The days are getting longer. And quicker than you can say vernal equinox, some sections are all set to make the days longer than nature intended, using one of man's brainstorms called Daylight Saving Time.

Benton's City Council will decide soon whether we will conserve daylight, whether we will waste it, or whether we will just let nature take its course.

Everyone is entitled to his say in the matter, this being a free land. Appear at the City Council meeting in person, or talk or write to the officials.

THERE ARE SOME advantages to saving daylight.

The monthly electric bill shrinks a little.

Big city workers can leave their jobs at 5 o'clock, drive five or ten miles through heavy traffic to their homes and still have enough daylight left to take a sun bath, have a backyard picnic, play a round of golf, make a few casts in the nearest fishing spot, or mow (sob) the lawn.

Few persons in rural areas need extra daylight time. A small percentage are confined to the walls of a factory or office building all day and yearn for a few hours outdoors when the day's work is done.

Any farmer or outdoor worker gets more sunshine in one month than the average city worker gets in an entire summer.

A farmer's work is from sun to sun, regardless of what the clock says. And, of course, a woman's work is never done, so time is no problem with the ladies.

PERSONALLY we are opposed to Daylight Saving Time.

Sunshine gives us only blisters. On picnics, the ants and higgers go for us instead of the food. And on fishing trips, mosquitoes prevent us from enjoying a nice nap on a shady river bank.

The sight of lawnmowers gives a nervous indigestion. And not being ambidextrous, we've never been able to milk a cow.

So we do not need more daylight, personally.

Instead of moving the clock forward, let's throw the germ into the window and do to it.

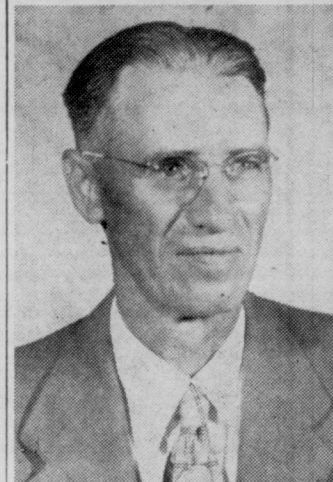

New Postoffice OK'd For Benton; Work Starts Soon

Plans for a new postoffice building in Benton have been approved by the U. S. Postoffice Department.

The new building will be located on Poplar Street, between 10th and 11th Streets, on property owned by Mrs. G. Wyatt and Woodson Cross.

The building is to be completed and occupied by August of this year. Construction is expected to begin soon.

The new postoffice will be a modern brick masonry structure, 35 feet wide and 85 feet long. It will have a concrete loading platform in the rear parking facilities for all post workers and a driveway entering the entire building.

The lot on which the building is to be erected is approximately 110 by 150 feet and entire lot will be backtopped. The building will be modern every respect and will year round air conditioned. Cost of the entire project is approximately \$40,000.

R. R. McWaters & Co. was bidder on the general contract. Miller-Johnson Co. will do the plumbing, and T. & S. Construction Co. of Calvert City will do the grading and blacktopping work.

The building will be owned by Mrs. Wyatt and Mr. Cross and will be rented to the Postoffice Department under a 10-year lease agreement.

International Union
Sunday School Lessons
DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Last Judgment

Lesson for March 31, 1957

Human judgments are imperfect, and some of them are unjust; because no man can see all the circumstances of a case, not even his own. We are usually poor judges of our actions; but we are no juster judges of ourselves. Judgments of ourselves are usually made by pride; judgments of others are usually made by prejudice.

We cannot well judge the motives of an act, because we do not know the motives of others we cannot guess at.

