## Boone Hill Gets Outstanding Honor

# Outstanding Honor

LEXINGTON—The Golden Sheaf Award, given for outstanding service to rural Kentucky, was presented at Farm and Home Week ceremonies here Wednesday afternoon to three Kentuckians.

Recipients were John W. Jones, Bourbon County banker and head of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association; Miss Lula Hale, long-time director of the Homeplace Community Center in Perry County; and Boone Hill, Marshall County farmer, educator, and businessman.

It was the first presentation of the award, sponsored by the



Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service, the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. K. College of Agriculture and Home Economics. It will be an annual basis "for

devotion to service beyond the call of duty," said Dean Frank J. Welch, head of agriculture college, at the presentation.

Each of the recipients got a silver engraved fruit bowl bearing the Golden Sheaf emblem.

Jones was cited for his work of more than half a century in banking, agriculture, church and business activities.

Hale founded Homeplace Community in 1925 at Calvert Heights, the behest of the late E. O. Robinson, Cincinnati industrialist and lumbering magnate. He wanted such a center to augment the sketchy rural school systems in several mountain counties and Miss Hale got it done by him.

He gave him the learning center job as extension teacher at the Robinson Experiment Substation at Quicksand, Breathitt County.

## County Soil Notes

This week is devoted to highlights from the 1956 report of the board of directors of the Marshall Soil Conservation District, organized in 1943, after 10 years of operation in Marshall County.

Meetings of the board were held last year on a regular schedule each month in the Soil Conservation office in Benton.

Each year a committee is sent to each of the eight precincts to tell him of the help that can be obtained for the establishment of terraces, farm ponds, and other conservation projects.

Two hundred and eighty acres of sericea planted and 70 ponds dug. Invitations were sent to the Clarks River Watershed project to the meeting of the board to discuss the Kentucky Conservation District Law. One hundred.

Contest was held for the vocational agriculture chapters. Winning chapters were from the Ronald Nelson High School, the scoring FFA member in the county was given a plaque.

Shipments were given to the Kattie Conder, Marshall, and Anna Howell, Benton, for teachers at Murray College.

We sponsored the soil and water conservation essay contest. \$119 in prizes were offered. Brewers and Hardin schools submitted essays.

The Long Concrete Co. of Benton purchased a set of metal water tank forms. These were furnished district cooperators and others free.

Soil Stewardship Sunday booklets were given to 10 ministers and asked to preach sermons on this subject.

Fifty-three farmers became cooperators of the district during 1956. They own 4,106 acres of farmland. This brings the total district cooperators to 813 owning 71,067 acres. There are 1,653 farmers in the district. The agricultural land area of the district is 140,835 acres.

Some of the major soil and water conservation practices carried out on cooperators' farms were: Contour farming, 26 acres; cover cropping, 1,225 acres; stubble mulch farming, 929 acres; crop rotations, 1,324 acres; pasture seeding, 1,901 acres; Sericea, 258 acres; rotation grazing, 669 acres; tree planting, 53 acres; wild life areas, 7 acres; fish ponds, 65, open drains, 3.6 miles; ponds, 70; and sod waterways, 5 acres.

More educational help is needed to sell the conservation practices of a permanent nature, such as trees, diversion channels, sod waterways, and woodland improvement.

Because of the severe erosion on many farms and low fertility

of the soil, there is need for more direct financial assistance in establishing conservation measures.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources furnished cooperators fish for stocking 65 farm ponds and planting stock for six acres of wildlife areas.

The TVA, in cooperation with the Extension Service, furnished trees for planting 43 acres of eroded land on cooperators' farms.

The Kentucky Division of Soil and Water Resources provided promotional help for our District Program. Wayne Williams is the field representative. Splendid assistance and cooperation was received from other federal and state agencies, schools, business and professional people, farm and civic organizations, newspapers, and seed, fertilizer and equipment dealers.

Our latest treasurer's report shows total receipts for the year to be \$901.00. Disbursements were \$120.16, which leaves a balance of \$1,518.84.

## Top Homemaker Plans Work

Mrs. Cecil Day of Spencer County, recognized on Wednesday, Jan. 30, as one of Kentucky's two Master Farm Homemakers for 1956 at University of Kentucky Farm and Home Week takes an active part in local and county improvement affairs.

In reply to the question, "How do you find time for your many duties in and out of the home?" Mrs. Day said she plans with a purpose, use as many labor saving devices as possible, encourages the assistance of her family, and works to improve skills in doing routine tasks.

