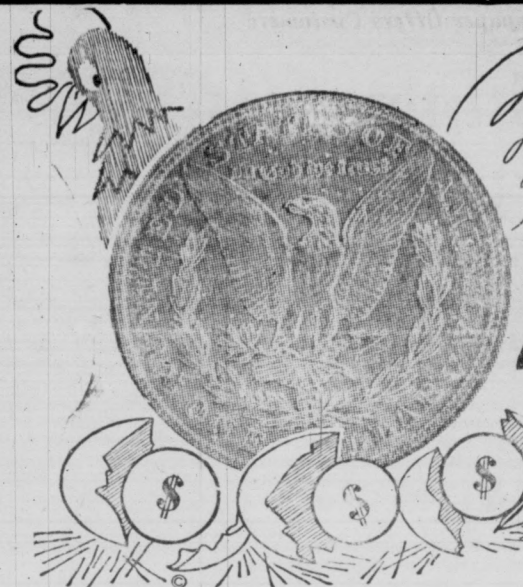

## Fire Increase Shows Need of Precautions

The 1955 fire record, higher than that of 1954 in almost every way, emphasizes the need for full-scale observance of Fire Prevention Week, says Fire Chief Van Wyatt of Benton.

Fire Prevention Week is Oct. 7-13.

Referring to figures compiled by the national Board of Underwriters, Chief Wyatt pointed out that in 1955 fire took an estimated 11,000 lives and destroyed property valued at \$855,218,000.

In urban areas, there was an increase of almost every kind of fire. Residential fires numbered 291,324, almost 2,000 over 1954. The grand total of all fires was 499,044, more than 10,000 above 1954.

Home fires continued to be the most common type of building fire. In 1955, they represented 35 percent of all fires, a slightly greater percentage than the year before.

Chief Wyatt urges every household in the community, therefore, to increase his efforts to locate and eliminate fire hazards in his home.

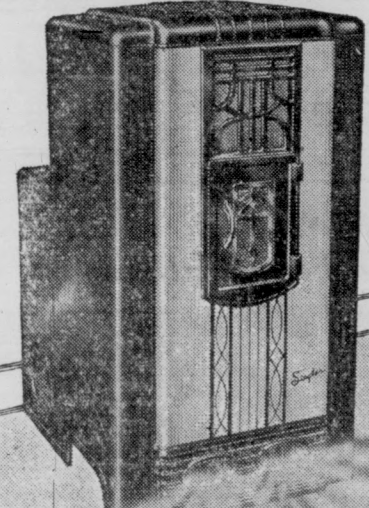

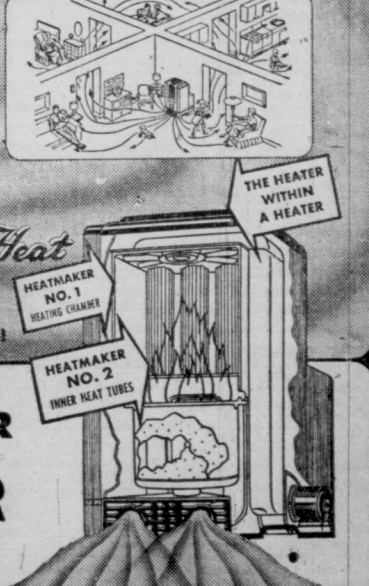

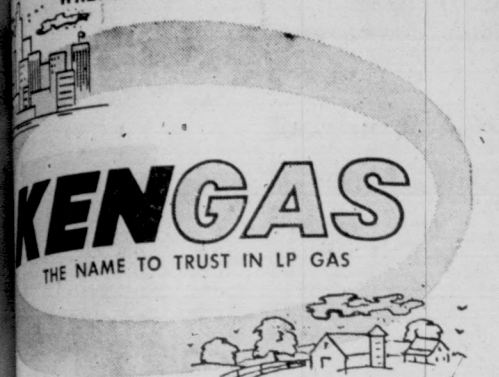

## The Farm FRONT

BY J. HOMER MILLER

Leemon Downing brought  
four soil samples into the of-  
fice last week. A. C. Palmer  
brought one sample. Soil tests  
show the available plant food  
in the soil. You can then ap-  
ply needed amounts for a given  
crop.

Grasses, legumes, and certain  
small grains should receive a

good start.

A good goal for 1956 is to put  
a cover crop 100 per cent of the  
row crop land. Certain plant  
foods are water soluble and will  
get away unless you have some  
green crop growing.

