Inman Leads Farmers For Bates Campaign

Appointment of Elbert Inman as Marshall County farmer's chairman in the campaign of former congressman Joe B. Bates for the democratic senatorial nomination was announced today by Earl T. The Kentucky Public Service Commission held a hearing in Frankfort Monday on Benton's application for a certificate of convenience to obtain an allotment of natural gas.

The hearing went off well, attorneys reported to city officials, and a ruling is expected in the next 10 days.

The state commission requested at the hearing, however that the Marshall County Gas Co. amend its stock set-up and make other minor changes.

The Marshall County Gas Co. is a local organization set up to act for J. L. Mosely of Owensboro, who holds the franchise to operate a natural gas system in Benton.

Albert Switzer and Associates of Jackson, Miss., has the contract to install the system.

When the okay is received from the Public Service Commission, application will be made to the Federal Power Commission to obtain the necessary gas allotment to operate the system here.

Eight Points are Listed for Buying Proper Seed Corn

Eight points should be kept in mind by farmers purchasing seed corn in the next few days, says Dr. Frank Loeffel, Kentucky Experiment Station, associate agronomist.

They are:

1. Buy adopted hybrids. Splintered corn is a waste of feed, food and labor. Try early hybrids for late planting.
2. Buy two or more hybrids. Seasons vary and hybrids respond differently.
3. Try new hybrids. Improvements are being made constantly. Farmers could try a new hybrid on a limited acreage the first year.
4. Buy from a reliable source. Local dealers and reliable firms want satisfied customers.
5. Be sure the hybrid is backed by research and field tests. Good

hybrids are developed through years of breeding and testing. Ask the dealer.

6. High prices and high pressure don't prove a hybrid. Ask for proof.
7. Look for certified seed tags. Certified seed tags are a mark of quality and should be checked before purchase.
8. Check the grade. A bushel of medium-flat grade seed will plant more acres than a bushel of large grade seed.

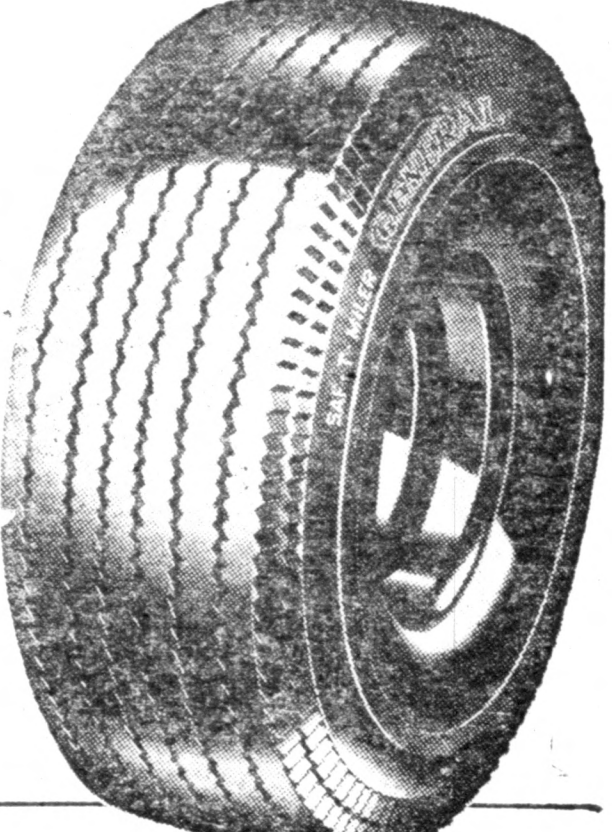

WHEREAS, it is a custom of old to implore the mercy of God during Rogation days to give to the plants of the field and increase; and,

