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Through Our Bifocals

The "backwoods" of the Purchase area are disappearing.

A survey made by the University of Kentucky shows that rural folks in the Purchase are "catching up" with their city cousins in standards of living.

The study deals only with families having school-age children, omitting families with pre-school children and also mature families with children beyond school age. About half of the rural families are non-farming citizens, while the other half is full-time or part-time farmers.

Among the interesting facts revealed are:

Electricity now is in 98 percent of the rural homes. Ninety three percent have refrigerators, 96 percent have radios, 96 percent have washing machines, 77 percent own automobiles and 13 percent own trucks.

RUNNING WATER now is in 52 percent of the homes and telephones in 48 percent of the rural homes. Thirty-four percent have home freezers. Sixty-one percent subscribe to newspapers and 89 percent subscribe to some magazine.

Thus far, only 9 percent own television sets. This probably is because of poor reception in sections too far from city TV stations.

Eighty-two percent of the men were born in the Purchase, while only 75 percent of the women were natives. And 68 percent of the men were born in the county in which they reside, compared with 62 percent of the women.

Fifty-six percent of the part-time farm families had lived in the same residence 20 years. Thirty-nine percent of the full-time farm families had not moved in 20 years, and 36 percent of the non-farm families had lived in the same spot 29 years.

However, the shift from farming increased during the last 20 years. Seventy-one percent of the now part-time farmers had once been full-time farmers and 5 percent of the non-farm families once had been farm families.

THE SURVEY ALSO shows an increase in educational advantages. Seventy-four percent of the rural men, farmers and non-farmers, have completed the 8th grade. And 23 percent of the women have completed high school. Sixty percent have had one or more years of college education. Sixty-eight percent of the men have completed the 8th grade and 24 percent are high school graduates. And 12 percent of the wives have had one or more years of college education.

Mr. Ivey, a farmer, is a former member of the Marshall County School board. He will make his formal announcement later.

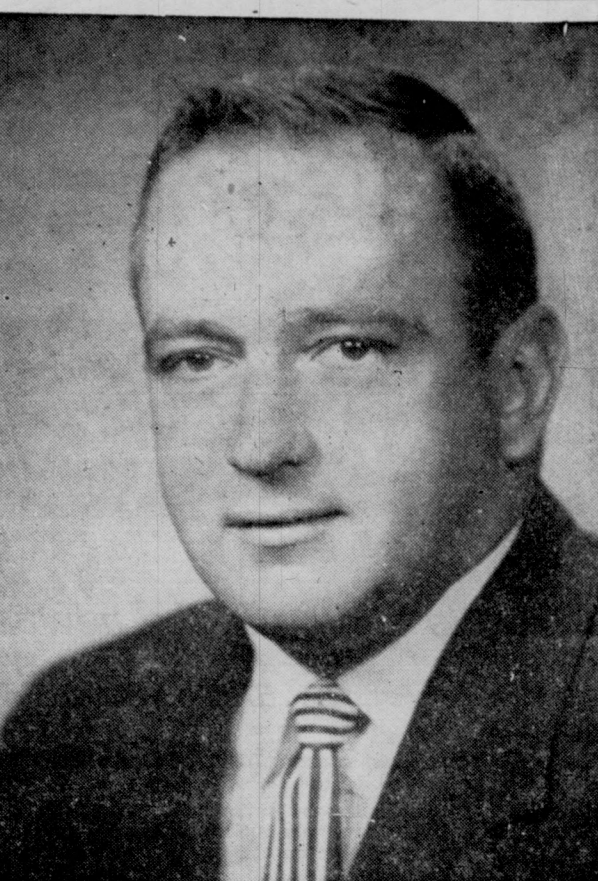
Raymond Powell now is magistrate in District 4.

Bible Comment:

Brutality Must Not Be Considered Part Of Soldiering Life

WE must very definitely understand that Christianity is wholly on the side of health and life. These are its great ends. "I am come," said Jesus, "to give life, and to give it more abundantly."

