The political race for City of
Benton is wide open.
That was the ruling this week
from the state attorney general.
Previously, some lawyers here
thought the deadline for
candidates to file for City Council
and mayor in fourth class
was, such as Benton, was April
20. That is NOT true, however.

THE LAW SAYS that in any
operating under a council-
manic form of government, re-
gardless of whether it is first
fourth class, candidates may
on an independent ticket
later than 45 days before
November general election
not sooner than 60 days be-
fore said election.
This means that candidates
running on non-partisan tick-
ets must file between Sept 6 and
Oct. 20.
Candidates running on a par-
tisan ticket in a fourth class city
could have filed by April 13.
Mayor O'Daniel has filed as a
Democratic Party candidate.
Four candidates have filed
Democrats for the six seats
on the City Council.

ANYONE WHO WISHES to run
for Mayor or a seat on the City
Council may do so by filing a
petition, signed by at least 20
residents of Benton, in the office
of the county clerk before the
dates of Sept. 6 and
Oct. 20.
However, a candidate must
run on an INDEPENDENT tick-
et and not on a political party
ticket. And he must have a
petition bearing 20 legitimate
signatures requesting him to be-
come a candidate.
There are rumors that there
will be at least one other can-
didate for mayor. And there are
rumors that two women
will make the race for seats
on the City Council.

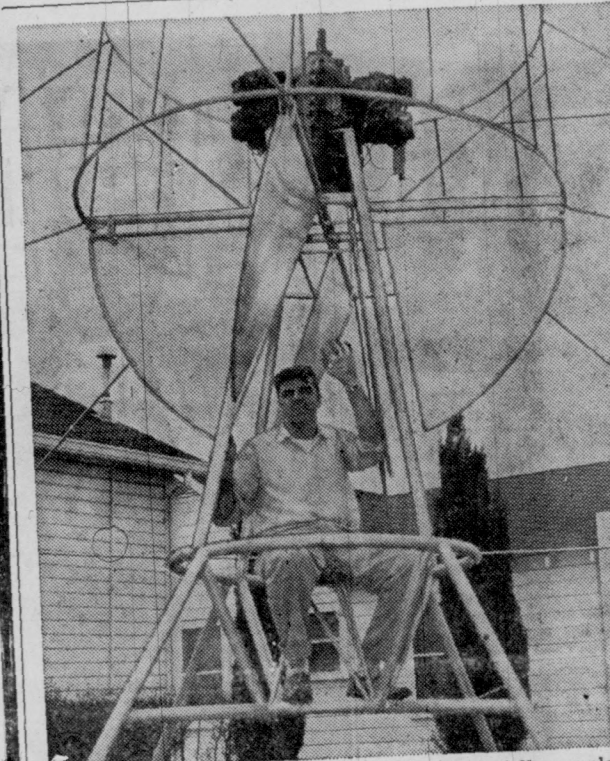

Wool Growers to File Applications For Pay by April 30
 Wool and lamb producers must file applications for payment under the 1956 wool incentive payment program not later than April 30, Chairman Everett Treas of the Marshall County ASC Committee, has announced. The applications must be filed at the County ASC office.

Payments under the 1956 program will be made on marketings of wool and lambs completed between April 1, 1956, and March 31, 1957.

Completions of marketings, Chairman Treas explained, means that the title of wool or lambs must have passed from the seller to the buyer. If any part of the sale—such as price, weight or yield—needed to determine the purchase price is not completed within the dates mentioned above, the sale will not be considered as eligible for submission under the 1956 program.

Sales made after March 31 will be eligible under the 1957 program, which runs from April 1 of this year through March 31, 1958.

In applying for payments, producers must supply documents showing complete information concerning the sale of their wool and lambs.

Max Sledd, a junior student at Belmont College, Nashville, has been elected vice-president of the Belmont College Ministerial Conference.