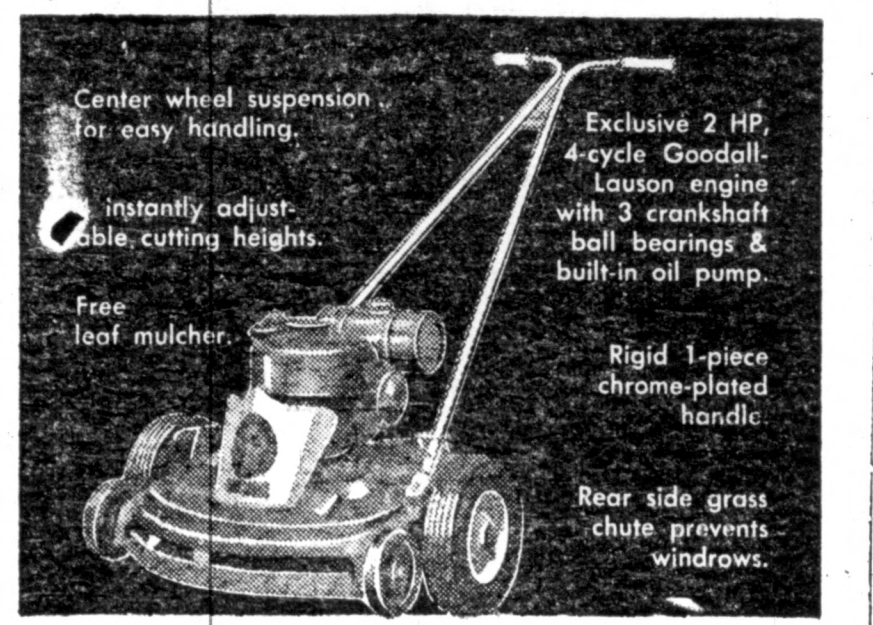
WHEREAS, during this period the soil conservation districts of America are sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the churches;