After this is grasped, it is worth our while to go into the details of the lesson of the healing of the Roman centurion's servant. Here is a Roman soldier, a man in the position of authority. He has soldiers under him and is accustomed to command.

It is undoubtedly true that war is a terrible and brutalizing business. Yet one of the things here emphasized, which stands out in history, is that soldiers have not all been brutes. On the contrary, many of them have had a fine sense of ideals and duty.

This should be emphasized because at least two newspapers, with circulations running into the millions, have suggested editorially that our chief business in America is "the raising of born brutes and young brutes." "This," the newspapers said, "ought to be the aim of the draft."

That is a sad statement. May it not be said in contrast that the defense of this nation and the service of democracy depend upon the measure of idealism and courage, the tender regard for the homes and the country they defend, and the higher virtues that we can instill in our young men?

Here was this Roman Centurion, capable of tender solicitude for his servant. He used his position as a representative of a conquering power to show a magnanimity and kindness to Jews, people under Roman domination. Here was a man capable of faith and responsive to goodness. This faith was commended by Jesus. It was instrumental in the healing of his servant.

It is a picture worth bearing in mind at a time when brutality is so rife in the world. War offers many problems. The Christian, as a man of peace, is faced with the very real dilemma where he has to meet ruthless aggression.

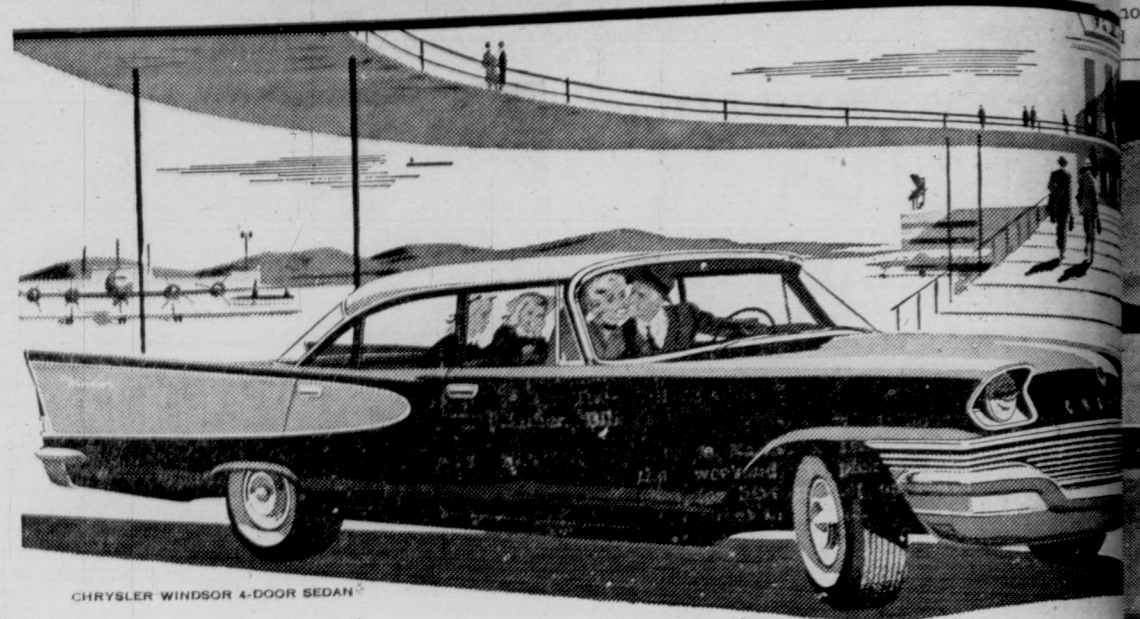

Happy is the man who can find for himself the highest and best way in the midst of these conflicting forces. In the discovery of that way there is nothing which will prove so helpful as the great example of those who have kept their lives clean; people who are strong and full of helpfulness toward their fellow man.

