## 'CITY OF MIAMI' MAKES INITIAL RUN

Acclaimed by thousands who have inspected the Illinois Central's new City of Miami as the most beautiful train and forecasting that it will be the most talked-about train in America the diesel-powered streamliner left on its initial run from Chicago Wednesday morning, December 18, arriving in the Floridan resort city 29 1-2 hours later.

Participating in the ceremony, which were broadcast, incident to the christening just before it started were Commissioner James A. Dunn of Miami, nine honorary hostesses sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Miami, J. L. Beven, president of the railroad, C. A. Liddle, president of Pullman-Standard Car Manufacturing Co., and members of the train crew. Miss Charlotte Beven, younger daughter of Mr. Beven, christened the train with water from Biscayne Bay.

The City of Miami is a luxury coach train which will seat 254 persons. It will operate between Chicago and the city for which it was named every third day. Departure from Chicago at 9:40 o'clock in the morning brings arrival at Miami at 4:10 o'clock the following afternoon, just 29 1-2 hours later. Departure from Miami will be at 6:25 P. M., with arrival in Chicago at 10:55 o'clock the following evening.

The City of Miami makes a striking appearance in the unusual design of its orange, green and scarlet color scheme. No less intriguing is the interior of the spacious coaches, dining and lounge-observation Florida cars. Semi-tropical Florida has contributed the blues of the skies, the blue-green of the ocean, the yellows of the fruit, the greens of the foliage and the sand tones of the beaches, to create an atmosphere of the territory it will serve. Native Florida woods, bamboo, sheet cork and the beauty of Florida scenery have been worked into the decorative treatment and have been combined and blended with many mechanical innovations to result in a perfectly-appointed train.

Exclusive of the regular members of the operating train crew, the personnel complement will total 17 persons, as follows: steward, stewardess, two coach attendants, club car porter and assistant, train porter and six waiters and four cooks.

A public address system and radio, reaching every section of the train, are among the many features that are new and different in the City of Miami. The train is air-conditioned and seats are all reserved.

## FARMERS TO ATTEND STATE CONVENTION

A considerable number of farmers and farm women in Fulton County are planning to attend the annual Farm and Home Convention at Lexington, the last week in January, County Agent S. V. Foy announces. More than usual interest is said to prevail in this year's state meeting of farm men and women.

There will be meetings for stock raisers, dairymen, poultry keepers, beekeepers, rural pastors, fruit growers and for men interested in special problems of soil conservation, agricultural adjustment, marketing, crops, and the like.

Attendance at this convention has been increasing every year, and special accommodations are being arranged for the large number expected this year. Women will have meetings of their own throughout the four days. It is expected that at least 2,000 women will attend.

## Christmas Season Celebrated Before Christ Was Born

Strange as it seems, the Christmas season was celebrated long before Christ was born. Of course, it wasn't called Christmas then, but many religious and pagan ceremonies were held during the Christmas period.

This period is celebrated by the Jews as the Festival of Lights or Dedication. According to Jewish history, a large force of Maccabees defeated an army of Syrians in 165 B. C. The victors began the work of purifying the desolate Jerusalem, completing their task on December 25. The Jews have celebrated the eight days previous to December 25 ever since that time.

The proximity of Christmas to the winter solstice caused many pagan ceremonies to be held during that period. In Scandinavian countries, great fires were kindled in the middle of December to defy the Frost King.

Centuries before this, the Druids of England observed the earliest recorded history of that great empire. The pagans celebrated from December 17 to 24 in honor of their sun god. Among the slaves and lower classes, the celebration was transformed into unrestrained orgies.

Even the ancient Egyptians celebrated the Midwinter festival. Near the end of December they rejoiced over the birth of Horus, son of the god Isis.

### COUNTY AGENT

It is a well known fact that by giving a cow a rest period milk production will be increased in the next lactation period. There are two chief reasons why this is true; the more important being that during the rest period there is a rebuilding of body reserve and storing of fat and minerals in the body to be used in the next lactation period. The other reason is the effect of the rest period on the recuperation of the secreting tissue within the udder.

Investigators have shown that the production of the subsequent lactations increases with a lengthening of the dry period. This, linked with the fact that increasing the rest period shortens the length of the current lactation period, makes it obvious that there is a limit to the length of the dry period that is the most economical. Longer dry periods are needed for first calf heifers than for older cows. This is due to the greater need for growth and development in younger animals.

Under average conditions the best results are obtained with a dry period of from 40 to 50 days for older cows and from 60 to 75 days for young cows milking in their first lactation. Certain conditions alter the length of rest period required. Cows very thin in flesh require longer rest for building up necessary body stores and sail, undeveloped heifers need longer rest periods.

The dry cow should be fed liberally with carefully selected feed. As the body stores are made principally of fats and minerals, with only small amounts of protein, the feeds should be adequate in calcium and phosphorus and energy, with only slightly more protein than is necessary for maintenance. The guide for a satisfactory ration should be the diet of the sow.

When excellent legume hay is available, the cow can be fed on pasture can be furnished with amounts of concentrates necessary. Cows very thin prior to the dry period, however, should be fed up to 8 pounds of concentrates. When non-legume hay or roughage produced on poor land, it is advisable to add bone meal and ground limestone to the ration to supply necessary calcium and phosphorus.

During warm weather, cows may be let out on pasture usually for feed and exercise. When weather should be cooler and turned out to exercise.

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### THE PARABLES BY THE SEA

LESSON TEXT—Mark 4:26-32: Matthew 13:44-50.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Never man spoke like this man.—John 7:46.

Parables as a means of conveying truth reached perfection in the hands of the Master Teacher, Jesus. Taking short stories of well-known events or facts from daily life, He presented profound truth in the most simple and attractive form.

Except for the parable of the four kinds of seed which He interpreted (Matt. 13:18-23), He left it to His listeners to make their own application. This has led to some difference of opinion, but in general the parables are received as excellent and helpful portions of God's Word.

In the two passages of Scripture assigned for our lesson, we have five parables, each with a distinctive message, yet together pointing out that there is a time of growth leading to harvest and judgment, and that our gracious God has at great cost provided a way of redemption.

**I. Normal Growth Is Blessed** (Mark 4:26-29).  
God is patient. He awaits the normal, healthy, steady growth of the seed. Man is so impatient he must have forced growth, artificial stimulation, and even artificial
