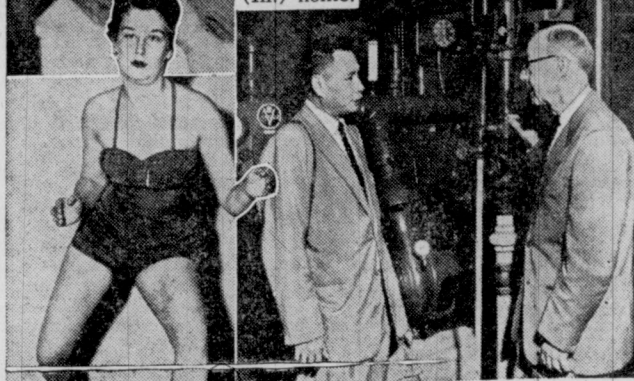

### I. C. Will Stop 2 Passenger Trains

(From the Mayfield Messenger)

The Illinois Central Railroad apparently will defy an order of the Kentucky Railroad Commission and will cancel the last two passenger trains serving this area Saturday.

Although I. C. headquarters in Chicago has officially announced that it would stop operating its two Louisville-Fulton passenger trains Saturday, the Mayfield passenger agent, Dick Loney, said this afternoon that he has received no official word about the discontinuance of the trains.

A spokesman at the Paducah superintendent's office said this afternoon he "understood" the trains would make their final run on Friday, although he added he had received no official information from IC headquarters. The Fulton trainmaster also said he had not been notified that the trains would be cancelled.

Meanwhile, Postmaster A. P. Anderson has announced a Highway Post Office schedule, effective Sunday, from Louisville to Fulton.

The IC's public relations office in Chicago has informed another West Kentucky newspaper that the trains' last operation would be Saturday night. The last train from Louisville, and the last from Fulton at 11:25 p. m.

The railroad cited these reasons for the discontinuance:

1. Lack of patronage.
2. Diversion of mail to trucks by the Post Office department.
3. Competition of private automobiles.
4. Increased costs and substantial out-of-pocket losses in operation of the two trains.

The railroad claims operating losses of the two trains runs about \$150,000 annually.

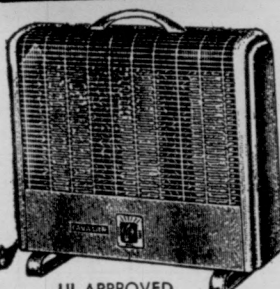

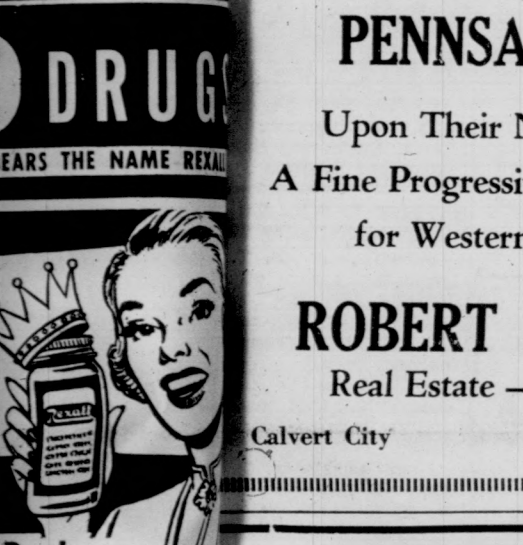

## U. S. Budget Will Cost Taxpayers of Ky. \$782 Millions

Kentucky taxpayers will be required to pay out approximately \$782,620,000 in Federal taxes as their share of the cost of the Federal spending program of \$71,800,000,000 proposed by President Eisenhower for the Federal fiscal year 1957-58, according to an estimate by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce.

The State Chamber pointed out that any reduction which Congress may make in this budget will, of course, reduce the amount that Kentucky taxpayers will have to bear.

The amount which would be borne by Kentucky taxpayers to support the President's proposed budget is 14 times the amount of taxes collected last year to finance the entire State Government budget of \$54,678,849, the Kentucky Chamber added.

These calculations show that Kentucky residents and taxpayers presently bear 1.09 per cent of the total Federal tax burden.

