Bruce Morgan, 69, died at 1:10 a. m. Tuesday at his home in Benton. He had been in failing health for several years. He had operated a shoe shop in Benton most of his adult life until he retired about three years ago. He was a native of Benton, a veteran of World War I, a member of the American Legion and of the First Christian Church.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday at the Filbeck-Cann Chapel, with the Rev. Sam East officiating. Burial was in the Benton Cemetery. Pallbearers were C. C. Mr. Morgan is survived by his wife, Mrs. Cordie Morgan; two sons, Bill and Howard Morgan, all of Benton; two brothers, Jim Morgan of Benton and Will Morgan of Roswell, N. M.; and two grandchildren.

## North Marshall Wins Soil Judging Contest

The North Marshall High School team won the Marshall County land judging contest last Tuesday.

Ronald Ford, Jerry R. East and Johnny Dunnigan were the members of the winning team. Their combined score was 387. The boys are members of the North Marshall Future Farmers of America Chapter. Gordon Chester is their Vocational Agriculture Teacher.

Competing in the contest were three member teams from the FFA Chapters at Benton, Brewers and Hardin. The event was held on the Homer Chester farm at Brewers.

Ronald Nelson, a member of the Benton team, made the highest individual score in the contest with a tally of 149. Morgan Hill is his vocational agriculture teacher. The Benton team placed third in the contest. Other members of the Benton team were Robert Powell and Eddie Sirls.

Brewers had the second highest scoring team. Howard Dunnigan is the teacher. Members of the Brewers team were Dwane Harris, Harold Wilkins and Bobby Riley.

## Action on City Gas is Promised

The Benton City Council, in special session Monday night at City Hall, listened to a report on progress made toward installation of a natural gas system here.

The report was made by David Brodie, Owensboro attorney, representing J. L. Moseby, Owensboro contractor, who holds the franchise for installing the gas system, and Bill Turner, engineer, representing Albert Switzer & Associates of Jackson, Miss., engineering firm that will install the system.

The two men reported that a necessity of convenience hearing will be held before the Kentucky Public Service Commission on May 1 in an effort to prove that Benton is entitled to an allotment of natural gas. The suppliers of natural gas have said that no gas is available at this time for Benton, the Council was told.

Mr. Brodie will attend the Frankfort hearing and will report results immediately to Benton officials. If the Public Service Commission's decision is favorable, then application will be made immediately to the Federal Power Commission in Washington for an allotment of natural gas for Benton.

There is no way of knowing how long it will take the FPC to process the Benton application, the Council was told, but the period usually varies from a few months to a year.

The two men promised city officials they would do everything in their power to obtain a victory before the Kentucky Public Service Commission and also the Federal Power Commission.

They promised that construction work will start immediately that the FPC has granted an allotment of gas. If they fail to obtain a gas allotment, they will bow out of the picture and Benton officials sell a new franchise.

The City Council had called on the holders of the franchise to make a report in person as to progress on the gas system. The Council was prepared to cancel the franchise and issue a new one if the report had been unfavorable. The report was considered favorable, however, and the Council decided to go along with the franchise holders in their effort to obtain an allotment of gas.

The franchise holders admitted they had been negligent in reporting action taken toward installing a gas system and promised to keep the Council fully informed of all future actions.

## Drive Leaders For Clements, Bates Named

Managers have been named in Marshall County in the campaign for the U. S. Senate between Earle C. Clements and Joe B. Bates.

Clements is seeking re-election to the Senate and is opposed by Bates, a former congressman. Bates has the support of Governor Chandler.

Mayor Louis O'Daniel of Benton and Volney Brien, a former sheriff, have been named as co-chairmen of the Clements drive in this county.

Earl Osborne, a Benton attorney, has been named county chairman for Bates' campaign. The primary election, under new law will be held on May 29.

