## Clements Leaders Give Views

Louis O'Daniel and Volney Brien, co-managers in Marshall County for the senatorial campaign of Earle Clements, issued this week the following statement:

"We have accepted the responsibility of directing the campaign of Senator Earl C. Clements for re-election to the U. S. ## From A COUNTRY KITCHEN

### An Old-Fashioned Dessert

Because of the nourishment in good bread, old-fashioned bread pudding is an especially good family dessert. It was a favorite dessert at grandmother's and was varied with spices or apples—usually dried apples.

In fact, bread pudding goes far back in cooking history. In one of my old cookbooks, published about 100 years ago, is the following simple recipe: "A well-baked loaf of stale bread may be tied in a linen cloth, and boiled or steamed, which, with a good sauce answers well for a plain pudding."

Our housewife today starts with grandmother's basically good recipe, but she has the advantage of modern processed food—from peanut brittle to frozen or canned peaches—for providing variation.

I use the following basic bread pudding recipe: Break 5 slices of day-old white bread in small pieces into 1½ quart size casserole. Scald together 2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons butter, ¼ cup sugar and ¼ teaspoon salt. When scalded mix with 2 slightly beaten eggs. Add minutes to 1 hour. Serve hot or cold. Will serve 4 to 6.

This pudding can be very good served with a simple sauce such as a lemon sauce. Children love it with jelly or jelly melted in the sauce pan and poured over it hot. I make my lemon sauce as follows:

### Lemon Sauce

1 cup sugar	2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons cornstarch	4 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon salt	grated rind of 1 lemon
1 cup boiling water	

Mix together sugar, cornstarch and salt; Add boiling water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick and clear. (About 6 minutes). Remove from heat, add butter, lemon juice and rind. Serve hot or cold.

