Going to school doesn't always mean studying the three R's—reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic. It can mean radioing, relaxing and recess.

Provided, of course, you are going to school by telephone and not in person.

Johnny Lovett, 11, who was injured recently in a traffic accident, goes to school by telephone. And although he is confined to bed until broken bones heal, he is not missing a day of school—not even one lesson.

Johnny's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Clay Lovett, arranged with Southern Bell Telephone Co. to install two-way equipment between Johnny's bedroom and the sixth grade schoolroom of Mrs. Jack Johnson, where

Johnny normally attends classes in person.

When classes are held, Johnny takes part by way of the inter-com system along with the other pupils. And he even tunes in for the recess playtime.

When tests are given, Mrs. Johnson reads the question to Johnny over the inter-com system and he writes the answers in his blackboard. Then he sends the completed test on paper to the teacher and she grades it.

Parents and teacher are high in their praise of the inter-com system which permits a child to carry on with school work although he cannot attend classes in person. And the charge is very reasonable for the equipment, only \$12 per month.

Yes, the inter-com system is wonderful, but most boys will insist that it is not near so much fun as playing hookey from school.

Biggest Tobacco Crop Since 1949 is Forecast

The 1956 crop of dark-fired tobacco in the Western District is expected to exceed 14 1/2 million pounds, an increase of approximately 250,000 pounds over last year, and the largest crop since 1949.

The dark air-cured (one sucker) crop is expected to be about the same as the 1955 crop of 2,822,692 pounds marketed at Mayfield and Murray.

The loan rate or support price will be approximately \$1.50 per hundred higher than last year for dark-fired and about \$1.00 per hundred increase over last year for dark air-cured tobacco.

The quality of this crop is believed to be superior to last year following a more favorable growing season. The new crop

Criminal History on the Rue Scribe

This year more than a million tourists will troop through the front doors of a half-century old seven-story building at 11 Rue Scribe in Paris, across the street from the Opera. There they will greet friends, pick up mail from home, scan the visitor's book to see if they know anyone else in town, and ask the clerks for everything from a ticket in locating a misplaced passport. But few, if any, of the millions who have made this building their Parisian "home away from home" are aware that this venerable structure was the scene of one of the thrillers in the annals of international crime—the Robbery in the Rue Scribe. It was in April 1901, American Express had occupied its offices in the building, which stands in the triangle where the Rue Scribe and the Rue Auber converge on the Place Charles Garnier, less than a year. A pre-dawn phone call brought the manager down to the office on the run one morning, to discover the company's iron safe had been dynamited. This was the first time that this new explosive, invented 34 years before in Sweden by Alfred Nobel, had been so used. William Swift Daliba, an enterprising Mid-Westerner, in charge of the Paris office for American Express, found that some of the company's most prized and expensive oriental rugs had been wrapped around the safe, to deaden the sound of the explosion. The rugs were burned and torn. Twisted gold Napoleons and other coins littered the floor. The robbery was a financial fiasco for its perpetrators, a

County Soil Notes

I went to Murray week before last for a meeting on the Clarks River problem with two representatives from the Nashville office of the Army Corps of Engineers. Soil Conservation Service personnel from Calloway, Graves, and McCracken counties were also present.

During the meeting the Engineers and S. C. S. came to a mutual agreement on the ways they could work together in the development of the Clarks River Watershed.

The Engineers stated they would begin immediately collecting engineering data needed to determine how far up the main stream they could economically

make improvements. If this date shows that the stream channel improvements which they might make would not pay off, then the proposed project would have to be turned down.

Hershel Hecker, assistant state conservationist of S. C. S. in charge of Kentucky Watershed Work under Public Law 566, stated that possibly within the next two years S. C. S. would be in a position to make a Watershed Plan on the upland portion of Clarks River.

Both the Engineers and S. C. S. were pleased to see that the people were now interested enough in the project to form the local legal organization to

be known as the Watershed Conservancy District. J. H. Morgan, west of Benton on the Symsonia road and Burd Powell east of Palma, taked ponds for livestock water in October.

R. E. Beard, north of Draffenville and Quitman Fisher, north of Briensburg, developed conservation farm plans during September. This was done in cooperation with the Marshall County Soil Conservation District.