Osborne issued the following statement: "I have accepted the responsibility for directing the campaign of Joe Bates for the office of United States Senator, here in Marshall County. I did this because I believe that the present Senator has not in the past represented the best interest of this county, either during the time he served as governor of this state or since he has been a member of the Senate."

"While governor he drove the school teachers from Frankfort with insulting rebukes when they visited the state capitol seeking a small increase in the appropriation for schools. Since he has been in the Senate he has voted to turn all oil lying under the continental shelf over to the oil barons when its proceeds could have been used to benefit education here in Kentucky and Marshall County."

"Joe Bates is a Christian gentleman who seeks nothing more than to serve the people of this state. He will do every thing within his power to help us make our county and state a better place to live. I have always felt that no one man has a right to stay in public office all his life to the exclusion of others. The present Senator has been in one office or another every since I can remember. It would be a fine experience for him to get out work for a living and pay taxes like the rest of us for awhile. It is possible that he might learn quite a bit from this experience. At least enough not to go around giving away the nation's resources."

## Surplus Food to Be Distributed to Needy in County

Surplus government commodities will be distributed to the needy residents of Marshall County.

Approval for distribution of the commodities in this county was given to Fiscal Court on April 13 by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

Fiscal Court had made application on April 10 for distribution of the commodities. Officials estimate that there are 1,500 persons in Marshall County who are eligible to receive the surplus food. Among those entitled to the food are persons on direct relief, those getting old age assistance, the blind, the dependent children, and others to be determined by Fiscal Court and the county judge.

Food to be distributed will include pork, lard, flour, corn meal, cheese, rice, three kinds of beans, milk, butter and other commodities as they are declared by authorities to be in surplus. Types of foods will vary from month to month as surplus are declared.

Applications for the food will be received at the county courtroom in Benton on Tuesday, April 24, starting at 9 a. m. Applications will be made by heads of families.

Each applicant will be required to fill out a form declaring his need for the surplus food. If the application is approved, the applicant will be issued an identification card which he will carry in his billfold and will produce each trip he makes to obtain surplus food.

The food will be ABSOLUTELY FREE to the needy. A storage place in which to keep the surplus food will be chosen later by the county.

Calvert City residents and the industrial plants there will start using daylight saving time Sunday, April 29.

The official switch from Central to Daylight time will start at 2 o'clock Sunday morning when most persons will be asleep. Calvert residents are urged to turn their clocks back one hour when they go to bed Saturday night.

The daylight time will remain in effect until Sunday, Sept. 30. Paducah also will go on daylight time at the same hour as Calvert City.

The City Council Monday night discussed the possibility of placing Benton on daylight saving time, but postponed action until its next meeting on May 7.

Councilmen expressed a desire that all citizens interested in the issue appear at the May 7 meeting so the officials might obtain a better consensus of public opinion.

John Clay Lovett, representing the Benton Lions Club, appeared before the Council Monday night and urged the officials to place Benton on daylight time. He said the Lions Club had voted in favor of changing the time.

Bob Long also appealed for the new time. He said he operates plants at Benton and Calvert City and it would be almost impossible to operate one plant on daylight time and the other on regular time.

A decision on what course Benton will take likely will come at the May 7 Council meeting. If you have a preference, be sure to attend the meeting and express your views.

## Pennsalt Executives Given Safety Trophy

April 11 was a big day for the Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Company's Calvert City plant.

The President's Safety Trophy was awarded by James McWhirter, production manager, to A. E. Clement, Calvert City works manager, who received the trophy for the plant.

Mr. McWhirter told the employees assembled to receive the award that the most important consideration in a successful operation is employee safety. He further congratulated the employees for the fine work they had done in promoting safety during the past year.

The awarding of the President's Safety Trophy was established in 1949 by the former president, George B. Beltz. The trophy is awarded to the eligible plant achieving the lowest frequency rate during any calendar year. Plants eligible to

compete for the award must have an average of 150 employees during the period of the contest. Any plant having the best safety record for three consecutive years may retain permanent possession of the trophy.

