County Soil Notes

BY HERBERT ANDERSON
Designs for a sod waterway on the farms of Walter Binkley and Chloe Snyder at Palma have been completed. The waterway is now a huge gully four feet deep. It will be shaped in May to a size of one and one-half to two feet deep with a top width of 40 to 60 feet.

Sudan grass will then be sown to prevent erosion during the summer. This will be removed next fall and Kentucky No. 31 Fescue sown in the stubble.

Binkley and Snyder are eligible to receive a Federal cost-share of \$1.65 per 1,000 square feet for seedbed preparation, seeds, lime, and fertilizers used on the waterway. Also they will

receive 80 percent of the cost, not to exceed \$100 per farm, to move the earth necessary to properly shape the waterway.

Thirty-six cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District received blue gill to place in their farm ponds last week. Large mouth bass will be delivered to them at a later date. Fish for stocking ponds are provided free by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

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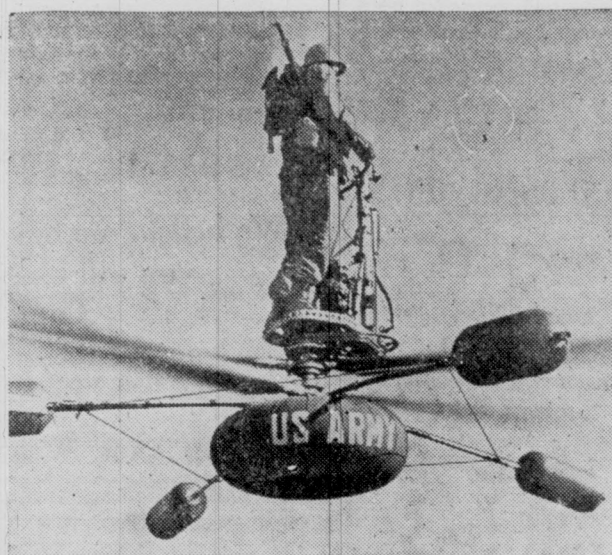