Nevertheless, most of us are prone to pass judgment on others in various ways. And when we are honest we do try to come to God's viewpoint as we judge. We try to take every act into consideration. But try as we may, we must admit first that only God can be a final judge, for only he has all the facts. There are many pictures of the "Last Judgment" in the Bible and they do not agree, since they are pictures of what cannot really be seen. But back of all the pictures, stern, compelling, chilling, some of them are, we discern plain truths. One is that only is God the final Judge every man, but his judgment is final because he and only he has all the facts, and he is not under his judgment till the facts are in. True, God's judgment is going on all the time, we can read them in history, we can read his righteous sentence in the dim and flaring lamps as poet says. This is true of men, nations, that the divine judgment is interwoven with their lives. God settles many of the affairs of this planet, on this planet, in the ultimate future, and men, will all the facts be in judgment before then, not God's, is final.

Last Separation
Parts of efforts have been made to dull the force of Jesus' picture of prophecy of the judgment in the parable of sheep and the goats. It has been said that this is a judgment on individuals; persons; not on nations but on individuals. (Furthermore, how do we fit into the end of the world? It has been said too that it is not a separation of the "saved" from the "unsaved." But Jesus of the Trial, as Jesus of the Cross, it is eternal life and death. The fact is, this picture of the Last Judgment of mankind, and there is nothing out of it. At least it stands out, etched as by fire. One is that the judgment against a man is necessary for what he has done; but for what he didn't do; but even think about doing; other point is that the judgment is a man's relations. True, deeper that is a man's relationship with God; but in this parable, identifies himself completely with the troubled sufferers of the world. What we do, or do not do, is our human misery, we do it to do for the Lord.

Judgment Seat of Christ
The strange thing appears is overwhelming portrayal of judgment, vast and final. The King, is the Son of Jesus Christ himself. This with other passages in the Testament where sometimes and sometimes God, appears as the Judge of all. This tremendous claim on Jesus' part, have the right to sit on the throne of the universe. No one else of Christ more affirmed than right here. In other hand, he is still the Man. He is our Elder brother, bone of our bone and of our flesh, "made like them in every respect" as it says. God in his final act, acts with and through the man who was and ever shall be with God and one with God. We cannot deceive him. He knows us.

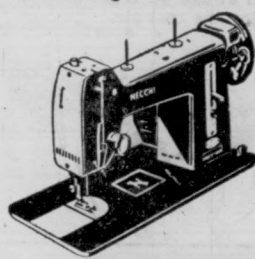

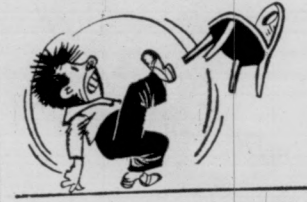

County Soil Notes

By HERBERT ANDERSON

J. D. Dunn, south of Calvert City, received the help of the Soil Conservation Service in staking two thousand feet of terraces last week. The field was an old fescue sod which had been pastured for a number of years.

He will break the field this spring, plant soy beans, harvest them early, and sow the field back in grasses and legumes this fall. By using this method, he can give the terraces a maintenance plowing this fall which should put them in good shape. Adequate sod waterways are established.

I attended an irrigation training meeting for SCS personnel last week at Kentucky Dam Vil-

lage. We were shown how to determine the basic data needed for designing a system. Then we designed several systems as a part of the training. Irrigation is becoming more and more popular with farmers throughout the eastern part of the United States.

Bill Grimmer and W. O. Fooks have used irrigation in Marshall County for the past two summers. An adequate water supply is the limiting factor for most farmers.

The Conservation Reserve Part of the Soil Bank is a good way to secure needed water for irrigation. This program pays up to 60 percent of the cost of building reservoirs.

Groups of farmers can very

easily go together in constructing a large reservoir. By pooling their own resources and that which they can get from the Conservation Reserve or the ACP they could build a twenty or twenty-five thousand dollar lake. This would supply water not only for irrigation but for livestock, fish, and recreation.

William T. Ross, north of Hardin, filed an application last week for placing his fifty acre farm in the Conservation Reserve. He will receive eighty percent of the cost of sowing the land and eighty percent of the cost of building a farm pond. In addition he will receive an annual rental payment of \$11.00 per acre for the five year period of the contract.