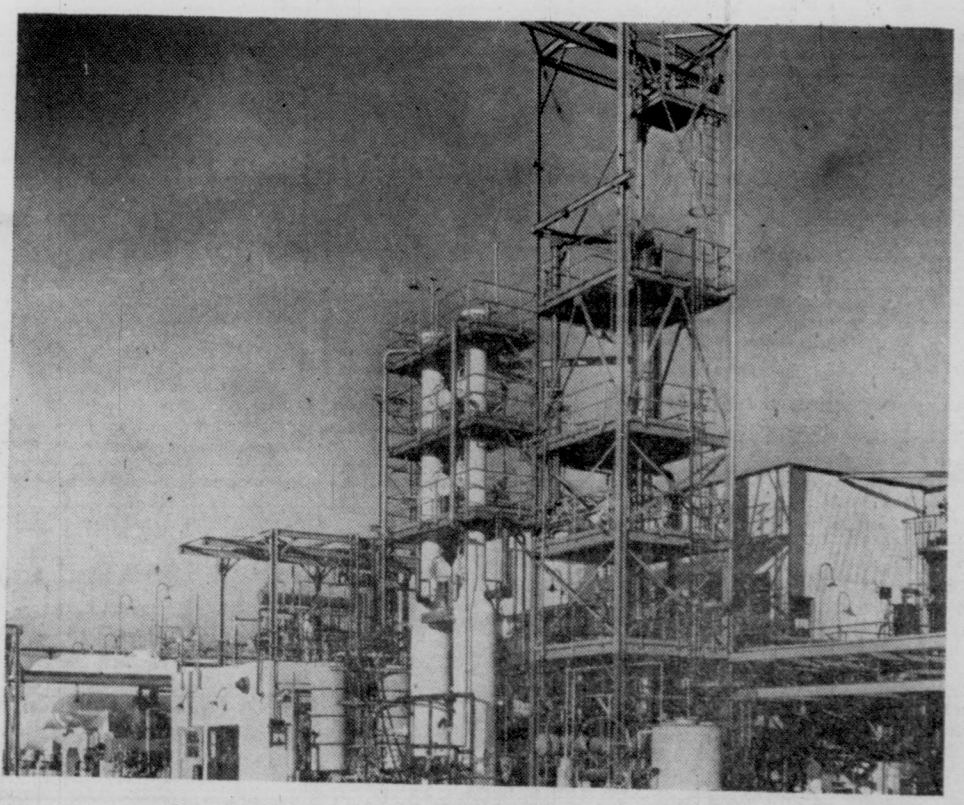
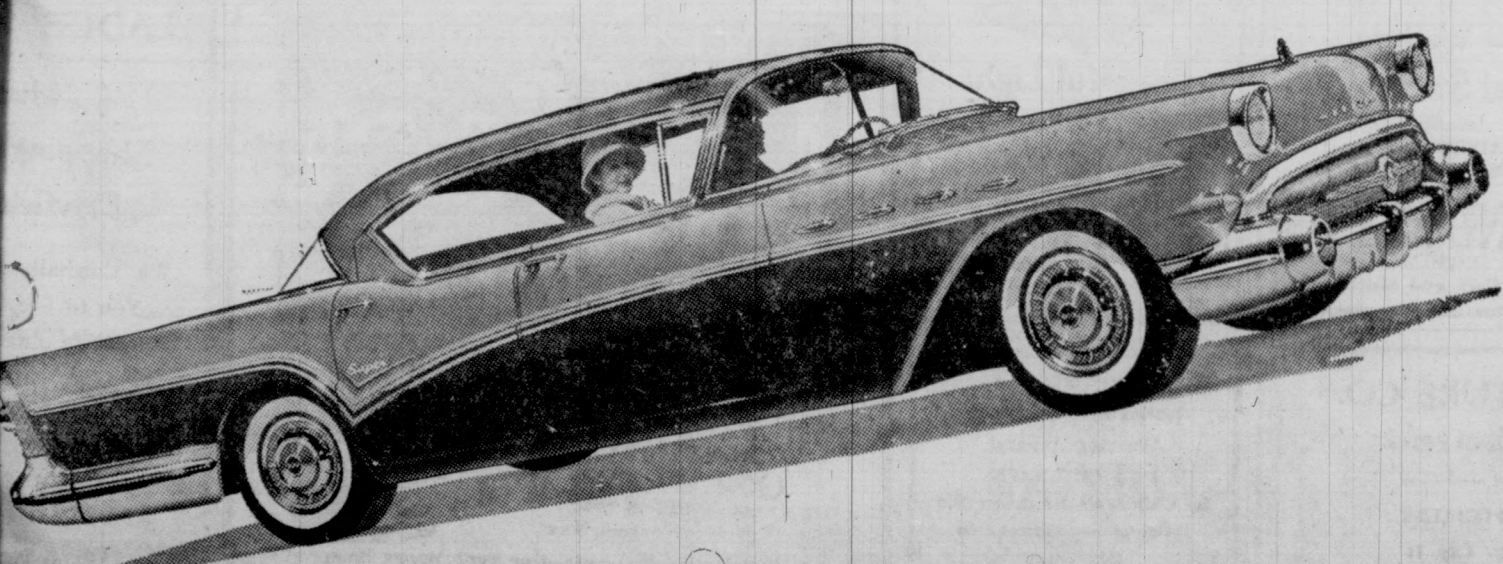

It was announced that Robert Lamb of Murray had donated his boat house to the Four Rivers Council for the boys at the Scout Reservation on Jonathan Creek.