Gaston Fiser reports harvest-  
ing over 20 bushels of soy beans  
per acre.

The grain sorghum that was  
planted last summer will soon  
be ready for harvest. The pros-  
pects look good for a satisfac-  
tory crop. You may want to try  
this as a new feed crop on your  
farm next year.

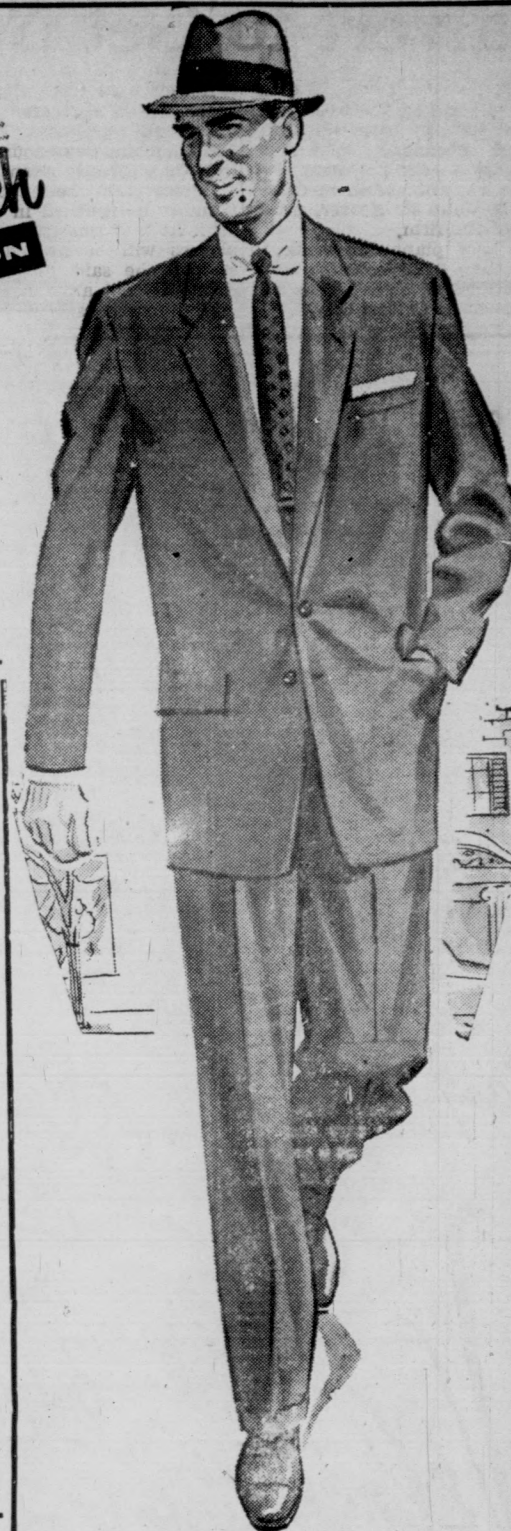

# Calvert to Get New Plant

B. F. Goodrich Chemical Company will build a \$2,500,000 plant at Calvert City to manufacture organic chemicals known as specialty acrylic polymers.

This was announced in Cleveland by John R. Hoover, president of the firm.

The new plant will bring to more than \$17,000,000 the company's investment in plants and equipment at Calvert City.

Hoover said the plant will consist of a process building, shop, and warehouse. Work on the shop and warehouse buildings has already been started.

