Through Our Bifocals

The ranks of rural dwellers are thinner and thinner, a recent survey reveals that 25.4 percent of the nation's population lives in communities of 2,500 or less.

This same survey shows, however, that those rural dwellers who remain are a solid and substantial group. Of them, 72.1 own their homes, compared with a national average of 69.9 percent.

A higher percentage of rural families also own automobiles and, as a result, there is a greater mobility of two-car families in rural areas. They do more living, too, naturally.

Rural families continue larger than city families. The average rural family has 4.2 persons, whereas the national average is 3.1.

MOST OF US think of ourselves as better average persons, perhaps a little above average. Just what is average, well, a national publication recently released some averages. The figures are interesting.

It seems that half of the country's adults have completed less than three years of high school, almost 40 per cent never attended grade school.

Three out of four U. S. families have annual incomes of less than \$7,500 a year. Three out of four home owners pay less than \$10 a month on the mortgage.

Three out of four renters pay less than \$50 a month rent. And, three out of four life insurance policyholders have less than \$5,000 in savings.

Half the men in the country are less than 35 years of age, and half the women are less than 30 years of age. And, half the air trips are made by the 7 per cent of our population with incomes above \$10,000 a year.

Now, what's average?

EVERY NOW and then some, a new idea is good.

The weather bureau at Atlantic City has come forward with a good idea concerning Easter forecasts.

The bureau, headed by the "homer" of Commerce, has adopted the term "partly cloudy" in favor of the term "partly sunny."

The idea is as bright as a tropical sun. It may be that, for instance, the forecast for Florida and California is "partly cloudy" for Easter Sunday, but if they did the news, we're ready to stand up and be counted in favor of more "partly sunny" forecasts.

Even if such forecasts becloud real facts, a little.

Marshall County burley growers voted 100 per cent in favor of quotas and allotments for the 1962, 1963 and 1964 burley marketing years.

One hundred and fifty-seven burley growers visited the polls at the five communities in the county, and all voted in favor of quotas for the next three marketing years.

One hundred and eleven counties in Kentucky reported 83,136 votes in favor of quotas; 576 voted against, or a total of 99.5 per cent voting in favor.

Tennessee burley growers voted 98.4 per cent in favor of quotas.

Outdoor Theatre Will Be Built Near Kenlake

A new amphitheatre will be built in Kentucky Lake State Park near Aurora, it was announced last week-end by Henry Ward, chairman of the Kentucky State Parks Commission.

The outdoor theatre will be built on a spot between the shelterhouse and the beach area. It will be near enough to the lakefront for the presentation also of water sports events and water shows.

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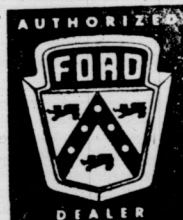

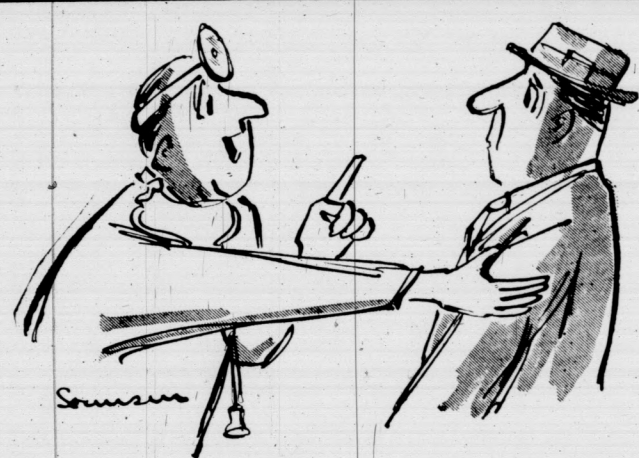

The Clean Life

Lesson for February 25, 1962

WHAT is the most valuable feature of American life? It is not the supermarkets, the big public-lane highways, it isn't the even the schools. Many even Christians

are not even the churches that are the best American possession.

What is it that the reader is invited to think which could get along without the church, but with which the church would suffer away?

The answer, of course, is the Christian home. Christian church and Christian home support each other; sometimes with an emphasis on the school, sometimes not.

What then is the inner support foundation of a Christian home? The obvious answer is Christian marriage. Failure of a marriage means failure of a home.

One of the deadliest ways to ruin a marriage is to attack it directly; no one would get a divorce hearing if he advertised himself as opposed to good homes at indirectly, in countless ways marriages can be, and often are, ruined in advance. Advance Pay Available Under Grain-Feed Plan

Producers who participate in the 1962 Feed Grain Program are entitled to payments for diverting acreage from production of corn and grain sorghum, according to W. W. Shemwell, vice chairman, County ASC Committee. Up to half of the estimated payment to be earned may be paid in advance when the producer signs up under the program.

Vice Chairman Shemwell said this program provisions should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra

ready cash during the spring planting season. Sign up for the program runs from Feb. 5 through March 30.

The program offers payments to producers for diversion of feed grain cropland to approved soil conserving uses. The program is voluntary, but farmers who cooperate must divert a minimum acreage in order to be eligible for price support on the normal production of their 1961-crop corn and grain sorghum acreage.

Payments under the program

will be in the form of a cash advance or a feed grain certificate, whichever the producer chooses. Each county will have two county average rates of payment per acre for corn and two for grain sorghum. One rate will be based on 50 per cent of the county normal yield per acre times \$1.25, \$1.93 per 100 lbs., the county support rates respectively, for corn and grain sorghum.

Farm payment rates will vary according to the farm's productivity in relation to the county average production and the number of acres diverted.

The minimum acreage for diversion from crop of grain sorghum will be determined from the "farm base" which is determined from the average acreage on the farm used in producing the crop in 1959-60. The minimum reduction is 20 per cent of the base. The maximum depends upon the
