Benton's Indians had little difficulty defeating Murray High School's basketball team Tuesday night. The score, 88 to 57.

Coach Farris' boys led 25 to 4 at the end of the first quarter, 44 to 23 at the half and 67 to 36 at the three-quarter post. Coach Farris used his second team in the last quarter.

Gammel scored 23 points for Benton, Gold 21, Dailey 16 and Peck 11.

North Marshall's Jets, after a slow start, blasted Lone Oak 94 to 58 Tuesday night. The Jets held only a 15-14 first quarter lead, but increased it to 40-21 by halftime. And at the end of the third quarter, the score was 60-29.

Hall scored 22 for the Jets, Doyle 21, Ricks 16 and Lamp-ley 11.

Benton and North Marshall will clash Friday night at the Benton gym. South Marshall will play at Almo.

Benton won its 20th game of the season last Friday night by smashing St. Mary's of Paducah 88 to 58. Little Montie Peck, with a big 24 points, was high man for Benton.

South Marshall dropped a couple of games, losing to Reidland 57 to 63 and to Symsonia 53 to 59. The Rebels led Reidland in the first quarter, but couldn't hold on. Mathis was high man for the Rebels with 16 points.

Symsonia, beaten one point by the Rebels weeks ago, turned the tables and defeated the Rebels by one point. York and Green, each with 15 points, led the Rebel attack.

North Marshall lost a tough one to Ballard Memorial, 77 to 78. The score was tied 19-19 at the first quarter, but Benton grabbed a 42-35 lead at half-time. The Jets led 57-55 at the end of the third period and in the fourth period the lead changed hands several times.

Doyle scored 23 and Ricks 20 for the Jets.

The building is 36 by 48 feet. Its exterior is constructed of California redwood and Bedford stone, with a plate glass front and glass entrance door.

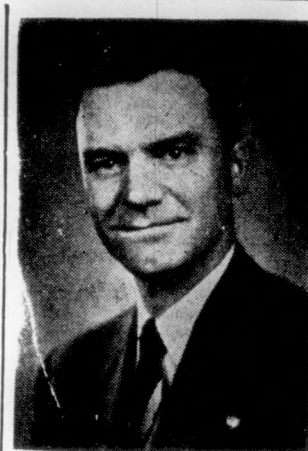
The interior is of knotty pine walls, vinyl tile flooring and acoustical ceiling with recessed lighting fixtures.

## Tobacco Voting Set For Feb. 18

Fire-cured and dark air-cured tobacco growers of Marshall County were reminded this week about the referendum to be held Tuesday, Feb. 18, on marketing quotas for the next three crops.

Everett Treas, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said that notices of individual farm acreage allotments are being mailed to farm operators in advance of the referendum. In this way, farmers will know the quotas they are voting on would affect their individual farming operations for 1958.

A separate marketing quota referendum is being held on the same day for fire-cured and dark air-cured tobacco. If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approve, quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1958, 1959 and 1960 crops of that particular kind of tobacco. Penalties for marketing "excess" tobacco will also be in effect, and price support will be available to eligible growers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

If marketing quotas are disapproved, there will be no quotas, no acreage allotments, and no price support on the 1958 crop of the kind of tobacco voted on. In that event, another vote would be held next year on quotas for the following three years.

## 1958 Wool Program Is Similar to That In Effect Last Year

The 1958 wool incentive program recently announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be similar to the program in effect during the current marketing year, according to Everett Treas, chairman, Marshall Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

As announced earlier, the shorn wool incentive price in 1958 will be 62 cents per pound, as during the past three years. The payment rate for shorn wool will be the percentage required to bring the national average price received by all producers for sales during the 1958 marketing year up to the 62-cent incentive level. The payment rate for the 1956 marketing year was 40 percent.

Producers who market wool during the 1958 marketing year will be eligible for a payment which will be an amount equal to the percentage rate times the proceeds from the sale of their wool. Payments will be made on the 1958 wool in the summer of 1959, when the tabulation of producers returns is completed.

Mr. Treas urges wool producers to get the best possible price for selling their wool. This is important to the grower because, under the percentage method of payment, the higher the price the individual producer gets for his wool in the market, the larger his incentive payment is. This method is designed to encourage producers to do the best possible job of marketing their wool.

The payment method on lambs under the 1958 program will also be the same as under the current 1957 program. Each producer who owns lambs for 30 days or more and sells the lambs unshorn will be eligible for a payment. The payment will be made on the weight increase of the lambs during the period of each producer's ownership.

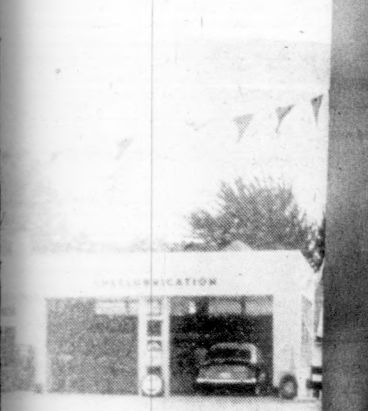

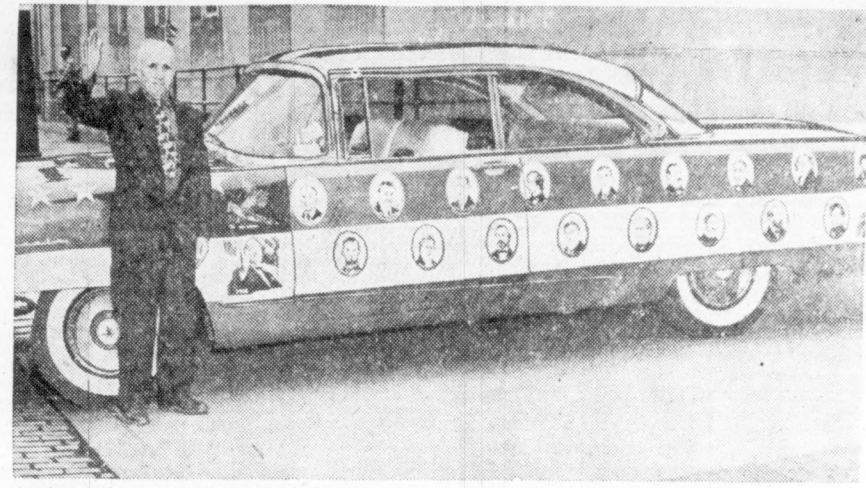

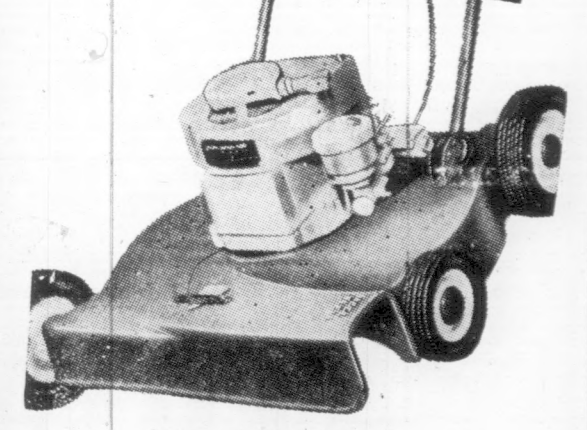