Here are some of her recommendations for reducing house-keeping chores:

1. Avoid starting too many things at once, which leads to putting off.
2. Work at your best speed, clean up as you go, and use both hands for certain tasks, such as dusting, washing windows, etc.
3. Sit while doing long-time jobs; use portable lap table and large trays.
4. Teach children to help by making work fun; praise good work.

5. Use the best tool suited for a job and keep it handy.
6. Have work tables and counters the correct height to cut down fatigue.
7. Organize storage, and train family members to put things in place.
8. Avoid old-fashioned house cleaning by doing a little cleaning each day or week.
9. Reduce ironing to a minimum by selecting no-iron or easy-iron fabrics for children's clothing, housedresses and sleeping garments.
10. When complaining starts, check health, then do something to improve morale.

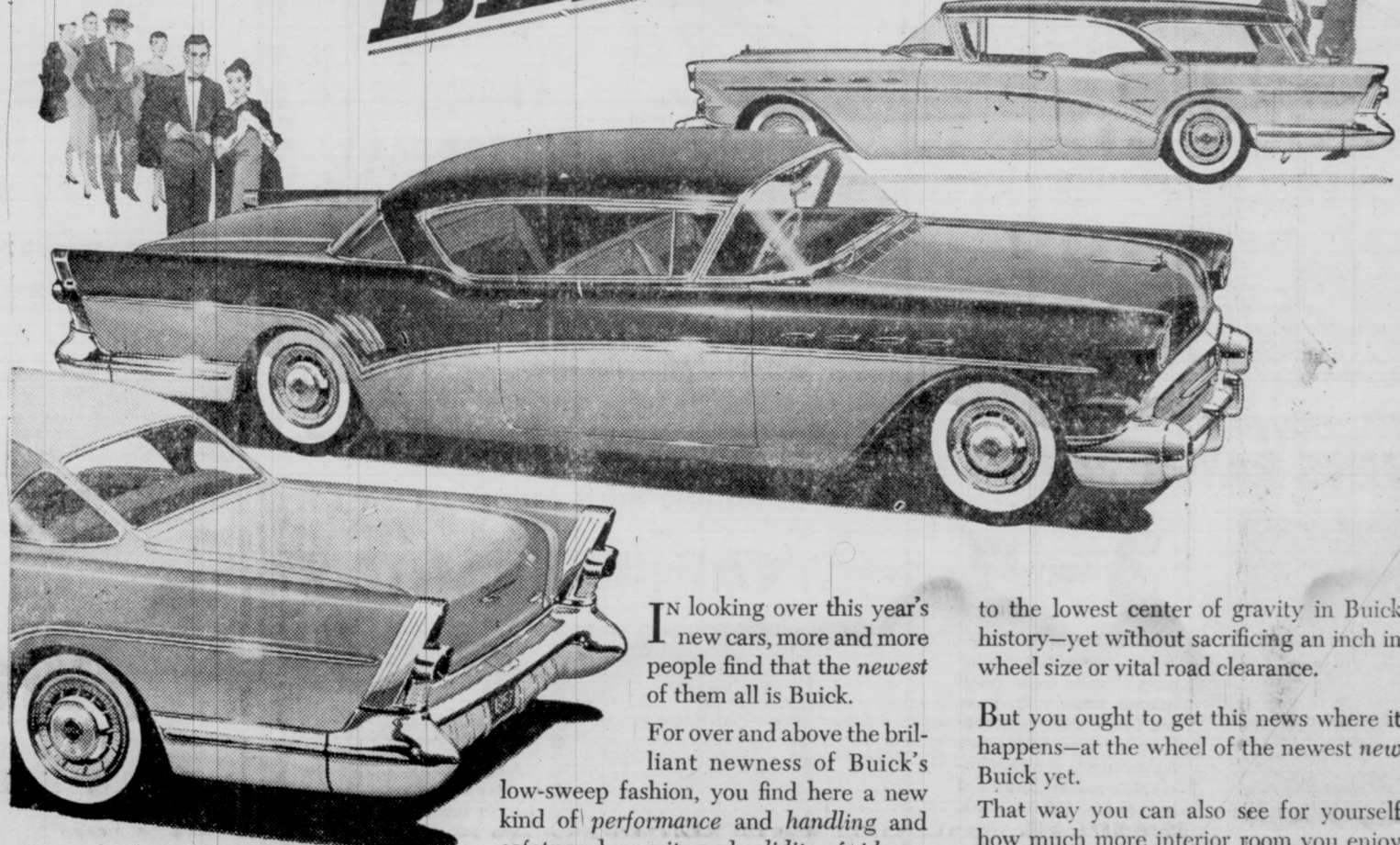

### Walter C. Kennedy Funeral Conducted At Gilbertsville

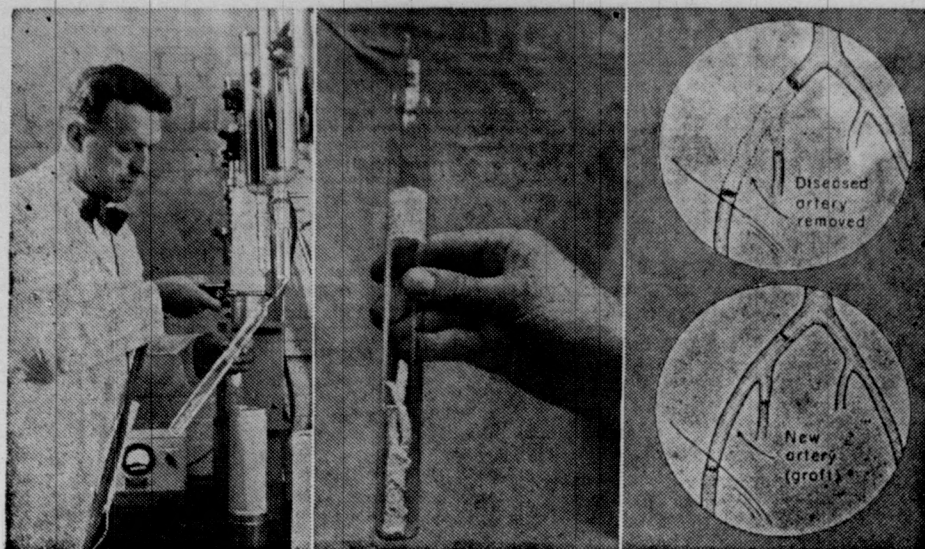
Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Gilbertsville Baptist Church for Walter C. Kennedy, 61.

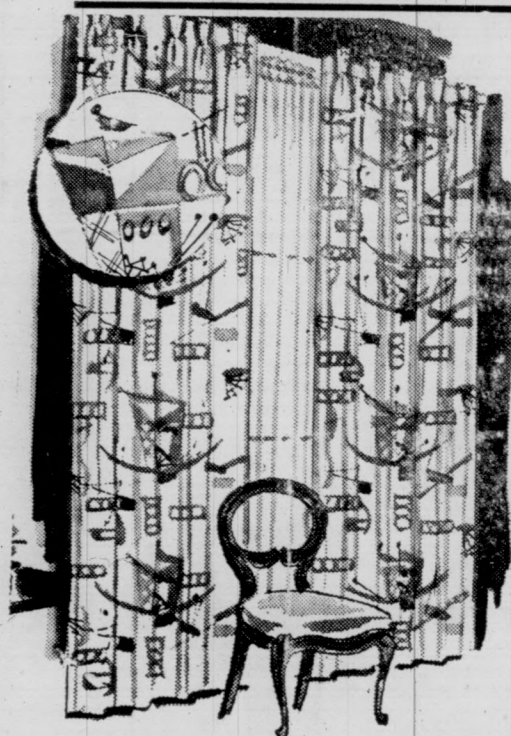

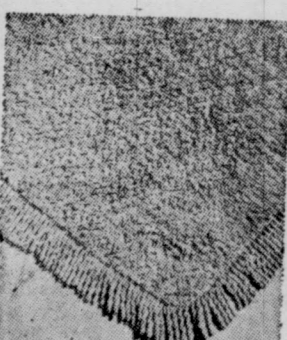

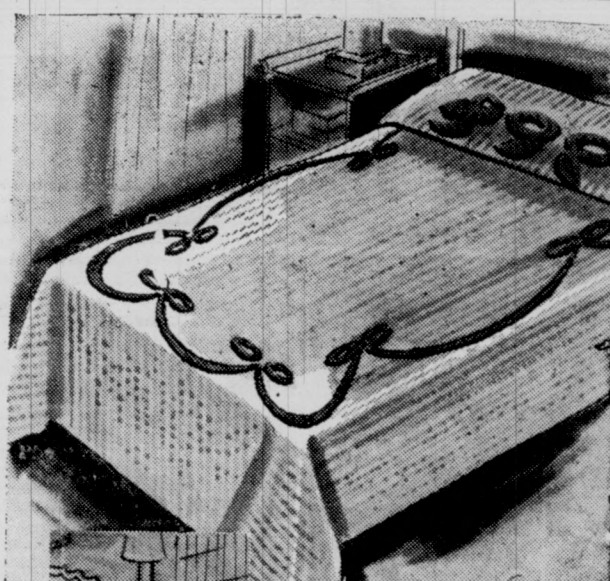

The market was extremely strong Monday, with all grades selling well. The top price of the day was \$57, and one grower sold eight baskets, all weighing more than 550 pounds, at an average of \$51 a hundred.  
Reports from sales this morning indicated another strong market today.

