## Hiway 95 Widening Is Sought

Fiscal Court, in regular session Tuesday at the courthouse, voted to draw up a resolution asking the State Highway Department to widen and improve State Highway 95.

Highway 95 runs from U. S. 68 to Calvert City and also is that town's principal thoroughfare. North Marshall High School is located on Highway 95.

The City Council of Calvert City recently voted to ask Fiscal Court to favor improvement of Highway 95. A copy of the council's resolution was mailed to Fiscal Court.

The seven industrial plants located at Calvert City also wrote to Fiscal Court, urging that Highway 95 be improved.

County Judge Artelle Halton and County Attorney Marvin Prince probably will go to Frankfort soon and present the Highway 95 problem to the State Highway Commission.

Fiscal Court did not consider at its meeting Tuesday the East and West roads in the Calvert City area. The court recently turned down requests that it purchase rights-of-way for the proposed East Road.

Fiscal Court's position was that it did not have the money and also that it would be establishing a dangerous precedent in buying rights-of-way because it had never been done before.

If it were done at Calvert City, they said, it would have to be done in various other parts of the county.

The industrial plants at Calvert City favored the West Road, rather than the East Road. Rights-of-way on the West Road would have cost about \$15,000.

Fiscal Court offered to submit a \$25,000 bond issue to the voters of Marshall County to buy the rights-of-way for both the East and West Roads. Proponents of the East Road did not favor the bond issue idea.

No Calvert City citizens appeared at Tuesday's meeting in behalf of either the East or West roads.

Growers eligible to vote in the referenda are all growers who produced fire-cured or dark air-cured tobacco, or who included 1957 fire-cured or dark air-cured acreage in the 1957 Soil Bank, or if the growers farm acreage allotment was preserved under section 377 of the Act.

Voting places are District 1, Aurora School; District 2, Briensburg School; District 3, Ervin Poe's Store, Palma; District 4, Swift's Store, Oak Level; District 5, Brewster School, and ASC Office, Benton.

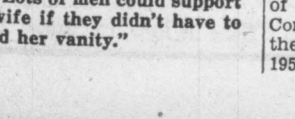
## SEVENTH GRADE PUPILS HERE FORM A 4-H CLUB

## Garbage Franchise Bids Asked

The City Council, in special session Monday night at City Hall, voted to advertise for bids on a franchise for the collection of garbage and trash in Benton.

The franchise will be for a period of one year, with option for renewal from one to 19 years.

Purchaser of the franchise will comply with all city sanitation laws, will provide his own dumping grounds, will procure his own customers and collect his bills.

The garbage collection will NOT be compulsory. No citizen will be required, under the city garbage ordinance, to become a customer of the privately-owned garbage collection service. All citizens, however, will be required to observe the city's sanitation laws.

The garbage collection service will start four weeks after the franchise has been sold.

Any person who desires to go into the garbage collection business is eligible to bid on the franchise.

### Faith By Ear

Lesson for February 18, 1938

WHY is there so much talking in church? By the preacher, that is. There are denominations that don't take much stock in preaching—and in consequence are not famous for good sermons. But the churches supporting this column are all preaching churches. They make a great deal of it. When you attend a "worship service" at 11 A.M. on Sunday in one of these churches, out of an hour's time you will be expected to listen to a man talking at least half that time. Couldn't you get what the preacher is trying to say, faster, if he just passed out leaflets containing his sermon, all printed out?

The Christian custom of preaching arose because this religion took its start among illiterate people. Those who could really read and write, beyond a few words, were far more rare than they now are in the civilized lands of the world. Furthermore, since all the first Christians were Jews, they were already used to the synagogue service, where from childhood they had been brought up to expect some one to read aloud and to explain the Scriptures.

The Benton Board of Education and the Marshall Hosley Mills were co-operating to offer a course in knitting and other hosiery mill work to local young men 18 years of age.

The Benton High School basketball team had tangled with Sharpe's state champion Green Devils and had lost 18 to 20.

And the Benton Debate team was sounding off. Orators were Rayburn Watkins, Chester R. Powell, Robert Landrum, Billy Ely, Ed Brandon and Bill Fiser.

Aurora School had posted its honor roll. Pupils on the coveted list include:

First Grade, Bessie Collier, Chester Uzzle, Glen Hayes Travis and Ruth Ethelene Jones.

Second Grade, Walter Johnson and Betty Collier.

Third Grade, Betty Ruth Jones, Norma Jean Jones and Delores Rudolph.

Fourth Grade, Mary Alice Uzzle and Glenn Clayton.