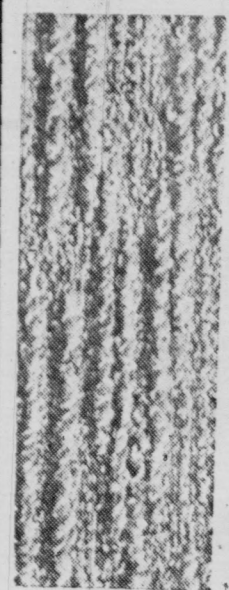

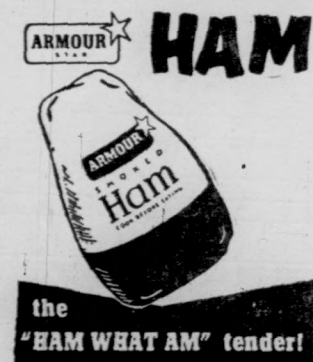

Circulating Percolator Cuts Coffee Costs

BY EDNA MILES

TRIMMING the family food budget and keeping it that way is a big concern of most homemakers these days. Any real aids in holding the food money line are most welcome.

For the household consuming cups and cups of coffee each day, there's a new coffee maker that's said to effect a 40 per cent saving in coffee costs.

It works like this: What looks like a conventional percolator contains a flaring funnel and coffee container into which you place 60 per cent of the usual amount of coffee you use. A mild pressure builds up in the funnel and swirls and reswirls the hot water through the ground coffee to extract full flavor.

Actually, the coffee-making method is a combination of percolator, drip and espresso. As with a percolator, the boiling water is brought by pump to the top of the stem. As in the drip method, the water temperature is reduced to the correct point for best coffee. And, like espresso, hot water is swirled through ground coffee to extract full flavor.



New coffee pot is said to mean a 40 per cent savings in coffee costs with the espresso flavor to boot.

