JOHN SMITH WINS RACE BY FIVE VOTES

John Smith was elected constable of the sixteenth district, Obion County, Tenn., by a five vote margin over his opponent, Charlie Burrow, in the election held Thursday, August 1. In South Fulton Smith received 129 votes and Burrow 128. At McConnell Burrow received 19 votes and Smith 18. The contest was decided at Pierce where Smith received 22 votes and Burrow 17.

One of the most one-sided votes on record was cast throughout Tennessee in state election, when McKellar-Cooper-Dunlap ticket was reelected with practically no opposition.

In Obion county Senator McKellar polled more than 2500 votes against a combined vote of fewer than 200 votes for his opponents, John R. Neal and Claude Toler, Gov. Cooper carried the county with an even greater vote than the senator with more than 2600 votes against less than 300 for George Dempster.

Porter Dunlap, unopposed candidate for Railroad Commissioner, polled over 2000 votes and Jere Cooper, unopposed for Congress, was renominated.

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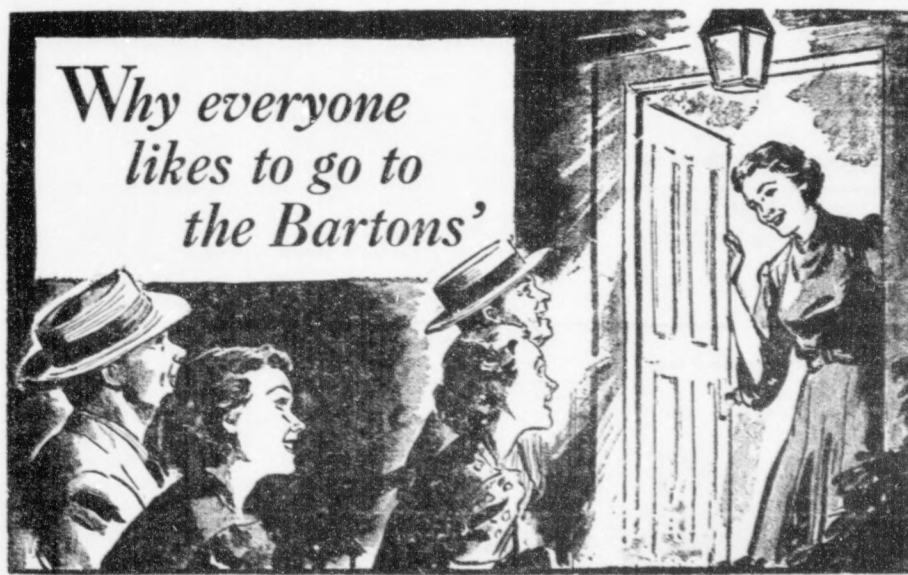
