crease in state income taxes.  
I was glad to vote for the ad-  
ministration measure increas-  
ing the production tax on whis-  
key which will bring an esti-  
mated \$200,000 in additional re-  
venue. I also introduced and

the House opposing the plan to  
charge for swimming in the  
Kentucky Lake State Park be-  
cause as I felt it would be de-  
trimental to our people by caus-  
ing children to swim in unprotected  
waters and where life guards  
and other safety factors would  
be missing, secondly by causing  
economic harm to our indepen-  
dent motel and restaurant op-  
erators.

lify an ordinance voted in 1956  
in favor of Daylight Saving  
Time.

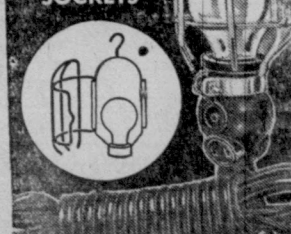

## REMOVAL OF SPECIAL CHARGES TO SAVE CONSUMERS OF ELECTRICITY \$15,000 ON BILLS

Change To Be Effective On Bills  
Mailed April 15

The Benton Power Board is proud to announce the removal of surcharges and amortization from all electric bills. The removal of these two extra charges will save you consumers an estimated \$15,000 on your electric bills during the next 12 months.

This change becomes effective with bills mailed on April 15.

Amortization and surcharges were necessary during the building stages of your city electric system. The Electric Department needed the extra money to pay for the investment. Amortization charges ran from a minimum of 25 cents to a maximum of \$1.00 per month for each consumer. Surcharges, applicable only to commercial and industrial consumers, consisted of an extra ten percent of the monthly electric bill.

But now, thanks to a high use of electricity by all of you, the financial condition of the electric department is such that these extra charges are no longer necessary.

The removal of amortization and surcharges from our bills is in keeping with our policy of making plenty of electricity available to our consumers at the lowest possible cost to them.

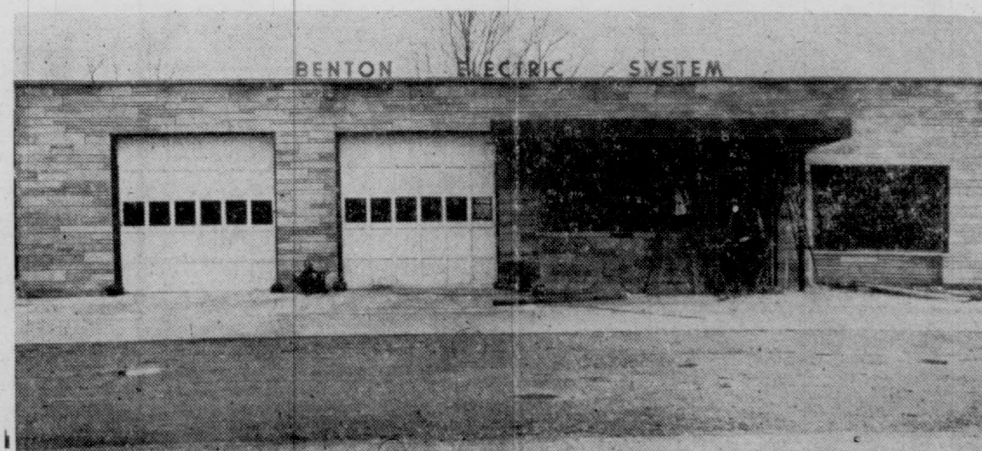
Your electric department is working hard to assure you of all the electricity you want, when and where you want it. We're working to stay ahead of your demands for more and more electricity, the power you're using to build a better, more progressive Benton.

### ... highlights of our operation

- **CONSUMERS:** we now serve 1,175 meters in the city.
- **PLANT VALUE:** Electric System is valued at \$218,000. In 1945 system value was only \$46,000.
- **DEBT:** Now stands at only \$58,000. Payments are being made on schedule.
- **TAXES PAID:** Tax equivalents last year totaled \$8,004. In 1946, we paid only \$1,500 in taxes to the city.
- **AVERAGE COST:** For the electricity you used in your homes last year you paid only .99 cents per kilowatt-hour. National average cost of electricity for home use is 2.62 cents per kwh.
- **AVERAGE USE:** In your homes last year you used an average of 9,677 kilowatt hours of electricity. National average is only about 2,800 kwh.