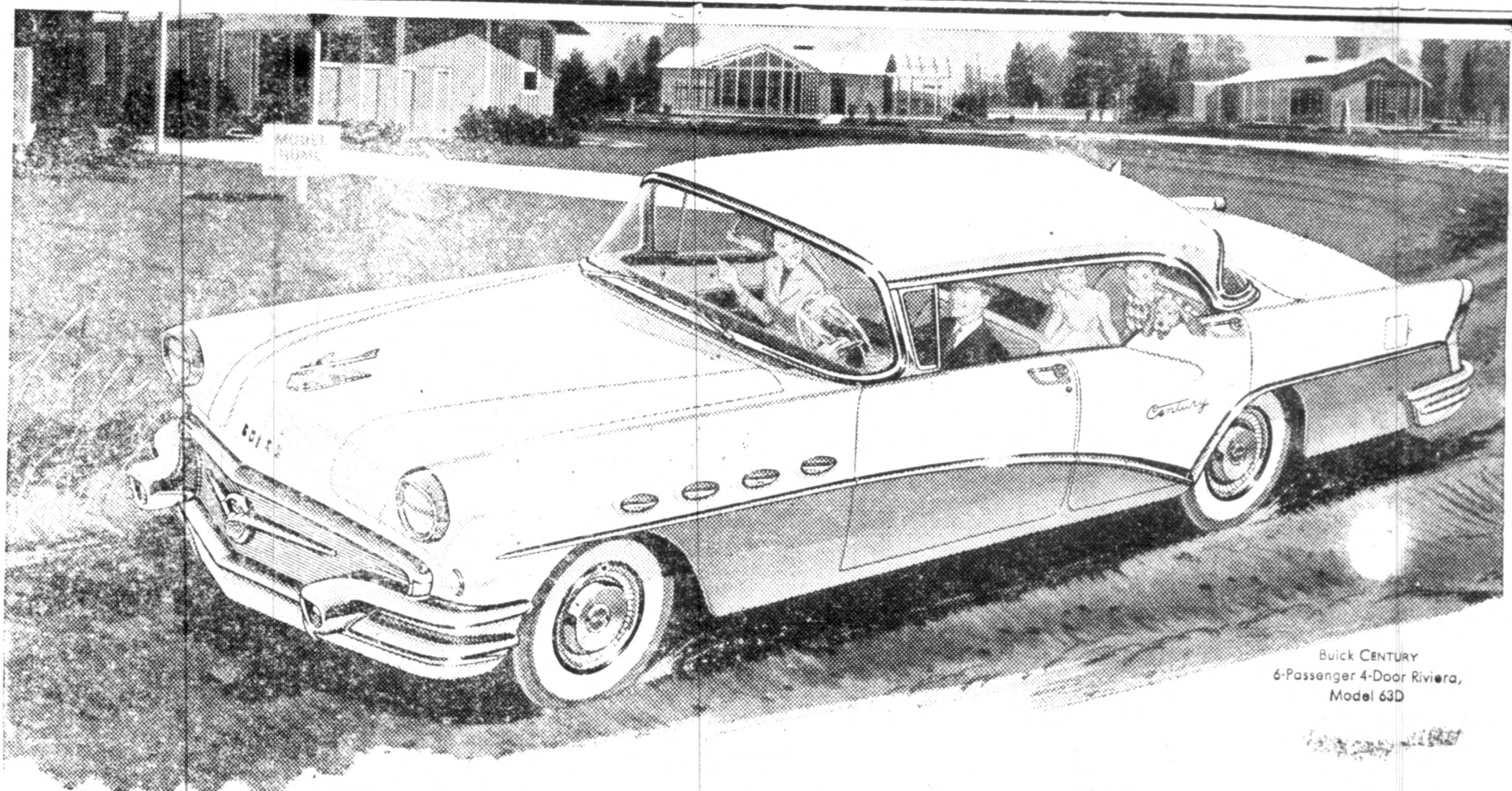

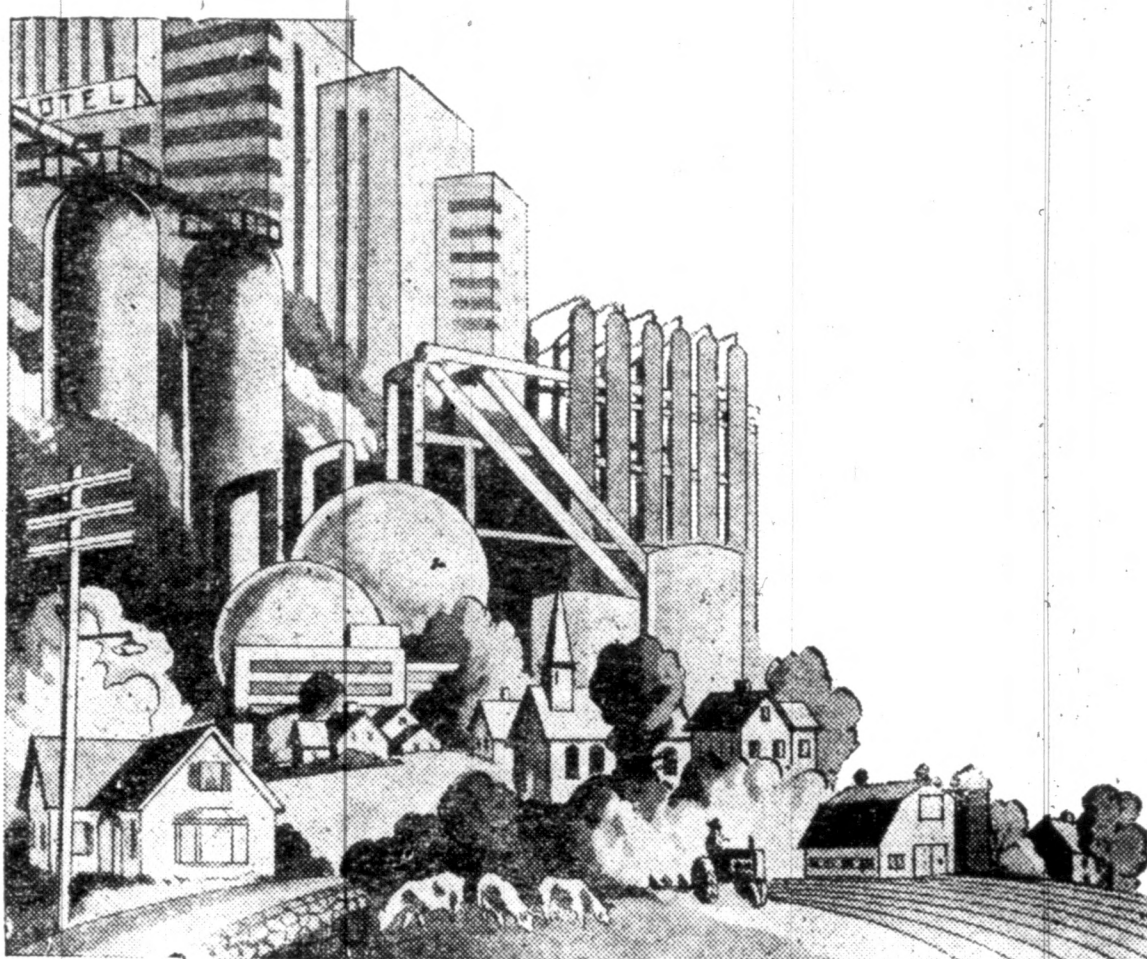

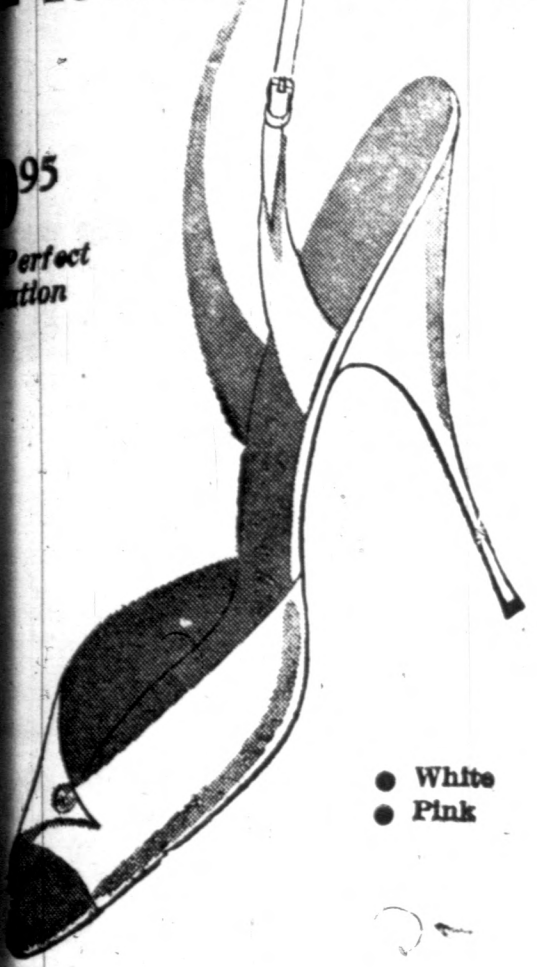

## County Soil Notes

Roy Vasseur, Lakeview Church Road, was successful in killing black locust sprouts last year. He had a field which was set in locusts ten to fifteen years ago to control erosion. They failed to grow rapidly on the poor soil. Insects attacked them.

Vasseur decided to remove the locust and establish a permanent sod for pasture. The trees were cut at the surface of the ground with a saw, some could be used for posts. A bunch of goats were turned in the field. They ate the young sprouts as they came out at the stumps. The field was mowed once in mid summer. This spring there are very few locusts left in the field.

Hatler Morgan has added another tract of land to his program where the Air Force pays the major share of the bill, paying full salary and allowances while in college.

