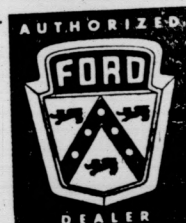

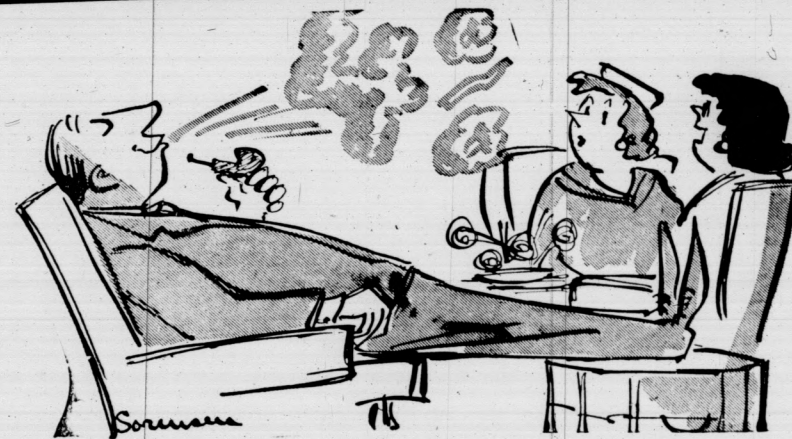

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING
FOR A LICENSE OR PRIVILEGE
TAX ON WITHIN NAMED BUS-
INESSES AND PROVIDING
PENALTIES FOR NON-PAY-
MENT THEREOF, AND FOR
VIOLATION THEREOF, AND
MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO
ENGAGE IN ANY SUCH LINES
OF THE WITHIN NAMED BUS-
INESSES WITHOUT FIRST
PROCURING LICENSES HERE-
IN, REPLACING PREVIOUS OR-
DINANCES ON WITHIN SUB-
JECT.

At a regular meeting of the

Board of Trustees of the City of
Gilbertsville held on the 17th day
of July, 1961, the following were
present: James C. Owen, Chair-
man of the Board of Trustees,
presiding; Roy Culp, D. J. Collins,
J. D. Woods, and James G. Dext-
er.

Upon motion by J. D. Woods
and seconded by D. J. Collins, a
quorum being present and vot-
ing yes, the following Ordinance
was adopted:

BE IT ORDAINED that a pri-
vilege tax or license tax of Five
Dollars (\$5.00) per year plus Fifty
Cents (.50c) clerk's fee on the
following named business be
levied: Hotel, Grocery, Restau-
rant, Cafe, Barber Shop, Garage,

Service Station, Domestic Gaso-
line Distributor, Fish Market,
Beauty Shop, Radio and T. V.
Shop, Electrical and Plumbing
Shop, Motels and Tourist Courts,
and any other retail or whole-
sale commercial establishment.
For the purpose of this Ordi-
nance, a Motel or Tourist Court
is defined as a place or lodging
wherein rooms are rented com-
mercially for profit containing
as many as 3 units or more.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED
that a privilege tax or license
tax of \$5.00 per year plus Fifty
Cents (.50c) clerk's fee shall be
levied for each pinball machine and for
each juke box in a commercial
establishment.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED
that a privilege tax or license
tax of Five Hundred Dollars
(\$500.00) per year plus 50c
clerk's fee shall be levied on the
following named business: Pool
room.

The Board of Trustees of the
City of Gilbertsville does further
Ordain that the within enumer-
ated license shall be due and
payable and procured on or be-
fore the 1st day of January, 1962
and each successive January 1st
thereafter, and that if any of the
within enumerated licenses are
not procured and paid for on or
before March 1, 1962 and March
1 of each year thereafter, there
shall be a penalty of 10% thereof

added to such license, and any
person paying or offering to pay
such license tax after same have
become delinquent, shall also pay
said 10% penalty thereof.

In the event any business shall
be established during any calen-
dar year, the license issued
thereof shall be pro rated quar-
terly for such portion of the year
as the license is issued and any
new business shall have thirty
(30) days from the date of
establishment to procure said
license without penalty.

