CONDENSED NEWS.

Matthew Arnold, the distinguished English poet, is dead.

Walter West, aged seventeen, was accidentally killed at Evansville, Ind., by his four-year-old cousin with a loaded pistol.

August Anderson, a Norwegian stone-cutter, blew out his brains at Shelbyville, Tuesday. He stated, just before committing the act, that he murdered his wife and two children in Norway, eight years ago.

Mrs. Jennie Burdine, of Nicholasville, Ky., who was bitten by a mad dog recently, has returned from Frankfort, where a maul-stone was applied. The stone stuck to the wound eight hours drawing out all the poison.

A canvass of the Pennsylvania delegation in congress shows that Messrs. Randall and Bowden are the only two claiming to be Democrats who will vote against the Mills bill. Representative Lynch, about whose course there is some speculation, will, it is believed, vote for tariff reform.

Evan Owens, a demented young man, shot and killed his brother Theodore, a farmer, near Greenwood, Ky., Monday evening. His brother had scolded him for standing in the doorway in his bare feet. The crazy youth secured a rifle and creeping up behind his brother shot him down, killing him almost instantly. The murderer will be sent to the asylum.

The brewery lockout has begun and more than 5,000 brewers, brewery wagon drivers, helpers, coopers, wagon makers, painters, apprentices, in Brooklyn, New York, Newark, Paterson and Staten Island are out of work. The lockout was caused by the action taken by the National Brewers' Association. The places vacated by the union men have all been filled.

Of the gentlemen mentioned in connection with the chief justiceship, Gray, of Delaware, is not yet 48; McDonald, of Indiana, 68; Bayard, of Delaware, 59; Carlisle, of Kentucky, 52; Thurman, of Ohio, 74; Morgan, of Alabama, 61; Justice Field, of California, 71; Justice Miller of Iowa, 71. Of the former Chief Justices, Jay was 32; Marshall, 45; Ellsworth, 51; Taney, 59, and Chase not quite 57 when appointed.

A dispatch from Louisville states that Francis Murphy, the great temperance advocate, who has been exhorting for a week past before immense crowds in the Moody tabernacle, Monday morning undertook a special mission. He tackled the Louisville base ball club, and as a result every member of the nine signed the pledge. This includes the great un-reformed left-handed Ramsey, and the club managers regard their nine as sure winners now.

The residence of A. D. Hoffman, nine miles north of Jackson, Mo., in Cape Girardeau county, was the scene of a violent fire Wednesday morning. At an early hour a fire broke out on the premises, and Hoffman and three of his children were burned up. Six other children made their escape. Several months ago Mrs. Hoffman died, and since then he has been acting in an insane manner. From the stories of the children the people believe that Hoffman set the house on fire with the intention of destroying himself and his whole family.

A telegram from Hazard, Ky., says: The famous French-Eversole feud, which has extended over many years, came to a tragic end Tuesday when John J. C. Eversole, one of the principals, and Nicholas Combs, a follower, were assassinated from ambush. This was the first ambush since last fall, when Eversole killed a man named Gambrell. C. Eversole, who was once a member of the legislature, and H. J. French were once rival merchants of this place. They quarreled, fought, and a feud similar to that of Rowan county was the result. Half a dozen men have already been killed as a result of it. French left the state a year ago, but returned again.

South Carolina legislators in their enthusiasm have overstepped the bounds of reason. At the last session of the legislature an act was passed giving a pension of \$5 per month to all disabled Confederate veterans or their widows. The act appropriated \$50,000 and authorized the treasurer to borrow as much as was needed after the appropriation was exhausted. The pension bill is now in session and they are called on the number of applications pouring in. It would require at least \$50,000 to pay the pensions applied for. Any good soldiers now regard the whole scheme as a mistake, but they are loath to take steps to repeal the law. As payers object to the increased burden on them and the numbers of applications which were refused will have something to say.

Early Monday morning an attempt was made to blow up the residence of Mrs. Jessie Craig, at Richmond, Ind. Mrs. Hewitt and her four children were so injured. Mrs. Hewitt was seated in a common wood chair near a table. Mrs. Craig was by the stove and three of the children were in bed when a sudden report shook the building, and in a moment Mrs. Hewitt surged upward. Mrs. Craig was pitched forward and the floor and rendered semi-conscious. She was on which Mrs. Hewitt was sitting and she was knocked down. The bed on which the children were was wrecked, though the children escaped unhurt. Mrs. Hewitt was hurt about the side and arms and was slightly bruised. A dynamite cartridge had been placed in the bed and evidently exploded. Enoch Craig, who is separated from his wife, Mrs. Jessie Craig, is suspected.

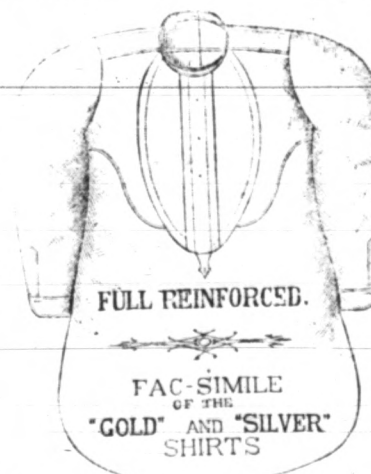