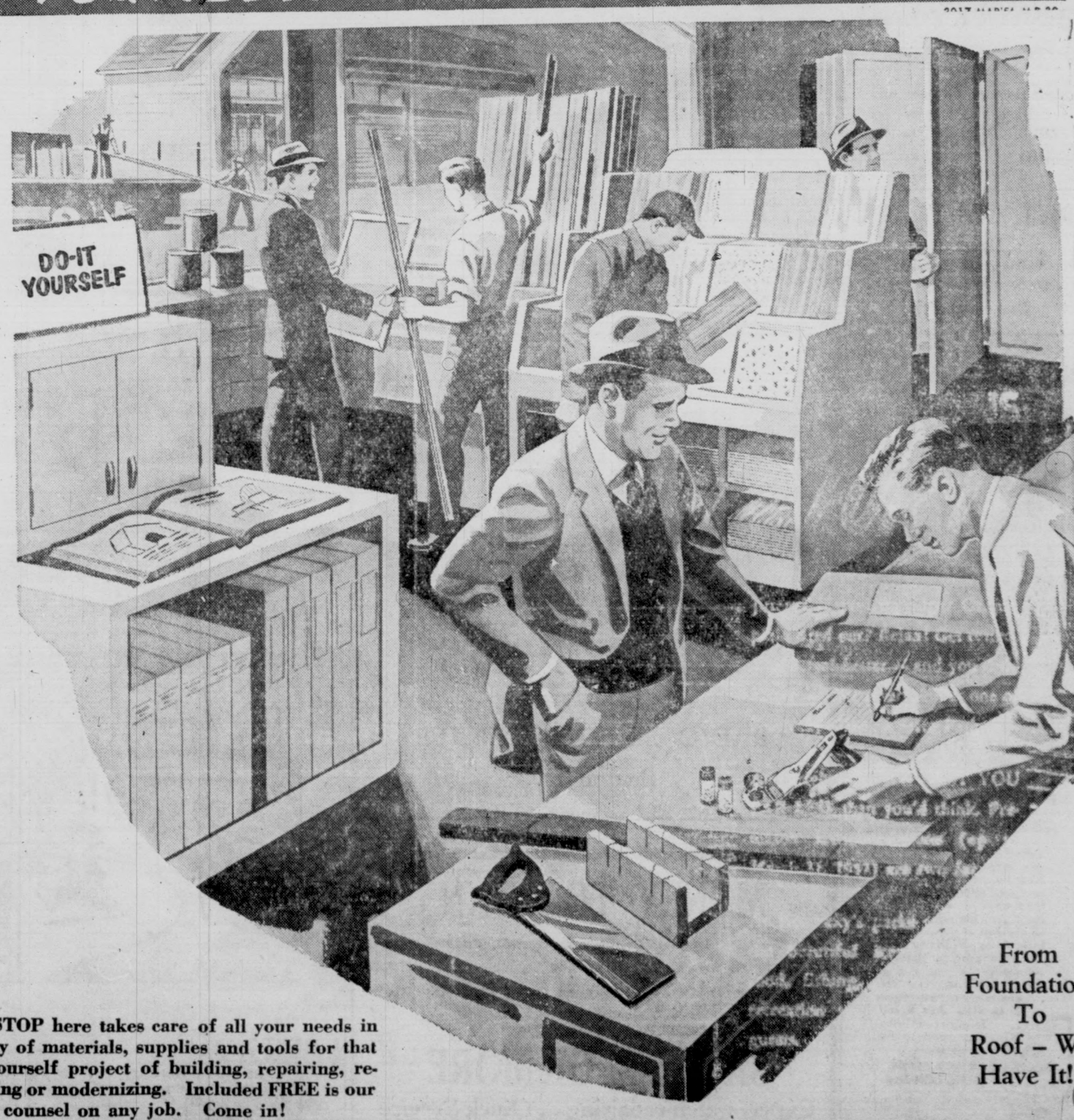

County Soil Notes

A series of meetings will be held next week to explain the Kentucky Watershed Conservancy District Law. Landowners in Clarks River Watershed will vote Saturday, March 16, whether to form a Watershed Conservancy District for the East and West Forks of Clarks River.

The schedule for the meetings is as follows: Hardin, March 4; Brewers, March 5; New Harmony, March 7; Sharps, 8; and at Benton, March 9. The meeting time will be 7:00 P. M. except the one at Benton will be Saturday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock.

All landowners in the watershed and others interested in the improvement of the watershed for agriculture are invited to attend.

The creation of watershed conservancy districts is carried out under the supervision of Soil Conservation District Boards of Supervisors.

Frank Parker, west of Hardin,

has received the help of the Soil Conservation Service in staking a farm pond for livestock water.

Ponds are now classified in three types, embankment, hillside, and pit. Parkers is hillside type. The new dam will impound three feet of water. Another three feet of depth will be secured by excavation.

The ACP Federal Cost-Share rate on this type of pond is eighty percent of the cost per cubic yard of earth moved and approved, not to exceed twenty cents per yard. Also, two dollars per 1,000 square feet will be given for seeding the earth dam and spillway.

Claim All Exemptions for Yourself and Dependents

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. These articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants, and the Kentucky Society of Certified Public Accountants in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

Many people overpay their taxes because they cheat themselves on their personal exemptions.

Here is how to count your exemptions (each one takes \$600 off your taxable income):

One exemption for yourself, two if you are 65 or over, two if you are blind, three if you are both 65 and blind. The same applies to your husband or wife.

If your husband or wife died during 1956 you can still file a joint return claiming the exemptions, including those for age or blindness, to which the deceased would have been entitled at the time of death.

Who Qualifies

One exemption of \$600 can be taken for each person who fits the definition of a dependent. This \$600 is not doubled for age or blindness, however, as in the case of your personal exemption.

To count for an exemption, the dependent must:

(1) Have less than \$600 gross income for 1956 (except that this does not apply to your child if he is under 19 or is a full-time student).

(2) Have received more than half of his support from you, unless you file a Multiple Support Agreement (see below).

(3) Not file a joint return.

(4) Be either a citizen of the U. S. or a resident of the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone, Panama and in some cases, a service-man's child living in the Philippines.

(5) Live with you (absence while attending school does not interfere) or be a close relative as defined in the instruction book or be a cousin receiving institutional care for a mental or physical disability who had lived with you before going to the institution.