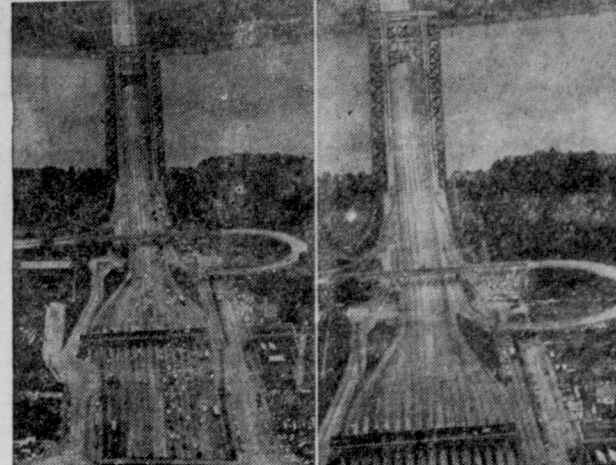

## Health and Sin

It takes a long time for some people to sink in. Sometimes it takes that a father or mother give a child a serious talk about something important, but all children remembers is that there was a talk about it. Years later, a grown man, the former child suddenly exclaim: So that's what he was telling me! The father was right. He was giving a straight talk which a few minds remembered, but not understood.

Dr. Foreman says that for years the saying of "You would be read in the Bible, and then hundreds of years later, people would discover Jesus' meaning. He was long of his time."

## People Are in Hospitals

One of these ahead-of-time hints about the relation between sin and health. In the famous story of the man who was paralyzed, brought in by four of his friends for Jesus to heal, it longed a puzzling thing that the thing Jesus said to him did appear to have anything to do with his case. "Your sins are forgiven," Jesus said. Perhaps the friends found it odd. They did find the man there to have been paralyzed, they came to him back on his feet again. It was his muscles, not his morals, seemed to need help. But saw with certain eye that the man's trouble was his body, it was in his soul. There was no use sending him back into activity, with his body but a crippled soul. That day was probably the living person who could see today the truth has dawned on many persons. ## Against the Body

Physicians, who are M.D.'s and who work hand in hand with surgeons, internal-medicine men and so on, are trained to be for these non-physical causes of disease. The causes may be mental or spiritual, — if indeed can be distinguished. A major they look for is the "guilt factor." One who hides within himself, perhaps at a deeper level, conscious memory, a sense of guilt, is a person who falls easy to disease, even to accidents. Case records are numerous which it appears that the patient began to get well as soon as he began to "get right" in his attitude to God or man, or both. It jumps to extremes here! If catch cold it's not necessarily because you've been stealing. One of the most common sins, how that many commit without aware of it, is the whole of sins against one's body, health, — against oneself. Eating drinking unwisely, undernourishment, overstrain or undernourishment, — in ways too many to be listed, — men and women sin themselves. If it is a sin to commit suicide, it is equally a sin to do anything or to form any which shortens life.

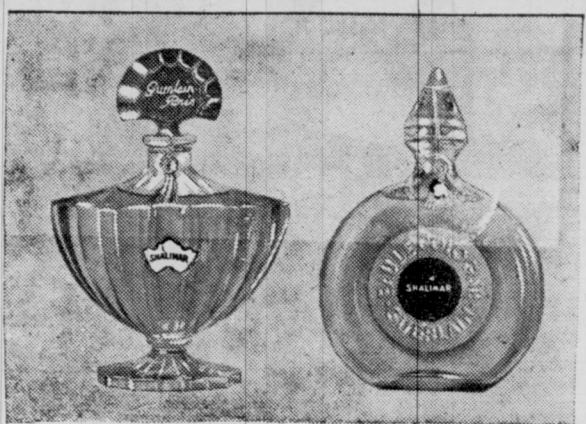
## 4-H Council Meets

Indications are that acreage set to strawberries this year will be increased over the past few years. Select adopted varieties of virus-free plants, preferably from cold storage. Fertilize according to needs. Make arrangements for your plants early to be assured of good sturdy plants.

Bill Grimmer plans to set eight acres and Charlie Cone seven and a half acres of Tennessee Beauty berries this spring. They are two of the largest growers in the county. How about you trying a small acreage?

