Youth Day Will Open County Fair

Youth Day at Marshall County Fair will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 21, opening day of the five-day fair.

The program will start at 1:30 p.m., DST, with invocation by Rev. Terry Sills. There will be 4-H song and yelling contests and musical events by the Hungry Five of Benton High School and the Girls Trio of Brewers.

Jimmie Miller of Hardin will give a reading. A Girls Trio of Hardin and Fairdeal students will sing. There will be a Brew-ers duet and a boys quartet from North Marshall will perform.

A string band from Fairdeal will play and Fairdeal students will present a folk dance. A Hardin duet, Bobby Warren and Sammie Washam, will perform.

Athletic events will include such events as sack race, three-legged race, standing broad jump, soft ball throwing, 50-yard dash, rolling pin, throwing, slipper kicking, suitcase relay, bicycle race and animal imitation.

These events will be for both boys and girls.

Teachers in charge of events include Cleo Hendon, Howard Dunnigan, Charlie Lampley, Robert Goheen, Earl Walker, Terry Sills, Glenn Warren, John Hicks, Joe Nall, Reed Conder, Gordon Chester, Roy Jones and Jesse McNutt.

Blue ribbons will be given winners, and also each winner will get a one-day pass to the fair. All school pupils will be admitted to the fairgrounds free on Tuesday, Aug. 21.

School buses will operate from the following schools: Sharpe, Calvert City, Gilbertsville, North Marshall, Briensburg, Fairdeal, Aurora, Hardin, Brewers and New Harmony. Students who desire to ride buses to the fair Tuesday, Aug. 21, should go to one of the above schools.

George E. Little of Route 6 is the new member of the Farmers Home Administration county committee for Marshall County, according to information received from the county FHA supervisor this week.

Mr. Little's appointment became effective July 1. The committee on which he will serve determines the eligibility of local farmers who apply for Farmers Home Administration loans.

The new committeeman carries on a general type farming operation in Marshall County. He succeeds Roy Vasseur of Route 7, whose term expired this year. Each member is named for a 3-year term and one appointment expires each year. A member completing his 3-year term cannot succeed himself. At least two of the members must be farmers.

This agency makes loans for farm operating expense, purchase of livestock and equipment, and loans to buy, improve, or enlarge efficient family-type farms in this area.

A representative of the Farmers Home Administration is at the local ASC office every second and fourth Wednesday morning from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., DST.

Drug Store Burglars Are Sought

Law enforcement officers were seeking suspects this week in the burglarly Monday night of Nelson's Drug Store in Benton.

Main clue was a set of fingerprints found on a screwdriver used by the burglars to open one of the store's three cash registers.

An undetermined amount of cash and narcotics was taken by the thieves.

The burglarly was discovered Tuesday morning by Arch Nelson and Mrs. Katie Major when they arrived to open the store for business. They found the front door unlocked and, after investigation, discovered that the three cash registers had been emptied of cash and that a quantity of morphine had been taken from the narcotics case.

Arch Nelson said he did not know how much cash and narcotics were taken and would have to wait until his son, Albert Nelson, owner of the store, returned from a druggists' convention at Louisville to appraise the loss.

The back door, located in the basement of the store, also was found opened.

Paducah police took fingerprints in the store.

Mr. Nelson said he closed the store Monday night and felt sure that everything was in order and that he locked the front door when he left.

How the thieves got in the store still is a mystery as no doors or windows were broken or pried open.

Garbage Franchise Requested

The Benton City Council, in session Monday night at City Hall, was asked to offer for sale a garbage collection and disposal franchise. The request was made by Howard Copeland and William A. Combs, both young men in their 20's. The typewritten request was presented by Mr. Copeland in person.

The proposal suggested that a franchise be sold for a systematic collection and disposal of garbage, both residential and business, within the city limits.

It was suggested that the garbage be collected not more than two days per week and that these days be specified so as to avoid confusion.

A fee of 25 cents per collection was proposed for all residences. No fee was proposed for business firms because of different requirements of the various firms.

The two men promised, if they should get such a franchise, to furnish a conveyance for garbage that would meet all the requirements of the health department. They also proposed to dispose of the garbage in proper manner at the city's dumping grounds.

City Councilmen discussed the matter but reached no decision. The City Council would like to hear the wishes of the general public on the proposal.

The Council will discuss the problem again at its next meeting on Monday night, Aug. 13. The public is invited to attend the meeting.

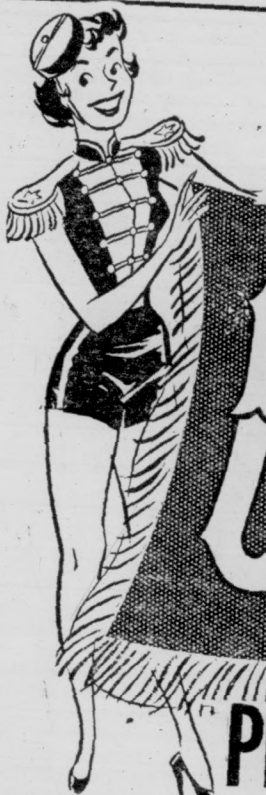
AUTO STORE IS ROBBED; TWO MEN ARRESTED

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: John 13:3-15, 34-35; 1 John 1:3-17; 2 John; 3 John.
Devotional Reading: Philippians 2:1-11.