The contest of 1955 was extremely close, with the Calvert City Plant having the lowest frequency rate of 2.27. The Sharples Chemicals Division had a frequency rate of 2.31 and the Tacoma, Wash., plant had a frequency rate of 2.59. The frequency rate is determined according to American Safety Standards as set up by the National Safety Council. This rate is based on the number of lost time accidents multiplied by 1,000,000 and divided by the number of man hours worked. The Calvert plant worked approximately 450,000 man hours during the calendar year with only one lost-time accident.

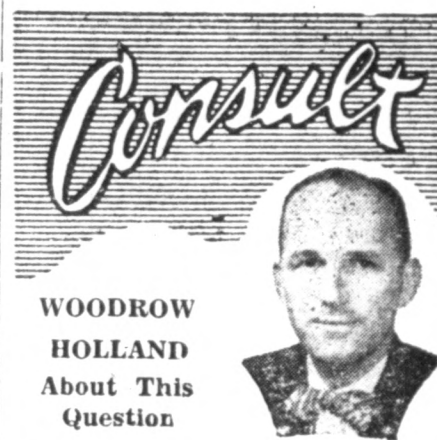

### Unto Death

Lesson for April 22, 1956

WHY do people get killed for being Christians? It seems incredible, and it hasn't happened to most Christians. But it does happen. Christianity was perhaps only a few months old when the first martyr, Stephen, met his death at the hands of a mob. Now the peculiar feature of that mob was that it was so respectable. Not a hoodlum in the lot. They were all civic leaders, men high in religious circles. In fact, it was the high court that adjourned and became the stonethrowing mob. They would not have said that Dr. Foreman they murdered Stephen. They would have said they executed him. But that makes it all the more of a puzzle. A hoodlum might shoot down a good Christian just for meanness, but why should men of distinction kill a man for no other crime than being a Christian?

**Blood of the Martyrs**  
Before trying to answer that question, we might glance through history and see a few other cases. Circumstances vary, but the kind of martyrdom that was Stephen's is always essentially the same. No one ever brings the killers into court. Who would have brought suit against the Sanhedrin for killing Stephen? They were the court. Who could arrest the Emperor Nero for burning the Christians alive in his gardens? Who could have written a letter to the paper (if there had been one) complaining about the mass murders, by great emperors like Diocletian or Marcus Aurelius, of innocent Christians? So it was when Joan of Arc was burned at the stake, or when "Bloody Mary" was running wild against the Protestants, or when the Russian revolution caused the death of no body knows how many hundreds of millions of people. In all these cases, the revolution has brought death to Christians again in our time. The persecutors may be bishops, and arch-bishops, heathen emperors, "people's governments," or African chiefs, they always have the law on their side, and what is more serious, they have public opinion. When the early French missionaries to the American Indians were lambasted, as so many of them were, does any one suppose that their scalps were buried to destroy traces of the crime? Not a bit of it—some Indian warrior wore the scalp and was the envy of everybody in his village. Always the murder of the Christians is done with public knowledge.

**Persecution Can Be Avoided**  
We can move a little closer to our question by remembering that the church has not always been persecuted. Sometimes it has been highly praised, welcomed, honored. It may even succeed in running the country. Nobody would dream of persecuting it,—in fact, it may turn the tables and persecute other people. Oh—you say that once—when that happens, it isn't the church of God any more; the true church will always be persecuted, and when it isn't, it is a sign it is no longer the true church.—There is some truth in that, but it is saying too much. A church may be free from persecution and still be largely Christian. However, you can set it down as a rule: Whenever the church, and the people in it, do just what everybody else does and think what everybody else thinks, then it will not be persecuted.