Multiple Support Agreements

If you shared with others in the support of a dependent, but none of you provided more than half the support, you may still be able to arrange among you for one of the group to have the \$600 exemption. You might agree, for example, to take turns in having the exemption from year to year.

The one who claims the exemption must have contributed more

than 10 percent of the support, and he must be a member of a group who altogether provided more than half support, and that person must have been entitled to claim that dependent except for the requirement of providing more than half support.

In order for one of the group to have the exemption all other members of the group who contributed more than 10 percent must sign declarations that they will not claim the dependent. The Internal Revenue Service provides Form 2120 (Multiple Support Agreement) for this purpose.

Children and Disabled Dependents

There is a deduction of as much as \$600 for care of children under 12 while the breadwinner works. This child-care deduction is available to mothers, widowers, divorced and legally separated persons, who are allowed to deduct expenses paid to someone other than a dependent for the care of a son, daughter, stepson or stepdaughter under the age limit. This regulation also applies to any dependent of any age who is mentally or physically incapacitated.

A working wife is entitled to this deduction if her husband is physically or mentally incapable of providing support. Where the husband is not disabled, the working wife may also take the child-care deduction only if a joint return is filed, and the \$600 limit must be reduced by the amount of the couple's gross income exceeds \$4500. It should be kept in mind that you can't take this deduction if you take the standard 10 percent deduction.

The instruction book which comes with your tax form gives further information. Help is also available by telephone or at offices of the Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue Service urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you decide to seek outside help.

More Tobacco Urged for Soil Bank

Officials in a joint meeting of the three dark tobacco associations at Hopkinsville, Feb. 21, went on record as approving the Soil Bank Program as a suitable vehicle for reduction of the large surpluses of dark tobacco now on hand, since restrictions have now been officially lifted so that a grower may place all or any part of his dark tobacco in the Soil Bank.

The group is also recommending to Congress that dark tobacco payments in the Soil Bank be increased to 50 percent of parity in order to place tobacco in the same position as other commodities. Fifty percent of parity would result in payments

of 16-17 cents per pound compared to the present payment of 12 cents for dark air-cured and 13 cents for dark fired tobacco. The group also asked the Department of Agriculture for an extension to April 1 for placing tobacco in Soil Bank in order that growers might have sufficient time for familiarization with the various provisions and regulations.

Association officials also requested that the 10 percent acreage cut for dark-fired tobacco and the 15 percent cut for dark air-cured tobacco be restored insofar as it affects base acreage and that growers receive Soil Bank payments for this acreage.

Attending the conference from the Western District were Boone Hill, president, Marshall County; E. E. Shanklin, Weakley County; Crate Boyd, Graves County; Paul Paschall, Calloway County; and Holmes Ellis, general manager of the Western Association.

The 1956 dark-fired crop was the largest produced since the 1949 crop and total sales are expected to exceed 15 million pounds of which five and three-fourths million pounds have been consigned to the Association for approximately 40 percent of the total offerings.