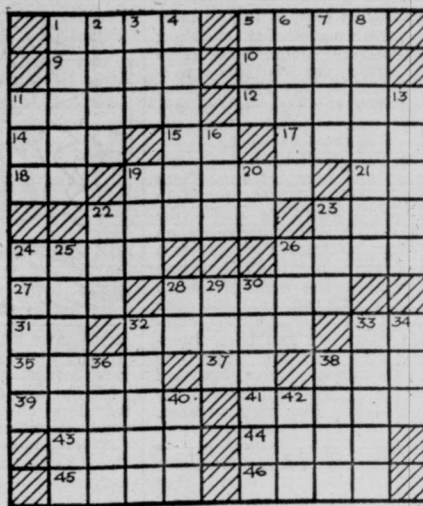

Pheasant Hunting Will Start Nov. 19 At Ky. Dam Village

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's first open season on ringneck pheasants will be held in 13 counties Nov. 19 through Jan. 17. Only the Fifth Wildlife District, composed of Pendleton, Owen, Campbell, Robertson, Bracken, Boone, Harrison, Gallatin, Kenton, Carroll, Grant Henry and Trimble Counties, will be open for shooting.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has stocked an "excessive" number of pheasants in the district. The birds do not ordinarily reproduce themselves as far South as Kentucky. They are the chief game bird in many northern states.

The limit will be two birds and both hen and cock pheasants may be shot.

available at Kentucky Dam Village State Park, where sportsmen are assured the opportunity to kill limits of birds in controlled shooting. The pheasants are raised in captivity and released at the start of hunting periods at pre-determined spots on the 1,500-acre shooting range. Hunters may contact for a "package deal," entitling them to kill a number of birds and receive meals and overnight lodging. The controlled hunting is expected to continue as long as sportsmen show an interest, possibly until March 1.

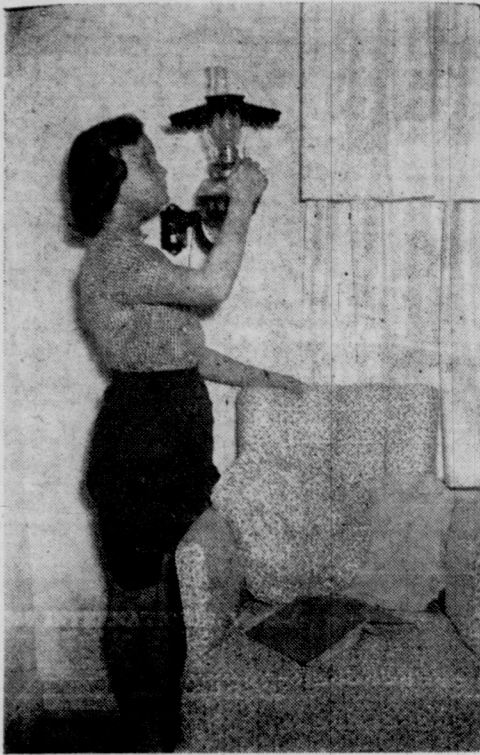

Background Scripture: Matthew 4:23-25
Devotional Reading: Psalms 15:1-15:24

Christian Persons

Lesson for November 18, 1956

WHICH is more important, what a person is or what he does? According to Jesus, what a person is, is the main thing. These two cannot be separated. On the one hand a person does what he does because he is the kind of person he is; on the other hand a person cannot be the kind of person Jesus describes without doing. The ideal character, as Jesus draws it, is not to be grown in a hot-house nor in a cellar like Dr. Foreman mushrooms. An ideal person develops only in a world of persons. But let us see. Every one of what we call the eight "Beatitudes" or "Blessed's" needs very careful study. All one thin column can do is to call attention in a very general way to three facts about Christian persons as Jesus pictures them here. Perhaps no actual Christian every fully matches the picture, the ideal; but the more a Christian resembles this description, the more these three facts will be true about him.