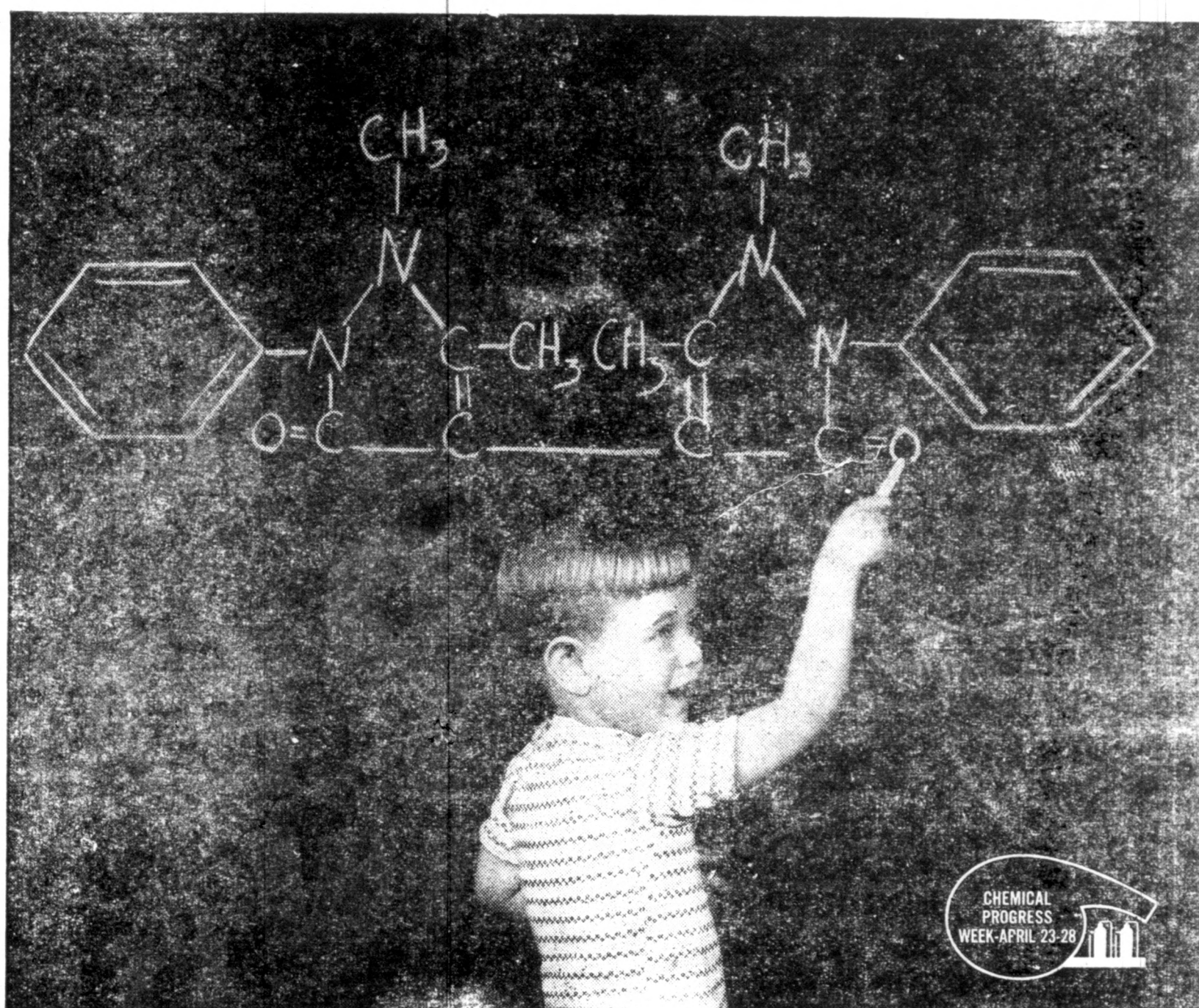
## New Signs Mark All Closed Roads In Kentucky Reservoir

