Deadline for submitting of bids on the new school structure was set for 10 a. m. of March 5. The new high school will be similar to the North Marshall High School, which went into operation September 1955. The South Marshall High School will consolidate Hardin and Brewster High Schools. The Hardin and Brewster buildings will be used for the grade schools. The new high school will be located on a 22-acre tract of land just off Highway 641 between Benton and Hardin near the Marshall County Drive-In Theatre owned by Jack Wright. The new high school building is expected to be ready for the opening of the fall term of high school next September.

## Former Countess Now is Marshall County Citizen

Though they live in the Lack house at Sledd Creek, Gilbertsville, Calvert City claims the existence of Dr. and Mrs. Hans Beller inasmuch as Dr. Beller is the plant manager of General Aniline and Film Company and Mrs. Beller has made many warm friends among the Calvert City people. Being a newcomer to the area, Mrs. Beller, the former Countess Hortensia Zalpar Caspar von der Trabe of Buenos Aires, is eagerly looking forward to her stay in the Bluegrass State of Kentucky. The countess was married to Dr. Beller in January 1951 in Mexico. Immediately after their wedding, they moved to New Jersey, making their home in Cranford. Dr. Beller then was area manager at the General Aniline and Film Corporation in Linden, New Jersey. Mrs. Beller came to this country in 1941 to make it her home after spending many years in Europe. In her attractive Spanish accent, she says, "Americans are not grateful for all they have. A person must suffer a little to appreciate what is good. It is like gardening -- you spoil your hands and break your fingernails -- but when you finish, the garden's lovely and you are happy." "A person like myself, a relative stranger from another country, can see how wonderful America is. I waited two years before I applied for my citizenship -- I wanted to be sure -- but now I know I do not wish to live in any other country." She recalls her days in Argentina where women, as ladies, were expected to do nothing, but rejoice at being in America where women can cook, dig in their gardens and be active in business and civic programs. The Latin American, educated in Universities in Germany and Switzerland, has traveled widely throughout the continent and lived for many years at her mother's estate in Nice, France. "As I traveled," she said, "and met interesting people, I felt I had to write my adventures and so I sent articles to magazines in South America. When I arrived in America, I had interviews with Mary Sullivan, who was a policewoman in New York; Desi Arnez, Lucille Ball and others. This was wonderful because in Argentina, I could never work like that," she said. The tall Latin, brown-eyed and dark with her hair pulled tightly back and away from her attractive face has enjoyed many activities other than her writing. While living at "Wild Acres" her 44-acre estate in Boonton, New Jersey, she worked for six years with the American Red Cross, acting as motor corps chairman and head of volunteer services for the Morris County Chapter. One of her happiest moments was in 1949 when she planned, produced and directed a series of sketches showing the chapters activities during the year. Mrs. Beller has accumulated an English vocabulary spiced with American slang. She and her husband sometimes speak in German, and on occasions a string of Spanish words flow out it happens without her conscious knowledge. The South American countess met Dr. Beller in 1945. A native of Germany, Dr. Beller came to this country in 1931 and spent eight years with petroleum refineries in Louisiana. He has been employed for 15 years by General Aniline and Film, and prior to that was consulting chemist in New York City. Dr. Beller is a member of the Chemists' Club of New York, the American Chemical Society, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Armed Forces Chemical Association, the American Ordinance Association, and was recently made a Kentucky Colonel.

## New Calvert Dial System Completed

The familiar "number please" will be a thing of the past in Calvert City on Friday, Feb. 24 at 10 p. m. At that time the telephone system in Calvert City will be converted to dial operation. At the same time the last step in a plan to tie the communities of Benton, Gilbertsville and Calvert City together in a toll-free network will be taken. The dial conversion climaxed a major improvement and expansion program in Calvert City according to William Thompson, general manager of the Calvert City Telephone System. "Originally scheduled for the last of December, the cut-over was delayed by the lack of telephone cable, but now all is in readiness," Mr. Thompson said. The Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company is co-operating with the Calvert City Telephone System in exchanging calls between Calvert City and Benton and Gilbertsville without any long distance charges. All the new numbers in Calvert City will begin with the prefix of Express which is in accordance with the nationwide numbering plan. This plan has as its ultimate goal the dialing of long distance calls by the customer without the assistance of any operator. Under the new extended area service arrangement, it will only be necessary for a customer in any of the three cities mentioned, to dial the number as shown in the directory to reach anyone desired. A new directory is being issued in Calvert City and the Calvert City listings also are included in the current Benton directory. The new dial system will be inaugurated with approximately 1,075 telephones in operation, which is a considerable increase over the old manual system. Both Mr. Thompson and B. F. Harwood, district manager for Southern Bell, said that the inauguration of the extended area service between Benton, Gilbertsville and Calvert City will add to the over-all prosperity of this region.

