### Tobacco Forecast Favorable

Managers of dark tobacco associations of Kentucky and Tennessee, Messrs. R. A. Hamrick, Eastern dark fired, Springfield, Tenn.; C. W. Maloney, Stemming district, Henderson and Holmes Ellis, Western Dark Tobacco, Murray, advise growers-members that export prospects for the immediate future continue favorable.

However, over a long period exports may be expected to decline gradually and at a slower rate than before World War II.

Factors adversely affecting exports include the worldwide trend toward lighter tobaccos and especially cigarette types, increased use of substitute tobacco from Italy and Africa available at lower prices than

American dark tobacco and foreign governmental policies encouraging the use of European or home grown tobacco.

European manufacturers indicated a strong preference for American types of dark tobacco. However, they pointed out that Italian and African dark tobacco was uniformly graded and available at lower prices though they do not carry the flavor and aroma of American dark types.

The association managers called on European manufacturers, importers, and agents seeking information concerning the future prospects for dark tobacco and dark tobacco products. They visited factories and observed the use of American and other

### Coomer Family Benefit Program is Arranged

Some folks have good luck, and some have bad luck.

The Charley Coomer family of Benton has had more than its share of bad luck.

The family — Mr. and Mrs. Charley Coomer and their five children — live in a four-room house battered by time and wind in the Westtown section of Benton.

Two months ago, the house was badly damaged by a windstorm and there was not sufficient insurance to make proper repairs. In rainy weather, the house leaks. And in the winter, cold winds blow through the many cracks in the dwelling.

The Coomer family also has had more than its share of sickness. In 1949, one of the daughters, Maybelle, now 15,

was stricken with polio and since that time she has been confined to a wheelchair. Her legs and hips and one shoulder were left paralyzed by the dreaded polio. But Maybelle is a courageous girl and has resumed her school work. She is in the sixth grade.

The eldest son, Joe Brooks Coomer, 19 years old, had a rheumatic heart condition when he was 14 years old. And he had to learn to walk again when he recovered from the disease.

But with all their misfortunes, the Coomers are a happy and hard-working family. Mr. Coomer works at the Roberts Pontiac and Implement, Inc., in Benton and Mrs. Coomer does housework for other families.

The children, all except Maybelle, also work when employment is available. Besides Maybelle and Joe Brooks, the other children are Ludelle, 15, William, 14, and Kenneth, 13.

And most any night, neighbors can hear music and laughter at the Coomer home, for all of them are musically inclined. They sing religious and folk songs to the tune of a guitar. And to hear them play and sing, you would think they never had a single trouble or care.

But despite their hard work and their courage, misfortune has been greater than they have been able to cope with properly.

So interested citizens are planning a big benefit party for the Coomers on Saturday night, July 21, at the Fairgrounds in Benton.

The Coomers are going to play and sing at the party, and several quartets also will appear on the program. There will be an admission charge, but all of the money taken in will go toward helping the Coomers get back on their feet. The money will be deposited in both Benton banks as a trust fund for the family. Everybody in the county is invited to the party.

The Coomers moved to Benton seven years ago from Grand Rivers.

## Man of the Week

Honored this week is not only a man who is our town doctor, but a man who is a tireless worker for promoting community spirit and furthering the growth of Calvert City—he is "Doc", William Joseph Colburn, M. D.

Dr. Colburn, son of George W. and Tena Alexander Colburn, comes from a large family, four boys and four girls. He was born in Murray in 1925, and was reared on a farm. He graduated from Murray High School and received his B. S. Degree from Murray State College in 1948.

In 1952, he was graduated from the University of Louisville with a medical degree, and later interned at St. Vincent's Hospital in Toledo, Ohio, until 1953.

Though he had gone to grade school with his wife, he met her again in 1944, and married her in 1945, while serving as an Air Cadet in Kingsville, Texas. Mrs. Colburn is the former Mary Elkins, also of Murray. They have five children—Linda Annette, 10; William Richard, 8; George Edward, 6; Philip Martin, 3; and Timothy Wayne, who will be a year old this summer.

The Colburns moved to Calvert City in June of 1953, through the influence of the industrial plants of the area. He is plant doctor for Pennsalt,

Pittsburgh Metalurgical, National Carbide, B. F. Goodrich Chemical, American Aniline, General Aniline and Film, Air Reduction Sales, and Air Reduction Chemical.

The youth camp is a joint effort by the Departments of Conservation, Welfare and Economic Security.

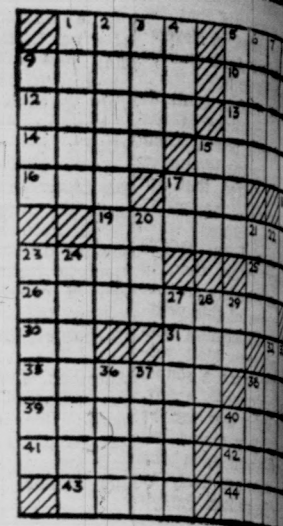