Velvin Smith placed the largest order of the season for pine seedlings, 10,000 trees, enough for 10 acres. If you need to stop some gullies, place your order now.

Four inches of rain fell last week. The biggest rainfall for a long time. 1.85 inches fell in two hours from 11:54 to 1:45. That is a lot of water in such a short time. Moved a lot of soil with it too.

We still have a limited number of farm record books available. If you need one, call at the Extension office. They are free.

Get your plant beds ready as soon as the weather will permit. Plant beds should be seeded about March 1. Use 2 level teaspoons of seed per 100 square yards.

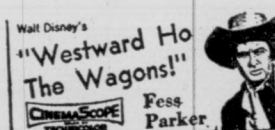

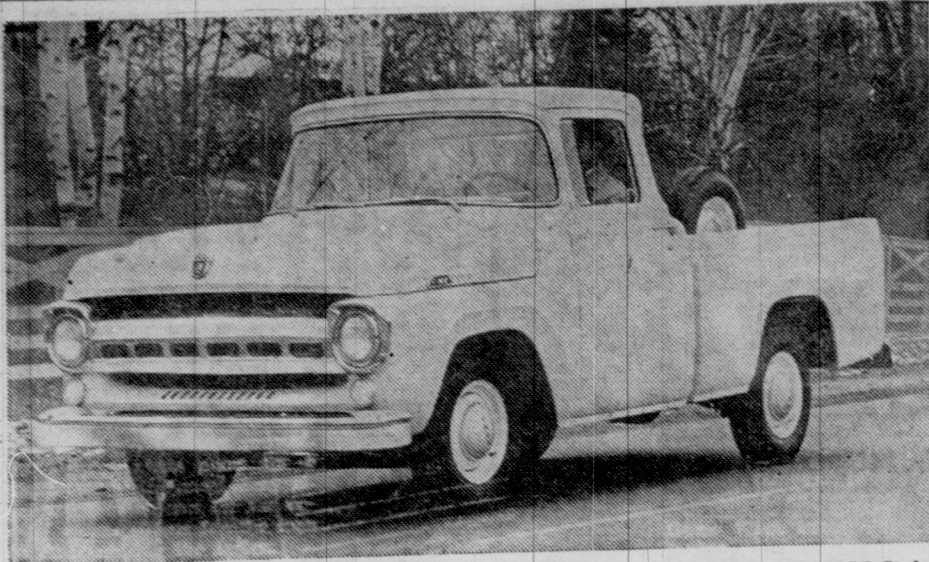

## Mammoth Cave Story Is Interesting

Most people know Mammoth Cave only as one of Kentucky's chief tourist attractions, but its geological story is of unique interest.

It has required millions of years to create the maze of corridors that make up the extensive cave system. More than 150 miles of charted avenues hold the secret of the geological ages.

Some 240,000,000 years ago, Kentucky was submerged by a shallow Mississippi Sea. In the ensuing millions of years, the waters slowly receded from the continent as an uplifting of the land pushed southward to the Gulf of Mexico. As this movement progressed, the forces of erosion increased the attack upon the newly exposed land. Rainwater soaking into the ground dissolved large masses of limestone, creating sinkholes on the surfaces and carving out a network of channels underground.

As the subterranean drainage increased, the channels grew larger. The level of the cavern streams was controlled by the level of the surface waters, of which the major stream is Green River. As the level of Green River became lower, the underground water dissolved more limestone, forming new crevices in seeking low levels. Then the cave stream again flowed along a horizontal course carving out new chambers. This process was repeated five successive times until Echo River follows its course on the fifth and lowest level of the cave, about 360 feet underground.