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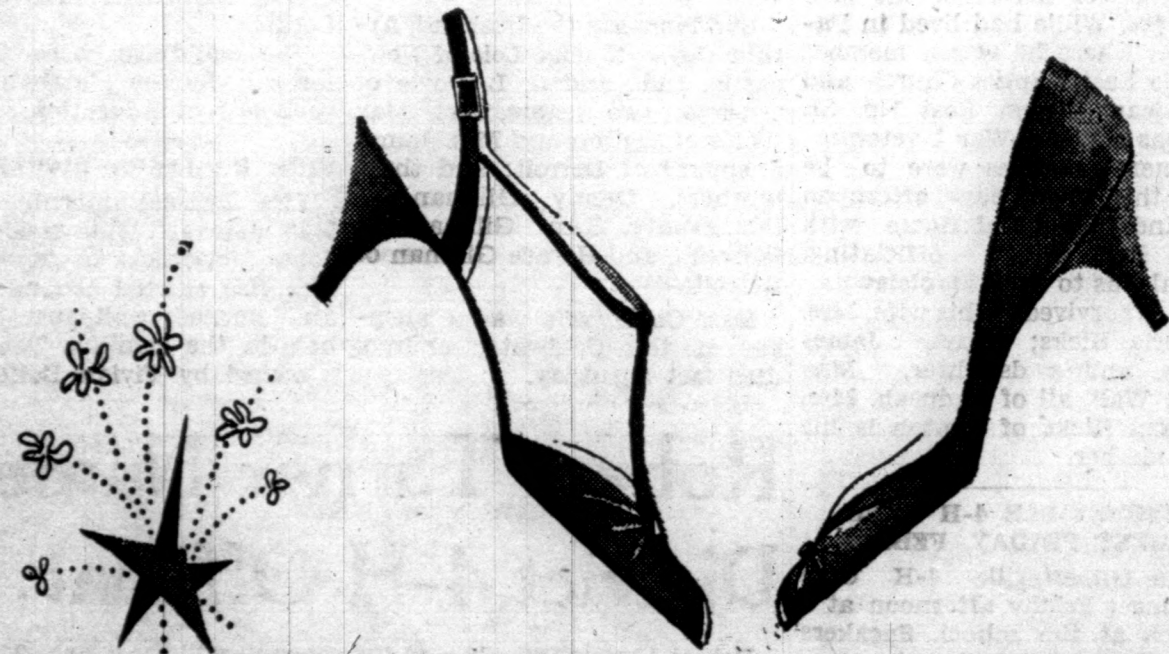

