## Man of the Week

Stepping forth as "Man of the Week" of June 29 is a man known to all of us — Edward J. Rendleman.

Ed, as his friends call him, grew up and received his early education in Southern Illinois, and has led a varied and interesting life.

He met his wife, the former Jane Klest, of Dongola, Ill., in 1940, and they were married on August 2, 1943, which was the day after he received his Army commission of second lieutenant in the infantry.

In early 1944, he went overseas for 18 months of duty with the 90th Infantry Division. While on a ship scheduled to strike the beaches of France on D-Day plus one, the ship was sunk. But even with this obstacle, Ed and the other survivors of his division hit the beaches with only an eight-hour delay, but without equipment or supplies and fought under these circumstances for three days.

During these trying weeks, Rendleman received a battlefield promotion to first lieutenant. From 1946 to 1947, he served with the Military Police in Vienna.

Once discharged, he and his wife traveled in many states trying to make up their minds where best to lay their future. Finally, he decided to enter school to learn the jewelry business, and in March 1949 was graduated from the Southern College of watch making in Memphis, Tenn. In October 1949, he received a degree from the School of Jewelry Manufacturing in Memphis.

December 1949 found Ed and his wife in Calvert City with a jewelry repair business. While maintaining his repair service,

and slowly branching out into the merchandising of jewelry, he completed a three-year course with the Gemological Institute of America and received a degree of Gemologist.

Rendleman is a man who keeps himself surrounded with worthwhile endeavors. Aside from his successful jewelry business, he is a Sunday School teacher at the Methodist Church, is active in the PTA — having been vice president and is presently safety chairman. He is a captain in the active Army Reserve and serves in the capacity of plans and training officer. Two weeks out of each year he spends on active duty. Ed goes to Camp Breckinridge Aug. 12-26.

One of his most important contributions to Calvert City is serving as chief of the Volunteer Fire Department. And though he is a busy business man, he finds the time to acquaint himself with the latest principles of fire fighting and the best uses of the equipment.

Mr. and Mrs. Rendleman have two children, Sherry Ann, 9, and Mike, 7. Ed is one of three children. He has a brother who is a hair stylist in Aurora, Ill., and a younger sister who was graduated from high school this year.

### Fisherman's Luck OK With Bass and Stripes

IMPORTANT - Instructions have been released on the perage reserve portion of the 1956 Soil Banks Program. Contact your ASC office immediately for full instructions. It could mean several thousand dollars to Marshall County farmers. This phase of the program applies to those with commercial wheat, cotton, and tobacco allotments. You must sign up by July 20. Act now.

If you did not plant your allotted acreage to the above crops, you may get a payment if you sign the proper agreement forms. Soil Banks payments for cotton is 15 cents per pound and tobacco - burley 18 cents, dark fired 13 cents, and dark air-cured 12 cents.

A beef cattle tour will be conducted in the county Tuesday, July 3. The morning will be spent on the Hatler Morgan farm 21-2 miles south of Benton. We will see a commercial beef herd, French silo, farm reservoir and many other things of interest. The afternoon program will be at the W. L. Frazier farm on the Access Road near Gilbertsville. Mr. Frazier has a registered Angus herd of 33 cows. We will see his cattle, feed lot, and discuss many phases of beef production. The morning will start at 9:45 in the morning and 1:30 in the afternoon.

Recent rains have caused Kentucky Lake to rise slightly and have interfered with trips by local fishermen, but tourists continue to flock to the big-fishing waters.

Paul Gilliam of Fisherman's One-Stop reports that bass and Stripes continue to be the best bet for anglers. He says the 3 best methods being used to catch fish are trolling with Spoonplugs, casting with bombs, and white and night angling around bridge piers using minnows and frozen willow flies.

Fisherman's One-Stop reports the following catches: Thomas R. White and party of Russellville took 20 stripes while night fishing and Mr. and

Mrs. Cecil Herndon of Russellville, got 21 bluegill and cats with worms.

Leslie and George Reynolds of Henderson caught 28 bass and 3 Stripes using Spoonplugs. C. C. Criter, Harry French and Quik Reed of Cape Girardeau, Mo., took 10 Stripes, 8 bass, two crappie and one pike while fishing at night with minnows.

Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Barker of Eldorado, Ill., caught 20 Stripes, five bass and one pike with Spoonplugs. Kenneth Cox and father of Eldorado took seven bass with three weighing over five pounds each.

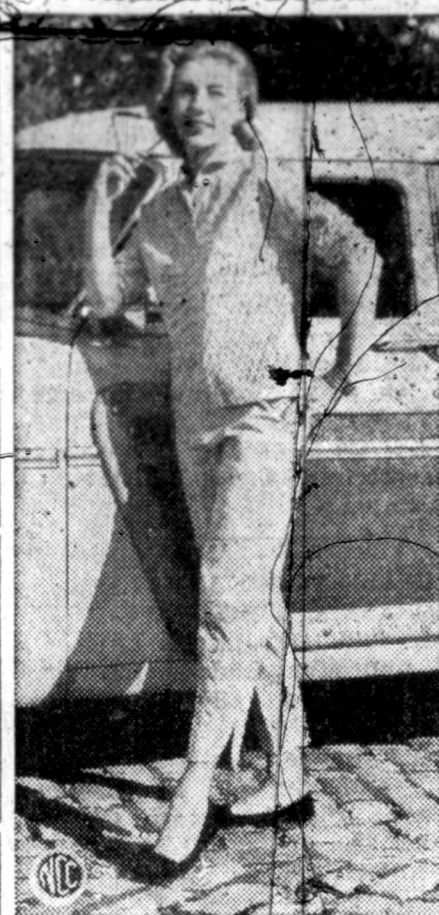

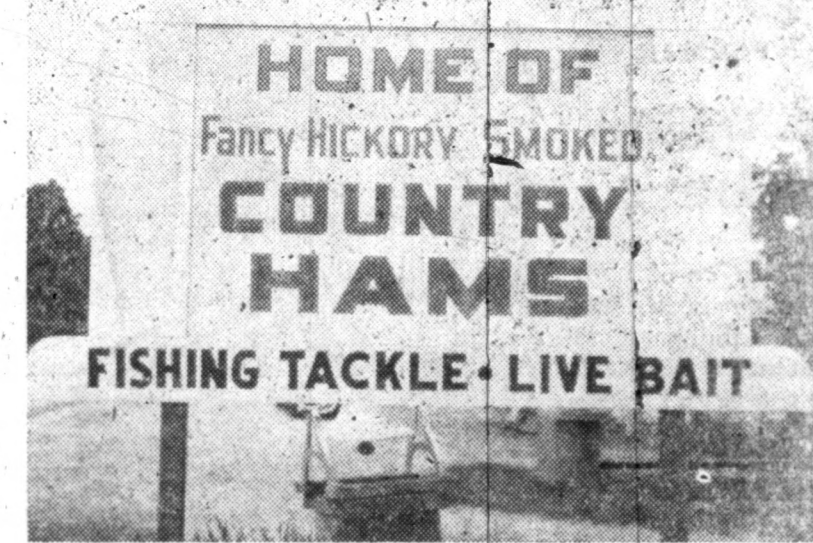

### County Soil Notes

Roy Gregory, east of Briensburg, has completed a sod waterway. Before he began the work, the waterway was a large ditch grown up in trees, bushes and briars. A bulldozer cleared the area and filled the ditch with soil. The average width of the waterway is 60 feet. It is about one and two-thirds acres in size and will carry water from 12 acre watershed.

A seedbed was prepared and sudan grass seeded at the rate of 30 pounds per acre. About the first of September, the sudan will be removed and fescue drilled in the stubble.

Payments are made on the establishment of waterways like this at the rate of \$8 per hour for shaping with bulldozer and \$120 per one thousand square feet for lime, seed and fertilizer.

Ponds for livestock water which have been completed recently were on the farms of Oliver Jones, Aurora; John Shemwell, Oak Level; John Womack and Charles Nimmo of Briensburg. All are cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District.

I made a tour with other Soil Conservation Service personnel from this area week before last of the Plum Creek watershed project in Spencer and Shelby Counties. This is one of the first projects approved under Public Law 566, the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Law.

