The re-organization was made necessary by the retirement of Boone Hill, veteran chairman of the school board.


W. J. Brien was named new board chairman. Mr. Brien has been a member of the board for 26 years.



Calvert Phone System Asks for Rate Increase

Costs of new dial telephone
program in the Bardwell, Ar-
lington, Milburn and Columbus
areas have been finally deter-
mined by the Calvert Telephone
System, Inc., and based on the
findings, it is now possible to
establish rates to be charged
when dial service becomes ef-
fective. W. W. Thomason, man-
ager, reported this week.

In determining the costs of
dial in the four areas, and af-
ter a review of costs of opera-
tions and added equipment at
Calvert City and Smithland, it
has been found some adjust-
ments in rates will be needed
in the Calvert City and Smith-
land areas, he said.

Company officials Monday fil-
ed with the Public Service Com-
mission at Frankfort a schedule
of rate adjustments. The Com-
mission set 9 a. M. Jan. 27 as
the date for a hearing on the
proposed rates.

Should the rate adjustments
be approved by the Public Ser-
vice Commission, they will not
become effective in the Bard-
well, Milburn, Arlington, and
Columbus areas until the cut-
over to dial which is anticipat-



Most of the trouble in family life comes from the failure to take these things into account. The whole condition of family life makes much forbearance necessary as well as a large amount of constructive kindness.

A good example is the case of Jacob and Esau, brothers of the Old Testament. Jacob in his dealings with his brother was inordinately ambitious and selfish to the point of meanness and criminal deception. Esau was easygoing and slack.

But both turned out a great deal better later on in life. Jacob's energetic ambition became tempered by a sense of responsibility. Esau's slackness developed into a beautiful magnanimity.

There are, of course, the problems of marriage and divorce. One bold, clear fact stands out, viz., that there can be no happy marriage where there is no loyalty between husband and wife. One might say that love comes first, but there are times when duty and loyalty will tide over a situation and give anchorage and safety when love is tested and strained.

Brotherhood is often tested where there is a sense of unfair treatment, or where one in the family has benefited to the disadvantage of others. But here again it is better to be brotherly than resentful.

There is no other way of avoiding quarrels and disruptions.

County Soil Notes

By JAMES O. BURKEEN

Is your bank account in the red after the Christmas spending? If you want to make sure you have Christmas money for the years ahead put some of your cropland in trees and sign it up in the Soil Bank.

You can draw \$10 per acre yearly payment for a period of 10 to 15 years. That is a guaranteed income of \$110 per acre for a 10-year contract.

On top of this you can receive \$20 per acre for setting the trees.

Trees are like money in the bank. Deposit trees on your land now and your return will be pulpwood, posts, shelterbelts, conservation of soil, water, game cover, and recreation.

After the 10-year contract is over you will be free to do as you like with your trees. In 10 to 15 years the trees will be ready for thinning. If treated the thinned out trees will make good posts.

Later on you will be able to harvest light and telephone poles and saw timber.

I believe you will be able to get more than a 6 percent return on your investment.

The trees must be planted on land that has been in crop during the last five years. Hay is counted as a crop.

The main purpose of the program is to take land out of production and put it in storage for future use. As we have a large surplus, the land is certainly not needed for production now. We believe it will be needed later on.

Your local ASC Office can provide more detailed information on the soil bank program. Your ASC committee will take your application and help you work out your contract plan covering cost sharing help and annual payments.

Your SCS technician or forester will provide technical help in your tree planting.

SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE

Coping With Flu

Public health authorities predict that if Asian flu spreads across the United States, the first really large-scale outbreaks will arrive with the cold weather.

The best protection against the disease, authorities agree, is vaccination. Since it takes the body approximately two weeks to build up an immunity after the injection is given, the vaccine should be administered as soon as possible.


This is particularly true in the case of children and the elderly, who are most susceptible to the secondary infections which often follow influenza — infections which can be far more dangerous than the flu itself.

Luckily, physicians will be able to fight the secondary infections with such weapons as Tetracycline, which combines a powerful broad-range antibiotic with other drugs aimed specifically at the symptoms of respiratory diseases.

As the American Medical Association has cautioned, however, antibiotics and sulfa drugs have no effect against the flu itself, either in preventing or treating it.

The value of these drugs, the A.M.A. points out, lies in treating influenza victims who have established cases of secondary bacterial infections which can be cleared up with antibiotics.

Most reassuring word in the Asian influenza picture comes from authorities who point out that the disease is mild and of short duration.