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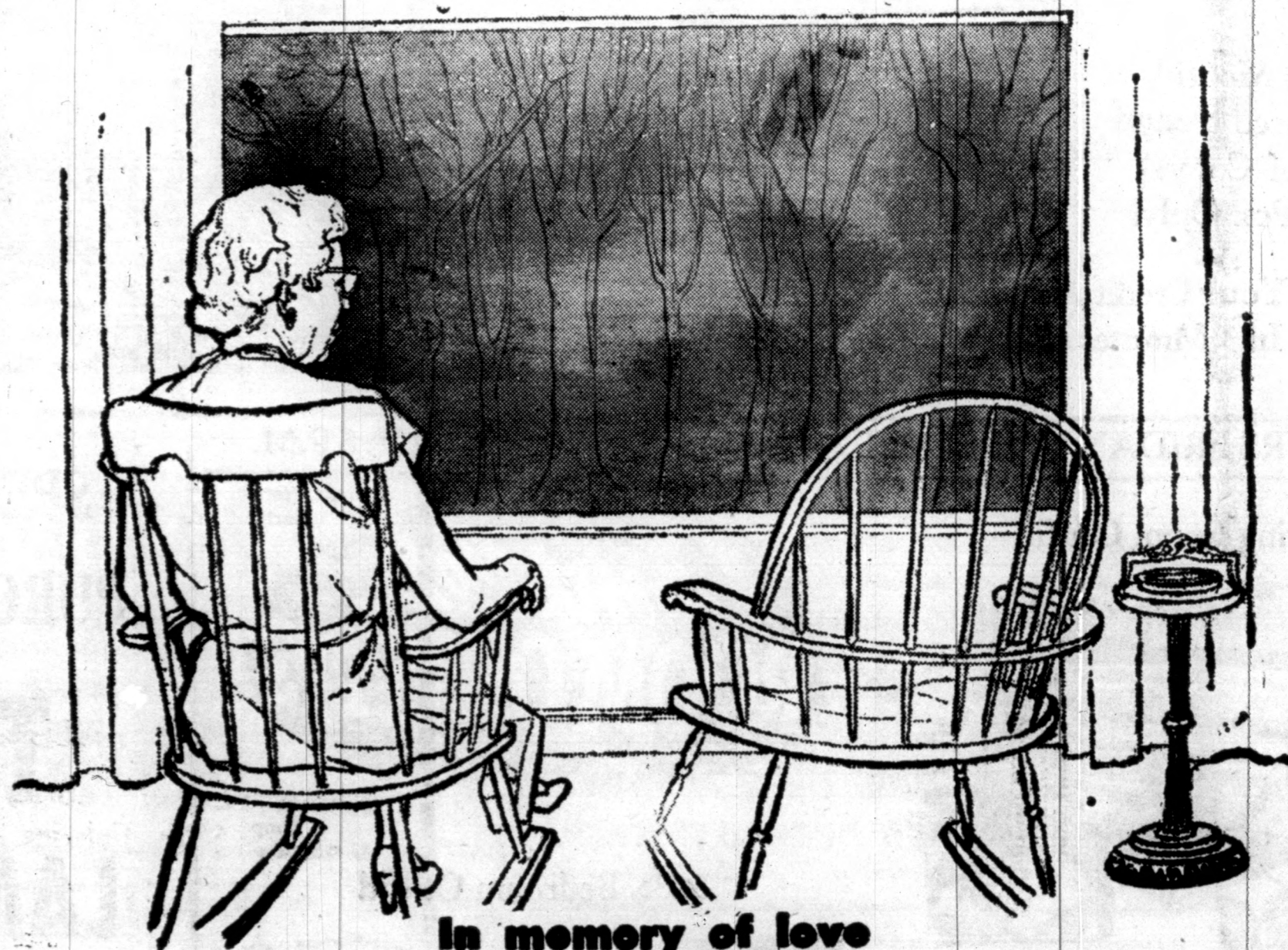

## Elwood Gordon Will Make Congress Race

Attorney Elwood Gordon last week became the first avowed candidate for representative in Congress from the First Congressional District.

The 44-year-old lawyer blasted the incumbent Congressman, Noble H. Gregory of Mayfield, in announcing his candidacy.

"The time has come when the people who pay the bills and do the suffering and do the work should have some representation in Congress," said Gordon. He called Gregory a "representative of the millionaires."



Gregory himself has not yet announced whether he will be a candidate for re-election this year, but most political observers are assuming that he will.

There have been several other men mentioned as possible candidates for his House seat. Emerson (Doc) Beauchamp, lieutenant governor under Lawrence Wetherby in the term that ended last year, has said that he hasn't made up his mind whether to run or not.

Beauchamp's county, Logan, would be shifted into the First District under the redistricting bill now pending in the legislature.

State Senator Wayne Freeman of Mayfield and Commonwealth's Attorney Roy Vance of Paducah have also been mentioned as possible candidates.

This is the second time for Gordon to challenge Gregory in the House race. He ran against him in 1948, losing by 5,000 votes, including a 4,000-vote margin in Graves County.

