One hundred women attended the Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Fulton County Homemakers' Association September 25, 1940, at the Fulton Woman's Club Building, Fulton, Kentucky.

The theme of the day was "Women in a Democracy." Mrs. E. H. Dublin, County President, presided over the meeting. Mrs. Cecil Burnett, assisted by Miss Clara Bondurant, led the group singing. Roll Call was answered by the President of each club standing and giving the report of their year's work in the club.

What Have We Done, was given by the County Leaders. Each one reported an increase in the year's work. Mrs. W. H. Harrison made a very important talk on the Homemakers' Vacation. Mrs. Wales Austin gave a report of Farm and Home Work. The Agent's report was then given by Mrs. Catherine Thompson.

Lunch was served by Missionary Society of the Christian Church.

The afternoon session opened with music by the Fulton High School Band, directed by Mr. Yewell Harrison.

Miss Zelma Monroe, Assistant State Leader of Home Demonstration Agents, spoke on "Women in a Democracy." She said that to have a good democracy we should be better Christians and better neighbors. To have liberty, we should be able to think as other people think and have brotherly love as citizens of the world. Happiness is rich experience that can't be taken away.

Mrs. T. M. Johnson, Former State President of Kentucky Homemakers' Federation, Bowling Green, Kentucky, was the guest speaker of the day. The subject was "Do We Appreciate Being Women in a Democracy?" Democracy is a condition of the heart and we as American Women do not know how to appreciate the freedom we have. She compared our freedom with those women of other nations that she became acquainted with on her trip last June to London where she attended the meeting of the Associated Country Women of the World.

## Traffic Violators Hailed Into Court

Drivers of motor vehicles in the city of Fulton are warned that traffic regulations must be obeyed, as the police department is making a drive to see that laws are enforced. Thirty drivers were brought into the city court this week for failure to observe the school zone speed limit of not more than 15 miles per hour. Each were fined \$2.50, no court costs being added.

The purpose of this drive is to educate the motoring public to observe the local traffic regulations, and only light fines are being assessed on first charges. More rigid steps will be taken if necessary if violations persist, Chief Dalton said.

Warning is issued by the police department that other traffic violations will be enforced; red lights, stop signs, and parking zones must be observed. Warning notices are being placed on cars parking on the wrong side of the street and double parking.

A policeman is stationed in the school zone and anyone caught driving more than 15 miles an hour will be brought into court. Officers are watching the red lights at the corners of Lake and Carr, and Edgings and Fourth streets, and anyone running these red lights will be hailed into court.

## 7 HURT NEAR FULTON IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Seven persons were injured, four seriously, when two automobiles collided about 19:30 last Friday night on the Fulton-Union City highway.

Those injured were Charles Adams, Union City, driver of the car, cuts and severe bruises and chest injuries; Will Murray Hudson, Union City, badly injured pelvis; Joseph Roberts, Union City, bruises and deep cuts on hands; William Souders, Brookport, Ill., driver of the northbound car, dislocated hip, crushed right knee, cuts and bruises; T. E. Vasseur, Paducah, crushed face and broken ribs; W. J. Wilson, Paducah, dislocated hip; Harry McGehee, Brookport, slight cuts and bruises.

All seven victims of the accident were rushed to the Union City Clinic.

The Souders' car, a 1940 Studebaker sedan, was headed north on the Union City-Fulton road, en route to Paducah from an auction at Newbern. The Adams car, a 1937 Plymouth coupe, was returning from the Union City-Fulton football game in Fulton.

Adams asserted that the lights of the approaching car blinded him. Both cars were hurled from the highway on the east side of the road. Both machines were badly damaged.

## Temperance Drama Here Next Week

"The Prisoner at the Bar," a highly dramatized court trial, telling the story of the tragedy of re-peat under the present liquor set-up, will be presented at a number of places over the county next week, under the auspices of the Dry Forces of the County, cooperating with the Educational Department of the Anti-Saloon League of Kentucky. The drama will be presented by local talent at 7:30 each evening at the following places:

Crutchfield school, Monday night, Oct. 7; Sylvan Shade school, Tuesday night; Cayce school, Wednesday night; Western school, Thursday night; Hickman school, Friday night; Graves school, Sunday afternoon at 2:30; Fulton, First Methodist Church, Sunday night, October 13, at 7:30.

Walter J. Hoshal, State Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League is directing the drama, and takes the part of "The Prisoner." To date Mr. Hoshal has played this part 508 times, in presenting the drama to packed houses all over the State. The trial is taken from actual records. The sensational testimony of "Mrs. Frank Hall", the principal witness who was first on the scene of the gruesome tragedy, is highly interesting. The dramatic highlight of the drama, is the unusual and powerful plea of the Prisoner and the farewell between him and his little daughter, "Dorothy", just before he is sentenced for killing his wife in a drunken debauch. Critics claim it is one of the most impressive Temperance Dramas since "Ten Nights in a Bar-room." It is highly recommended, and is enthusiastically endorsed by Church leaders. ## NEW SOUTH FULTON SCHOOL OPENED MONDAY

The new building is of brick, steel and frame construction and is two stories high. Located on the first floor are two large primary rooms, with sanitary facilities and drinking fountains in each room, a storeroom, heating plant and work shop. On the second floor are five large class rooms.

## STEPS IN POULTRY PROFITS GIVEN BY SPECIALIST

The main objective of the poultryman for the next few months should be to secure satisfactory egg production.

In order to reach this goal it will be necessary to house the flock in clean, comfortable, well ventilated houses, feed a balanced ration and use sanitary precautions to prevent diseases, states A. J. Chadwell, poultry specialist for the U-T Agricultural Extension Service.

The house does not have to be an expensive one, but it should be dry, free from drafts and with enough ventilation to afford plenty

of fresh air. Avoid crowding and where possible house hens and pullets separately.

The feeding of the right kinds and amounts of feed is important in securing good egg production. Hens need a variety of feeds in order to be profitable producers. Proteins, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals are all essential elements in poultry ration. Proteins of animal origin (milk, meat scraps, tankage and fish meal) are more palatable and are easily digested.

Carbohydrates (corn, wheat, oats and barley) are used chiefly for heat, energy and to produce fat. They also contain other nutrients and are usually the cheapest feeds.

Vitamins are necessary for health, body and maintenance, growth, egg production and hatchability. They are present in small quantities in most feed stuffs but their principal source is green feed. Yellow corn is also a good source of vitamin A.

Disease resistance is in a large degree an inherited characteristic but proper feeding, sanitation and comfortable houses will go a long way toward keeping the flock healthy.

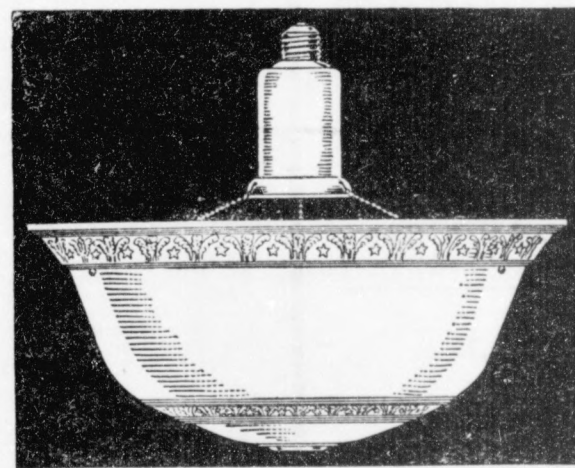
