## CONDENSED NEWS.

Lieut. Gov. Bryan has ordered an election to be held on the first Monday in August in the counties composing the thirty-fourth senatorial district, for the election of a senator, vice Hon. R. M. Pieratt, deceased.

The Senate bill appropriating \$15,000 for the continuation of the geological survey was agreed to by the house by a vote of 61 to 29, after the adoption of an amendment providing that the survey shall be extended to those counties which have hitherto received no benefit therefrom.

At Montgomery, Ala., Saturday, 125 pounds of powder stored in a freight car exploded, tearing several cars to pieces, killing one man and wounding several others. The whole city was shaken up, windows and doors smashed and houses unroofed. The exact cause cannot be ascertained.

Roger Q. Mills has returned to Washington from Old Point Comfort and entered upon his duties as chairman of the ways and means committee Monday. He will call up the tariff bill to-day. It is stated that the Republicans will not attempt to obstruct the bringing up of the bill, but will fight its passage to the bitter end.

Two boilers used by the Armistead Lumber Company at Heland, Mich., exploded Saturday morning, killing two firemen. A young white man named Deming, a son of the sawyer, was also killed. A laborer named Allen Lindsey had a leg badly crushed. The mill-house is a complete wreck. Both boilers were blown to pieces.

William Hopkins, who is confined at Clarksville, Ga., will be hanged on May 11. He is the man who, in company with his brother Joe, murdered William Thomas in Rabun county on Sunday because he wore store clothes. His only sorrow is that his brother, who was sentenced to the penitentiary, is not to be hanged with him. His father called on him to-day, and when about to leave the murderer asked, "Pap, will you come out to the hanging?" The old man, looking at the passing clouds, replied, "Wah, if hit's to wet for plowin' I reckon I will."

On Dec. 30 a license was issued by the clerk of Wayne county, Mich., for the marriage of Wm. M. Brown, of Cleveland, aged forty, and Mrs. Robertson, of Detroit, aged thirty-eight. About two weeks later the bride called upon the minister who performed the ceremony with a request for a duplicate of her marriage certificate, stating that her husband had stolen the original and fled. About this time the county clerk received a circular from the authorities at Pontiac, warning him to look out for a W. J. Brown, who was rumormongering seeking whom he might marry. It is said that less than twenty victims of Brown's matrimonial ventures have been discovered, among them one at Pontiac, one at Kalamazoo, and at Grand Rapids, two at Detroit and one at Niagara Falls.

The "white cap" around New Albany, Ind., have become unusually daring. Saturday night a band of fifty-seven of these men rode into the suburbs and took from their beds three stalwart men the sons of a widow named Jones, tied them to trees and gave them severe whippings with switches and sticks. After the whipping the men were told if they did not go to work and earn a living they would receive more of the same medicine. Mrs. Jones, the mother, takes in washing to support herself and grown sons. They then visited the house of William Wright and warned him, under pain of death, to get out of Harrison county. What Wright had done is not known. He is apparently a law-abiding citizen. From the Wrights the regulators went to Taswell, where a Leavenworth lawyer, aged sixty-two years, who had been too demonstrative in his attentions to a young girl, was called out and given an hour to get out of town.

Information has reached here of the crazy act of an old man at Aurora, Marshall county, Ky. At that place resides Milt Egner, formerly a resident of Paducah, and his sons, the latter keeping a general store and warehouse on the bank of the Tennessee river. About a week Thursday afternoon the old man asked one of the boys for the key to get into the store. This was refused, and he walked away with the remark that he would burn the building to the ground. No attention was paid to the threat, but a few minutes demonstrated that the denuded old man meant what he said. He applied a torch to the store and stood back laughing at the destruction. The fire had gained such headway before it was discovered that it was impossible to save either the store or warehouse. Egner is well known at Paducah. He once owned the street railway system, which was abandoned several years before the present lines were built. He is evidently insane, and will probably be sent to the asylum.

Pretty Miss Helen Forster, of Philadelphia, will not wear her dresses out of season this season, owing to a very singular accident. Saturday evening while she was in the midst of her toilet, preparatory to making herself particularly attractive for expected company, the accident occurred. She was engaged in curling into tiny ringlets the locks of blonde hair on the nape of her neck, and to do this she used a red hot slate pencil. At this moment she was lightly clad, having on but one garment, when the hot pencil slipped from her hands and dropped down the opening between the single garment and her ivory-white skin. She screamed with pain and jumped about, hoping the hot pencil would slip through to the floor, but it would not. 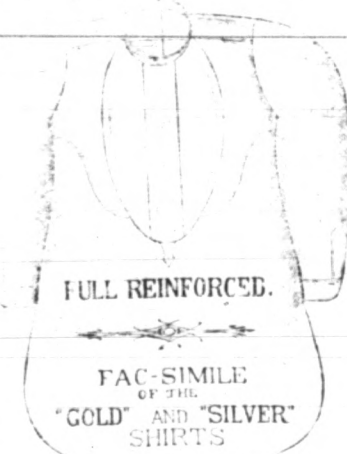