The purpose of a watershed

protection project is the control of erosion, flood damage, and drainage which is brought about through stream channel improvement. A project of this kind is needed locally on watersheds such as Clark's River and Cypress Creek.

The Plum Creek watershed is 17 miles long, two miles wide, with a total area of 23,688 acres. There are 162 farms in the watershed boundary.

Some of the main flood and erosion prevention measures needed are 13 flood water retaining structures, 95 miles of sub waterway improvement, 21 miles of stream improvement, 12 miles of roadside bank treatment, 235 acres of tree planting, and 450 acres of silt producing areas needs establishing to grass.

### Nine Letters

Lesson for July 1, 1956

THOUSANDS of Sunday schools for the next three months are going to be studying nine short but immortal letters. These letters are the forgotten parts of the New Testament, for many people. Out of the 27 "books" of the New Testament, all but five are letters. These nine—from Hebrews to Revelation—make up about 30 pages or one-sixth of the whole Testament. It would be worth the reader's while to make a special study of these letters this summer. Dr. Foreman



Perhaps all the teachers in a Sunday school could chip in and buy a commentary or two.

Letters from . . .

No two people write quite alike. All letters bear the mark of their writers even when they are unsigned. So it is with these nine. Some of them are signed, some are not. But the writers can be told apart without any trouble. If Hebrews and James were printed together without a break, a high school student should be able to notice the difference between them. The writer of the first letter is clearly a highly educated man, a man who is keenly interested in ritual and in the history of the Hebrew people. The writer of the second is less highly educated, but a more practical man all around. Not that his advice is any better, but he loses no time getting down to particular problems. The first man is greatly interested in theology, the second is so little interested in it that his letters are carefully signed. Hebrews is not signed at all. . . . So one may go through the rest of these letters seeing the writers through what they wrote.

Letters to . . .

Letters vary according to the persons to whom they are written. A woman writing to her mother, her husband, the tax collector and her boy at school will write four different kinds of letters. So these nine letters were written to different kinds of people. To be sure, some of them were sent to a pretty wide circle of readers (Peter for instance), but even so, that wide circle had something in common. In this case, suffering and persecution. Is it too much to suggest that the Christians John has in his mind's eye as he writes his letters are much more mature than the Christians to whom James writes his plain advice? Now the interesting thing is that the various kinds of Christians to whom these letters were addressed are matched by Christian types today. That is why one Christian will sometimes get more out of one part of the New Testament, while another Christian finds more meat in another part. And yet for all the differences there are some important likenesses, and the noticing reader will find them.

Letters about . . .

Few if any of these letters, or any others in the New Testament, are about "things in general." They usually speak to some particular problem, situation or trouble. The New Testament does not consist of a series of theological essays neatly arranged by topics. Rather, it consists of fairly short letters speaking to certain specific problems that had been distressing the readers. Some of these problems emerged in more places than one at the same time, just as happens today. In the short passages selected for special study in most quarters, two problems are highlighted, as the reader will find: false teachings, and persecution. In these times in which we live, with half the world in a ferment against Christianity, and even in the "Christian" part of the world a bewildering jangle and wrangle of sects and "isms" soap-boxing it over the place—the Christian church threatened by enemies without and "crackpots" oftentimes within, who can call the New Testament's themes out of date?