Born near Aurora, Gordon attended Aurora High School, then worked his way through Murray

State College, taking a B. S. degree.

He was elected county clerk of Marshall County at the age of 21 and served two four-year terms.

Afterward he became a purchasing agent for the old Kentucky Ordnance Works and farmed in Ballard County for about a year. He became a pipefitter, working at KOW and later in Louisville.

In Louisville he went to the University of Louisville in the day time and the Jefferson School of Law at night. He was admitted to the Kentucky and federal bars in 1946 and went to Benton to open a law office.

## Old Silver Dollars Stolen From Home Of Charles Nimmo

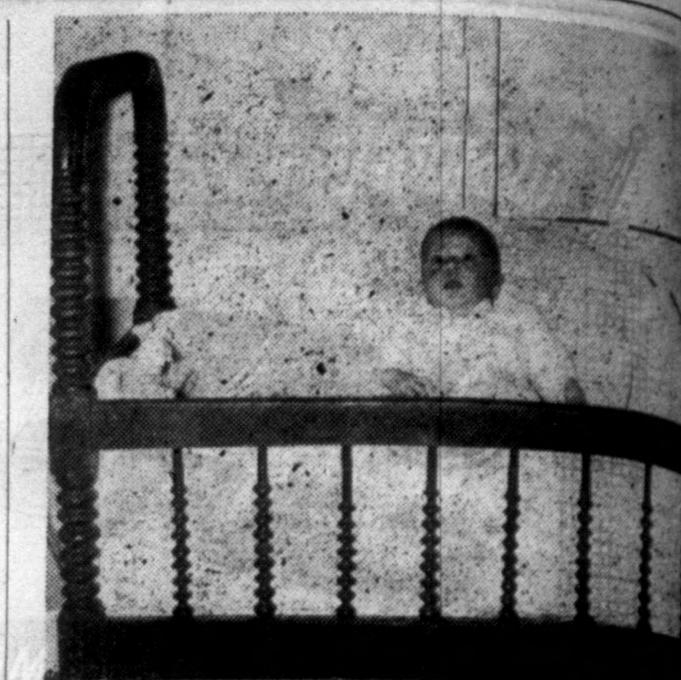
Thieves broke into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Nimmo, who live near Briensburg, and stole 29 silver dollars and one dollar in change.

## HERES HOW... SEAL WOOD SURFACES

For a fine finishing job, wood must be properly sanded, the surface filled and sealed, and then resurfaced before the final finish is applied.

On some woods, especially those with coarse grain, the surface is filled with a brush, causing light and dark spots. Uneven surfaces are accentuated when the finish is applied. It is usually necessary, therefore, to treat the wood surface.

Wood fillers speed up the finishing job and help produce a more beautiful finish. Liquid sealers are used for fine-grained woods. The sealer is applied with a brush, in the direction of the grain. When the liquid sealer has dried, it should be sanded with 5-0 garnet paper or 000 steel wool.

Fast fillers are used for coarse-grained woods. The filler is applied with a brush, across the grain. Excess filler is removed by rubbing across the grain with burlap. Then the piece is rubbed in the direction of the grain. When the filler has set, it should be sanded, with the grain, with 5-0 garnet paper or 000 steel wool.

Then the article should be cleaned before the varnish is applied. Rub with a cloth dampened in benzene or similar cleaner. For cleaning joints, moldings, corners, etc., use a piece of "steel" or a sharpened dowel wrapped in a cloth dampened with cleaning fluid. Shellac is commonly used as a filler. Usually two thin coats are applied. Sand the piece after the first coat has dried to remove the shellac from the wood surface. Use white shellac for light colored woods or finishes, and orange shellac for the dark ones.

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Background Scripture: Luke 18:18-20  
Devotional Reading: Joshua 24:14-20

### Man Can Choose

Lesson for February 19, 1956

THE difference between man and the other animals is not in one thing but in many things. But one of the most important facts about man is his power of choice. Some little creatures of the sea just sit in one place their life long. Others drift with the tides. Higher animals like dogs and horses make some choices; but only man makes, or can make, the enormous number of decisions that every man makes, and only man can make choices that have the far-ranging results that human choices sometimes have. A dog does not decide what time he will get up; but man sets an alarm clock. A dog does not select his breakfast; man does (or would like to). A human being decides what to wear, where to work, whom to marry, whether to have children, whether to be a good citizen or no citizen at all. He selects a school or college, he selects his friends, he picks out a lot in the cemetery, he makes a will. Man is the choosing animal. And he is this because he is more than body. He is mind and soul.