Fellowship

Lesson for August 12, 1956

THE word "fellowship" is bandied around a good deal without people's always knowing just all that the word can mean. When some men use the word they may mean no more by it than lunching in the same place with other men of about the same age and salary bracket, once a week, calling one another by their first names and in general acting as jolly as possible. This is some distance off the meaning of the same word "fellowship" as we find it in the New Testament. There it is a very important word. Indeed it sums up all that the Christian church is and ought to be at its best.

With God

Fellowship—the word, that is— even among Christians can be misunderstood. It is not just the same thing as "sharing." Some forms of sharing, or what goes by that name, are not fellowship at all. The writer was in a meeting once where a good deal was said about sharing with the needy of the city and in other lands. Toward the close of the meeting it came out that what was being planned: an old-clothes drive. Everybody present was exhorted to go through his or her attic and closets and find clothing, hats and what-not that wouldn't be used again, and to have these ready on the porch when the boys came by for it. Of course that was not real sharing at all, it was only a scheme to get rid of some fire hazards, to tidy up for full housecleaning. Real sharing always involves giving up something which one would otherwise have been glad to use. But even real sharing may not be fellowship as the New Testament has it—not as our Lord and the beloved John meant it and practiced it. A traveler can share a seat on a bus when he would much rather sit alone. Fellowship is sharing-with-love, it is a sharing love.

With Man

It is a striking fact that although John is writing to and about the Christian church, he writes two of his three letters without ever using the word. Perhaps it was too cold and formal a word for him, although Paul loved the word "church" and so may we. But John did not want to be misunderstood. So he uses simple words like "God's children," "brothers." The church is the place for fellowship among God's children. In a real church, there is bound to be a closer, dearer tie between Christian and Christian than there can be between persons outside the church, or between Christians and outsiders. What brings Christians together in the first place is not simply themselves as human beings. It is their fellowship with God. It is because they are so close to him that they become close to one another. Now fellowship with other Christians in the church is again more than sharing. Even on the sharing-level, how much of it is done in the typical church? What do "members" of the same church share? Pews, hymnbooks, the same sermons, preacher, potato salad at church suppers? All this may be the doorway to Christian fellowship, but still not quite it. Two people can sit at opposite ends of the same pew, and out of the same potato salad bowl, for years on end, without ever finding out what real fellowship means. It is only when they really share the love of God, when together they let his love flow through them in joyous service in his name, that they discover Fellowship.

Learning How

Christian churches would wither without Christian homes. Little children learn lessons in living first at home before they learn in Sunday school or church. Father, mother and children can learn together what Christian fellowship is, and if they do, they will know what the preacher is talking about. If they do not learn at home, the minister, and the Bible, will seem to be talking in a strange language. Actually, there is not a great deal of time to practice fellowship in the church. Maybe one spends five hours a week there; it's more than most do. But there are 168 hours in a week; what about the other 163? If the church is the lecture-room for fellowship, the home is the laboratory. The Bible tells us that it will work. Home is where we can find out how right it is.

Health Tests for County Students Slated in August

The State Board of Education requires all students entering school for the first time to take physical examinations. The Benton-Marshall County Health Department in order to accommodate the children of the county and Benton, have arranged the following schedule for health examinations.