Girl Scouts Seek to Buy Lake Camp Site

With the birthday slogan of the National Girl Scout 50th Anniversary as its goal the Bear Creek Girl Scout Council starts a long campaign to buy a lake camp site. The Council leased from TVA a 183-acre site on Ky. Lake for a year in the years since the thousands of girls from West Kentucky have enjoyed the camp and Troop Camps. A serious study and plan for the site is being made. Since 1945, with the help of friends and proceeds from Cooks Sale, the Girl Scouts have built up a fund of \$25,000. The plan is to buy the site for \$25,000. The land is a great deal less than the actual value of the land itself. Many are aware of the fact that TVA will not renew the lease for campsite on Kentucky Lake. After lengthy negotiations they agreed to sell the property for \$25,000. This is considerably less than what the land would bring if the option to buy is not exercised and the land is sold at

public auction. Besides the 183 acres Girl Scouts have acquired \$50,000 worth of improvements which will be lost if they are unable to purchase the site. It has been determined that borrowing \$25,000 is out of the question because the interest payments could not be met from operating funds. The only alternative is to raise the money by conducting a one-shot, council-wide fund drive to be completed within six weeks.

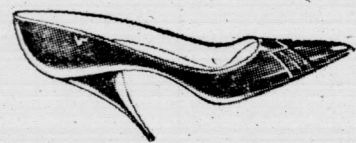

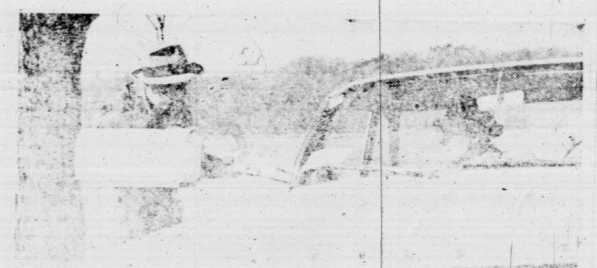

HERNIA

A hernia is a weak spot in the muscular wall of the abdomen through which internal organs protrude. It is a common condition, especially in men, and can be a source of considerable discomfort. Normally, the abdominal wall is strong and holds the internal organs in place. However, if there is a weak spot, the organs can push through, creating a bulge. This can happen at any age, but is more common in older men. The bulge can be painful, especially when lifting or straining. In some cases, the hernia can become strangulated, which is a medical emergency. It is important to see a doctor if you notice a bulge or experience pain in the abdominal area.

New Classification In Selective Service

Lt. Col. Everett S. Stephenson explains a new classification for rejected registrants as follows:

"Selective Service Regulations have been amended to create the classification of I-Y for registrants who are found not qualified by Armed Forces for military service under current physical, mental, and moral standards but who are considered to be qualified to serve in an emergency. Previously such men were placed in Class 4-F. Only men not qualified for any military service will be placed hereafter in Class 4-F."

Current standards of physical, mental, and moral acceptability are higher than those which the Armed Forces would use in an emergency," the state director said.

The Director added, "The local boards in Kentucky had anticipated the change in the regulations and are ready upon receipt of amended regulations, to reclassify those registrants into the appropriate classification."

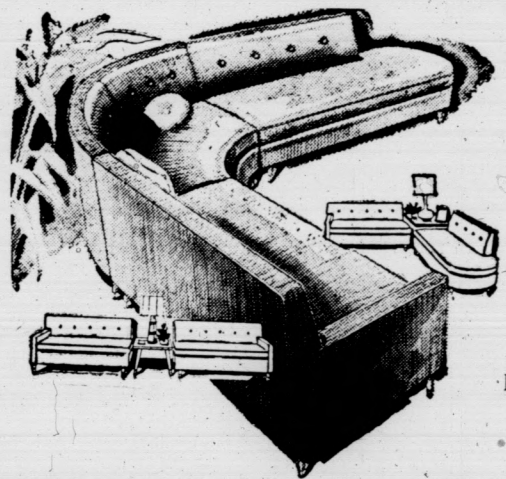