The path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day. This rich and beautiful figure brings to mind this saying, "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." It is in our will, the inner choice backed by good judgment, that our destiny rests.

To set before oneself the goal of good living, the way of honor and decency, is to be worldly wise as well as spiritually sound. Even where men have to make great sacrifices to keep their integrity, honesty is justified. For what comfort or gain is there for any man to realize that what he has won has been won at the cost of himself?

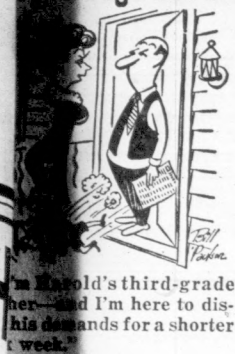

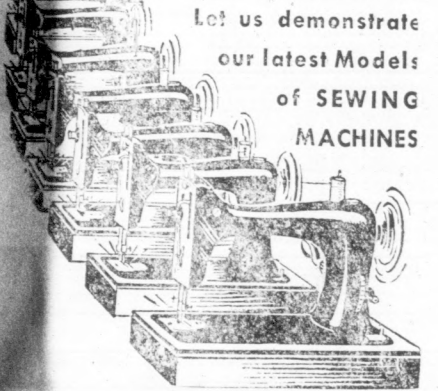

## Ryan Buys Much Milk in This Section

Ryan Milk Co. had one of its most successful years in 1957. James Garrison, general manager, has announced.

The company paid out \$1,255,081.27 last year, which was \$275,979.86 more than it paid out in 1956.

Largest expansion resulted from the purchase of the All-Jersey franchise for the company's trade area, which includes West Kentucky and two counties in Tennessee.

The company now uses the All-Jersey label and also uses new glass bottles.

The firm last year also put on a campaign to encourage owners of small farms to install milking parlors at a small cost of \$300. This cow-to-can program allowed a farmer to milk several cows himself and sell the milk to Ryan's Grade C division.

Many Marshall County farmers sell their milk to Ryan and have set up the cow-to-can program. The company buys both Grade A and Grade C milk in Marshall County and mails checks to quite a number of farmers in this county.

A fleet of Ryan trucks covers this area to pick up grades of milk and to make deliveries to residences and business houses.

Garrison said that the potential for dairying and the sale of dairy products in this area are very good. He also said that "during the months ahead we plan to expand further this market for all goods and services."

... more fun at 53 than at 20 or 30. I can make a good thing out of it. I went back to a college in 1925. I was a guest in the class-... a bonafide student... a mental ob-... relaxed and enjoy-...  
... CAME about when a friend, who is doing college work, was his guest at the Nashville, Tenn., home of a four-hour class. The class was by Dr. Robert M. Foote, a Nashville physician. Normal people of the class is 100 students because of a three-hour class. Last Saturday's class was made up of the class members and special teachers. Most of them were in the class. Only four were in their middle years. Five percent were from the other 25 percent. Most of them were from the Nashville area. One came from as far as Birmingham, Ala., and another from Ind., to attend the class.  
... FOOTE LECTURED the year and a half. His subject was polio. At the time of the lecture, there was a question and answer period. There was a 45-minute question and answer period. The students returned to the classroom for the second half of the four-hour class. The lecture consisted of an hour and a half. Dr. Foote gave a question and answer period and a 15-minute question and answer period on convalescent nursing victims of rheumatism.  
... THE FOUR-HOUR period, students gleaned a great deal of information on polio and fever. These participants will use this information in their capacities as nurses and doctors. They gathered several valuable facts.  
... I learned that two Salk shots provide immunity whatever from the disease. The THIRD Salk shot gives all of the immunity. You can't take the first two shots. You take the first two shots. The third shot is the most accurate or they will not have your tonsils out during a polio epidemic. If you do, you will leave your mouth wide open for the polio virus. A majority of the persons with the dread bulbar polio have been persons without tonsils.  
... AND ANOTHER thing. Polio strikes more older people than it does younger people. That we are such clean, healthy people that we evade the disease bugs in our community and build up immunity to them. When we get a new batch of bugs for polio, we have no immunity.  
... you get an opportunity to go back to college, don't miss it. It's a lot of fun. And it's educational.  
... LINCOLN'S birthday was well known for his story we read only once a year. One of his sons operated a mill. One day, Lincoln said to the mill grinding stone, "You could eat corn meal faster than I could grind it. How long?" asked the stone. "I starved to death," answered the stone.  
... THOUGHT—Break back to a young child. He was looking when promised.  
... MEET