April 15 is the deadline for signing contracts for 1957 under the Conservation Reserve Program.

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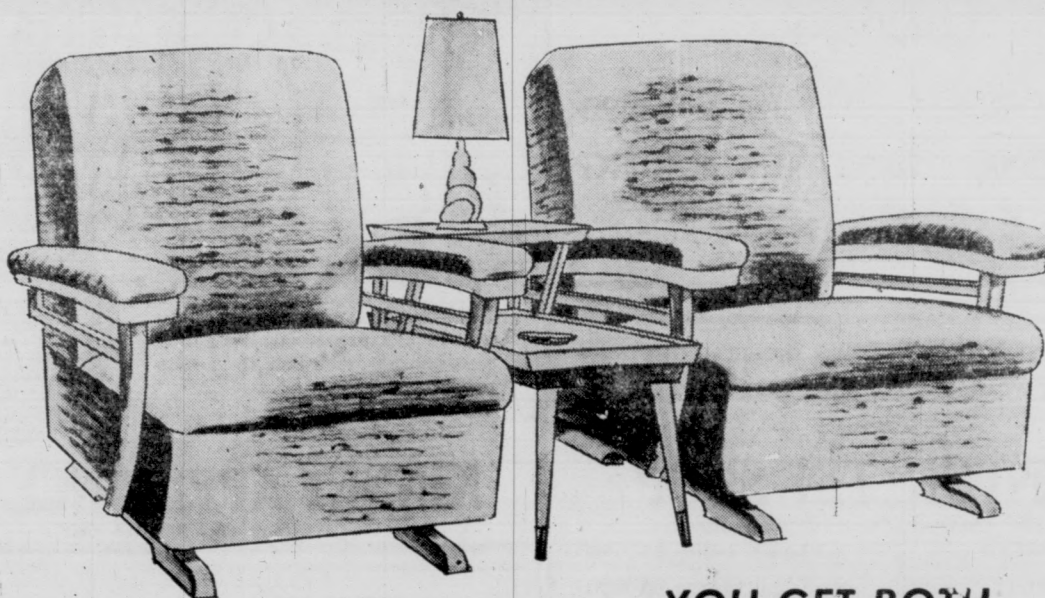

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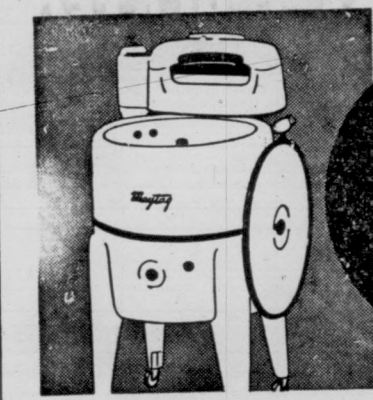