The process of carving out barren rooms and corridors is the first stage of cave formation. The second stage occurs when the water with calcium carbonate in solution slowly seeps from the ceiling of the cave. Stalactites form on the ceiling and grow downwards as the water evaporates. When the water flows faster than it can evaporate the water drops to the floor forming stalagmites, which build upward. It is estimated the process requires about 100 years to form a cubic inch of the cave anyx. The multi-colored formations are caused by varied minerals in the limestone.

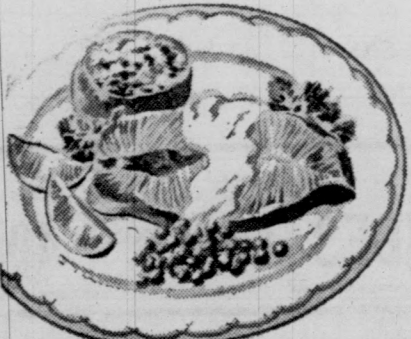

# INCOME TAX FACTS No. 1 How to Save Tax Dollars

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, and the Kentucky Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

Between now and April 15 over sixty million Americans must file a tax return to report their 1956 income to the federal government. On the basis of past experience about 1 out of every 4 returns filed will contain an error of \$2.00 or more. Last year these errors totaled over \$100,000,000.

To help you prepare a correct return and avoid mistakes that cost you tax dollars, this newspaper is printing a series of eight articles prepared with the help of the national and state organizations of certified public accountants.

Today's article deals with problems faced by almost anyone who has to make out a return. Later articles will give special hints on deductions you may take, particularly if you own a car, home or business. Use this series along with the official instruction book which comes free with your tax forms.

## Common Mistakes

According to the results of a sampling by the Internal Revenue Service, the mistakes most often made by taxpayers fall into these four groups:

(1) Incorrect listing of income. This is the main source of error, partly because of debatable questions involving business income. Individuals make mistakes too by leaving out such items as interest on savings accounts, dividends and contest winnings, or by including items which are exempt.

(2) Errors in personal deductions. This category includes the deductions taken when the 10 per cent "standard deduction" is not used. Important deductions from income are: state and local taxes, interest paid on loans, charitable contributions, medical expenses, losses from storm, fire, flood or theft.

(3) Claiming too many or too few dependents. Exemptions are allowed for the taxpayer himself and for certain persons he supports, if they fit the definitions in the instruction book.

(4) Faulty arithmetic. This is the cause of the fewest number of errors, but approximately 80 per cent of these arithmetical mistakes are made by the taxpayer against himself, resulting in approximately \$19,000,000 in overpayment of taxes. The first thing to determine is whether you should file a return or not. Everyone whose gross income was \$600 or more in 1956 must file.

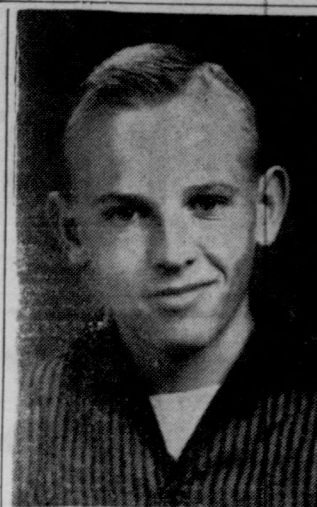
Second prize of a \$75 bond will be awarded to Ben Boston Barnett, 17, of Route 1, Hickman.