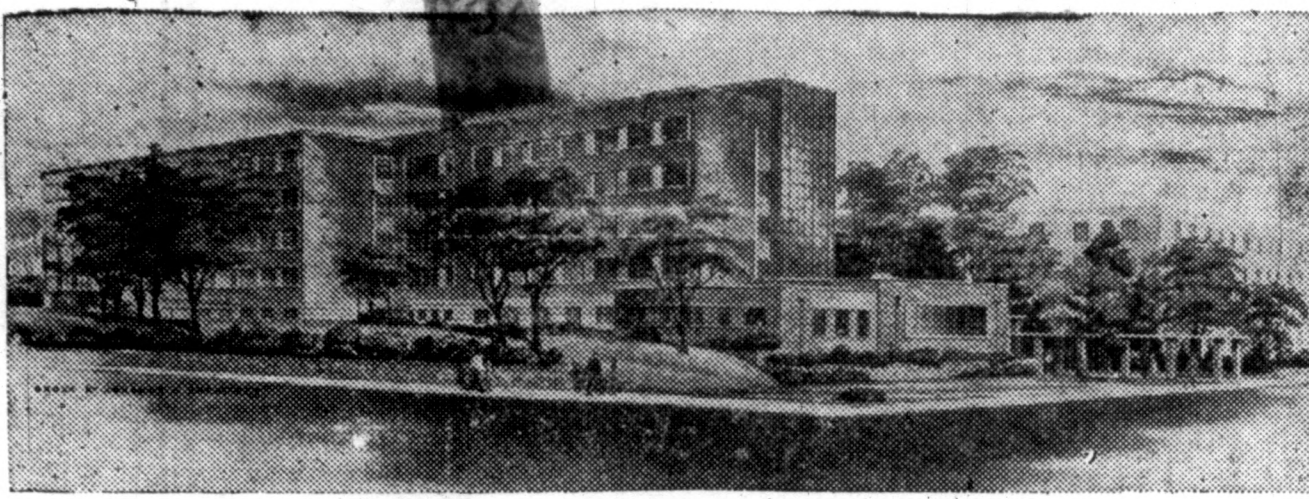

## Library May Get Aid of Government

The Marshall County Public Library is expected to benefit from a \$37,500,000 bill signed last week by President Eisenhower. The bill gives approximately \$1,000,000 in help to the Kentucky Bookmobile project, and the local library is linked with the Bookmobile project.

The money will be spread over a period of five years. Kentucky is expected to get \$220,815 worth of Federal aid each year.

At the same time the state must put up \$114,261 of its own in State and local funds.

Miss Margaret Willis, co-ordinator of extension services in the Kentucky Library Extension Division, said at Frankfort earlier this month that the Federal aid will be a boon to Kentucky's rural library program.

Towns of more than 10,000 population will not benefit under the bill. The Federal grants could be used to hire library personnel and buy books, but not to construct libraries or buy land.

Congressional backers of the measure said 27,000,000 Americans are without access to local public-library services of any kind and 90 percent of them live in rural areas.

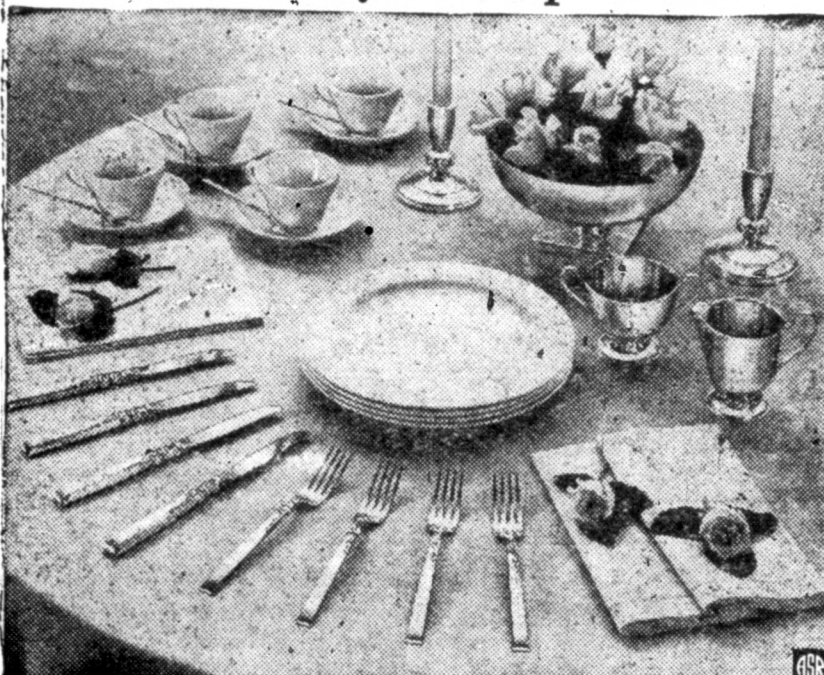
The President's approval of the measure climaxed a long fight for it. The legislation had been pending in Congress for more than six years.

The Federal grants will be parceled out at a maximum rate of \$7,500,000 a year. The amounts to each state will depend on the size of the state's rural population.