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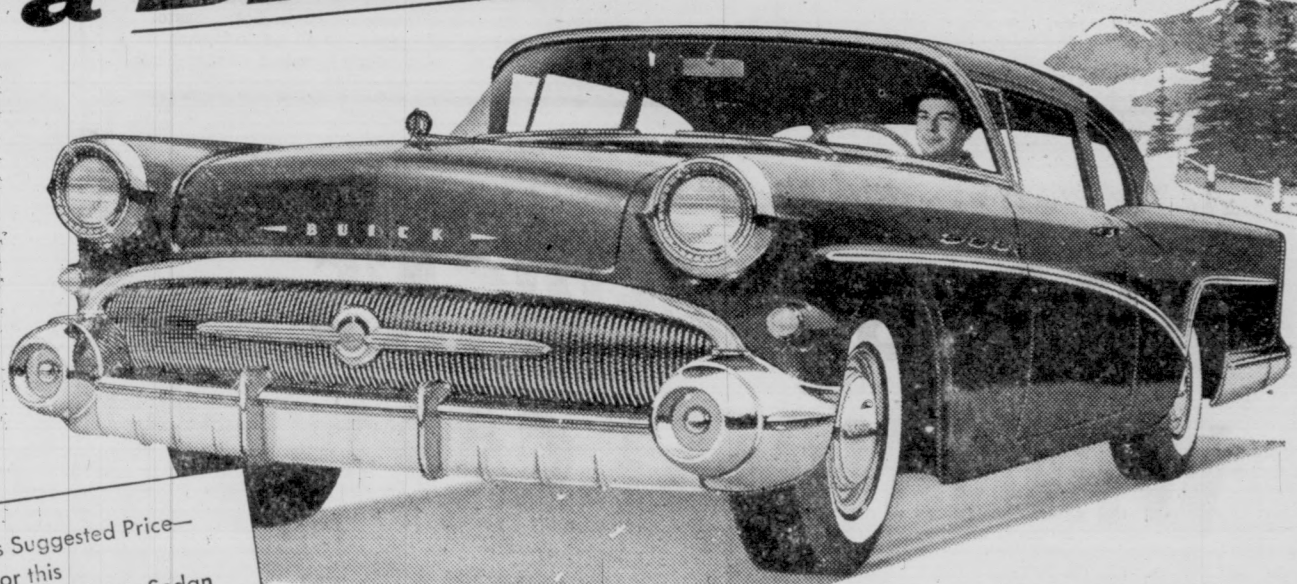

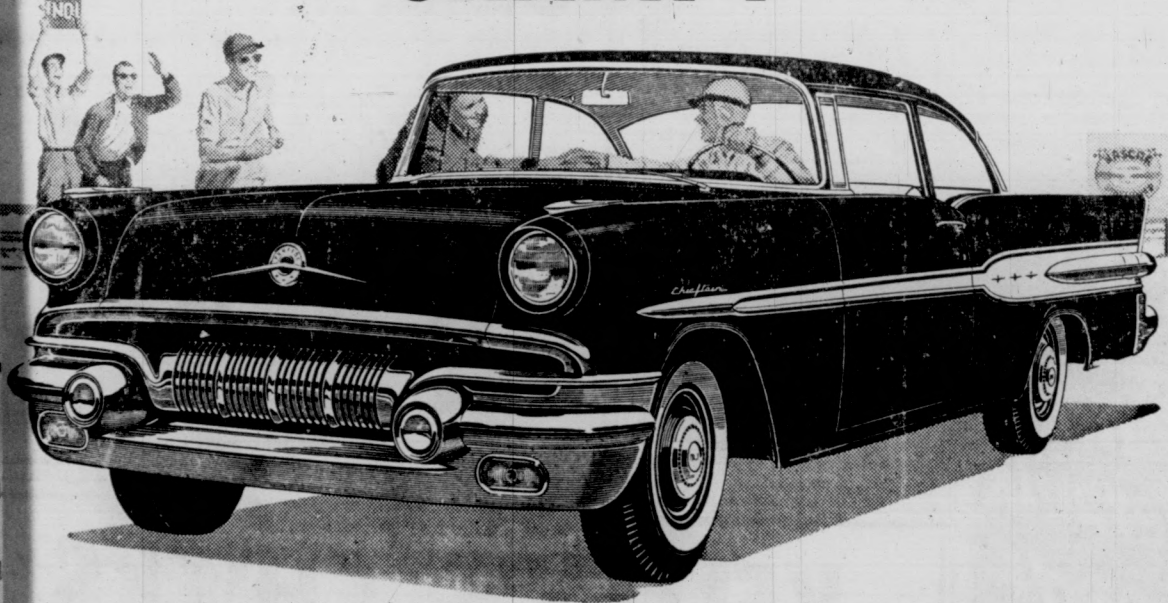

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Background Scripture: Matthew 16:13-17
Devotional Reading: John 3:14-21

Who is This?