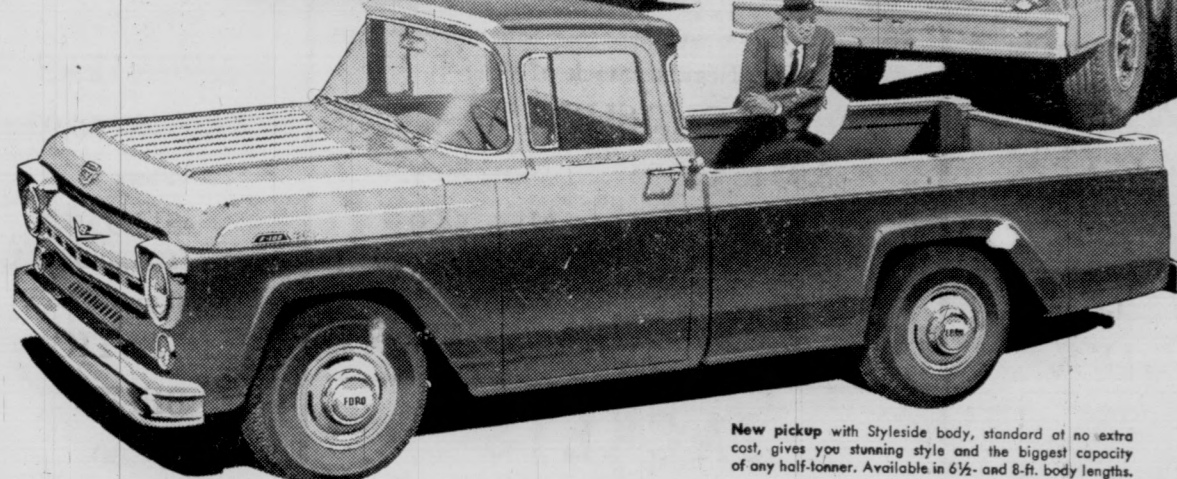
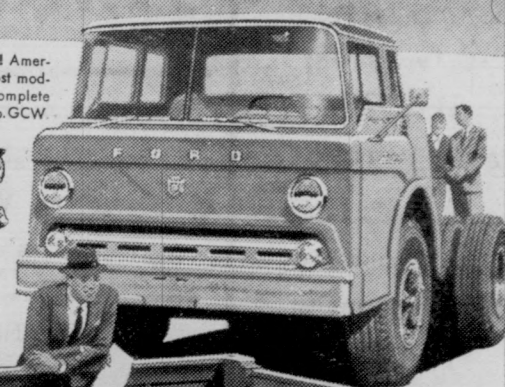

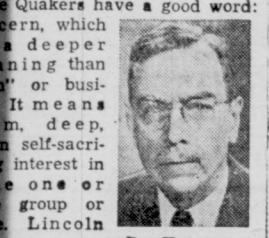

**Going Concern**  
Lesson for February 3, 1957

GOING concern" is one that prospers, does business and is growing. If the Christian church is not a going concern, the reason is that it is not going concern. That remark is explaining; it is not meant as a joke.



The Quakers have a good word: a concern. Dr. Foreman says a concern for Gentiles; mothers have a concern for their children. The church, if it is the true body of Christ, ought to share his concern. We know what it was that concerned him—people, the multitudes, the masses as we speak of them. The church ought to have—and to be—a living concern for all sorts and conditions of men.

church without the human, human concern which Jesus had, is what Christ intended. Furthermore, the church, so far as it is Christian, ought to be a going concern, not only a sitting concern, but a praying one. The body of churches are (so to speak) sitting concerns. The church preaches about "lost" people but nobody gets out to hunt them—perhaps the preacher isn't looking very hard himself. The members talk to one another about the dreadful state of the world, but they do nothing about it. They say, "What's that?" The fact that their denomination is actually going into the ends of the earth, and begs them for help, is not getting through to their ears. (Maybe the preacher's it again?) They have a concern the sad state of the world, but not a going concern, only a sitting concern, a tut-tutting concern, nothing alive. So the church dies, it's not a going concern any longer because it's a going concern—it has no concern, and it never goes there.

Mission, No Church  
The first Christian church was twelve apostles. It was a 100% mission church. Jesus did not plan to be sent out. There are many of them to remain behind. The directions he gave them are now followed by any mission society that has much success. But all the same, those twelve men had prepared not to go when Jesus sent them? He chose them for two reasons, we read: to be with him and to be sent out. There are always Christians who enjoy working better than service. Ten people will be out for church, to one who will come out for volunteer service, of any sort. But there was a time when Jesus had to go (in effect) to his closest friends: You have been with me much; you have heard all you need to hear, learned all you need to learn—for now. Go out now and teach people, change the world, my name! If they had refused, Jesus could have found no one to go, there never would have been a Christian church. And the church ceases to be missionary today it will become a fossil, a curiosity, without usefulness.

If everybody can become a missionary, (indeed the first were sent out first to a smaller than Vermont; home country.) But there are various ways in which the church can go out, and send out. It is a man who has found his chief work and interest in developing the moral and spiritual atmosphere of the schools in his state. He said not long ago to a group of religious workers: "I don't see here if my church is doing it." What he is doing is to take the church; he works with public agencies of the state. But his inspiration comes from the church. And his church is not having inspired him and him if in turn it had not inspired and fed by the Living Word. Where the church as an organization cannot go, its members, stirred and supported by the Spirit of God, must go, into wherever, in the name of

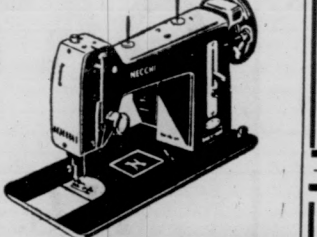