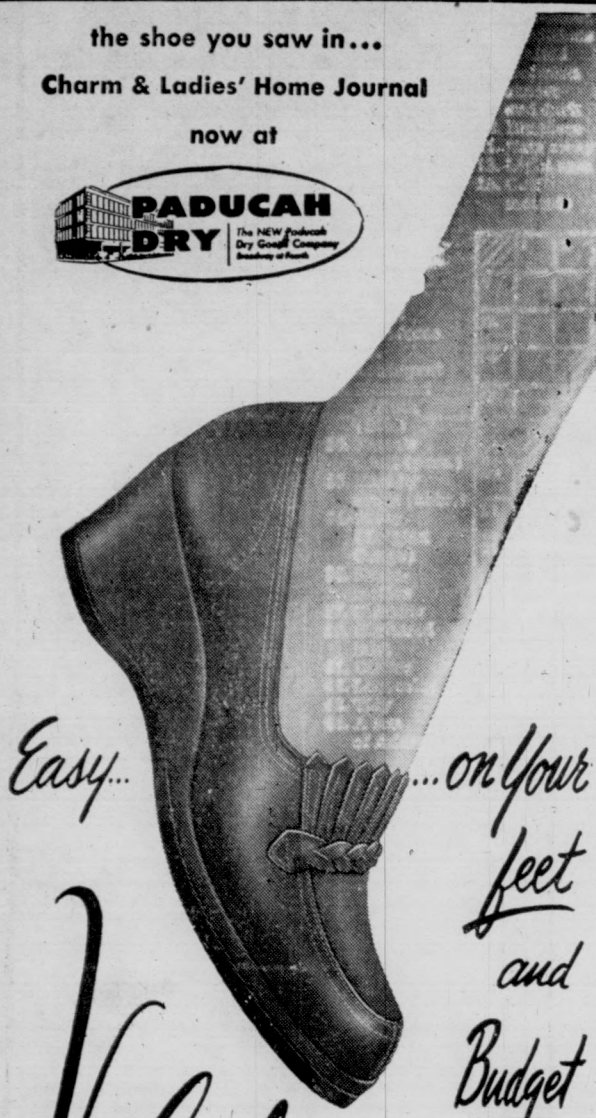
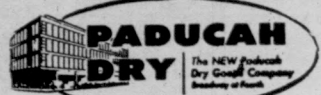
Hoover said he expects the plant to be finished in October, 1957. At that time 25 or 30 employees will be needed to operate it, he said. Size of the plant was not announced.

Uses for the specialty acrylic

polymers include textile sizing (fillings for textiles), binders for foundry core sand, flocculating agents (for settling solids from liquids), and additives for pharmaceutical, cosmetic, and latex-paint formulations.

Present Goodrich facilities at Calvert City include a plant for making vinyl chloride monomer and one for making acrylonitrile. These plants employ about 165 persons.

## County Soil Notes

Edgar Hicks, west of Scale, Dallas Green, Will Adlich, Chester Edwards, Brewster, Lake Cunningham, Oak Level, and E. F. Mathis, Aurora, became cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District during September. The district board of supervisors agreed to furnish technical assistance as available to plan and apply the needed soil and water conservation practices.

W. F. Pritchard, west of Scale, dug two drainage ditches in September. Each of them was 1,000 feet long. They will drain low ponding areas. In the spring and fall he has been unable to get near these wet places with his tractor without getting stuck.

Henton (Buster) Farley, has completed a drainage ditch on his farm at the north side of Benton. The ditch will also benefit the farms of Dan Clayton, Roy Boyd, and George Long by providing an outlet for water draining from this land.

More than 4,000 cubic yards of earth were moved in digging

the ditch an average of four feet with a ten foot bottom. A fifty foot right of way was cleared through woods for 700 feet of the ditch. The ditch empties into Clarks River.

As your Soil Conservation Service technician, I can help District Cooperators or others who ask for financial help from A. C. P. with farm drainage problems. Such help may include methods of drainage, location of drains, and necessary survey, layout, and construction. Contact me at 1201 Poplar St., or call LA7-2381.

## SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE

Ray of Hope

X-ray radiation has long been as much a tool for treating cancer as surgery, but new techniques have given the invisible "scalpel" a keener cutting edge.

Since World War II radiation has been stepped up from one million to as high as three million volts, allowing larger total doses of X-rays to be beamed to deep-seated tumors and cancer tissues with fewer undesirable effects on surrounding normal tissue.

More recently, streams of minute electrical charges from the atom-smashing betatron have been directed at cancers in human patients. And methods of revolving the patient through the beam—resembling the familiar kitchen roaster—further pinpoint the attack so the tumor receives more radiation, and normal cells less.

A minute pellet of Cobalt 60, the so-called wonder metal, has been powerfully charged with radioactivity, making it the world's smallest X-ray therapy "bomb." The atomic pellet can be injected directly into the malignant growth where it gives off energy equivalent to a three million volt X-ray machine.

Regardless of the source of radiation, the treatment is painless and side effects are usually mild. Localized tanning or reddening of the skin, much like sunburn, may develop. There may be nausea similar to motion sickness, or mild diarrhea. These side reactions may be relieved easily by the doctor with cointments for burns, the motion sickness drug Bonamine for nausea, and other simple remedies. X-rays of course cannot be used against all cancers. Surgery, hormones, synthetic compounds and even certain viruses are also employed.