Kelly Allen, Route 6, reported he has a supply of state inspected Tennessee Beauty, Blakemore, and Armore plants for sale. He lives on the bottom road below Scale.

Three new KY. certified corn varieties will be available this year. They are KY. 204 (white), KY. 105 and KY. 106A both yellow. All three look very good and should be tried by a num-

ber of growers this year. All have given good results in recent tests.

In a very real and personal sense, this warning system is the first line of defense for every American as he goes about his daily life under the threat of ever-possible attack.

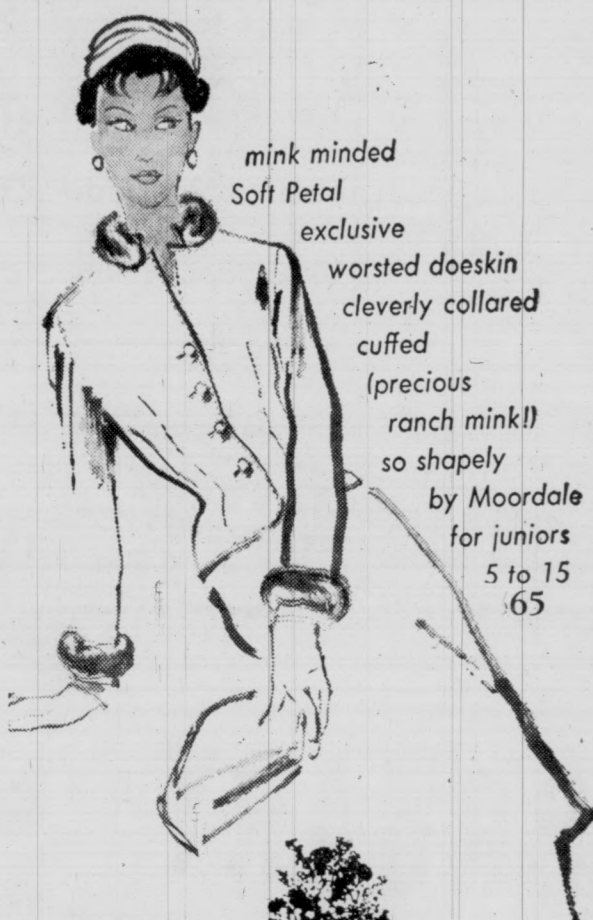

### Tax Commissioner Exam Scheduled Feb. 5 at Kenlake

Frankfort--Examinations of prospective candidates for county tax commissioner will be given in each Kentucky Congressional district Feb. 5.

Revenue Commissioner J. E. Lockett said under Kentucky no tax-commissioner candidate's name may be placed upon the ballot until he has been examined and qualified by the Department of Revenue. Persons passing the exams are given certificates of eligibility.

In addition to holding the certificate, a candidate must be at least 24 years of age at election time and must have been a Kentucky resident at least two years and a resident of the county and district in which he is running for at least a year, Lockett said.

He added that although law requires the tests be given in each congressional district, an applicant may take an exam at the location most convenient to him. Notices of exact time and location will be posted in court-houses.

The examinations, beginning at 9:30 a.m., local time, will be conducted at Kenlake Hotel, Kentucky Lake; Owensboro High School; R.E.A. Building, Glasgow; high school, Eighth and Columbia, Newport; Kentucky Utilities Co. auditorium, Lexington; Morehead State College; Hazard High School auditorium; Somerset High School library and Gardner Hall, University of Louisville, Louisville.