**When Choices Are Important**  
Everybody knows that some choices are more important than others. At least everybody should know this; but for some reason, people will put more thought into trifling decisions than they do into big ones. People need to learn what is important and what is not. A woman who had had a nervous breakdown told the writer that it all started when she couldn't make up her mind which of two hats to buy. One was only one dollar more than the other, and she could afford the dollar. But she actually lay awake all night worrying about whether she had a moral right to spend that extra dollar when there were so many people in the world. So she worried herself right into a sanitarium because she built up a terrible decision into a terrible problem. What makes a choice important? Surely a choice that lasts a long time is more important than one that makes a difference only a few hours or days. A choice that affects one's whole life is more important than one that affects only one part of it. A choice that lasts beyond this life into the next, a choice for eternity, is surely the most important of all.

**Choosing Christ**  
Becoming a Christian can be described in various ways: one of the most meaningful is "choosing Christ." Jesus himself used to say "Believe in me" or "Follow me," which mean much the same thing. Choosing, or believing in Christ, is much more than just adding certain beliefs to whatever else you happen to believe. It is more than adding one more person to a list of persons you already admire. Choosing Christ is a far more profound thing. Real choice of Christ involves a turning-about of the whole personality. The captain of a ship headed north does not merely believe that North exists; he heads the ship that way, he keeps it moving toward the north star. So a person who chooses Christ does not simply believe that he exists, or that he is "born of God." He turns the helm of his life toward him, he keeps moving in the direction of Christ the "Morning Star." If that rich young man whom Jesus loved had followed instead of turning away, who knows what a changed man he would have been? We do know that the dishonest graffer Zacchaeus, a man of whom his neighbors could have expected little good, once he let Jesus into his life, was a radically different man.

**Life and Eternity**  
Choice for Christ is a choice for a lifetime; so is choice against him. It is not a choice you make once and that's an end of it. It is a choice that has to be made again and again day by day. Every day brings you some moment of decision, where the way you decide affects all your other decisions. Now you are his, and all your life's course is steered by his star. More than this: decision for Christ is a choice for Eternity. You enter the life beyond as his friend, or not his friend. He is the Light of the world. To turn from him is to choose the dark. "There are only two roads through life: with him, or without him. There are only two ends of life: with him, in the light, or without him, in the dark. The light is his gift; but the choice is your own."

## County Soil Notes

By HERBERT ANDERSON  
U. S. Soil Conservation Service  
Dannie Edwards, near Benton on the Dogtown road plans to relocate and dig a new stream channel this year for a creek which goes through his farm. The new channel will be straight and will move the water through his land faster than the old crooked creek did.

Edwards also plans to clear the bushes from ten acres, of idle land. A seedbed will then be prepared and a grass legume mixture sown for pasture.

He will receive financial help on both projects through the Agricultural Conservation Program and technical help on the drainage ditch from the Soil Conservation Service.

Joe Faughn has planned a one acre wildlife area on his farm south of Benton. He will plant a plot of Japonica lespedeza, one of milo, and one of sorghum. Quail eat the seed from these plants.

All seed will be furnished free by the Kentucky Division of Fish and Wildlife Resources. All farmers are eligible to receive this planting material. Place

your order with your conservation officer, or come into the SCS office in Benton.

Supervisors of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District have mailed 100 copies of their 1950 annual report to local agencies, organizations, and business people. A few copies are left. If you want one, see one of the five supervisors or contact the office in Benton.

George Little, Perry Greenfield, Noble Marshall, Arlie Ham, Cecil Dunnigan, Rex Anderson, Joe Greenfield, O. L. Chumblen, Joe Faughn, Roy Gregory, C. C. Minter, Hoy Thompson, Claude Foust and Norman Pace have asked for help in constructing or deepening wells for livestock water.