A Christian Is Happy
Again and again in reading the Bible we come to something that shows what nonsense it is to think of the Christian life, the God-pleasing life, as a sort of prison existence. God's requirements are not like chains, weights, handcuffs, barbed wire, electric fences. They are what makes life truly free and strong. When Jesus describes the ideal—God's ideal—character, in these Beatitudes, he begins every sentence with the word which though often translated "blessed" was the regular ordinary word for "happy." Some people get the whole business of it. It means to be a Christian, and to be a Christian, they think: What a Christian has to do and be is not pleasant, but he grits his teeth and goes through with it, hard task master, knowing that God will one day reward him for his life of martyrdom. Not at all. According to Jesus, the ideal character is the one that finds real joy in becoming more and more like our Father in heaven. Your real athlete is the man who enjoys sports, not the man who goes out for athletics only so as to earn a "letter." Your real artist is the person who loves to paint or write, not the man who writes or paints only because he has to, to make money. Your real cook is the man or woman who enjoys cooking, not the one who feels like a martyr over a kitchen range. So your real Christian is the one who is happy being one.

Christian Life Flows Outward
A second fact about the Christian life is that it is not self-centered but flows outward. It is not like a swamp into which streams flow without ever finding an outlet; it is more like a mountain lake, fed by fresh springs and kept fresh because its water flows on in a sparkling river. A person cannot be truly good if he lives to himself and for himself. Consider how many of the Beatitudes could be true of a hermit living on an island apart from other people. Very few, if any. A selfish Christian is a contradiction in terms. "Love thy neighbor as thyself" is a commandment older than Christianity; but Christ himself approved it. "What do I get?" is not the Christian's first question, but "How may I help?" This does not mean that a good Christian is a kind of meddlesome Mattie, running around sticking his finger into other people's affairs. It does mean that in the countless human contacts which he has everyday, as well as in his whole life-plan, he will not think of the world of men as merely an orange which is his to squeeze.

Out of Line?
Now a man from Mars might think that Christians would be the most popular people in the world. Everybody would love them and want them around. As a matter of fact, we have to remember that Jesus himself was bitterly hated and finally crucified. In the Beatitudes themselves there is the prediction that "all manner of evil" things will be said of Christ's followers. The simple, ugly reason for this is that this is a world still mostly out of line with God, which in other words means out of line with Love. The true Christian will always seem somewhat out of line with this world. If all men speak well of you, there must be something wrong with you.

All business sessions of the 33rd annual event will be held in the University of Kentucky's Memorial Coliseum.

Farmers to Save Money Under New Insurance Rates

FRANKFORT — Kentucky farmers are scheduled to save approximately \$225,000 a year through a new insurance rating scheduled announced by C. P. Thurman, commissioner of the State Insurance Department. Savings of about 42 cents on fire rates will be made by persons having a superior type of farm dwelling buildings on their land, Thurman said.
 Explaining the superior type building, the commissioner said these included buildings constructed of good materials, properly maintained, with central heating plants, approved electric wiring, solid masonry foundations and standard plumbing equipment.
 Credits also are allowable to the better type of barns and other outbuildings which are of superior construction and maintenance, Thurman said. Farm buildings which do not qualify as superior will be subject to a nominal increase in rates for both fire and extended coverage, he said.
 "It would estimate 70 percent of the farm dwellings and outbuildings will qualify for the new rating plan," Commissioner Thurman said.

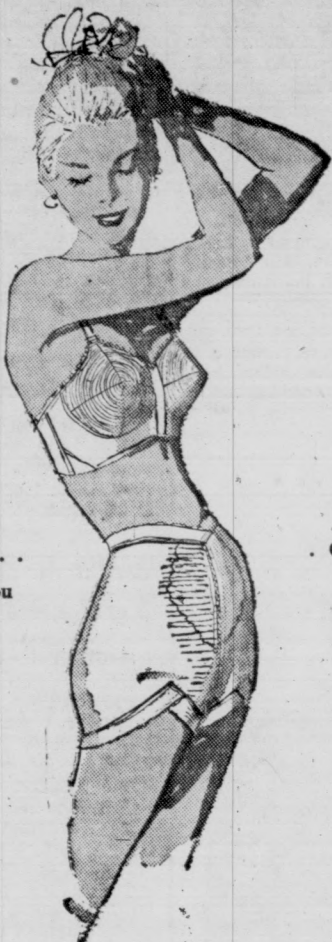
