puckett, which occurred on or about the 6th day of January, 1956. After such investigation into these indictments, we find nothing to indicate that any criminal agency was involved in the death of this person.

The grand jury also inspected the courthouse and reported that it is being "maintained in an exceptionally fine manner" but recommended that Fiscal Court provide funds for painting the inside walls of the county jail.

The jury visited the County Farm and reported that it also is being maintained in a "highly satisfactory manner" and commended the caretakers, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Griggs.

## Last Rites Held for John Hall

John D. Hall, a native of Oak Level and a widely known Marshall Countyman, died at 8 a.m. Sunday at the age of 78 years. He had been in failing health for several years.

Mr. Hall served as county clerk for two terms from 1910 to 1918 and served as county judge one term from 1938 to 1942. During World War I he served on the county draft board.

He was a member of the First Missionary Baptist Church and was one of the church's oldest deacons. He also had served as Sunday School superintendent. He was a long time member of the Benton Masonic lodge and was once a member of the Young Men's Progress Club.

Mr. Hall also was connected for about 15 years with the Aetna Insurance Company's office at Jackson Tenn.

Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at the Filbeck-Cann Chapel, with the Rev. J. Frank Young officiating. Burial was in the Birmingham Cemetery. Pallbearers were Dan Castleberry, Scott Elley, H. C. Wood, J. D. Peterson, Arthur Darnell and John Sledge.

Honorary bearers were Will Kuyendall, Java Gregory, Arch Nelson, Headley Heath, R. E. Bailey, C. B. Cox and Walter Prince.

Mr. Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lillie Hall; two sons, Ralph Hall of Paducah and Eddie Hall of Jackson, Miss.; two sisters, Mrs. Gorda Hastings and Mrs. Bethel Dycus, both of Benton; and one brother, Street Hall of Bowling Green.

## Council Favors Changing City to 4th Class Rating

Benton City Council in session Tuesday night, passed a resolution favoring the change from a fifth class to a fourth class city.

The resolution called upon the local state representative and state senator to introduce legislation in the General Assembly.

The Council voted unanimously in favor of seeking the change. Two members of the Council — Bob Rider and W. C. Hutchens — were absent from the meeting, however. Rider was in Louisville attending a convention of lumbermen and Hutchens was in Murray Hospital recovering from a hernia operation.

Major objection to Benton becoming a fourth class city has been on the liquor problem. Any precinct in a fourth class city may, on proper petitioning, conduct a precinct vote on the wet and dry issue. Fifth class cities do not have this right.

However, it has been pointed out that many fourth class cities remain dry and there is little likelihood of any precinct in Benton voting wet.

Although the special Council meeting had plenty of advance publicity, only two citizens aside from the officials attended the important meeting. They were two men who came to the Council session after the Lions Club meeting had adjourned.

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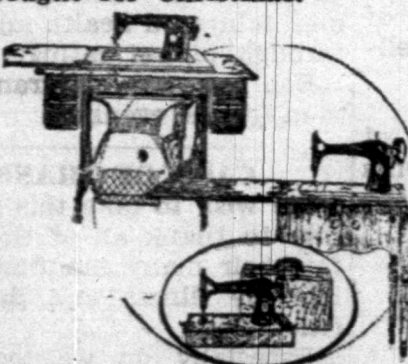

## Telephone Almanac Features Atlantic Cable System

The telephone almanac for 1956 which is now being distributed by Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company features the transatlantic telephone cable system which consists of two undersea cables between Newfoundland and Scotland. It tells why two cables are necessary and how during a transatlantic call a voice may travel over one cable in one direction and the answering voice may travel through a cable 20 miles away. The voices are put automatically together at each end of the circuit.

The front cover features the laying of the cable and the route it will follow.

Other articles in the almanac tell of how the telephone helped in restoring the spire of the Old North Church that was blown down by the hurricane last year. It tells of how the transistor invented by the Bell Laboratories is being developed by the electronic industries. It points out that the solar battery, another Bell invention began supplying electricity for telephone use last October.

The almanac has an article about Nike, this country's weapon for defense against enemy airplanes which was developed by Western Electric and Bell Telephone Laboratories at the request of our Government.

The almanac also contains information about the movement of the sun and moon; comments on historical events and weather previews for 1956.

## Eye Testing Equipment Is Ready for Students

The Kiwanis Club has pur-  
chased a visual-skills telebin-  
ocular for the school children of  
Benton and Marshall County.  
The purpose of this visual  
screening instrument is to tell  
the teacher whether or not a  
child has a visual problem which  
may hinder the student in his  
school work. The teacher may  
then notify the parents that  
the child has faulty vision from  
some cause or another.

Then it is up to the parents  
to see that the child gets pro-  
per visual care. If, perhaps the  
parents cannot afford visual  
care for their children the Ki-  
wanis Club of Benton will see  
to it that they are taken care of.

It might be pointed out that  
Marshall county is the only  
county in West Kentucky,  
which has started this specific  
type of survey, although Graves  
county is seriously considering  
it.

This program is sponsored by  
the Kentucky Optometric asso-  
ciation. The KOA will supervise  
the instruction of the teachers  
in the taking of the Visual  
Skills. Instructors appointed by  
the KOA for West Kentucky are  
Dr. Robert E. Sawyer of Clinton  
(with the exception of Hickman

County, and Dr. Pat Warren of  
Benton (with the exception of  
Marshall County). Any member  
of the KOA may be contacted  
for further information in re-  
gard to setting up a program  
similar to the one being started  
in Marshall county and Benton.

All teachers in the Marshall  
County area are urged to attend  
the class in instruction of the  
taking of the visual skills which  
will be held Wednesday at 7:30  
p. m. in the Community build-  
ing on Jan. 18. The Kiwanis  
Club has reserved the building  
for that evening.

At least two teachers from the  
individual high schools and two  
teachers from each grade  
school should attend if it is im-  
possible for all to attend.

The Kiwanis has also purchas-  
ed record forms which will fol-  
low the student all through his  
schooling. In keeping records of  
each child's visual abilities, pro-  
blems of a visual nature may  
be remedied before real visual  
problems occur.