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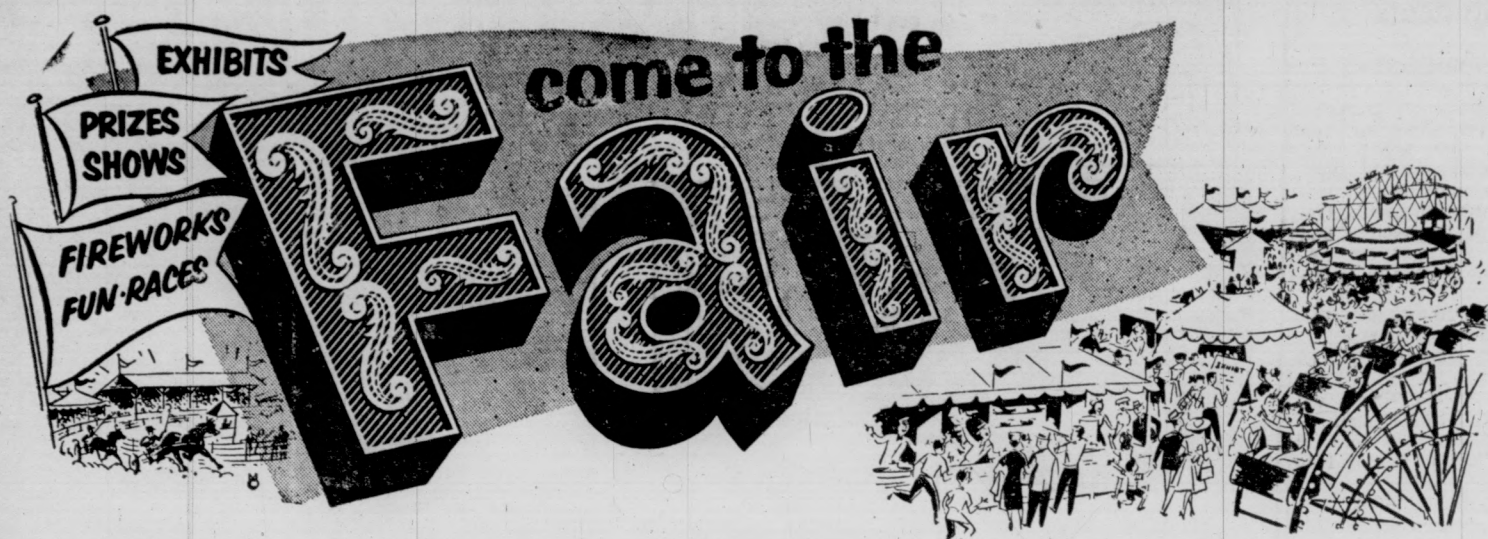
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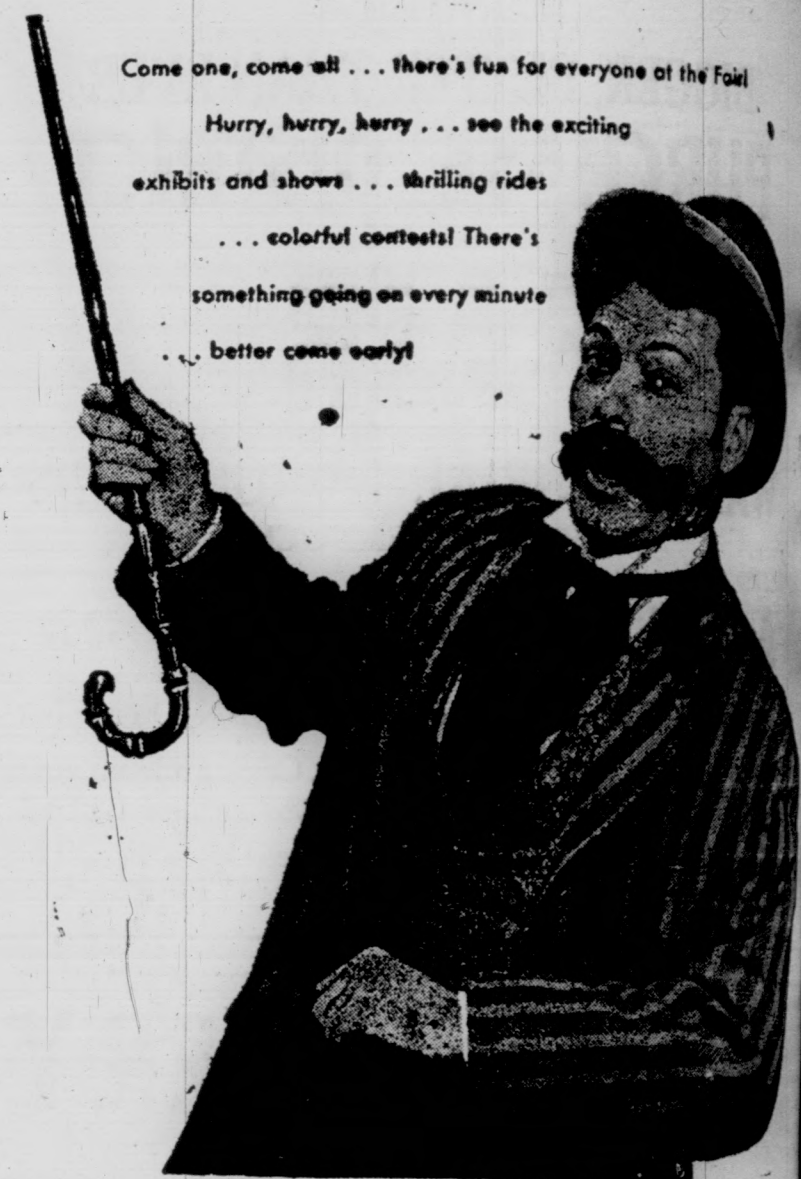

Traffic Deaths In 1955 Were Greater Than War Casualties

CHICAGO—More Americans died on the highway alone than on the battlefield during the entire Korean War!

The National Safety Council's statistical yearbook, "Accident Facts," just off the press, shows there were 38,300 traffic deaths in the United States in 1955. Official Defense Department records list the battle deaths in the Korean War at 33,629.

We don't for a moment want to imply that the highway is as hazardous as the battlefield," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council. "But the fact is that the loss to the nation from the 1955 traffic toll is greater in terms of human life than the loss sustained in the Korean War. Therefore, it's certainly worth getting excited about."

Approximately 1,350,000 Americans were injured in motor vehicle accidents during the year, the Council said.
