Third Industrial Tour of Kentucky Slated Sept. 24-27

The third Kentucky Industrial Tour will be held Sept. 24-27. The tour will cover the area of the Commonwealth generally described as West Central.

Northeastern Kentucky was covered last winter on the first tour and Western Kentucky was the scene last spring of the second tour. These tours provide an opportunity for manufacturing companies and consulting firms, engineering and plant location specialists to see a lot of Kentucky in a brief time.

The third tour will begin with registration, a reception and a dinner at the Brown Hotel in Louisville. After the three-day jaunt through the state, the tour will return and disband in Louisville.

On the first day, the tourists will visit Shelbyville, Taylorsville, Bloomfield, Springfield, have lunch in Lebanon and proceed to Campbellsville, Greensburg, Munfordville, Horse Cave and Cave City, where the first night will be spent.

Pheasant Hunting Will Open Oct. 1 at Ky. Dam Village Park

A controlled hunt for pheasants and other upland game in which shooters will be assured of the opportunity to bag a limit of birds will be conducted near Kentucky Dam Village State Park, Conservation Commissioner Laban Jackson announced last week.

In the hunt, tentatively set to open Oct. 1, sportsmen will be charged for each bird they kill on the 1,500-acre controlled range. A "package deal" is being considered, officials said, which a hunter pays a sum for a number of birds, lodging and meals at the park.

The pheasants, raised in captivity, will be released at the start of hunting periods. Hunting parties will be accompanied by guides. Bird dogs and kennels will be available, but hunters may bring their own dogs.

Jackson said the hunting lodge will be a club house at Kentucky Dam Village Airport. The club house, electrically heated, has all modern conveniences and a snack bar. Over night lodge, cottage and dining facilities are available at the park.

As hunting will be restricted to a pre-determined number of hunters in the field at one time, reservations should be made for the shoot, Jackson said. Prospective participants were advised to call Superintendent B. J. Clout at the park.

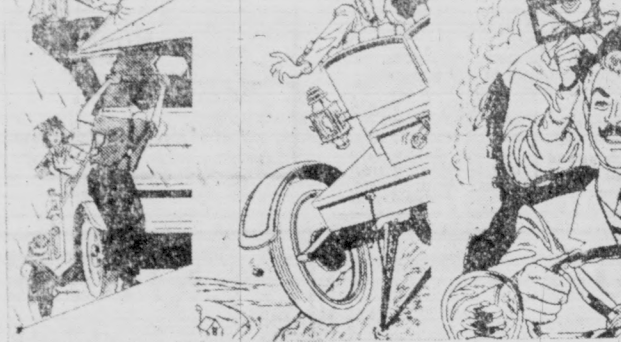

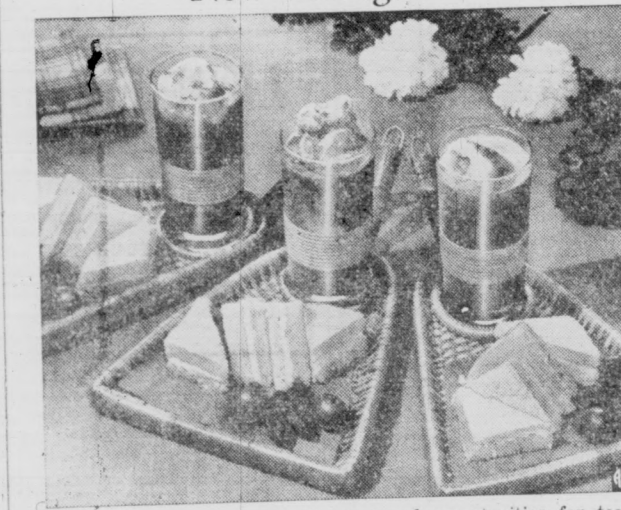

The State Fair buildings are magnificent, no other word describes them. I hope as the years go by every Kentuckian will see them. The very grandeur of the setting makes boeing a Kentucky Governor there even more disgraceful and I do not wonder that everyone seems ashamed now. I heard one fellow say that he was so mad about the traffic jam he joined in the boeing simply to vent his rage. He didn't mean to miff the Governor. You know Governor Chandler said he was miffed.