new grass sprigs set in these places now will stop them from getting any larger, with a little care. 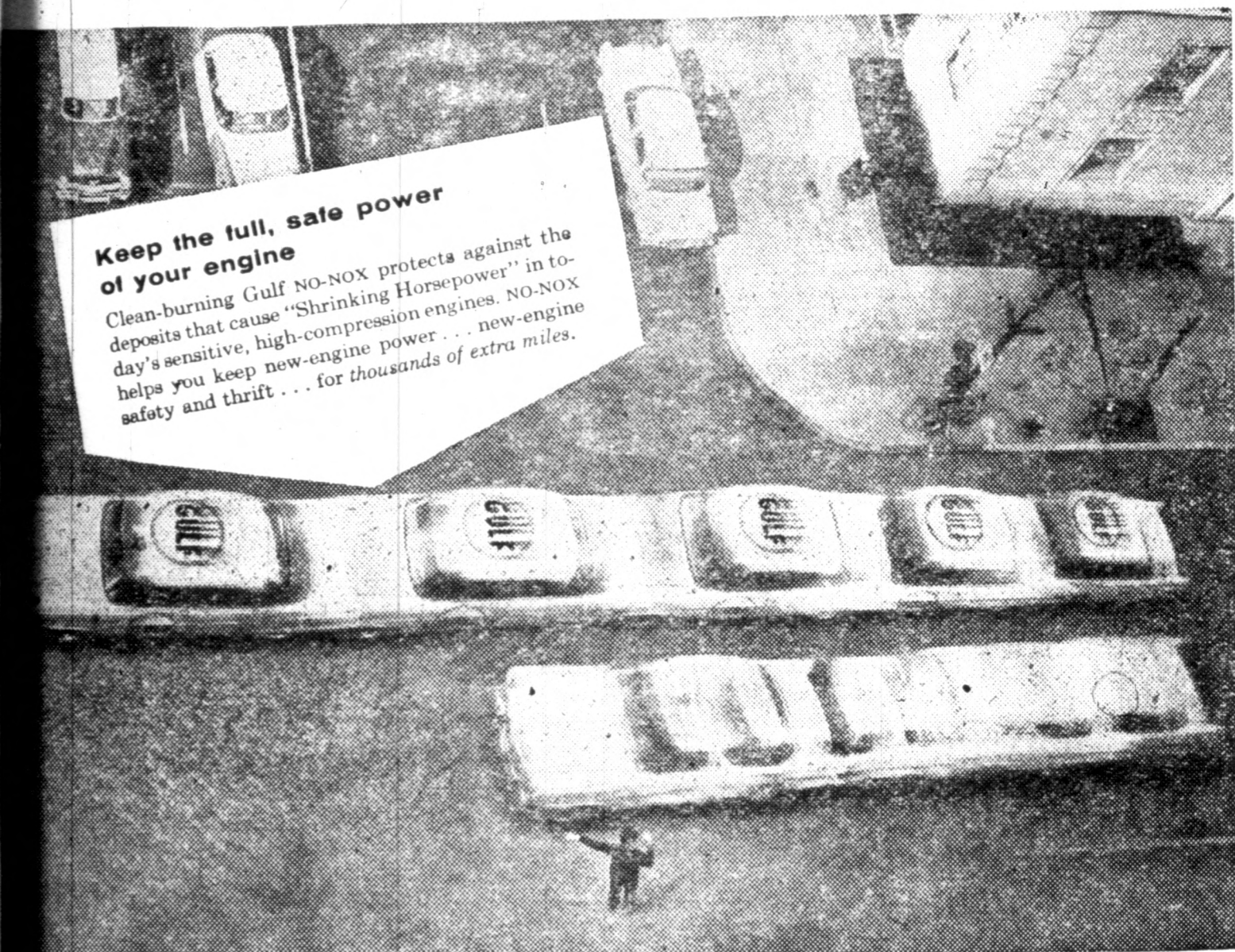

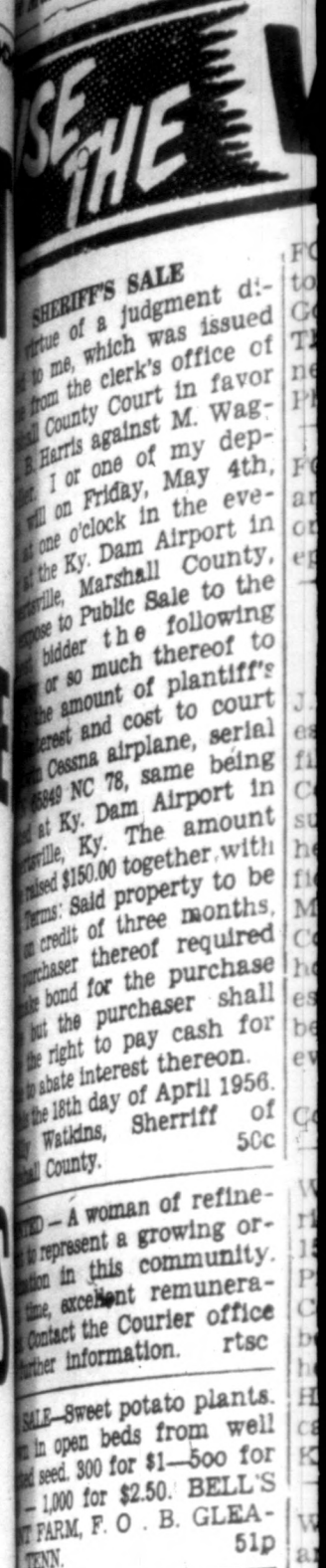

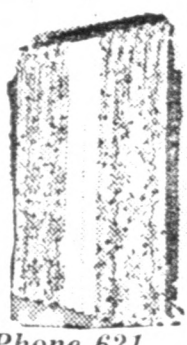
