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ROW IN MONTREAL.

Indication of Roman Catholics Aroused by a Colorado Delegate.

President, Clark's Public Statement Resented Good Feeling.

Montreal, July 10.—Saturday was the most eventful day in the history of the Christian Endeavor Convention. THROUGH THE HEART.

James Davidson, Better Known as "Buckskin Jim" Put a Ball Through His Heart.

The Sad End of a Man Who Achieved Great Notoriety in His Line—A Short Sketch of His Life.

Last Monday night an "Indian medicine man" arrived in Earlton and pitched his tent for the purpose of selling medicine and extracting teeth. He had been on a spree for some time and was still drunk and seemed to be very dependent. Friday night he had delirium tremens with terrible hallucinations, imagining that the citizens were going to hang him, &c. &c. His wife being unable to manage him, called in several men to help her. At an early hour Saturday morning he asked his wife to go and get him some fresh water. While she was gone for the water he took up a revolver and put a ball through his heart. When he committed the deed there was no one present except his three small children. His remains were shipped to Henderson.

"Buckskin Jim," as Davidson was usually called, was born and partly reared in Henderson, from which place he ran off with a circus when he was quite a young boy. He remained with this circus for several years, finally leaving it to go out West and cast his lot with cow-boys, and later on with Indians.

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A TERRIBLE TORNADO

Swept Through Iowa Killing and Wounding Many People and Destroying Much Property.

Details of the Cyclone Show Many Appalling Scenes—The Town of Pella, Iowa, Destroyed and Other Towns Greatly Damaged.

Fort Dodge, Iowa, July 8.—Pomeroy, a town of 300 inhabitants, in Pottawattamie county, was practically wiped out Thursday night by a cyclone. Between thirty and one hundred were killed and nearly 200 were injured, many of whom will die. The utmost confusion followed the advent of the storm, and it was several hours before the condition of affairs there was known. As soon as the true state of affairs was learned relief trains over the Illinois Central were sent out with a corps of physicians, tents and provisions.

Two women were killed and several injured five miles south of Cherokee. Ten were killed and several injured south of Aurelia.

One person was killed and several injured near Storm Lake.

Nine were killed and two injured south of Fond du Lac.

The names of the injured near Cherokee were Mrs. Lester and Mrs. Molyneux; near Fond du Lac, only one of the Gordon family of seven has been found. It is reported four of the family of Mr. Burgess, near Cherokee, were killed. The rest of the property is beyond estimation.

The most appalling sight of all was in the village of Pomeroy, with a population of close to a thousand souls. Reports here are to the effect that thirty houses are all that are left standing in the town, the rest having been blown away. It is estimated that 60 were killed outright in the town, while 200 injured were stretched along the streets shrieking for help. Special trains were run to Fort Dodge and Fond du Lac for medical assistance and every able-bodied man in the county is lending a helping hand to the wounded and dying.

On to the more densely populated district the monster of destruction moved, leveling all before it, and leaving in its wake a cloud of dust and wreckage, death and demoralization.

The storm at Pomeroy was one of the most terrible cyclones ever known in this section, killing or maiming every living thing within its bounds. The width was 1,000 yards.

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PAID THE PENALTY.

The Ravisher And Murderer of the Ray Girls Lynched At Bardwell, Ky.

The Mob Had Decided to Burn Him at the Stake, But Adopted A Speedier Method—His Body Cremated.

Cairo, Ill., July 8.—The negro who murdered the two daughters of John Ray, near Bardwell, Ky., Wednesday night, was captured at Sikeston, Mo. He escaped across the river to Missouri, and then walked fourteen miles to Charleston, and was beating his way down the Iron Mountain railroad when captured. He gave the name of C. Miller. He had a black and white clothing a bloody razor in his pocket and five rings, one with a black agate setting being identified as belonging to the murdered girls. It was discovered that the guilty fugitive had forced a fisherman to convey him across to Missouri.

Examination showed that the front of his drawers had been recently torn and the garment appeared to have been recently washed around the body.

The party from Bardwell went to Wickliffe, Ky. There Frank Gordon, the fisherman who ferried the murderer across the Mississippi river Wednesday night, identified Miller as the same man. Still Miller pleaded his innocence, and John Ray, the father of the murdered girls, counselled patience.

People were all of the opinion that the crime committed by Miller was too horrible to be punished by the ordinary method of shooting or hanging.

It had been determined to duplicate the deed at Paris, Tex., and the main thoroughfare of Bardwell was chosen as the location of the funeral pyre.

LATER.

Bardwell, Ky., July 9.—The rape and murder, Miller, has paid the penalty for his horrible crime. He was dragged from the county jail late yesterday afternoon by an infuriated mob, and was taken to a place in the woods, where he was burned to death.