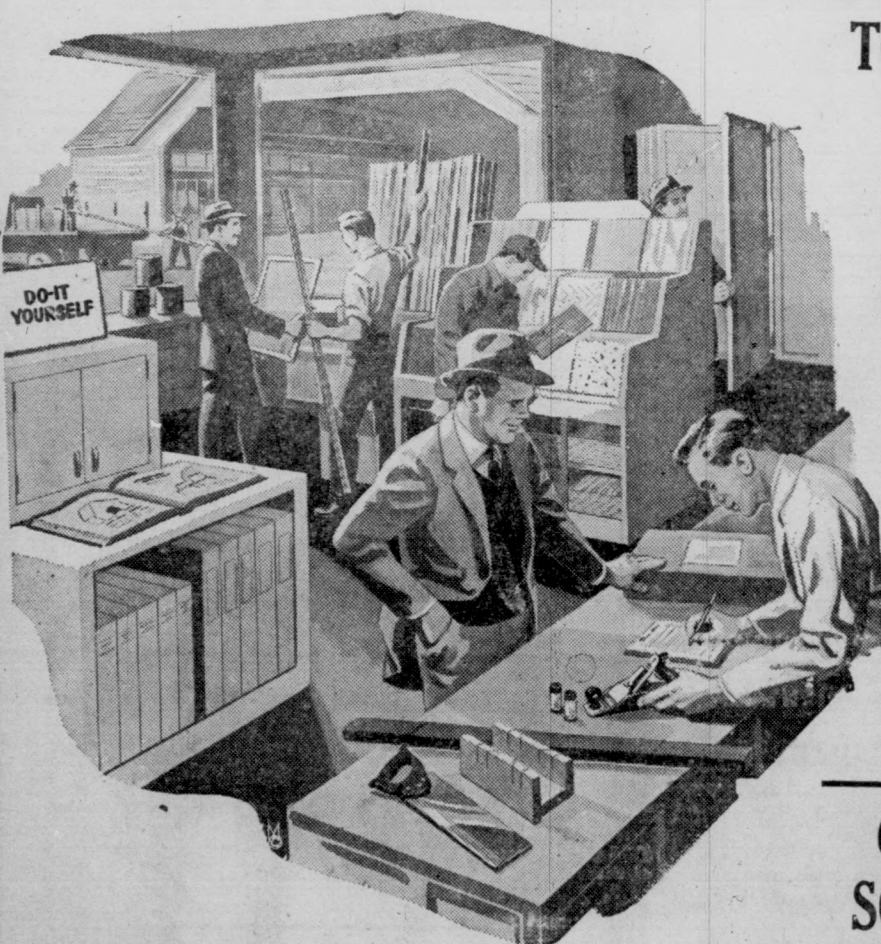

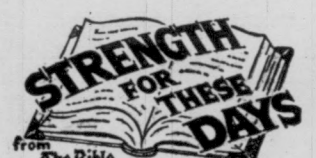
**Poetry From

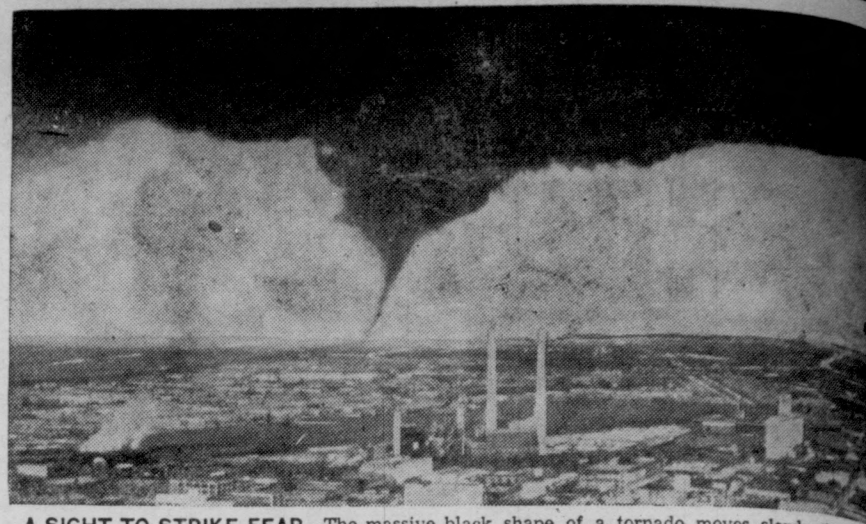

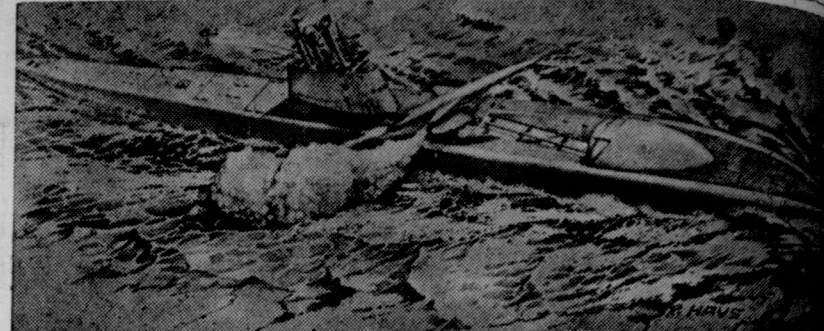

WOODSON CROSS

Auditor Mary Louise State is in the midst of a campaign to let Kentucky taxpayers know how their money is being

Woodson has served not only in county, city and other offices under her jurisdiction, but they not only must file complete financial statements with her office but also must make them PUBLICLY. These statements so taxpayers may know the financial FACTS about the various offices.

Woodson has revealed that only 13 percent of Kentucky officials filed published financial statements. Seventy-one percent of the county boards of education filed published financial reports, and 57 percent of the county treasurers filed their reports. Only 44 percent of the county treasurers filed reports, and a mere 10 percent of treasurers of first and sixth class cities made reports.

WOODSON HAS emphasized that officials entrusted with public funds are required by law to publish financial statements in local newspapers and then compare them with the state auditors' reports for non-compliance. Penalties for non-compliance range from \$50 to \$500.

Woodson's America's earliest days, legislative bodies have insisted that officials receiving and expending public funds should have a public accounting of the money.

This is done for two main reasons. First, the public is entitled to know where revenues come from and how they are spent as a safeguard against dishonesty.

Second, the public official is entitled to protection from the rumors and possible damage charging that he has misused the people's money entrusted to his care.

COUNTY AND CITY school boards in Marshall County publish their financial statements each year. So does the Benton government.

The sheriff's office published its financial report this year for the first time in many a year.

Local court and the county auditor have never, to our knowledge, published a complete financial report to let the citizens of Marshall County know where funds are obtained and how they are spent. They have published stripped-down reports showing total revenue and expenditures, but they do not publish detailed reports.

Stripped-down reports do NOT comply with the law of Kentucky. The courts have held, after the time that the law was compiled with.

Some officials claim that publication of the reports is too expensive and money is lacking to do much work. But that is not so. The complete financial report of Marshall County can be published for approximately \$100 and that is not a high price to let the people know how their funds are being used.

CITIZENS OF THIS county demand to KNOW how their money is spent.

This being election year, now is a good time for citizens to feel a little pressure on candidates in regard to carrying out the duties of their various offices.

A man who accepts public office and then fails or refuses to comply with public laws should be kicked out of office. Citizens have an opportunity to kick out any public official deemed unworthy of trust.

Many find out where our tax money goes.