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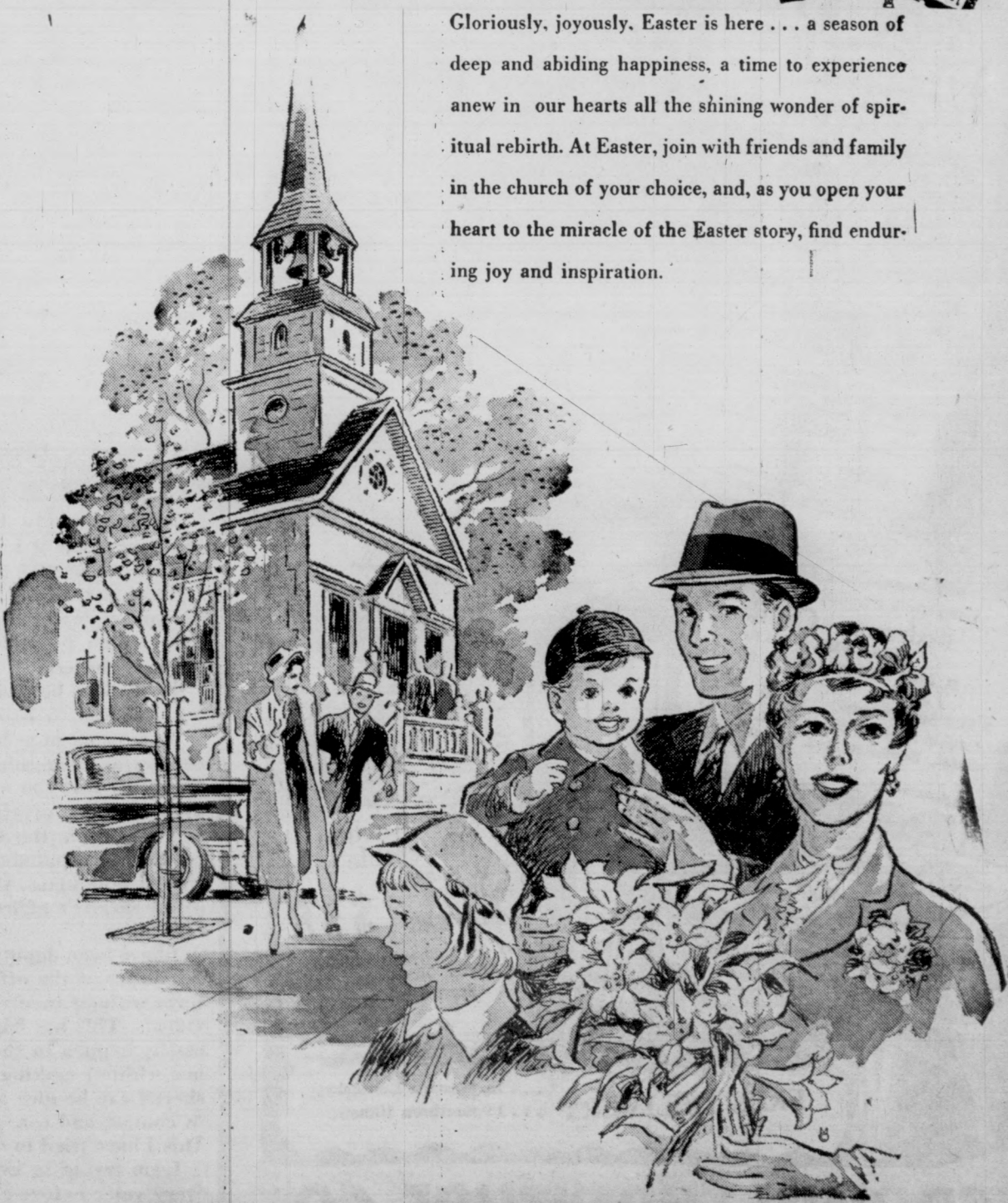

tion Program for Education gave me perhaps more real satisfaction than any other single accomplishment. It was also my privilege to introduce and co-sponsor the "TVA in lieu of taxes" act which has brought more than \$26,000 additional annual revenue to our county school system.

Roads: In my announcement prior to the primary of 1955 I urged the passage of a bond issue to finance a highway building program and have constantly worked and voted in favor of the program that has now been passed and should soon provide Kentucky, for the first time, with an adequate road system. I shall if re-elected continue to work for more "farm to market" roads to get Marshall County out of the dust as well as the mud.

Farm: I shall continue to work closely with the legislative representatives of the Farm Bureau in continued efforts to enact legislation beneficial to our farmers. In past sessions I have served on the Agriculture Committee and was awarded the "Service to Agriculture" citation for work during the 1952-54 sessions.

Welfare: I voted to repeal the (old age) "lien law" during the

past session and had voted in favor of its repeal during previous sessions. I supported the new Welfare Act enacted during the past session.

Since both of the counties that I represent are on record as favoring "local option" laws it has been my pleasure to work closely with the Rev. Walter C. House, secretary of the Kentucky Temperance League, in all matters related to any legislation involving the wet-dry issue.

In closing I would like to state, with some degree of modesty, that of the three candidates available I do not think that you could select a "poor" representative. However, I would like the opportunity of serving you again and I promise you that if re-elected I will do my best to give you effective representation in the 1958 session of the General Assembly.