Goodrich Provides Over \$450,000 for Higher Education

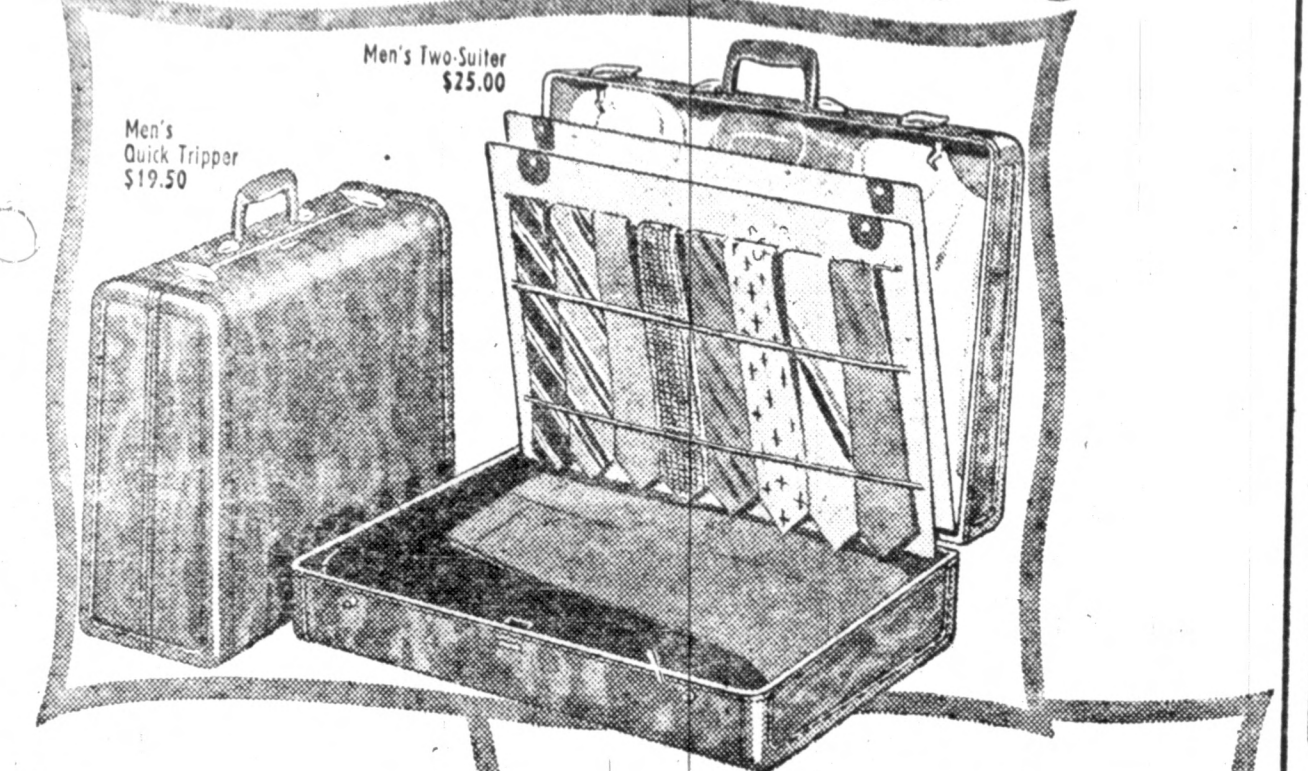

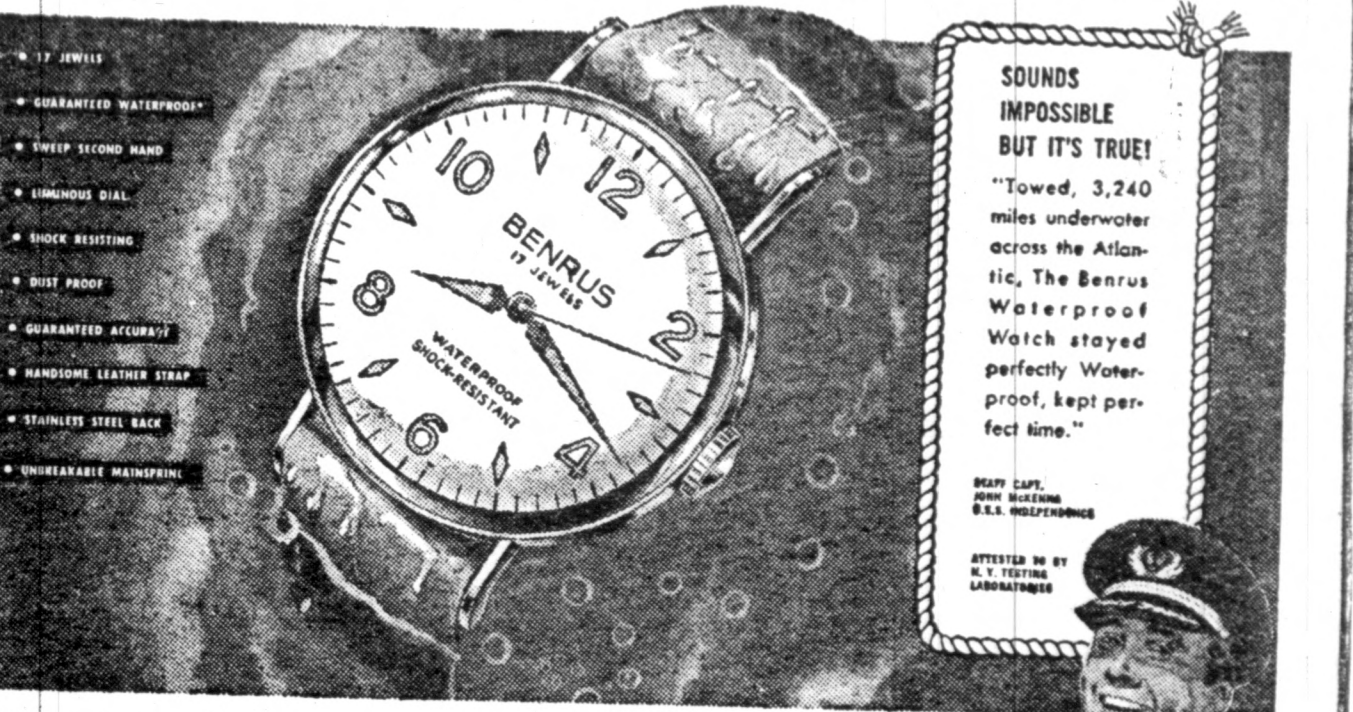