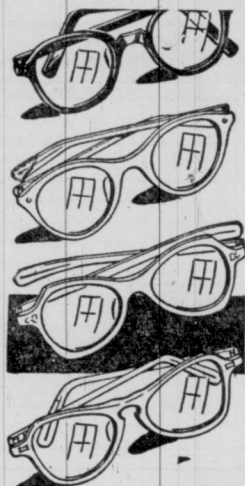

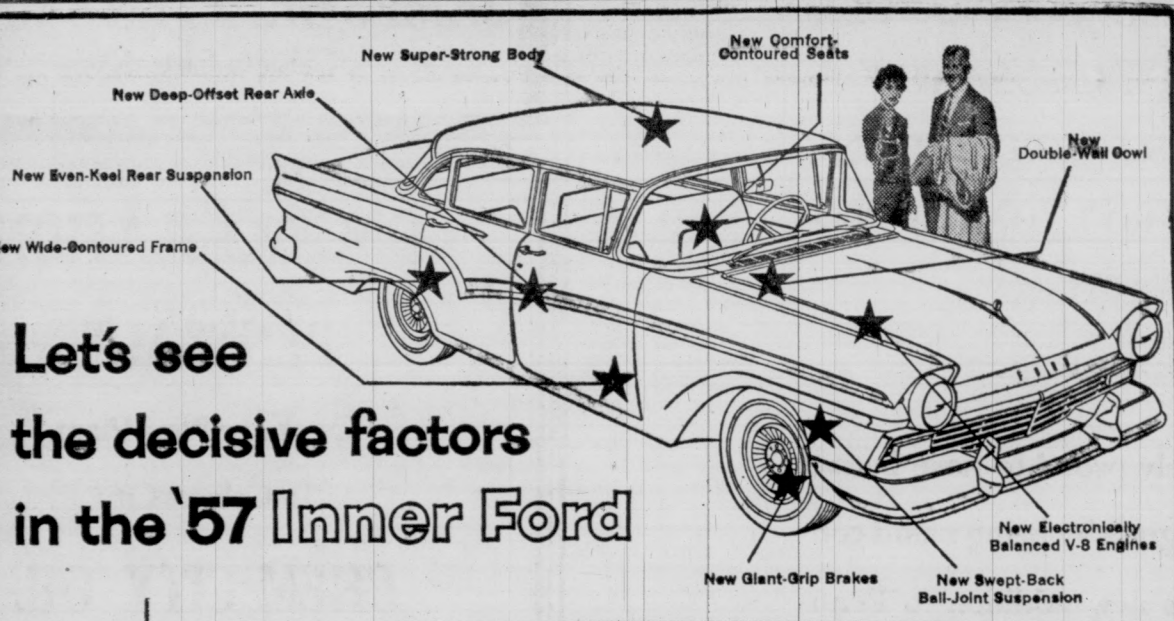

Roetta Turner, Louie King and Rita Ross were awarded prizes after a number of games were played.

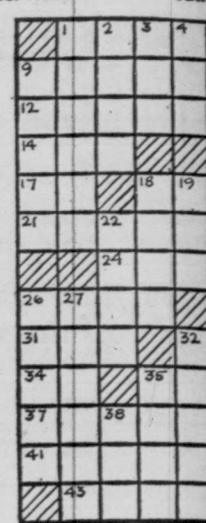

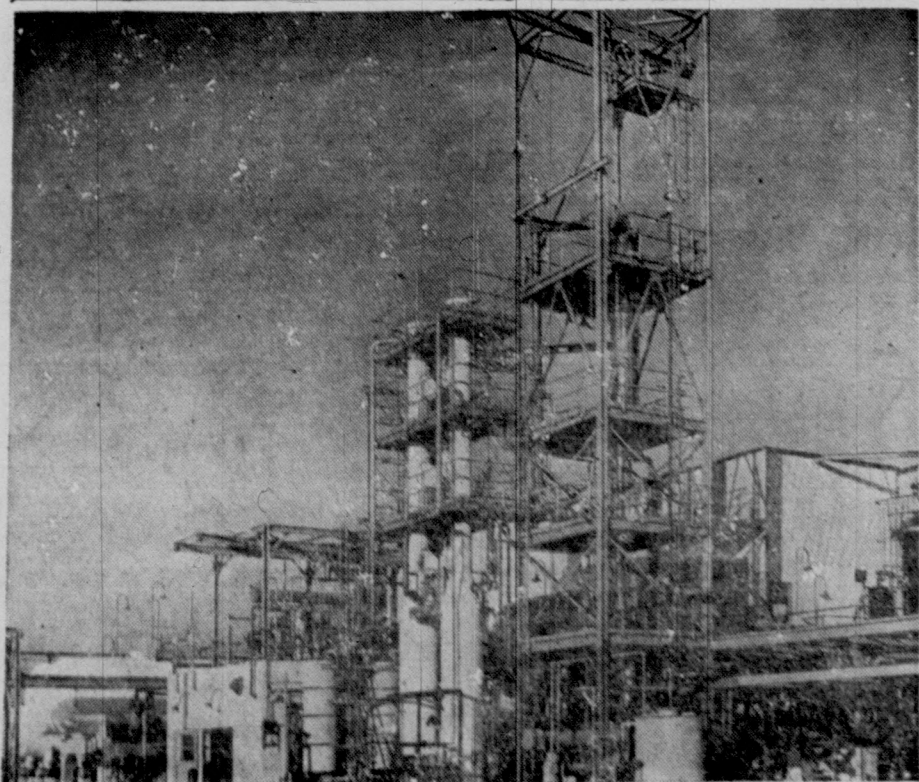
