## Calvert City Fire Dept. Fees Due

Payment for the annual membership in the Calvert City Fire Department is due in February and subscribers are urged to make payment by mail address: Calvert City Fire Department, c/o Fire Department, or by calling at Rendleman's Jewelry Store. A yearly membership certificate will be issued upon receipt of payment.

The cost per membership is \$5 per home, \$10 for small businesses (stores, shops, garages, etc.), and \$25 for large business establishments and industrial plants.

This certificate entitles the holder to free fire protection for a period of one year. Anyone who does not purchase a certificate will be billed \$100 per fire.

The volunteer workers of the Fire Department do not plan to personally contact the citizens

at their home or place of business. It is felt that it is the responsibility of the people who are being protected to use their own effort and initiative in securing their certificate.

In the past seven years, the department, under Fire Chief Ed Rendleman, has had an outstanding record in which it has responded to hundreds of calls.

During this period the department has purchased and paid for a fire truck, a water tank truck and many other accessories such as hose, nozzles, etc. It has installed a fire alarm system and a fire siren. To date, it has not met all operating expenses.

During the past year the department spent approximately \$1,733 in buying new equipment and replenishing that which has

worn out. It is estimated that an equal amount will be needed to maintain this equipment during the ensuing year.

Within the past month, an insurance rating team visited Calvert City. They were satisfied that the Fire Department and equipment were good enough to lower our insurance rating from tenth to seventh class. This will result in a 20-40 percent insurance reduction for all dwellings and business establishments in Calvert City. This rate lowering should be forthcoming within the next several months.

In order to keep this favorable rating, it is necessary that all the fire fighting equipment be kept in top-notch condition. The money from your membership certificates will be used for this purpose.

## Pineapple Sauce Glamorizes Meat Balls

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

YOU'll enjoy this unusual combination of little beef balls tenderized and made wonderfully different by a special pineapple sauce. It's a perfect dish, served with fluffy rice, for a summer porch party.

**Pineapple Meat Balls**  
(Serves 8 for dinner)

**Meat Balls:** One-half cup milk, 1 slice bread, 1 pound hamburger, 1 pound ground round, 1 egg, 2 teaspoons salt, pepper to taste, dash garlic salt, 2 tablespoons salad oil or shortening.

**Pineapple Sauce:** 1 can beef bouillon, 1 No. 2 can pineapple chunks, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1/4 cup wine vinegar, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons soy sauce, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate, 2 tablespoons cornstarch.

Pour milk over crumbled bread to soften. Add to combined meats, egg, 2 teaspoons salt, pepper and garlic salt. Mix well. With wet fingers form into walnut-sized balls (the meat mixture will be soft). Brown in hot oil, shaking pan frequently so balls will keep their round shape.

Meanwhile, simmer together about 15 minutes the bouillon, pineapple, and syrup, green pepper, vinegar, sugar, soy sauce,

simmer 10 to 15 minutes until flavors are blended and meat balls are heated through. Serve from chafing dish or candle warmer with fluffy hot rice or noodles.

## County Soil Notes

By JAMES O. BURKEEN

According to Ollie J. Portis, two miles south of South Marshall High School, sericea lespedeza has increased his corn yield from 50 to 78 bushels per acre.

Says Ollie, "In 1953 I sowed my corn field in lespedeza. Three years later I planted this same field in corn and my yield was 78 bushels per acre.

"I had never made over 50 bushels of corn per acre on this field. I did not use any more fertilizer. I made more corn the second year also.

Ollie went on to explain that sericea has a large tap root than runs deep into the heavy clay and opens it up. When the tap root dies it leaves little holes in the clay. This plant improves the drainage on the tight soil we have in Marshall County."

Sericea is a legume which means it adds a lot of nitrogen to the soil.

Because it is a deep rooted plant, it grows well even in drought years. It pumps plant food from deep in the sub-soil and deposits it on the surface of the top soil.

Sericea lespedeza is a part of the basic soil conservation plan that Ollie and I worked out when we planned his farm last week.

The following Marshall County SCD cooperators sowed a total of 74 acres of sericea in 1957:

Elza Ray Smith, Calvert City, 21 acres; Annie Nelson, Benton, 2 acres; C. L. Downing, Route 5, Benton, 10 acres; W. L. Frazier, Route 1, Gilbertsville, 15 acres; and Joe Faughn, Benton, 20 acres.

"I believe that sericea pays and that is why I have sown 6 acres and plan to sow about 4 acres more.

"I believe it pays to set trees on land that has lost all its top soil. I will set 5 1-2 acres of trees this spring and will set about 3 more acres later on."







## Mandalay Gives Us a Tempting Entree

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

FOR a change, give a party with an oriental slant. Good fun and good food. This recipe, developed by a friend who once worked with the Red Cross in Korea and Japan, combines shrimp, bean sprouts, bamboo shoots and mushrooms into a tempting filling for the Mandalayan pie. You will like it.

### MANDALAYAN PIE

(6 servings)

**Shrimp filling:** 4 strips bacon, diced; 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 1 1/2 cups water, 1 cup chopped shrimp, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 medium-sized onion, sliced; 1 cup bamboo shoots, drained; 1 cup bean sprouts, drained; and one 4-oz. can mushroom pieces, drained.

**Pastry:** 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour, 1/2 cup enriched cornmeal, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 5 to 7 tablespoons cold water.

For the filling, pan-fry diced bacon until crisp. Drain on absorbent paper. Pour excess fat from pan, reserving 3 tablespoons in medium pan; add cornstarch, sugar, salt, soy sauce and water. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened.

Combine thickened sauce with drained, diced bacon; shrimp, celery, sliced onion, bamboo




Mandalayan pie combines with bowls of rice to give you a touch of the Orient and a delightful change of pace.

shoots, bean sprouts and mushrooms. Set aside.

Heat oven to hot (425 degrees F.). For the pastry, sift together flour, cornmeal and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add water by tablespoons, mixing with a fork until pastry will just hold together. On a floured board or canvas, roll out one-half of pastry slightly larger than the 9-inch pie plate.

Line pie plate with pastry and fill with shrimp mixture. Roll out remaining pastry for top crust. In center of top crust, cut lines to resemble an oriental symbol. (Opening provides necessary steam vent.) Turn edge of top crust over bottom crust; seal by pressing with tines of fork. Brush top lightly with milk. Bake in preheated oven (425 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Serve hot.

## Farm Tractors Take Hillary To South Pole



**NEARING THE END** of the historic breakthrough to the South Pole is one of the three Ferguson tractors which Sir Edmund Hillary used to transport personnel and supplies. Leaving his dog teams behind at the base, Hillary relied entirely on these 26 h.p. farm machines to cover the final 400-mile trek through sub-zero temperatures, deep snow and crevasse-ridden terrain. Each tractor hauled a sled carrying more than a ton of fuel and supplies. Nicknamed "Fergies" by the expedition, these TE-20's are the same type of tractor used by American farmers for plowing, cultivating and other farm work. They are smaller predecessors of the newly introduced M-F 65's which head-up the Massey-Harris-Ferguson tractor line for '58. Except for the addition of cab and full tracks over the wheels, the only modifications made were in the cooling and electrical systems. Two other TE-20's were used by Dr. Vivian A. Fuchs' expedition to the South Pole by a different overland route. Hillary radioed from the Pole that the tractors had "performed magnificently."


