McAllister, of the Indian Territory, Marshal United States for the Indian Territory. To be attorneys of the United States: Clifford L. Dr. John Hager, of Ashland, declines to accept the World's Fair Commission, to which he was recently appointed, on account of engagements in his profession, which he will demand his attention for some time to come.

The wife of Representative Lewis Alexander, of Owen county, died at the Capital Hill Fracture Hospital at 10 o'clock. Mrs. Alexander passed away in an unconscious condition, surrounded by the members of her family and relations.

The case of the Commonwealth against George W. Bell, charged with embezzlement of several hundred dollars from the Adams Express Company while acting as its local agent, was called and before the testimony of the Commonwealth was finished a preliminary injunction was given the jury by Judge Saffley to find the defendant not guilty.

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## THE NARINIC LOST

The Great Steamship with Hundreds of Passengers on Board, Reported to be Lost.

Bremen, Mar. 23.—After long continued anxiety regarding the fate of the tug "Narvic," a steamer, Narvic, which sailed from Liverpool, England, February 1, for New York, and which had not since been heard of, intelligence has been received showing beyond a doubt that the vessel is lost. Hundreds of passengers were on board of the ill-fated steamer Narvic and there is great grief and much lamentation among the relatives and friends of the lost.