I saw a lot of funny things that were not supposed to be funny. A stylishly dressed girl in the crowd and exceptionally pretty she was too. She was wearing a tight fitting dress and of all things a chicken-feather hat! I'm telling the truth. I know that hat was made of chicken feathers though they were dyed the color of the dress. It was a sort of hen's nest affair pulled down to her eyes. What did a crowd of farm women including me do after she passed us in the Colliseum? We listened as we were admonished not to miss the style show that afternoon in the Stadium. When we got there who do you think was putting it on and for Simplicity patterns at that? None other than Miss Chicken-Feather Hat and a mighty good job she did of it too.

I took in the fiddlers' contest. There were 20 contestants and each played four different tunes. By the time I had heard 80 tunes I didn't care whether they were playing Irish, Washawoman or what. I knew only that it was lasting too long. I sat there and thought of the pleasure of hearing Will Karnes and Oscar Estes play mandolin and guitar at Peachie and Hulet's parties.

The square dance! Ah, that is what thrilled me! I read later that the Scott County Brier Jumpers won and I was glad they beat the young ones. Some of the men were bald headed and the women looked as if they had just finished helping their husbands bale hay but they could dance. So could the young ones for all that but they won most of the awards in other contests so I say let those who never jittersburged win in square dancing. However, I would make a mighty poor judge for a square dance.

I saw the rodeo horses, Gene

Autrey's cowboys and cowgirls but I didn't go back to see their show. My brother, E. E. Heath of Reidland, once went clear to Wyoming to see a rodeo. Why do they draw such wildly enthusiastic crowds? My Western horse, Fuzzy that I used to race around Bald Knob, looked better than any horse they had.

Oh, the fancy ways farmers have taken up! I could hardly believe my eyes when I saw hands of tobacco tied, not with the leaves, but with rubber bands. They are taking up stiletto office ways. An agent had some magnetized rubber bands and he explained that if one was left on the tobacco the machine he had on display would stop until it was taken off. I told him common rubber bands are good enough. If one gets in some fellow's cigaret it serves him right for smoking so much.

I must get back to my typewriter. I can play at being a farm woman again for only two days.

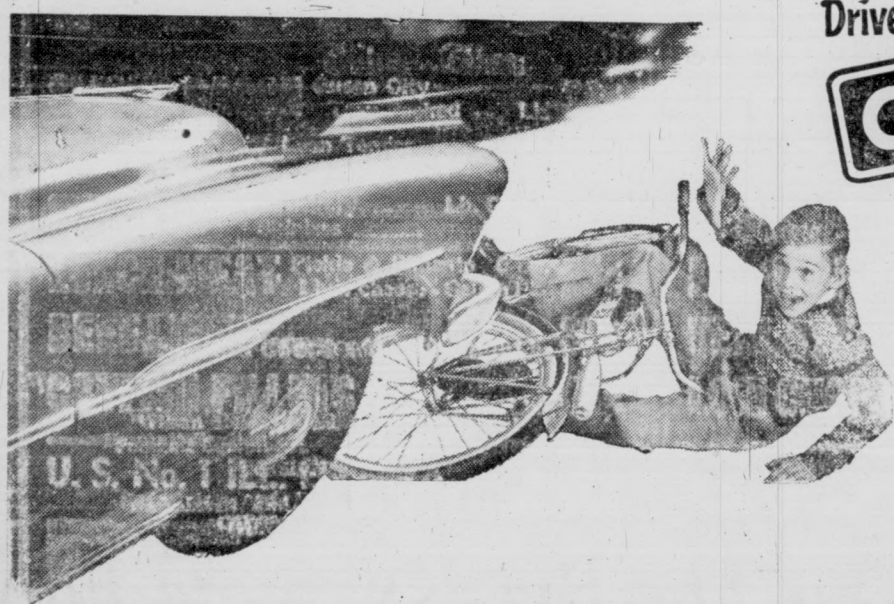

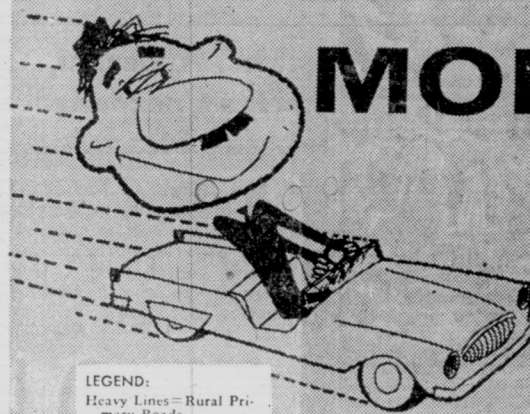