**"I Had a Higher Führer"**  
Martin Niemöller is a case in point. He was a hero of World War I who later became a minister. When Hitler took over Germany, Pastor Niemöller went along with what Hitler did, or at any rate he said nothing, for a long time. And all that time, Martin Niemöller went right on with his church work undisturbed. Then finally Hitler was too much even for Niemöller's strong stomach, and he defied Hitler. "I had a higher Führer," he said years later, a higher Leader. So the police came and marched that minister off to jail, one morning after church. You see? The church is never persecuted when all it says to the world around it is "Yes, yes, we agree!" The church has been persecuted, and will be persecuted here in America even if and when—like Stephen of old—it dares to set above public opinion, custom, "mores," respectabilities, authorities and powers, the Higher Leader.

"Trailing clouds of glory do we come from God who is our home" — (Wordsworth) — we as babes naturally respond to the beauties of the World of Nature which is so akin to heavenly things and — "as daily we must travel farther from the east," we "still are nature's priests," recognizing the language of flowers throughout our lives as "speaking words" we mortals have not the power to express. As a nation of people we have come to depend more and more upon the commercial means of conveying our words of love, appreciation, and sympathy for getting the role our own hands can play in gardening to grow beautiful plants or in sending those blossoms we tend, to cheer others.

We are not minimizing the importance of the florist. It is gratifying indeed to have that business in Benton and it has done much to help make Benton beautiful particularly on special days and during special seasons. That is just another of the many

signs of the healthy growth of our community.

But, there is a part every individual can play in the beautification of his town — that of giving a little attention and time to the planting of his own premises. With litter cleared away and the yards well-groomed as a suitable background, and the good earth warming up in spite of sudden cold blasts and snow flurries along with a monetary "spray" of halstones, we can sow those annuals or set out those plants ready for us in the stores that will later send "Messages" of cheer to the passers-by. Sometimes the investment of a mere dime will yield several dollars' worth of pleasure. The author of the following is unknown

but the thought is worthy of being passed on:

The Board of Supervisors of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District is sponsoring a land judging contest for Future Farmer of America boys in the high schools of the county. The county contest will be held April 17.

Each school has held a soil contest to select a team of three boys to go to the county contest. Dan Amos, Soil Conservation Service Soil Scientist, and I helped teachers of each school train the boys and conduct the school contest.

Jerry East, Murrell Hill, and Ronald Ford were the high scoring boys in the North Marshall school contest and will represent their FFA Chapter at the district contest. Gordon Chester is their VoAg teacher.

James H. Henson, Glenn Dar-

nall, and Wayne Green were the high scoring boys in the Hardin school contest and will represent their FFA Chapter at the county contest. Glen Warren is their VoAg teacher.

Robert Powell, Eddie Siris, and Ronald Nelson were the high scoring boys in the Benton High School contest and will represent their FFA Chapter at the county contest. Morgan Hill is their VoAg teacher.

Glenn Stone, Dwane Harris, and Nelson Darnell were the high scoring boys in the Breweds school contest and will represent their FFA Chapter at the county contest. Howard Dunnigan is their VoAg teacher.

The winning team in the county contest will go on to the district contest. This will be held in Mayfield, Saturday, April 21. The Kentucky Farmer is sponsor-

ing the contest throughout the state.

In judging land, the boys check the physical features of the soil such as the effective depth, texture of surface soil, permeability, drainage, organic matter content, capacity to store water, slope, and erosion.

These features help the boys decide the correct land capability class, the proper land use, and the conservation practices which are needed to protect and improve the land.

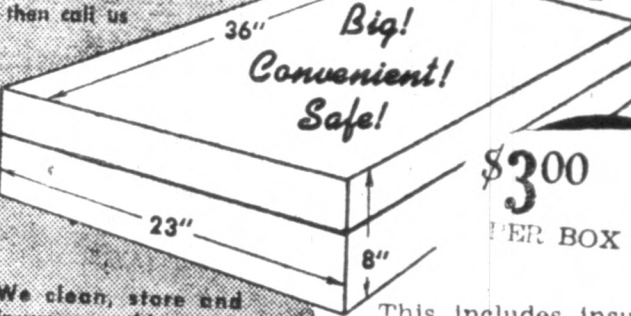