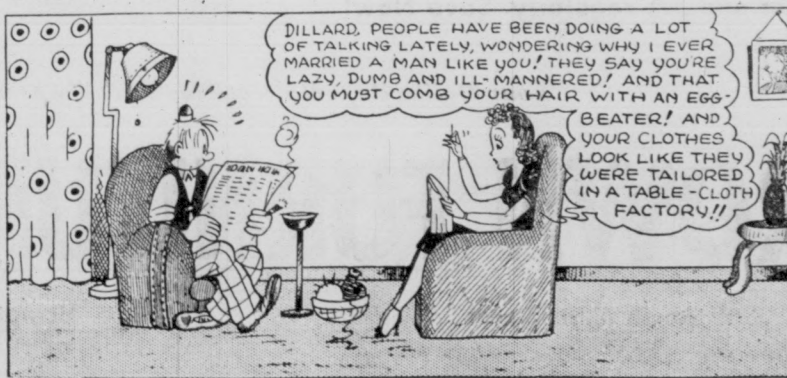

Air Reduction to Build New Plant At Calvert City

A plant to produce methyl butynol will be built at Calvert City, Ky., near Paducah, by Air Reduction Chemical Company. Production is expected to start by fall.
 The plant will have the first commercial, continuous-process production of methyl butynol, a tertiary acetylenic alcohol, in the United States. It will have an annual capacity of 3,000,000 pounds.
 The plant will be the fourth by Air Reduction on its 1,500-acre site at Calvert City.
 The plants receive acetylene by pipeline, as will the new installation.
 Methyl butynol is used as a starting material in the preparation of flavors, perfumes, and pharmaceuticals. It is an acid corrosion inhibitor, a brightener in metal plating, and a specialty solvent.
 The plant will also produce some methyl pentynol, which has been used by fish-and-game authorities to tranquilize live fish to prevent their self-injury in transportation tanks.

COPE ON SMALL COLLEGE ALL-AMERICA TEAM

Mason Cope, a former all-state basketball star with the 1943 championship Brewers team, has been named to the Associated Press' small college All-America basketball team.

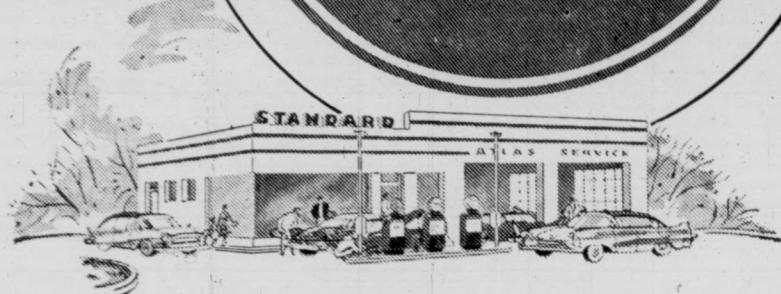

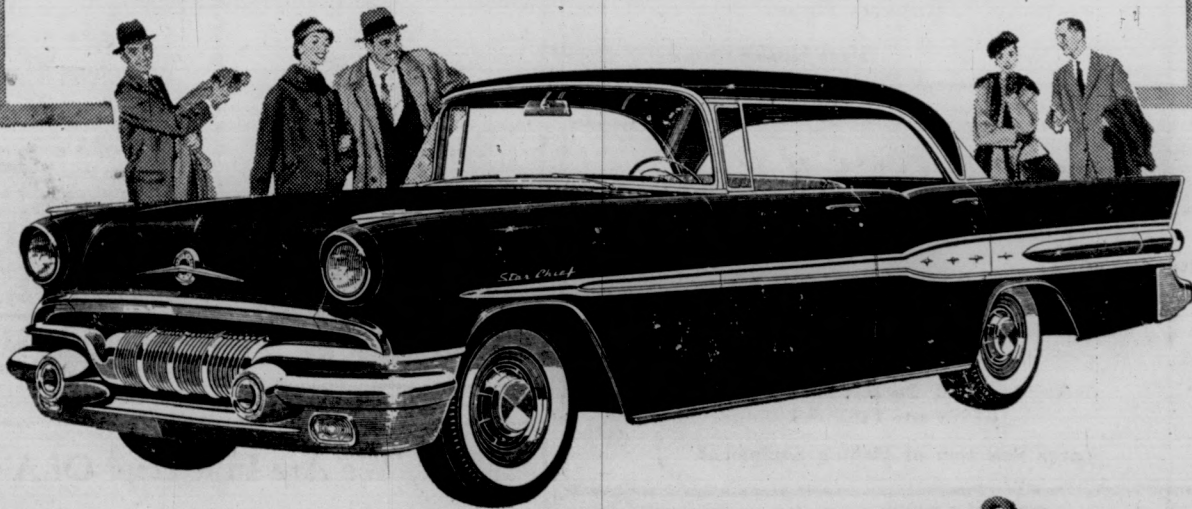