Lesson for March 3, 1957

WE ALL like to know what people think of us, but sometimes all we really want is compliments, or else we ask out of idle curiosity. Jesus asked the same question most people ask some time or other: "Who do men say I am?" But it was not curiosity or pride, with him. He knew better than any one that what men thought of him was vital—not to him, but to them. What people think of Christ affects their whole lives. He is no more than a picture-figure out of the past? Then we can safely ignore him. Is he a wise teacher, no more? Then we can put his teaching together with those of other great teachers and add a few nuggets of ideas from him to the wealth of the ages. But suppose he is more?

They thought they had seen him. Nobody in Jesus' lifetime thought of him as a priest. The priests were professional religionists; but Jesus did not make that sort of profession. He reminded people of no priest—rather of prophets. Many spoke of him by the name of a well known prophet—John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah. Of course they did not literally think these men had risen from the dead; but it was almost as if they had. Incidentally, the modern reader might look up the three prophets whom Jesus was thought to resemble. They were anything but gentle, meek and mild. At all times, they were men whose authority did not come to them from position, an institution. They were men whose power and authority came from within; men trying their commissions direct from God.

One Lord
One might think that no higher category could be found for Jesus in Prophet—one sent by God, making the word of God. But Jesus once called himself "more than a prophet." So it was his friends' thought of him. "Great Confession" is well known. Speaking not for himself but for all—the question was to the group, Simon Peter said (Matthew reports it) "Thou art Christ, the Son of the Living God." The words should not lose their force because of familiarity. Peter does not use the language of the first century could use it but they were not words Peter had applied to any one else. It means Messiah, King, God's chosen King, to usher in the World's New Age. No Jew had for two Messiahs. Peter was saying to Christ: There have been many prophets; but there can never be more Christs than one. You stand alone, with none to match you, none beside you. Messiah was not only a unique figure, there was nothing above it. Therefore, the word Christ implied a great deal more than Prophet. You could take a prophet or a king, his messages might be for you at all. But the Christ was to be every man's Master, of Israel, Lord of the world, a prophet a man may keep silence of respect. In the presence of the one Lord a man must in reverence, asking, What thou have me to do?

What did Jesus mean when he said to Peter, "Flesh and blood have revealed this to you, but Father who is in heaven?" 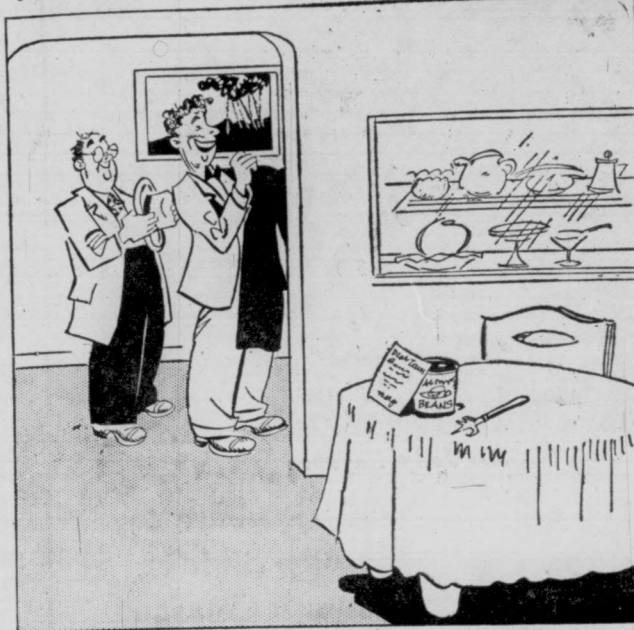

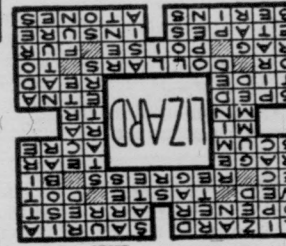

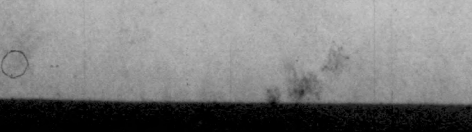
