Corn Support Rate is Set at \$1.30 Bushel

Everett Treas, chairman of the Marshall County ASC Committee, announced this week that the 1956 minimum support rate for corn will be \$1.30 per bushel.

Corn to be eligible for loan must grade No. 3 or better or No. 4 solely on the basis of test weight and contain not more than 20 1-2 percent moisture. Loans will be available from the time of harvest until a date to be announced later by the state committee, which should be approximately March 31, 1957, on corn stored on the farm. Warehouse-stored corn loans will be available until May 31, 1957.

Mr. Treas went on to say that loans will be granted on farm-stored corn and corn stored in approved warehouses. Purchase agreements will be available regarding where the corn is stored.

Indictments Made In Stabbing, Drug Store Burglary

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Atkins were indicted Wednesday by the Marshall Circuit Court Grand on a charge of "cutting, striking and stabbing another with intent to kill."

The indictment was a result of a fight last Saturday afternoon between the Atkinses and Robert Hendrickson. Hendrickson is recovering in Baptist Hospital in Paducah from his wounds. Heart surgery was performed to save his life.

Mr. Atkins, who operates a filling station below the railroad tracks, is being held in county jail under bond of \$2,000.

The grand jury, in a busy three-day session, also indicted G. W. Washburn, Arthur Faughn and Myrdol Henson on a charge of "wilfully damaging the Marshall County courthouse building."

The trio are accused of digging a hole in a wall of the county jail, located in the courthouse basement. Officials believed the hole was dug by prisoners in an attempt to escape jail.

Myrdol Henson also was indicted on two other charges. He was indicted on a charge of grand larceny in which he is accused of taking hay binder parts valued at \$65 from Paul Anderson.

Henson and Glenn Allen were indicted on a charge of breaking and damaging an automobile owned by M. A. Kent.

Arthur Faughn also was indicted on a charge of assault and battery on Mary Frances Faughn.

Raymond Alexander and George Rawls were indicted on a charge of breaking into Nelson's Drug Store at Benton and taking about \$75 in cash and \$100 worth of narcotics. They were arrested recently at Fulton.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Deuteronomy 6
Devotional Reading: Psalm 78:1-7

Home School

Lesson for October 21, 1956

NOT many people are born in a school-house. But most people in America move to some school-house before they are two weeks old. Because then they come home from the hospital; and home is the greatest school in the world. Experts tell us that a child learns more before he is six than he ever learns afterward; but at the age of six he is only just starting to school, as the saying is. It's only a saying, because he has been learning every minute since he first blinked at the light, and most of this he learned just at home. Learning is not just what is printed in books. The child learns to understand and to speak his mother-tongue; he learns to walk and run and eat and play. He learns a little about how to get along with other people. Among the most important things he learns are what never gets into a book—prejudices, habits, attitudes, both good and bad.

Learning Religion at Home

If it is true that our relation to God is more important than any other relation of life, then it is true also that the religion learned in the home is more important than anything else learned there. Suppose a child's home-school teaches everything except religion. How much hope is there that religion will become real to him? There are 168 hours in every week. Take out 56 for sleeping (it would really be more for a child) and you have left 112 waking hours. Let us suppose that little Johnnie Doe, Jr., is sent off to Sunday school by Mr. and Mrs. Doe, who take him and fetch him afterwards, but never go to Sunday school or to church themselves. That makes 112 of religion per week. If all of no religion. How much of anything?

a child going to learn if he has less than one per cent of his time to put on it? If all the religious homes of America stopped teaching religion, the churches and synagogues would soon fold up.

But Can Religion Be Taught?

At this point someone may catch us up. Can religion be taught? Isn't it "caught, not taught"? Quite so. The genuine spark is kindled only on the invisible altar of God. But in your car engine, the spark does not come to life in an empty chamber. There has to be there the right mixture of gasoline vapor and air. Without that, the sparks shine for a brief instant and go out—and nothing happens. When a farmer plants vegetables, he knows that if the seed is not fertilized, his work is useless. Everything depends on a germ he did not and cannot create. But that does not give him leave to quit his job. The gardener's job is to prepare the seed-bed in which the living seed will sprout and not die. So the home prepares the seed-bed in which the living seed of God's grace can bring forth a harvest. Speaking without parables, the home can teach a great many things about religion which can't be learned by inspiration or absorption. The Bible is high among these; in the home begins the work of filling the storehouse of the mind with treasures from the Word of God.

"When Your Son Asks You . . ."

The great sixth chapter of Deuteronomy is perhaps one of the most often quoted chapters of the Bible. In it, father and mothers are commanded to be teachers. God knows that rabbis and priests and preachers are never enough. But we find in this chapter also (among many others) this further thought: Children will not always understand all they are taught. They will ask "Why?" So, when (in the words of Deuteronomy), your son asks, What is the meaning of the testimonies and the statutes and the ordinances . . . ? The father and mother are not to dodge such questions. There is nothing meaningless about true religion; on the contrary, religion discovers life's central meaning. True religion is not a set of "scruples" as an unsympathetic sociologist has put it—not a collection of senseless "Don'ts." A great phrase in Deuteronomy put a great deal in a few words: true religion, all the commandments of God, everything we ought to believe and do, is "for our good always." Let father and mother just learn that first before they can teach it.



World War 1 Vets Will Get Dividend On GI Insurance

The first dividend in 25 years will be paid in 1957 to policyholders of 5-year term U. S. Government Insurance (USGLI), which originated in World War 1. Harvey V. Higley, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, has announced.

Mr. Higley also announced a \$25,000,000 increase in the regular annual 1957 dividend for some 5,000,000 policyholders of National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) which originated in World War 11. He said this dividend will amount to \$210,000,000 compared with \$185,000,000 for 1956, and that policyholders will receive proportionately larger sums.

The first dividend in 25 years to USGLI term policyholders will be paid out of the total 1957 USGLI disbursement of \$26,000,000 for both term and permanent plan policies. The term policyholders, numbering about 20,000 will receive approximately \$1,000,000, and the permanent plan policyholders, numbering approximately 330,000 will receive the remaining \$25,000,000.

County Soil Notes

Farm Ponds for livestock water have been staked recently on the farms of J. D. Cross, Aurora; Ted Crouch, east of Briensburg; Mrs. Refus Rose, Chester Edwards, and Will Adlich, east of Brewster; Rochie Jones, west of Benton; Olvin Fisk, Lake Cunningham, Oak Level; Jesse Barker, H. V. Moore, Charlie Walters, and C. E. Jenkins, Elva; F. R. Pierce west of Benton; Connie Watkins, Fairdealing; C. R. Vaughn, Blint Vaughn, south of Palma; William Brimmar, Gilbertville, Charlie Burd, south of Benton; L. E. Smith and Wayne Littlejohn, Calvert City.

All of these farmers, except three, are cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District. The U. S. Soil Conservation Service personnel helped them stake and survey the pond sites.

They are now waiting for the ASC Committee to approve payments for them before they start construction.

Pit type ponds have been dug on the farms of Paul Creason, Brewster, and Leon Byers, Dogtown. This type of pond can best be dug in dry weather as they are usually located in wet spots of bottom land.

The levee type of pond cannot be dug now when the ground is dry and hard. If they are dug, the cost is more and the dust which is used to build the levee cannot be compacted. Consequently the pond will probably leak the first year. Also there is danger of the complete failure of the earth fill.
